That the sum of \$1,500,000, to complete the Centennial buildings and other preparations, be, and the same is hereby, appropriated out of any moneys in the United States Treasury not otherwise appropriated, which shall be paid on the drafts of the president and treasurer of the Centennial Board of Finance, one-third immediately after the passage of this act, and the remainder in four equal monthly payments: Provided, That in the distribution of any moneys that may remain in the treasury of the Centennial Beard of Finance, after the

II .- NEW OFFICES CREATED AND THE SALARIES THEREOF.

[Prepared in the office of the Secretary of the Senate.]

By the act (No. 31) to authorize the sale of the Pawnee reservation.

The Secretary of the Interior is authorized to appoint three disinterested and competent persons to examine and appraise the Pawnee reservation-lands in Nebraska and the improvements thereon, and report to the Secretary of the Interior.

No compensation is mentioned in the act.

By the act (No. 45) to establish a land-office in the southern part of Utah Territory, to be known as the Beaver land-district, and for other purposes.

The President is authorized to appoint, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, a register and a receiver for the district created by this act, who shall receive the same compensation prescribed for like officers of the district now established at Salt Lake City, viz, \$500 each per annum and fees.

By the act (No. 54) revising and amending the various acts establishing and relating to the reform-school of the District of Columbia.

The officers of this institution shall be in charge of and governed by a board of seven trustees, who shall be appointed by the President of the United States upon recomendation of the Attorney-General, one of whom shall be elected president of the board by the members thereof.

The said board of trustees is authorized to appoint a superintendent, two or more teachers or assistants, and a matron; also two or more master mechanics, a farmer and a gardener, and such other laborers and servants as may be necessary.

The compensation of the mechanics, farmer, gardener, servants, and laborers shall be fixed by the board of trustees; but no compensation is fixed by the act for trustees, teachers, assistants, or matron.

The trustees are also authorized to appoint a treasurer, whose compensation is not

named in the act.

The appointment of two consulting-trustees is provided for, consisting of one Senator, to be appointed by the President of the Senate for the term of four years, and one member of the House of Representatives, to be appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives for the term of two years. No compensation named in the act.

By the act (No. 79) establishing Cheboygan, in the State of Michigan, a port of delivery.

Cheboygan, Mich., is declared a port of delivery, instead of Duncan City, Mich., and the office of deputy collector at Duncan City is required to be removed to Cheboygan. No provision respecting salary is contained in the act.

By the act (No. 83) to further the administration of justice in the State of Colorado.

The State of Colorado is constituted a judicial district, for which a district judge, at a salary of \$3,500 per annum, and a marshal, a district attorney, and a clerk shall be appointed by the President, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate. The latter officers shall respectively receive the fees and compensation allowed other like officers.

By the act (No. 96) providing for the sale of the Kansas Indian lands in Kansas to actual settlers, and for the disposition of the proceeds of the sale.

The Secretary of the Interior, in case he be satisfied that the lands mentioned in this act have been heretofore appraised at more than their cash value, is authorized to appoint a new commission of three persons to re-appraise the same, who shall receive like per-diem compensation allowed former commissioners, but which is not specifically stated in any act of Congress.

By the act (No. 147) establishing the port of Saint Paul, Minnesota, as a port of appraisal.

The appraiser at the port of Saint Paul, Minnesota, is authorized to be appointed, who shall receive like salary as now provided for the deputy collector at said port, the mour tof which is not stated,

By the act (No. 172) to create an additional land-district at Colfax, Whitman County, Washington Territory.

The President is authorized to establish an additional land-district in the Territory of Washington, to be known as the Whitman district, and to appoint therefor, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, a register and a receiver, who shall receive the same emoluments provided for like officers in said Territory, viz, \$500 per annum each and fees.

By the act (No. 113) authorizing the reparement of Pennsylvania avenue.

The President of the United States is authorized to detail Gen. H. G. Wright and Gen. Q. A. Gilmore, of the Engineer Corps of the Army, who, with Edward Clark, of Washington, shall constitute a commission for the repavement of Pennsylvania avenue. No compensation is mentioned in the act; but the sum of \$3,000 is appropriated from the Treasury of the United States, and a like amount is directed to be paid by the Commissioners of the District of Columbia, to defray the necessary expenses of said paving commissioners.

By the act (No. 126) making appropriations for sundry civil expenses of the Government, for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1877, and for other purposes.

One conductor of Senate elevator, at \$1,200 per annum.

By the act (No. 129) providing for the completion of the Washington Monument.

Provision is made for the completion of the Washington Monument, to be conducted under the direction and supervision of the President of the United States, the Supervising Architect of the Treasury Department, the Architect of the Capitol, the Chief of Engineers of the United States Army, and the first vice-president of the Washington National Monument Society; which officers are constituted a joint commission for the object aforesaid.

No compensation provided.

By the act (No. 134) establishing a new land-district in the Territory of Wyoming.

A new land-district in Wyoming, to be called the Evanston land-district, is established, for which the President is authorized to appoint, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, a register and a receiver, who shall receive the same compensation provided for like officers in said Territory, viz, \$500 per annum each and fees.

By the act (No. 100) making appropriations for the service of the Post-Office Department for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1877, and for other purposes.

The President of the United States is authorized to appoint a commission of three skilled and competent persons to examine the subject of transportation of the mails by railroad companies, and report to Congress such rules and regulations for such transportation, and such rates of compensation therefor, as in their opinion may be just and expedient and enable the Department to maintain the efficiency of the service. No specific compensation is provided, but the snm of \$10,000 is appropriated to defray expenses of the commission.

By the resolution of the House of Representatives to appoint a commission to inquire into the change which has taken place in the relative value of gold and silver, and the causes thereof, the policy of restoring the double standard in this country, and of continuing greenbacks concurrently with the metallic standards.

A commission is constituted, to consist of three Senators to be appointed by the Senate, three members of the House of Representatives, to be appointed by the Speaker, and experts, not exceeding three in number, to be selected by the members first named, to inquire into and report upon the recent change in the relative value of gold and silver, and the cause thereof, and its effects upon trade, commerce, and the productive interests of the country; the policy of restoring the double standard of gold and silver, and that of continuing legal-tender notes concurrently with the metallic standards, and also to inquire into the best means of facilitating specie payments.

The commission is authorized to employ a stenographer; but no provisions as to com-

pensation are contained in the act.

By the act (No. 173) to provide for the sale of a portion of the reservation of the confederated Otoe and Missouria and the Sac and Fox of the Missouri tribes of Indians, in the States of Kansas and Nebraska.

The Secretary of the Interior is authorized to cause to be surveyed the reservation of said Indians, lying in Kansas and Nebraska, which lands, when surveyed, shall be appraised by three commissioners, one to be designated by said Indians and the other two by the Secretary of the Interior. The commission shall receive for their services at the rate of \$5 per diem and actual expenses.

III.—THE OFFICES THE SALARIES OF WHICH HAVE BEEN INCREASED, WITH THE AMOUNT OF SUCH INCREASE DURING THE SAME PERIOD.

By the act (No. 82) to reduce the number and increase the efficiency of the Medical Corps of the United States Army.

In addition to the grades now allowed by law provision is made for four surgeons with rank, pay, and emoluments of colonels; and eight surgeons with rank, pay, and emoluments of lieutenant-colonels, to be promoted by seniority from the medical officers of the Army.

By the act (No. 117) establishing the rank of Paymaster-General.

The rank of Paymaster-General of the Army is fixed as that of a brigadier-general, with corresponding increase of pay and emolument, the specific amount of which is not named in the act.

By the act (No. 152) making appropriations for the legislative, executive, and judicial expenses of the Government for the year ending June 30, 1877, and for other purposes.

Clerk to Committee on Appropriations of the Sense, \$2,500 per annum; increase, \$280. Person in charge of store-room and document-wagon of Senate, \$1,200 per annum; increase, \$360. Commissioner of Pensions, \$3,600 per annum; increase, \$600.
