By the act (No. 78) to divide the State of Louisiana into two judicial districts.

The parishes of Caddo, Bossier, Webster, Claiborne, Union, Morehouse, West Carroll, East Carroll, Madison, Richland, Ouachita, Lincoln, Bienville, Red River, De Soto, Sabine, Winn, Natchitoches, Jackson, Caldwell, Franklin, Tensas, Concordia, Catahoula, Grant, Vernon, Rapides, Avoyelles, Saint Landry, La Fayette, Saint Martin's, Vermillion, Cameron, and Calcasieu, in the State of Louisiana, shall constitute, and is created, the western judicial district in that State. A person learned in the law shall be appointed by the President of the United States, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, district judge thereof, with a salary of \$3,500 per annum, payable quarterly. The said judge shall appoint a clerk of the district court in the western district, and a clerk of the circuit court for said district shall be appointed in the same manner as other such clerks are appointed, and who shall receive for the services performed by them the same fees and compensation that are allowed to the clerks of such courts holding their sessions in New Orleans, in the same State. The President of the United States, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, be, and hereby is, authorized to appoint one person as marshal and one as district attorney for the said western district of the United States within the State of Louisiana created by this act; and that the terms of appointment and service, together with the duties and responsibilities of the said marshal and district attorney, respectively, for the district aforesaid, shall be in all respects the same within their said district as the terms of appointment and services, the duties, and responsibilities of the marshal and district attorney, respectively, of the eastern district of the State of Louisiana.

By the act (No. 80) to establish an additional land district in the State of Kansas.

The following described territory in the State of Kansas, to wit, commencing at the southeast corner of township 35 south, range 31 west of the sixth principal meridian on the south boundary of the State of Kansas; thence west on said southern boundary to the western boundary of said State; thence north on said western boundary to the fourth standard parallel south; thence east along said parallel to the northeast corner of township 21 south, range 31 west, and thence south to the place of beginning, in the State of Kansas, shall constitute an additional land district, to be called the southwestern land district. The President is authorized, whenever the public interest shall require, to appoint, in accordance with existing laws authorizing appointment to office, a register and a receiver for the district hereby created, who shall each be required to reside at the site of the office for said district, have the same powers, responsibilities, and emoluments, and be subject to the same acts and penalties which are, or may be, prescribed by law in relation to other land-offices of the United States. Compensation \$500 each per annum and fees.

By the act (No. 90) to establish a port of delivery at Indianapolis, in the State of Indiana.

Indianapolis, in the State of Indiana, is constituted a port of delivery. There shall be appointed a surveyor of customs to reside at said port, who shall receive a salary to be determined by the Secretary of the Treasury, not exceeding \$1,000 per annum.

By the joint resolution (No. 8) to provide for printing and distributing the index of the Congressional Record semi-monthly.

The Joint Committee on Printing are authorized and directed to make the necessary provisions and arrangements for hereafter issuing the index of the Congressional Record semimonthly during the sessions of Congress, beginning with next ensuing session. The Public Printer is directed to print and distribute the same number of copies of said semi-monthly index as he prints and distributes of the daily issue of the Record, and to the same persons and in the same manner. The Public Printer shall employ such person to prepare said index as shall be designated by the Joint Committee on Printing, who shall also fix and regulate the compensation to be paid by the Public Printer for the said work and direct the form and manner of its publication: Provided, however, That the compensation allowed for preparing said semi-monthly index, including their compilation into a session index, shall not exceed the average total amount now allowed by the Joint Committee on Printing for compiling the session index.

By the joint resolution (No. 26) to create a commission for the performance of certain duties under the act of Congress providing for the erection of a monument at Yorktown and the proposed centennial celebration.

Richardson, of South Carolina; and Henry Persons, of Georgia, are appointed a commission with full power and authority to discharge all the duties and perform all the functions which were devolved upon them as a joint committee of thirteen Senform all the functions which were devolved upon them as a joint committee of thirteen Senators and thirteen Representatives under the act of Congress approved June 7, 1880, entitled "An act to carry into effect the resolution of Congress adopted on the 29th of October, 1781, in regard to a monumental column at Yorktown, Virginia, and for other purposes."

And the said commission may employ a clerk during the time they are engaged in the performance of said duties, whose compensation shall be at the usual rate of clerks to committees of Congress, and who shall be paid out of the contingent fund of the Senate and House

of Representatives in equal proportions.

# III.—THE OFFICES THE SALARIES OF WHICH HAVE BEEN INCREASED, WITH THE AMOUNT OF SUCH INCREASE DURING THE SAME PERIOD.

Said commissioner, with the approval of the Secretary of the Treasury, shall have the right and authority to sell any of the real and personal property of said company at public or private sale, as in his judgment he may deem best, and to buy in for the benefit of the company any property which may be offered for sale to pay debts and liabilities to said company, if in his judgment said property is being sacrificed by said sale, and to make to the purchasers of property sold by him deeds of conveyance for their respective purchases, and shall, by the tenth day of each annual session of Congress, make a written report to Congress of his proceedings up to the first day of said session; and for his service as commissioner aforesaid he shall, in addition to his present salary as comptroller, receive an annual salary of \$1,000, to be paid out of the funds of said institution.

By the act (No. 42) making appropriations for the naval service for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1882, and for other purposes.

Naval Academy:

For Washington Asylum: One commissioner and intendant, at \$1,200; increase \$200; three watchmen, at \$240 each; increase \$60 each.

General expenses: Executive office: Engineer Commissioner shall be entitled to receive such compensation, in addition to his Army pay and allowances, as will make his compensation equal to \$5,000. Amount of increase not stated.

Division of property office: One inspector of fuel, at \$720; increase \$94.

Public schools: Officers; one clerk, at \$750; increase \$50.

By the act (No. 71) making appropriations for the current and contingent expenses of the Indian department, and for fulfilling treaty stipulations with various Indian tribes, for the year end-ing June 30, 1882, and for other purposes.

#### MISCELLANEOUS.

For support of industrial schools and for other educational purposes for the Indian tribes, \$85,000. And out of this sum the Secretary of the Interior may make and pay such allowance, not exceeding the rate of \$1,000 a year, as he shall think just, to Capt. R. H. Pratt, in charge of the school at Carlisle, Pa., from and after the passage of this act, in addition to his Army pay and allowances.
