GENERAL DEFICIENCY BILL.

MARCH 1, 1881.—Committed to the Committee on Appropriations and ordered to be printed.

Mr. McMahon, from the Committee on Appropriations, submitted the following

REPORT:

[To accompany H. R. 7251.]

[To accompany the bill (H. R.—) making appropriations to supply deficiencies in the appropriations for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1881, and for prior years, and for those certified as due by the accounting officers of the Treasury in accordance with section 4 of the act of June 14, 1878, heretofore paid from permanent appropriations, and for other purposes.]

In presenting the regular deficiency appropriation bill the Committee on Appropriations submit the following report in explanation thereof:

The bill is principally based on the estimates presented in Executive Document No. 44, amounting to \$3,944,606.48, being the annual estimates from the Treasury Department, and upon the estimates in Executive Document No. 30, claims allowed by accounting officers of the Treasury under the act of June 14, 1878, amounting to \$930,561.27, and other estimates and letters amounting to about \$1,000,000; of which under Ex. Doc. No. 44, 46th Cong., 3d session, and other estimates, there is recommended as follows:

The total sum appropriated is \$4,065,618.99, not including indefinite appropriations which are principally for bounty to soldiers.

The appropriation for bounty and back-pay of volunteer soldiers covers a probable expenditure of about (and not more than) \$314,000.

Land-grant railroads, \$275,000.

The increasing business of the country, adding largely to the revenue in the Internal Revenue Department and the Post-Office Department,

has added over \$1,000,000 to their bill.

Many claims of every shade and degree of equity and inequity have been presented to the committee for allowance, for employés of the House, as well as for other persons. But the committee has allowed nothing that is not in some definite shape an audited and allowed claim. All accounts against the present House audited and allowed by Committee on Accounts, are regarded as finally adjusted under the practice of the House.
