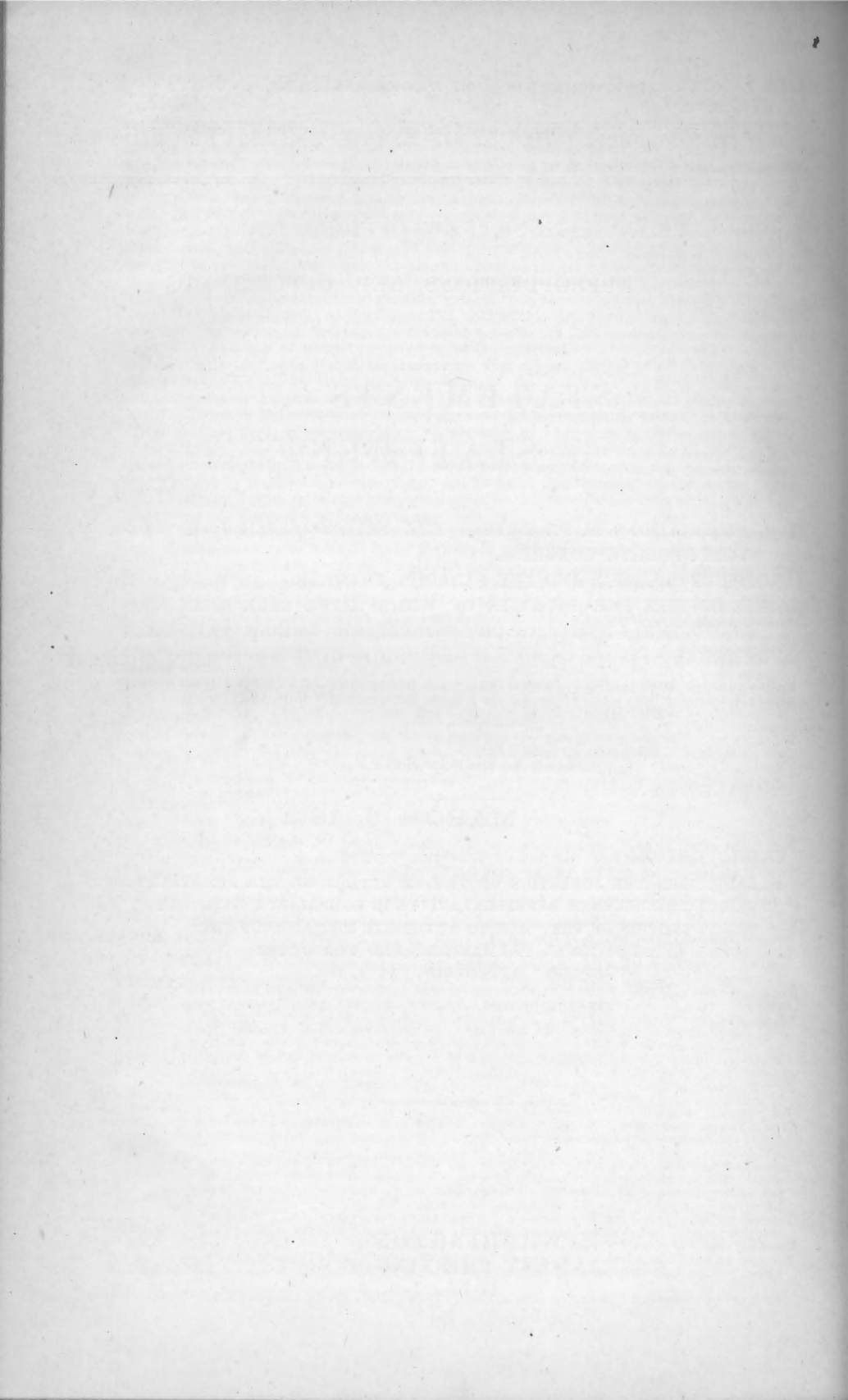

McCullough, of Petersburg, Va., the sum of \$328.87, the said sum being for the rent of property belonging to the aforesaid party, and occupied under contract by the United States, and for which vouchers were given to him..... \$328 87

By the act making an appropriation to pay the claim of Benjamin Fenton and D. W. Fenton.

That the sum of \$958.32 be, and the same is hereby, appropriated in full payment, satisfaction, and discharge of the claim of Benjamin Fenton and D. W. Fenton for "rent of lot numbered 59, of the Memphis navy-yard, in Memphis, Tenn., while the same was occupied by the United States..... \$958 32

By the act for the relief of Redick McKee.

That the memorial and claims of Redick McKee, late a disbursing-agent of the Indian Department in California, (Miscellaneous Document No. 102, printed February 25, 1871), be, and hereby are, referred for examination and settlement to the Secretary of the Interior. If the Secretary shall find the allegations and statements of the claimant verified by the records of the department, or other satisfactory evidence, he shall allow him such relief as may be equitable and just..... Indefinite.

By the act for the relief of Sarah E. Garland and Frank M. Hoppin.

That the Secretary of the Treasury be, and is hereby, authorized and directed to pay to Austin M. Garland, for the use and benefit of Sarah E. Garland and Frank M. Hoppin, the sum of \$337.82, being the amount of succession-tax erroneously paid by them to the collector of the eighth district of Illinois at the date aforesaid..... \$337 82

By the act for the relief of A. M. Garoutte, late captain and assistant quartermaster United States Army.

That the Secretary of the Treasury be, and is hereby, directed to pay to A. M. Garoutte, late captain and assistant quartermaster United States Army, \$1,544.15, in full for the amount refunded by said Garoutte to H. Hurdle, by order of General Boyd, in the year 1865, and of hotel bills paid by him for clerks and auctioneer while making sale of personal property of the United States at various places in the State of North Carolina in 1865 and 1866, and for amount of fine wrongfully imposed upon him by a court-martial in August, 1866, and paid by him; and for all sums which would have been due to him for military services in his said capacity if he had been honorably discharged on the 14th of August, 1866..... \$1,544 15

That the Secretary of the Treasury be, and he is hereby, authorized and directed to pay value to W. W. Van Antwerp, a citizen of Jackson, Mich., the sum of \$150, it being the of a private horse lost in action while said Van Antwerp was in the strict line of his duty as a soldier..... \$150 00

By the act for the relief of Marshal P. Thatcher.

That the Secretary of the Treasury be, and he is hereby, authorized and directed to pay to Marshal P. Thatcher, late of the Second Michigan Cavalry, the sum of \$150 in full satisfaction for the loss of a horse, April 15, 1862, while in the military service of the United States..... \$150 00

By the act to pay William L. Scruggs, late minister at Bogota, from October 10 to November 21, 1876.

That the Secretary of the Treasury be, and he is hereby, authorized and directed to pay to William L. Scruggs, late minister of the United States of America at Bogota, United States of Colombia, the sum of \$854.17, the amount which would have been due him as minister from the United States of America from October 10, 1876, to November 21, 1876, the time actually and necessarily detained in Bogota after his recall, by reason of the siege of the city by the revolutionary troops..... \$854 17

By the act for the benefit of the Louisville Baptist Orphans' Home.

That the Secretary of the Treasury pay to the Louisville Baptist Orphans' Home the sum of \$126, being the amount of two United States five-twenty coupons of \$3 each, Nos. 49699 and 316, due 1st January, 1875, and also four Louisville and Portland Canal coupons of \$30 each, Nos. 1398, 1399, and 1400, and 1401, due 1st January, 1875, belonging to the said Louisville Baptist Orphans' Home, and which were inclosed in a letter and mailed by George W. Norton & Co., bankers in Louisville, Ky., to Messrs. Nolan, Slaughter & Co., New York, which letter was registered in the Louisville post-office on the 6th of January, 1875, and which was destroyed by fire at some point between Baltimore and Washington on the 7th of January, 1875: *Provided always*, That the Secretary of the Treasury take from the claimant before payment a bond, with good security, for the protection of the United States..... \$126 00

By the act for the relief of Virginia E. White, of Ohio County, West Virginia.

That the Secretary of the Treasury be, and he is hereby, authorized and required to pay to Virginia E. White, widow and executrix of Andrew White, deceased, who was the administrator, with the will annexed, of Daniel Steenrod, deceased, \$1,250; said sum being the amount of tax erroneously and improperly assessed on income of the estate of Daniel Steenrod, deceased, and paid by the said Andrew White as the administrator of said estate, and since his death recovered of the said Virginia E. White as the executrix of said Andrew White by the residuary legatees of the said Daniel Steenrod..... \$1,250 00

By the act for the relief of Eli Teegarden.

That the Secretary of the Treasury is hereby authorized and directed to pay to Eli Teegarden, of California, the sum of \$50.34, being the amount of a balance due him 31st March, 1875, on his account as receiver of public moneys at the land-office at Marysville, Cal..... \$50 3 4

By the act for the relief of H. H. Mathis, of Arkansas.

That there is hereby appropriated to H. H. Mathis, of Saint Francis County, Arkansas, the sum of \$6,628.50, in full compensation for twenty-seven bales of cotton seized by order of Col. Jacob Fry, commanding United States forces at the post of Trenton, Tenn.; which cotton was taken and placed in the fortifications at that post..... \$6,628 50

By the act for the relief of Joseph W. Parish.

That the Secretary of the Treasury be, and he hereby is, directed to pay to Joseph W. Parish \$4,280, in full for that amount paid over by him in cash to the Commissary Department of the Army on the 22d day of July in the year 1863..... \$4,280 00

By the act for the relief of Hans C. Peterson.

That the Secretary of the Treasury be, and he is hereby, authorized and directed to audit and settle the claim of Hans C. Peterson for damages sustained by him by reason of deprecations and injuries by certain bauds of Sioux Indians, in Minnesota, in the year 1862, and to pay to said Hans C. Peterson the sum of \$2,283.92, in full payment and satisfaction for all losses and damages by him sustained; and the said sum is hereby appropriated for that purpose..... \$2,283 92

By the act for the relief of William Wheeler Hubbell, and to make just compensation for the past making, or use, or vending of his patent explosive shell, fuses, and percussion-exploders by the United States.

That the Secretary of the Treasury be, and is hereby, authorized and directed to pay to William Wheeler Hubbell, of Philadelphia, Pa., or his heirs or legal representatives, the sum of \$33,333.33, in full satisfaction of the balance of his actual loss and damage, ascertained by the Court of Claims, for the past use made by the United States of certain patents, the inventions of said Hubbell, mentioned in the preamble and reference of joint resolution approved June 3, 1864, said payment to be in full for all past use by the Government of his inventions of whatever name or nature; and the acceptance of the sum provided by this act shall be a full and complete transfer of his patents dated September 30, 1862, for concussion fuse; his patent dated July 8, 1862, for rifle-projectiles; his patent dated October 31, 1865, for incendiary-shell; and of all patents and inventions mentioned in said joint resolution, to the United States..... \$33,333 33

Corrected, the bill appropriates \$15,417,933.33, making the total of appropriation for previous fiscal year \$154,533,639.62.

II.—NEW OFFICES CREATED AND THE SALARIES THEREOF.

[Prepared in the office of the Secretary of the Senate.]

By the act (No. 49) making appropriations for sundry civil expenses of the Government for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1878, and for other purposes.

Appropriation of \$18,000 is made to pay the expenses of a commission of three skilled entomologists (to be appointed by the Secretary of the Interior) to report upon the devastations of the Rocky Mountain locusts in the Western States and Territories, and the best method of preventing their recurrence. The commission is authorized to be attached to the engineers conducting the geological and geographical surveys. No specified salaries are named in the act.

By the act (No. 45) making appropriations for the current and contingent expenses of the Indian Department, and for fulfilling treaty-stipulations with various Indian tribes, for the year ending June 30, 1878, and for other purposes.

One agent of Indian affairs for Papago tribe, in Arizona, \$1,500 per annum.
Two interpreters for tribes in Nebraska at \$300 each per annum.

By the act (No. 46) making appropriations for the legislative, executive, and judicial expenses of the Government for the year ending June 30, 1878, and for other purposes.

One clerk to Committee on Privileges and Elections of the Senate, at \$2,220 per annum.

Two firemen for Department of State, at \$720 per annum each.

For Treasury Department, office of First Auditor, (division of loans :) Three clerks of class 4, three clerks of class 3, two clerks of class 2, and two clerks of class 1.

Treasury Department, office of Auditor for Post-Office Department: Two assorters of money-orders, at \$900 each per annum.

Office of Treasurer: One clerk of class 4, one clerk of class 3, one clerk of class 2, and two clerks of class 1. For division of loans, (same office:) One clerk of class 4, one clerk of class 3, and one clerk of class 2.

For force employed in redeeming the national currency: Two clerks of class 3, and one clerk of class 1.

Post-Office Department: Four clerks of class 3, two clerks of class 2, five clerks of class 1, and two watchmen at \$720 each per annum.

Department of Agriculture: One lady superintendent of flower-seed room, \$900.

Department of Justice, (Office of Attorney-General :) One clerk of class 1.

By the act (No. 17) to provide for and regulate the counting of votes for President and Vice-President, and the decisions of questions arising thereon, for the term commencing March 4, 1877.

A commission is constituted comprising five members of each house of Congress and five judges of the Supreme Court of the United States, for the decision of all questions in respect of double returns by electors for President and Vice-President, or persons claiming to be such electors in the several States, and whether any, and what, votes by them given are those provided for by the Constitution of the United States. Such commission is authorized to employ such persons as may be necessary for the transaction of its business and the execution of its powers. No specific offices or salaries are mentioned in the act.

By a subsequent act (No. 62, approved March 3, 1877,) the sum of \$7,000 is appropriated to pay the expenses of said Commission, and any person by it employed is authorized to receive such compensation as the Commission may allow, in addition to any other compensation or salary he may be receiving as an officer of the Government.

By the act (No. 26) to provide for the sale of a certain piece of land in the Wallabout Bay, in the State of New York, to the city of Brooklyn.

The President is authorized to organize a commission of three members to arrange equitable terms, conditions, and considerations for the conveyance to the city of Brooklyn of all the lands belonging to the United States, situated in Wallabout Bay, which commission shall report to the Secretary of the Navy, who shall communicate the report so made to Congress at its next session. No salary or compensation is provided.

By the act (No. 39) to provide for the preparation and publication of a new edition of the Revised Statutes of the United States.

The President is authorized, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, to appoint one person, learned in the law, as a commissioner, to prepare for publication a new edition of the first volume of the Revised Statutes of the United States, who shall receive in full for his services the sum of \$5,000.

By the act (No. 52) in relation to the Hot Springs in the State of Arkansas.

The President is authorized to appoint three disinterested persons to constitute a board of commissioners, to examine, lay out into squares, lots, streets, avenues, &c., the tract of land known as the Hot Springs reservation in Arkansas.

Such commissioners shall hold office for one year, at a compensation of \$10 each per diem.

They shall have power to employ competent engineers to make surveys and maps, at a reasonable compensation, and to employ a stenographer who shall also act as clerk at not exceeding \$8 per diem.

By the joint resolution (No. 7) to appoint a commission to examine into the matter of contracts made by and between the United States and the Moline Water-Power Company, as to the water-power at Moline, Ills., and to report to Congress as to same.

The Secretary of War is required to appoint a commission to consist of three civil engineers (one of whom shall be the Chief of Engineers of the United States Army) to examine into the subject-matter of certain contracts made between said company and the United States, (through the Secretary of War, pursuant to authority of Congress,) and to ascertain and report to Congress what, if anything, is required to carry out the good faith of the United States under said contracts, and to relieve said company from certain alleged grievances arising from a failure of the Government to fulfill its covenants thereunder.

No compensation is provided by the act.

By the act (No. 10) authorizing the recorder of the District of Columbia to appoint an assistant with certain powers.

The recorder of deeds of the District of Columbia is authorized to appoint a deputy recorder; but no compensation is allowed by the act.

III.—THE OFFICES THE SALARIES OF WHICH HAVE BEEN INCREASED, WITH THE AMOUNT OF INCREASE DURING THE SAME PERIOD.

By the act (No. 46) making appropriations for the legislative, executive, and judicial expenses of the Government for the year ending June 30, 1878, and for other purposes.

LEGISLATIVE.

Senate: Telegraph operator, Senate wing of the Capitol, \$700; increase, \$300.

House of Representatives: Stationery Clerk House of Representatives, \$1,600; increase, \$100. Chief Engineer heating apparatus, \$1,700; increase, \$300; telegraph operator, \$700; increase, \$300; superintendent document-room, \$2,000; increase, \$200.

Treasury Department, office of Auditor for Post-Office Department: Three clerks of class 2, (increase from class 1.)

Office of Register of the Treasury: One clerk of class 4, for services as disbursing clerk, \$2,000 per annum; increase, \$200.

Mint at Philadelphia: One book-keeper at \$2,000 per annum; increase, \$200; one deposit clerk at \$2,000; increase, \$200.

Territorial Government, District of Columbia: One medical sanitary inspector at \$1,750 per annum; increase, \$250.
