

Estimates of appropriations required for the service of the fiscal year ending June 30, 1875.

TREASURY DEPARTMENT, December 1, 1873.

SIR: In conformity to the requirements of the joint resolution of January 7, 1846, (9 Statutes, 108,) the eighth section of the act approved May 1, 1820, (3 Statutes, 568,) and the fifth section of the act of May 8, 1872, (17 Statutes, 83,) I have the honor to transmit, for the information of Congress, the estimates of appropriations required for the service of the fiscal year ending June 30, 1875, as furnished by the several Executive Departments; statements showing the balances of appropriations unexpended on the 30th of June, 1873; the amounts appropriated for the service of the fiscal year ending June 30, 1874; the net expenditures for the quarter ended September 30, 1873; the estimated amounts that may be required to complete the service of the year, or of prior years, or that may be carried to the surplus fund; and a detailed statement of the "proceeds of Government property;" also, a combined statement of the receipts and disbursements of the Government, by appropriations, exclusive of the principal of the public debt, for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1873, exhibiting the various sources of the revenues; the *apparent expenses* of each branch of the service under the several Departments, and of each Department, and the *actual expenses*.



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

It is impossible to secure that watchfulness and supervision at night that so large a premises and so great interests require with less than four men. The increase for the two principal interest clerks is justified by the great responsibility attaching to their places, and, so far as regards the present incumbents, the satisfactory manner in which they have performed their duties. Clerks in similar positions at other offices are paid as much or more than is now asked for these gentlemen.

APPENDIX A.

Explanations of the estimate for office of Assistant Treasurer at Baltimore. (See page 20.)

In the estimates for the year ending June 30, 1875, herewith submitted, an increase in the salaries of the cashier and interest clerk is asked and respectfully urged.

The duties performed by the cashier, in this office, are much more in extent and amount than usually attach to the place. He is both receiving and paying teller, and performs an amount of labor so far in excess of what is usual in a similar position elsewhere as to fully entitle him to the advance applied for.

The duties of the interest clerk are also onerous and multiform. He is charged with receiving and examining the gold coin deposited, in addition to the ordinary work indicated by his title, a labor of great care and delicacy under the regulations of the Treasury Department. He also takes charge of and performs the duties of the cashier in case of sickness or necessary absence.

The advance in the pay of the messenger is asked by reason of the necessity of the case—he performs the duties of a clerk when not acting as messenger—and for the additional reason that \$900 per year is little enough for the lowest class of service under the Government, which requires the entire time and attention of the employed.

In the case of the vault watchmen an increase of salary is respectfully urged for the reason that the present payabout \$1 95 per day—is wholly inadequate for men to support themselves and families upon. The watchmen of the Customs department here receive \$3 per diem. The duties of the watchmen of this office are to guard the money of the United States, a very important trust; the duties of the watchmen of the Customs department, in the same building, are to guard the *realty and fixtures*, which are in no great peril of being stolen and carried off; yet the *former* service is paid at the rate of \$1 95 per day and the *latter* at \$3. If importance of trust be a reason for better wages, the discrimination ought to be in favor of, and not so grossly against, the watchmen of this office. I therefore strongly urge, as a matter both of policy and justice, the above small increase in the pay of the particular

employés of this office hereinbefore named.

for the fiscal year commencing July 1, 1874, amounting to \$153,920. The appropriation for the present fiscal year is \$148,980, making an apparent increase for the next fiscal year of \$4,940, as to which I beg leave to submit the following explanation:

And first, in carrying out the new coinage act, it became necessary to organize a separate force of coin weighers. With the approval of the Department, five additional clerks were employed for this purpose, which number has since been reduced to three, and a further reduction to two will be made as soon as practicable. This last number will have to be permanently employed, and I have, therefore, estimated for their salaries at the rate of \$1,500 for each weigher, or \$3,000 in all, which is not excessive for men possessing the requisite skill and otherwise properly qualified for these posi-tions. The employment of coin weighers, being a necessity imposed in the execution of a new law, the \$3,000 estimated for their salaries is not an increase in the rates hitherto paid, and deducting that amount from the apparent increase of \$4,940. it reduces the actual increase in the estimates arising from additional compensation (less \$1,000 saved by dispensing with one hall-man) to \$1,940.

The following statement will perhaps present the explanation in a clearer light:

The positions, the salaries of which it is proposed should be increased, as shown in the foregoing statement, are amongst the most important and responsible in this office, and the present incumbents are men of superior intelligence, long experience, and unswerving fidelity to their trusts. The tellers, especially, are without doubt as accomplished experts, in the examination of coin and currency, as can be found anywhere. They have fairly earned this distinction by years of patient and earnest effort, during which the public, as well as the Government, has repeatedly reaped the benefit of their skill, in the detecting of counterfeits, both coins and notes. Notable examples were the discovery recently of the \$5 counterfeit gold coins of 1872 and the \$500 counterfeit United States notes. In both instances, the counterfeits had passed through the hands of persons of great experience in the detecting of fraudulent coins and bills without suspicion. I may say, further, that the salaries of the tellers employed in this office have never equalled those paid for equal ability by individuals and corporations, and I have no hesitation in recommending that they be increased as proposed.

The cashier and chief clerk, who, as acting assistant treasurer, is invested with all the powers of the assistant treasurer during the absence or disability of the latter, and whose routine duties are arduous and unremitting, is, I think, fairly entitled to the increase in his salary proposed. Few, if any, positions in the civil service require in a greater degree the strictest integrity of character and the most thorough business training. The present salary is not, in my judgment, a fair compensation for the services required, and it is less than what is paid to many of the cashiers of banks in this city. The two chief watchmen, in consideration of the greater responsibility resting on them, are, in my judgment, entitled to some additional compensation, and I have therefore estimated for their salaries at the rate of \$900 each, which is an increase of \$170. This is not more than is paid to watchmen in other public offices.

is an increase of \$170. This is not more than is paid to watchmen in other public offices. May I be allowed to add, as not altogether foreign to the subject, that the expenses of this office have always been regulated with as much regard to economy as seemed consistent with the public interests. And I think I am justified in say¹ng, further, that if the expenses of an office depend in any degree on the amount of business transacted, those of this office are conspicuously low; for, with receipts and disbursements more than three times greater than all the other sub-treasuries and depositories combined, the appropriations for salaries are one-third less.

Salaries.—The excess of \$26,500 is occasioned by the proposed increase in salary of superintendent, (\$500,) assayer, and melter and refiner, (\$500 each,) two clerks, (\$300 each,) and \$24,400 in the transfer of three clerks and five assayer's assistants, heretofore paid from the appropriation for wages of workmen.

Wages of Workmen.—Whilst the estimate for 1875 shows an apparent decrease as compared with the appropriation for the current fiscal year, yet in reality there is an excess of \$24,400, that being the amount transferred from wages of workmen to appropriation for salaries, in the proposed payment of clerks, assistants, &c., heretofore paid from the appropriation for wages of workmen. This increase is deemed necessary, on account of the additional work at that office, especially in silver.

I have the honor to submit herewith the estimates of the Pay Department, U. S. Army, for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1875, as follows:

It will be observed that the amount estimated for pay of the Army is \$227,375 less than the amount estimated under same items for the current year.

These estimates have been carefully prepared, the items for salaries of *all* officers and for pay of enlisted men and employés of the several staff departments being based upon the monthly dues of those actually in service at this date; the items of pay of enlisted men of the Army proper upon the number authorized by existing laws; and the other items upon the actual expenditures of eight months of the last fiscal year. The excess in the estimate, under the head of "Miscellaneous," over the amount estimated thereunder for the current

The excess in the estimate, under the head of "Miscellaneous," over the amount estimated thereunder for the current fiscal year, is due to the inclusion of items of mileage and general expenses heretofore appropriated under separate heads, but embraced in the appropriations for the current fiscal year in one item with pay of the Army.

The excess of \$34,037, in the estimate for Military Academy, over the amount estimated for the current fiscal year, is due to the increased number of cadets under the last apportionment of members of Congress, and the increase of salaries to professors and instructors under the act of February 28, 1873.

APPENDIX F.

Explanation of the estimates for Regular Supplies, Horses for Cavalry and Artillery, Barracks and Quarters, and Clothing and Equipage. (See pages 67 to 69.)

Regular Supplies.—The appropriation of last year, 1872–773, has been entirely exhausted, including the deficiency appropriation, and a larger appropriation is necessary to supply the Army.

The Army of late years occupies a country further from the cultivated and timbered regions, and its forage and fuel is more costly than in former years.

Horses for Cavalry and Artillery.—This estimate provides for a renewal of one-third the horses in service. The appropriations of late years have been reduced, and it is probable that a full proportion of the horses will need replacing this year.

this year. Barracks and Quarters.—Many posts are in process of reconstruction. The Army is advancing its posts and taking up new positions to protect the advancing railroads and settlements. The appropriations for barracks and quarters for several years past have been insufficient, which has led to great

The appropriations for barracks and quarters for several years past have been insufficient, which has led to great inconvenience to the service, personal discomfort and embarrassment to the troops, whom the War Department has not been able to supply with shelter, which, under the laws governing the Army and under the contract of service, they are promised.

Clothing and Equipage.—The new uniform is being distributed to the Army, but the appropriations of the last and present year suffice only to provide a bare supply for the use of the troops. Some stock in depot is needed to meet the contingencies of service and to be en route to the various posts at which it is to be issued. The appropriation asked for will enable the War Department to accumulate a small stock to meet this absolute necessity of service.

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APPENDIX G.

Explanation of the estimates for Military Academy. (See pages 72, 73, and 140.)

UNITED STATES MILITARY ACADEMY,

West Point, N. Y., September 5, 1873.

SIR: I have the honor to forward herewith, estimate of funds required for the Military Academy for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1874.

The items, as to objects and amounts, are the same as for former years, with slight variations, less for some, more for others, found to be desirable, with exceptions stated below:

CURRENT AND ORDINARY EXPENSES.

The item for pay of citizen mechanics and labor for work which cannot be done by enlisted men is placed at \$10,500, instead of \$8,000. The increase is rendered necessary on account of the increase, relatively, of the cost of labor for a given amount of work under the system of eight hours per day, as compared with that of ten hours per day, on which the estimate was formerly based, and also the increased difficulty of procuring the enlistment of mechanics.

2. The item for compensation of draughtsman, making drawings for use in section-rooms, &c., (\$120,) in department of civil and military engineering. The pay of an enlisted man is so much below the compensation usually paid to competent draughtsmen, that an addition is necessary to secure the enlistment of a suitable person. The services of such a man are very necessary in this department of instruction. In case the allowance recommended shall be approved, I would respectfully suggest that a special clause be included in the act of appropriation, granting authority for the payment, in future, when appropriated, as well as for the particular year. It was at one time held by the Comptroller, in reference to the pay of additional compensation to enlisted men here, that such special authority, in addition to an appropriation of the money, was necessary, as, otherwise, the general acts fixing the pay of enlisted men would exclude the additional compensation only authorized by appropriation.

3. The item of \$400 for one barge, included in the estimate for the department of practical military engineering. This is asked for to procure a barge to replace one, old and unfit for use; it is necessary in this department of instruction, and will also be necessary for use otherwise in the public service at the post.

MISCELLANEOUS ITEMS AND INCIDENTAL EXPENSES.

4. The item of \$1,000, for renewing furniture for academic section-rooms and offices, is necessary to provide plain furniture for the use stated, and to replace worn-out articles.

5. The item of \$60, for papers and periodicals for cadet hospital, is necessary to provide suitable reading-matter for the sick, particularly convalescents. Such provision would be very beneficial in a sanitary point of view and otherwise. 6. The item of \$1,200, for hire of a school teacher for instruction of children of enlisted men at the post, is necessary to provide suitable elementary teaching for such children. The number of children of suitable age is sufficient to require the employment, for the whole year, of a competent teacher. In the past, such instruction has been given, as could be, by the detail of enlisted men and temporary employment of civilian teachers; but such means have been found inadequate

for the object desired. 7. The item "Printing catalogue for library" is necessary for reprinting the library catalogue. No complete catalogue has been printed since 1853, since which time the library has been greatly increased in number of volumes.

BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS.

8. The item of \$8,000, for the construction and furnishing of a school-house for soldiers' children, is necessary to provide a building suitable for the purpose. At present the only available place, and which is used therefor, is the basement of the soldiers' chapel. It is insufficient as to space, damp, and badly ventilated. The amount asked for will be sufficient to meet present, and all probable future, necessities of the case. It is proposed to construct a plain, one-story brick building, school-room thirty by sixty feet, and entry, with room on each side, eight by ten feet, for cap and cloak-rooms for boys and girls. This would give no more room than necessary for the purpose. The furniture to consist of the usual school desks, seats, and blackboards.

APPENDIX I.

Explanation of estimate for Building for Treasury Archives and Bureau of Engraving and Printing. (See page 120.)

The files of the Department are increasing annually about nine thousand cubic feet, and this increase has heretofore

The files of the Department are increasing annually about nine thousand cubic feet, and this increase has heretofore been supplied by renting and fitting-up temporary buildings contiguous to the office using them. Those now in use are, the building on the corner of New York Avenue and 17th street, NW.; the building adjoining Winder's building, on 17th street; the Kidwell building, on E street, near 14th; and some temporary wooden buildings on the ground designed for the site of the proposed new buildings. The garret over the eastern portico of the Treasury building has been fitted up, and is now full. All these buildings are mere fire-traps, and should not be continued in use one day longer than is absolutely necessary to provide safe and fire-proof storage for the papers in them. A fire, fairly started, would consume valuable vouchers and evidence of payment which could not be replaced, and which would cause the Government the loss of millions of money, by duplication of claims, besides the loss of historical data of great importance.

It is designed that the building to be erected shall be of such dimensions as to afford accommodation for the necessities of this Department for the next ten years.

APPENDIX K.

Explanation of estimates for Government Hospital for the Insane. (See page 141.)

Additions to the original plan of the hospital, and the increase in the number of patients under treatment, render it Additions to the original plan of the hospital, and the increase in the number of patients under treatment, reduer it necessary to correspondingly increase the size of the ventilating fan and of the engine that drives it, and to furnish and fit up another kitchen. About one-third of the amount of the last estimate will be needed for those purposes, and the remainder will be required for painting and repairs necessary to preserve the Government property, and for such improve-ments in the furniture, and fitting up of the wards, and in the facility for the medical and moral management of the patients, as are suggested by experience and the progress of this branch of the healing art. The river wall has been built on just one-half of the extent of the river front, at a cost of ten thousand dollars; but as the average death of the water is less along the line of the reweinder of the river front, it is estimated that this part of

the average depth of the water is less along the line of the remainder of the river front, it is estimated that this part of

the work can be completed for eighty-seven hundred and eighty-eight dollars; and the cost of raising those portions of the boundary walls that were originally extended into the river and now intersect the front wall, so that the former cannot be scaled from the latter, or from the filling of earth behind it, will be nine hundred and sixty dollars—the two amounts making the sum of eighty-seven hundred and forty-eight dollars.

The centre building of the hospital edifice contains the administrative offices of the establishment, the principal kitchens and storerooms, the general assembly rooms, and the officers' quarters. The hospital was originally intended to accommodate a maximum of 350 patients, and the present centre was planned for an institution of that size. The number of patients now under treatment exceeds 600, and is increasing, and more room is needed for the assembling of the patients, both for worship on the Sabbath and for lectures, concerts, and exhibitions on other days of the week. The present assembly room accommodates barely 350 patients and their attendants, and at least 100 of the inmates of the institution whose mental condition is such that they would derive pleasure and benefit from being present on such occasions are now unable to attend the Sabbath services and the entertainments on other days.

Additional room is also much needed for all the other purposes for which the central building is used. It is proposed to add 45 feet to the rear end of the present structure, and, by extending the assembly-room into the addition, nearly double its present accommodations. Below the assembly-room will be two stories and a cellar, which will contain the other rooms that are needed.

The demand for increased accommodations has rendered it necessary to fit up two of the original coal-rooms for diningrooms and to use the remaining two as workshops, and it has, for some years, been necessary to deposit the most of the coal used for heating the house in an unsightly pile, a short distance outside of the windows of patients' rooms. By using the foundation walls of the house for two sides of the vault, it is estimated that convenient storage room for 500 tons of coal can be secured for the moderate amount of this estimate.

This building was erected in 1856, and accommodates 20 patients, and it is thought that it may be extended so as to comfortably accommodate 44 altogether. The room is needed, and it is thought that it can be properly obtained in no cheaper way, nor in one more advantageous to the classification and treatment of the inmates of the institution.

APPENDIX L.

Explanation of the estimates for Coast Survey Service. (See page 153.)

COAST SURVEY OFFICE, Washington, D. C., September 18, 1873.

SIR: I have the honor to submit detailed estimates for continuing field and office-work in the survey of the Atlantic, Gulf, and Western coasts of the United States, during the fiscal year 1874-75.

The small increase asked for, in the two leading items of the estimate, seems unavoidable, on account of continued increase in the cost of supplies required in the field service.

For the geodetic connection my estimate was, for the present fiscal year, fifty thousand dollars, in view of additional demands for the determination of points within the interior States. The appropriation of thirty-six thousand dollars in lieu of the estimated sum has not availed for the requirements of the service, two other States, Wisconsin and Kentucky, having applied within the year for the benefit intended by that item, in prosecuting their geological surveys. The determination in the interior, of points in true relation to the eastern and western coasts, limited as it is to "each State of the Union which shall make requisite provision for its own topographical and geological surveys," now requires an increase of means for extending the provisions of this item in the west, and it is hoped that the increase of the estimate to sixty-five thousand dollars will enable the survey to perform all the work which may be required during the next fiscal year in the several States that are entitled to the service.

In illustration of the detailed estimates, I present, as heretofore, an abstract of the work done between the 1st of November, 1872, and this date, parties being now in the field at the north where the survey will be prosecuted until the approach of cold weather, when they will be transferred to sites of work on the southern coast. The field-work will be recapitulated in geographical order. Parties now on the coast of Maine are engaged in the survey of Mount Desert Island, and the adjacent hydrography; on the shores of Eggenoggin Reach; on the coast near Castine; on the islands in that vicinity, including those of Isle au Haut Bay; and on the Penobscot above Belfast. Supplementary work has been done in the upper part of Casco Bay, and in Portland harbor; points have been determined by triangulation in New Hampshire; special observations are in progress near North Adams, Massachusetts, for the determination of terrestrial gravity; and others, at Cambridge, for finding the longitude of points in the interior of the United States; off-shore hydrography is continued near George's Bank; in-shore soundings, near Nantucket; and tidal observations have been constantly recorded at North Haven, Penobscot Bay, and at the United States Navy Yard, Boston. The harbors between Portland and New York have been further examined for the preparation of final sailing directions. Field-work is advancing on the coast of Rhode Island, west of Point Judith. Special observations in hydrography, including those relating to tides and currents, are in progress in New York harbor. Field-work on the south side of Long Island; on the shores of Raritan River, New Jersey; on the shores of Lake Champlain, with adjacent soundings; and station marks of triangulation in the vicinity of New York, have been examined with reference to their preservation. Determinations have been connected with the primary triangulation which passes from New York to the head of Chesapeake Bay; coast topography has been prosecuted between Barnegat and Absecom; hyd

The harbors of the Chesapeake have been specially examined with reference to sailing directions; the survey of James River, Va., has advanced above Warwick River entrance; that of Elizabeth River has been completed; latitude has been determined at a station on Knott's Island, Va.; the survey has been continued in Currituck, Pamplico, and Core Sounds, including Pungo and Chowan Rivers, with observations for the latitude of a station near Ocracoke Inlet. Further southward the operations of the year include Cape Fear River, to Wilmington, N. C.; the coast of South Carolina, between Little River and Winyah entrance; the coast south of Winyah Bay; parts of Coosaw River and of Port Royal Island; latitude at St. Simon's Island, Ga.; the survey of Halifax River and the adjacent coasts below Matanzas Inlet, Fla.; and the extension of hydrography in the vicinity of the Florida Reef.

On the Gulf coast the operations of the year include Tampa Bay; the coast between Cedar Keys and Ocilla River, and between St. George's Sound and Dickerson's Bay; the Gulf approaches to Apalachicola; the vicinity of the Atlanta base line, Ga.; Chandeleur Sound, La.; the Mississippi River from Jesuit Bend to New Orleans; the east branch of Galveston Bay; and Espiritu Santo, St. Joseph's and Aransas Bays, Texas.

Points in the geodetic connection between the Atlantic and Western coasts have been occupied in Missouri, Wisconsin, and Colorado, and now each State and Territory of the Union along the belt which includes the 39th parallel has at least one point accurately determined in latitude and longitude. The plan of field and hydrographic work on the Western coast, and in the prosecution of which parties have been or

The plan of field and hydrographic work on the Western coast, and in the prosecution of which parties have been or are now engaged, comprises hydrographic developments in the vicinity of San Diego; the coast of California near Newport and San Juan Capistrano; Catalina Harbor, Point Hueneme, San Buenaventura, Santa Barbara, Santa Rosa Island; the coast north and south of Point Conception; reconnoissance between Santa Barbara and Monterey; the coast between Point Sal and San Luis Obispo Bay; north of Piedras Blancas; San Francisco entrance and approaches; latitude, longitude, azimuth, magnetic elements, co-efficient of refraction, and observations on the tides and currents at stations north and south of San Francisco; deep sea soundings near Falmouth Shoal; development of the Cordell Bank; field-work on the coast north of Mendocino Bay; south of Bear River; soundings between Cape Mendocino and Rocky Point, and offshore from Crescent City Reef; the coast north of Mack's Arch; soundings off the Orford Reef; extension of the survey of Columbia River and of Shoalwater Bay; Budd's Inlet; Puget Sound; and geographical reconnoissance of the coast, including special surveys of the harbors of Alaska.

The work in the Coast Survey office, embracing the computation of observations, the drawing, engraving, and publication of maps and charts, has kept pace with the operations in the field. Nineteen charts engraved on copper have been completed, twenty-three continued, and six new ones commenced, in addition to which six preliminary charts have been published by means of the photo-lithographic process, which greatly expedites the publication of new material. In the drawing division sixty-three charts have been worked upon, being either completed or brought up to the date of the survey. Fourteen thousand copies of copperplate charts and fifty-three hundred of lithographic charts have been printed, and nearly as many issued to sales agents, and to different departments of the Government, chiefly the Navy and Revenue Marine. Tide tables for all ports in the United States for the year 1874, have been computed and issued. The important matter of reproducing the original topographical maps, which exist only in a single copy, has received continued attention, and satisfactory results have been obtained by the comparatively inexpensive process of photo-lithography. It is proposed to proceed with the reproduction of these maps as fast as the means can be applied to that object. The preparation of a "Coast Pilot" or sailing directions for all the harbors and the coastwise navigation between Eastport, Maine, and Newport, Rhode Island, has been completed and that much-needed work is now ready for publication.

ESTIMATES IN DETAIL.

SECTION I.-COAST OF MAINE, NEW HAMPSHIRE, MASSACHUSETTS, AND RHODE ISLAND.

Field Work.—To continue the topography of the western shores of Passamaquoddy Bay and its estuaries, and of the coast and islands between Castine and Mount Desert; to determine the heights of the principal trigonometrical points in the section; to complete the hydrography of Penobscot Bay and River, and continue the soundings eastward to Mount Desert; to make such additional triangulation as may be required for the topographic and hydrographic surveys; to continue the resurvey of Monomoy and Nantucket Shoals, and the off-shore hydrography of this section, and make special examination for the sailing lines for charts; to continue the tidal observations and to make such astronomical and magnetic observations as may be required. *Office Work.*—To compute results from the field observations; to continue the drawing of charts No. 1 and No. 2, showing the approaches to the coast of Maine, between Passamaquoddy entrance and Petit Manan Light-house; to continue drawing and engraving for charts No. 3, No. 4, and No. 6, which include Frenchman's Bay, Blue Hill Bay, the approaches of the Penobscot and the coast between Kennebec entrance and Saco; also for local charts of Mooseabec Reach, Mount Desert Island, Eggemoggin Reach, Penobscot Bay East, Penobscot River, and the vicinity of Monomoy Shoals, will require

SECTION V.-COAST OF SOUTH CAROLINA AND GEORGIA.

Field Work.—To extend northward the primary triangulation along the Blue Ridge; to continue the topographical survey southward of Cape Romain; to determine azimuth for the triangulation of the coast of South Carolina, to complete the detailed survey of the sea islands and water passages between Charleston and Savannah, and to make tidal observations. Office Work.—To make computations and reductions; to continue the drawing and engraving of the general chart of the coast between Cape Romain and the St. Mary's River, and of charts Nos. 51 and 52, between Cape Fear and Winyah Bay; and to make additions to the charts and sketches, will require.

SECTION VI.-COAST, KEYS, AND REEFS OF FLORIDA.

Field Work.—To extend southward from Cape Canaveral the triangulation, topography, and hydrography of the sea-water channels adjacent to the eastern coast of the Florida peninsula; to make the requisite astronomical observations; to continue the off-shore hydrography of the Florida peninsula, and observations on the Gulf stream, and to complete soundings in the vicinity of the reefs and keys. Office Work.—To reduce and compute from the field records; to continue the drawing and engraving of the general chart of the coast from St. Mary's River to Cape Canaveral, and of charts Nos. 58 and 59, from Cumberland Sound to Mosquito Inlet, and to make additions to the charts of the section, will require.

SECTION VII.—GULF COAST OF THE FLORIDA PENINSULAR NORTH OF TAMPA, AND COAST OF WESTERN FLORIDA.

Field Work.—To make the astronomical and magnetic observations requisite in this section; to continue the triangulation, topography, and hydrography of Tampa Bay, and of the western coast of the peninsula between Cedar Keys and Appalachee Bay; to run lines of soundings in the Gulf of Mexico and develop the hydrography of the Gulf coast included in the field operations. Office Work.—To compute from the astronomical and field records; to continue the drawing and engraving of charts No. 79, No. 82, No. 83, No. 86, and No. 87, showing parts of the Gulf coast between Chassahowitska River and Pensacola entrance, and of the chart of Tampa Bay, will require.

SECTION VIII.-COAST OF ALABAMA, MISSISSIPPI, AND PART OF LOUISIANA.

Field Work.—To connect the survey of the Mississippi River at New Orleans with that of Lakes Borgne and Pontchartrain; to determine geographical positions and make the astronomical and magnetic observations required in this section; to extend the triangulation and topography westward of the Mississippi delta, and continue the hydrography of the Gulf of Mexico. Office Wcrk.—To make the computations required; to continue the drawing and engraving of charts No. 91, No. 92, No. 93, No. 94, and No. 95, showing Lake Borgne, Lake Pontchartrain, Isle au Breton Sound, and the Mississippi River between New Orleans and the Gulf of Mexico, will require.

SECTION IX.—COAST OF PART OF LOUISIANA AND COAST OF TEXAS.

Field Work.—To extend the triangulation and topography of the coast of Texas westward from Sabina Pass, and south of Corpus Christi; to measure a base of verification, and make the astronomical and magnetic observations requisite in this section; to continue the hydrography of the approaches to the coast and of the bays and passes. Office Work.—To compute results from observations recorded in the field; to continue the drawing and engraving of the general chart between Galveston and Rio Grande, and of charts Nos. 109 and 110, showing Aransas Bay, Copano Bay, and Corpus Christi Bay, will require.....

The estimate for the survey of the Western Coast of the United States is intended to provide for the following progress:

APPENDIX M.

Explanation of the estimate for "Observation and Report of Storms." (See page 154.)

SIR: In submitting these estimates, the chief signal officer invites attention to the fact, that the proper distribution of the reports, to reach directly the farming population, as has been practiced during the past year; the publication of river reports now had upon all the principal rivers; the connection of stations established at life-saving stations and lighthouses upon the coast, and the display of signals thereat, as also at the principal ports of the United States, cannot be carried out and maintained with any less sum. The chief signal officer, therefore, ventures to hope that the appropria-

ion estimated for will not be reduced by a single dollar. There are now filed in this office applications for one hundred and forty-four (144) stations on the part of influential authorities, boards of trade, and others, representing large communities, which cannot be granted. APPENDIX N.

Explanation of the estimates for "Refunding to States expenses incurred in raising volunteers," and "Horses and other property lost in the military service." (See page 155.)

SIR: I have the honor to acknowledge receipt of your letter of 21st instant, asking what amounts will probably be required to meet claims settled in this office during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1875, payable from the appropriations "refunding to States expenses incurred in raising volunteers," and "payment for horses and other property lost or destroyed in the military service." In reply, I have to state that the probable amounts required will be as follows: For payment of claims refunding to States expenses incurred in raising volunteers, five hundred thousand dollars, (\$500,000;) and for payment for horses and other property lost or destroyed in the military service, four hundred and fifty thousand dollars, (\$450,000)—*i. e.*, the amount required for payment of claims for lost horses will be one hundred thousand dollars, (\$100,000;) and for steamboats and other vessels, railroad engines, and cars destroyed, three hundred and fifty thousand dollars, (\$350,000;) making a total of four hundred and fifty thousand dollars, (\$450,000,) as above stated. The second section of the act of March 3, 1849, entitled "An act to provide for the payment of horses and other property lost in the military service," as amended by the fifth section of the act of March 3, 1863, entitled "An act to promote the efficiency of the Corps of Engineers," &c., makes it necessary that this appropriation should now be made, especially as, owing to a misunderstanding, no appropriation was made last year for the payment of steamboats, cars, &c., lost in the military service of the United States.

lowing classes of claims, amounting in the aggregate to seventy four thousand dollars, (\$74,000,) namely: Claims for three-months' extra pay, under the act of Congress approved July 19, 1848, (the unexpended balances of moneys originally designed for their payment having been covered back into the Treasury,) \$60,000, as follows: The amount now due the Soldiers' Home, on settlements made by this office under the act of March 3, 1851, which cannot be paid for want of an appropriation, fifty-three thousand five hundred and forty-one dollars, (\$53,541.) The amount of claims under the act of July 19, 1848, now ready for settlement or liable at any time to be called up

and completed, six thousand four hundred and fifty-nine dollars, (\$6,459.)

Claims for pay of volunteers in the war with Mexico, now ready for settlement or in process of adjudication, \$10,000. Claims for pay of Florida volunteers of 1857 and 1858, under the act of Congress approved March 3, 1859, \$2,000. Claims for pay of volunteers in the Black Hawk war and other Indian wars from 1818 to 1838, \$2,000.

STATEMENT OF THE PROCEEDS OF GOVERNMENT PROPERTY, PUBLISHED IN CONFORMITY TO THE FOLLOWING PROVISIONS OF LAW:

SEC. 5. That all proceeds of sales of old material, condemned stores, supplies, or other public property of any kind, shall hereafter be deposited and covered into the Treasury as miscellaneous receipts, on account of "proceeds of Government property," and shall not be withdrawn or applied except in consequence of a subsequent appropriation made by law; and a detailed statement of all such proceeds of sales shall be included in the Appendix to the Book of Estimates. But this section shall not be held to repeal the existing authority of law in relation to marine hospitals, revenue-cutters, the clothing fund of the Navy, or the sale of commissary stores to the officers of the Army. And it shall be the duty of the Register of the Treasury to furnish to the proper accounting officers copies of all warrants covering such proceeds, where the same may ne neces-sary in the settlement of accounts in their respective offices. (Act of May 8, 1872, 17 Statutes, 83.) Src. 1. That the fifth section of the act approved May eighth, eighteen hundred and seventy-two, making appropriations for the legislative, executive, and judicial expenses of the Government for the year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and seventy-three, shall not be held to apply to materials, stores, or supplies sold to officers and soldiers of the Army, or to exploring or surveying expeditions authorized by law, and that said section shall not be held to repeal such part of paragraph 1032, Revised Army Regulations of eighteen hundred and sixty-three, as provides that expenses of sales of military stores or supplies regularly condemned will be paid from their proceeds. (Act of June 8, 1872, 17 Statutes, 337.)

b War Appropriations—Forts and Fortifications.—The balance of appropriations for forts and fortifications included in this statement were not limited to fiscal years by the acts making them. The act of February 21, 1873, making the appropriation for this branch of the service for the present fiscal year subjects these appropriations to the limitation imposed by the terms of the act of July 12, 1870.

c War Appropriations-Rivers and Harbors - These amounts were appropriated March 3, 1873, and placed to the credit of these appropriations March 29, 1873, and are merged in the balances of June 30, 1873, or have been drawn against, not being limited by law to fiscal years.

d Interior Indian Appropriations.—These amounts were appropriated February 14, 1873, and placed to the credit of these appropriations April 29, 1873, having been made available for expenditure for 1873 by provision of law, and are merged in the balances of June 30, 1873. By a devision of the First Comptroller, the appropriations made for 1873 and prior years for the Indian service, contained in this statement, are limited in expenditure to the service of those fiscal years. 




