SCHOOL-BUILDINGS FOR THE SACS AND FOXES AND IOWA INDIANS.

IN RELATION TO

An appropriation for schools and school-buildings for the benefit of the Sacs and Foxes and the Iowa Indians in Nebraska,

Sin: I have the honor to transmit herewith a copy of a report of the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and accompanying papers, in relation to schools and school-buildings for the benefit of the Sacs and Foxes, and the Iowa Indians in Nebraska, as contemplated by the fifth article of the treaty of 6th March, 1861, with said Indians.—(12 Stat. at I., p. 1172.)

The estimates forwarded by the Commissioner, with a view to an appropriation for the objects contemplated, are herewith submitted, with the recommendation that they receive the favorable consideration of Congress.

Sir: I have the honor to state that, by the fifth article of the treaty of March 6, 1861, with the Saes and Foxes and the Iowas, (Stat. at L., vol. 12, p. 1172,) the United States agree to expend the sum of \$1,000 for the erection of a suitable school-house and dwelling-house for the school-teacher, for the benefit of the Saes and Foxes. For some reason, not now known to this office, said sum of \$1,000 has never been

appropriated, and consequently no school-house has been provided for

the Sacs and Foxes, as stipulated in said treaty.

Late Superintendent Janney, in a communication to this office dated March 3, 1871, (copy herewith,) suggests that said sum "be used in enlarging the building proposed as an 'Industrial Home' on the Iowa reservation," and that some of the Sac and Fox children be admitted to that institution. The sum stipulated in the treaty above referred to will, doubtless, not prove sufficient to erect a suitable school-house and dwelling-house for the teacher, and unless Congress will appropriate at least \$2.500 for the erection of said buildings, I would respectfully recommend that the necessary authority be granted by that body to use the sum of \$1,000, when appropriated, in the manner and for the objects named in the late superintendent's letter.

I herewith inclose two estimates of appropriation, in accordance with the views herein expressed, and respectfully request that the same be

submitted to Congress for its action.

OMAHA NEBRASKA, Third Month 27, 1871.

RESPECTED FRIEND: It has recently come to my knowledge that in the treaty with the Saes and Foxes and Iowas, made March 6, 1831, promulgated March 26, 1833, article 5, there is a provision that the United States shall expend the sum of \$1,000 for the erection of a suitable school-house and dwelling-house, for the schoolteacher, for the benefit of the Sacs and Foxes, and also the additional sum of \$200 per amum for school purposes, so long as the President of the United States may deem advisable. This stipulation, I believe, has never been complied with. Some of the Saes and Foxes wish their children educated, and there is no school on their reservation.

If the above-mentioned funds are applicable to this purpose, I suggest that they be used in enlarging the building proposed as an "industrial home," on the Iowa reservaion, and admitting some of the Sac and Fox children to said institution. As the Sac and Fox tribe of Indians come under the head of those "not otherwise provided for" in relation to schools, and for whom \$100,000 was appropriated by Congress last year, it would seem as if they were justly entitled to a portion of the above sam.

I am sorry to say there is very little improvement in the Sacs and Foxes, which I attribute to their living six miles from the agency, with no employes of the Government among them. Their neighbors, the Iowas, are rapidly improving, both in their physical and moral condition.
