## AGREEMENT WITH WICHITAS AND OTHER INDIANS.

## LETTER

FROM THE

# AOTINGSECRETARY OF THE INTERIOR, 

Articles of agreement with the Wichitas and other affiliated tribes, granting them a home in the Indian Territory, concluded in this city October 19, 1872.

January 7, 1873-Referred to the Committee on Indian Affairs and ondered to be printed.

## Department of the Interior, Washington, D. C., January 6, 1873.

SIR: I have the honor to lay before Congress articles of agreement between the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, representing the United States, and certain chiefs and head-men of the Wichitas and other affiliated bands of Indians, concluded in this city on the 19 th day of October, 1872, whereby a certain tract of country in the Indian Territory is granted to said Indians for a home, and recommend that the same receive the approval of Congress.

A copy of a report of the 19th ultime, from the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, in relation to the subject, is also herewith transmitted.

SIR: I have the honor to transmit, herewith inclosed, articles of agreement, made and concluded in tkis city, on the 19 th day of October last, by and between the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, representing the United States, on the one part, and certain chiefs and head-men, members of the Wichitas and other affiliated bands of Indians, duly authorized to act for their people, of the other part, whereby the United States, party of the first part, agrees to give and grant to the said.

Wichitas and other affiliated bands, for a home, the tract of land in the Indian Territory, deseribed in article 1 of the iuclosed agreement, bounded as follows: "Commencing at a point in the middle of the main chanuel of the Wichita River where the 98th meridian of west longitude crosses the same; thence up the middle of the main channel of said river to the line of $98040^{\prime}$ west longitude; thence on said line of $98040^{\prime}$ due north to the middle of the main channel of the man Canadian River; thence down the middle of said main Canadian River to where it crosses the ninety-eighth meridian ; thence dne soath to the place of beginning;" and in consideration of the reservation provided for in said article 1, the Wichitas and other affiliated bands cede and relinquish to the United States all right, title, interest, or claim of any nature whatsoever in and to any lands in Texas, Lonisiana, Indian Territory, or elsewhere within the limits of the United States.

This agreement is transmitted to you with the recommendation that the same may be laid before Congress for ratification.

In this connection I deem it proper to state that these Indians have for many years (except when driven out by the rebellion) occupied the tract of country set apart for them by the first article of the agreement before referred to, aut if confirmed it will secure to these Indians the home they desire, and will be a settlement of all claims they may have to lands in other parts of the country, which claims have heretofore beeu urged in their behalf.

Articles of agrecment made and concluded at Washingtou City, District of Columbia, this nineteenth day of October, A. D. 1872, by and between Francis A. Walker, Commissioner of Indian Affaips, representing tho United States, of tho one part, and the undersigned chiefs, head-men, and members of the Wichitas and other affiliated bands of Indians duly authorized to act for their people, of the other part, wituesseth :

Airtiche 1. The United States hereby give and grant to the said Wichitas and other affiliated bands, for a home, the tract of combtry bomnded as follows, to wit: Commencing at a point in the midule of the main channel of tho Washita River, where the 98 th meridian of west longitnde erosses the same, thence up the middle of the main channel of said river to the line of $98^{\circ} 40^{\prime}$ west longitude, thence on said line of $98^{\circ}$ $40^{\prime}$ due north to the middle of the main channel of the main Canadian River, thence down the middle of said main Canadian River, to where it crosses tho $98 t h$ meridian, thence due south to the place of begimuing.

Art. 1. In consideration of the reservation provided for in the preceding article, the said Wichitas and other affiliaterl bands hereby cede and relinquish to the United States all right, title, interest, or claim of any naturo whatsoever in and to any lands in Texas, Louisiana, Indian Territory, or elsewhere within the limits of the United States.
