

PENSIONS TO SOLDIERS OF THE MEXICAN WAR.

RESOLUTION

OF THE

LEGISLATURE OF TENNESSEE,

IN FAVOR OF

Granting pensions to the surviving soldiers, &c., of the war with Mexico, and of the Indian war of 1836.

DECEMBER 15, 1873.—Referred to the Committee on Invalid Pensions and ordered to be printed.

Whereas, as a testimonial of the esteem and grateful recollection in which this nation holds those who have imperiled their lives in her cause, as a sacred duty which she owes the survivors of the war with Mexico, and the Indian war of 1836, and in view of the fact that the cause of those who fought at Monterey, Buena Vista, and Molino Del Rey, and the Indian war of 1836, have, as yet, not received that return which their services demanded: Therefore,

Be it resolved by the general assembly of the State of Tennessee, That our Senators and Representatives in Congress be requested to ask the National Congress to place the names of the survivors of the war against Mexico, and the Indian war of 1836, upon the pension-roll of the Government on an equal footing with those of 1812-'15.

Be it further resolved, That a copy of this preamble and accompanying resolution be sent to our Senators and Representatives in Congress.
