NOTE.—The office of disbursing-clerk was created and the compensation fixed by the act of March 3, 1853, (10 Statutes, 211.) At that time the civil force of this Department consisted of sixty-two clerks of all grades, whose annual salaries aggregated about \$90,000. There are now on the civil list 1,650 persons, with an annual salary total of about \$2,000,000 and a contingent-fund account approximating \$200,000. In the Treasury Department there are five disbursing-clerks, two of whom receive each a compensation of \$2,500 per annum, and the disbursing-clerk of the Interior Department is allowed \$1,000 per annum, in addition to his regular salary, for disbursing the appropriation for care and improvement of the Capitol buildings and grounds, making his compensation \$3,000 per annum. In view of the great increase of labor and responsibility devolved upon the disbursing-clerk of this Department, his salary should be increased to \$2,500.

NOTE.—Since January 1, 1876, there have been three chiefs of divisions in the office of the Secretary of War, two at \$2,000 each per annum, and one, an officer of infantry, who received, including extra pay and allowances, \$3,231.96. Total for the three, \$7,231.96. This continued until June 30, 1882, when Congress repealed the provision for extra pay for the infantry officer, who had been relieved from duty in this office. In the legislative, &c., appropriation act of August 5, 1882, a third chief of division was authorized, at \$2,000. This estimate for \$7,200 for three chiefs of divisions is a more equal division, as well as a reduction from the amount paid the three chiefs prior to July 1, 1882. The present incumbents earn the moderate compensation asked, and no reason is seen why they should not be compensated equally with the chiefs of divisions in the Treasury Department, who receive from \$2,400 to \$2,700 each.

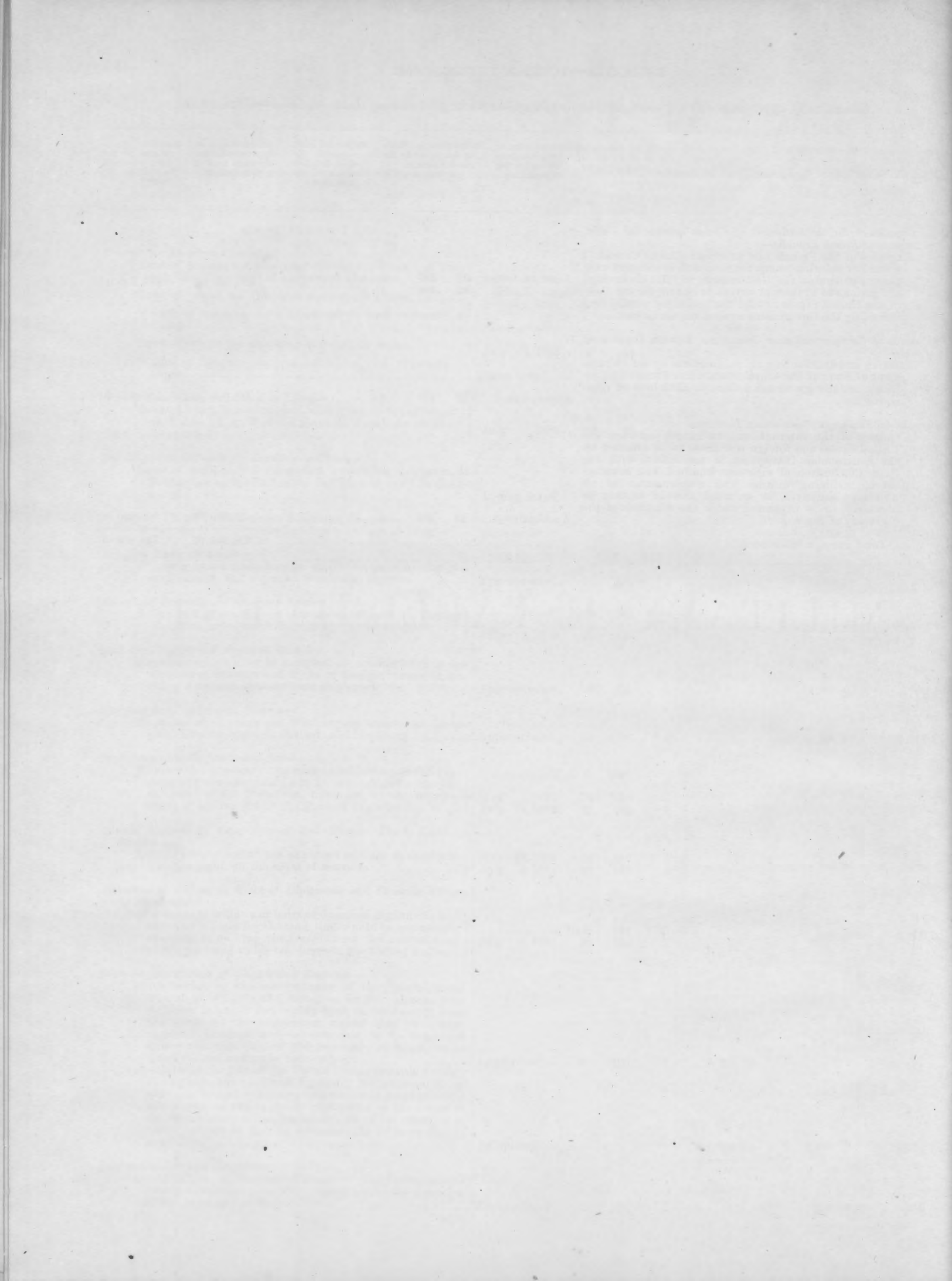

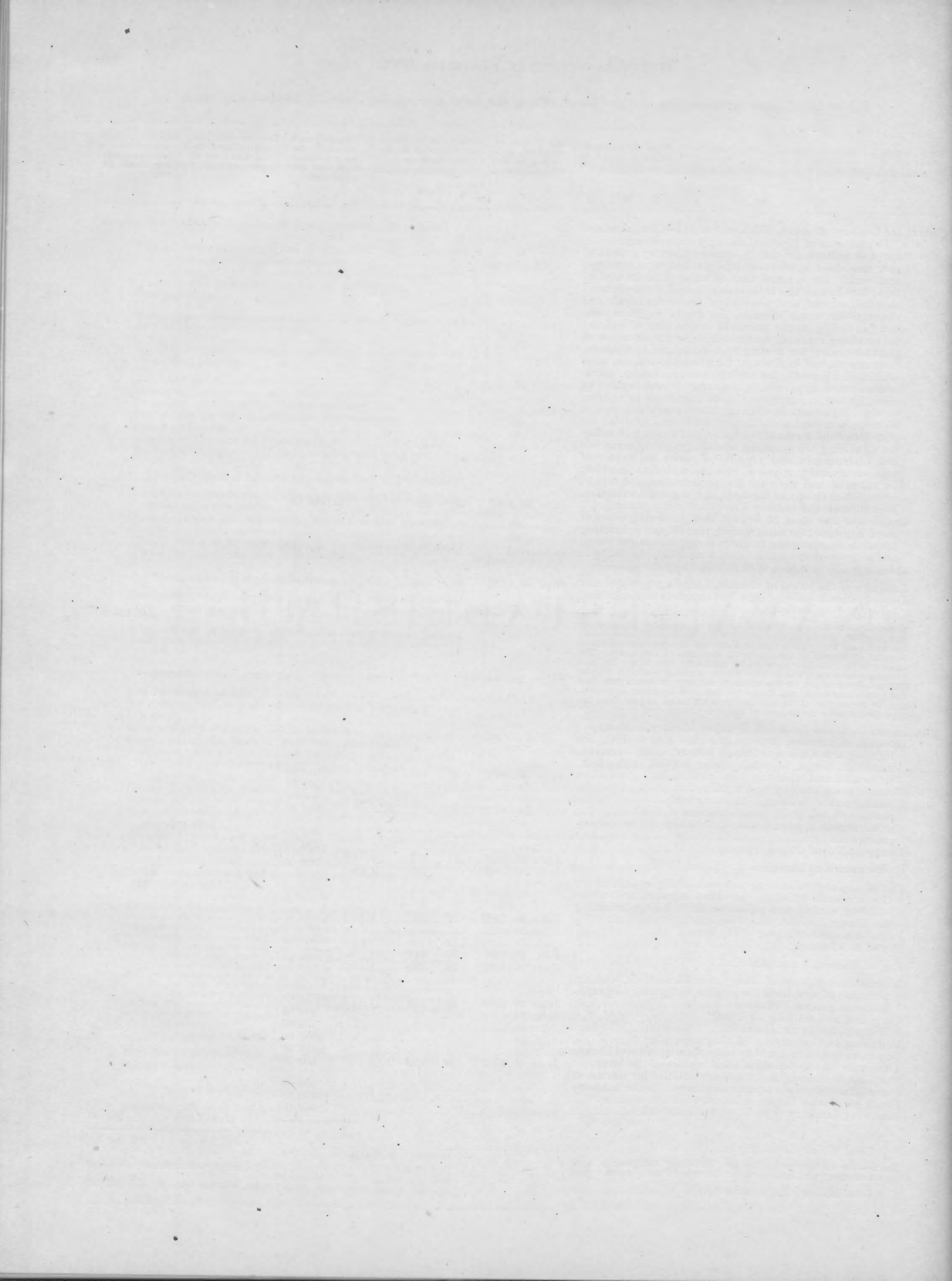

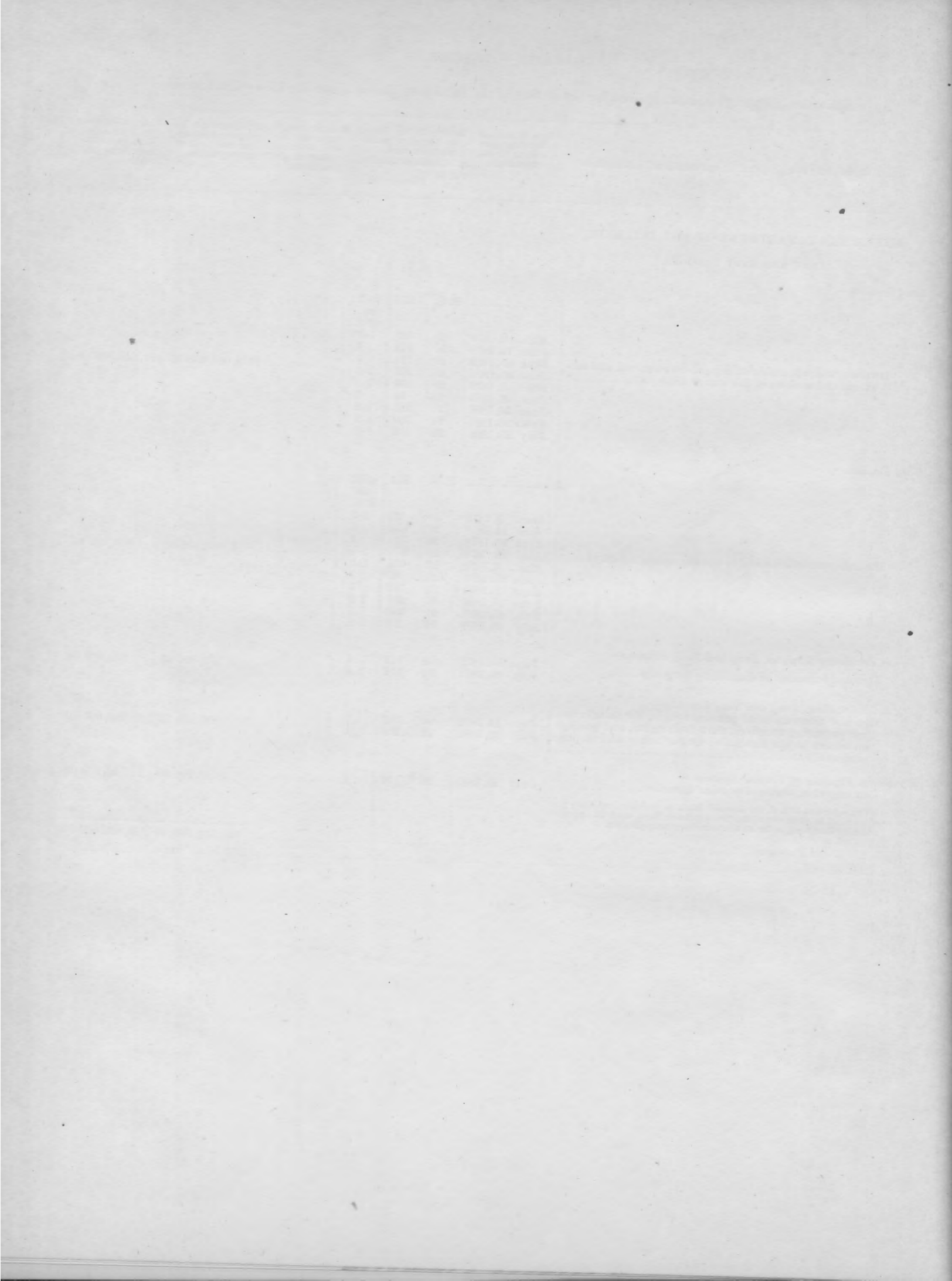

These buildings are all poor, very inflammable and highly exposed to fire, with all their invaluable records. There will be no room in the new War-Department building for this bureau. 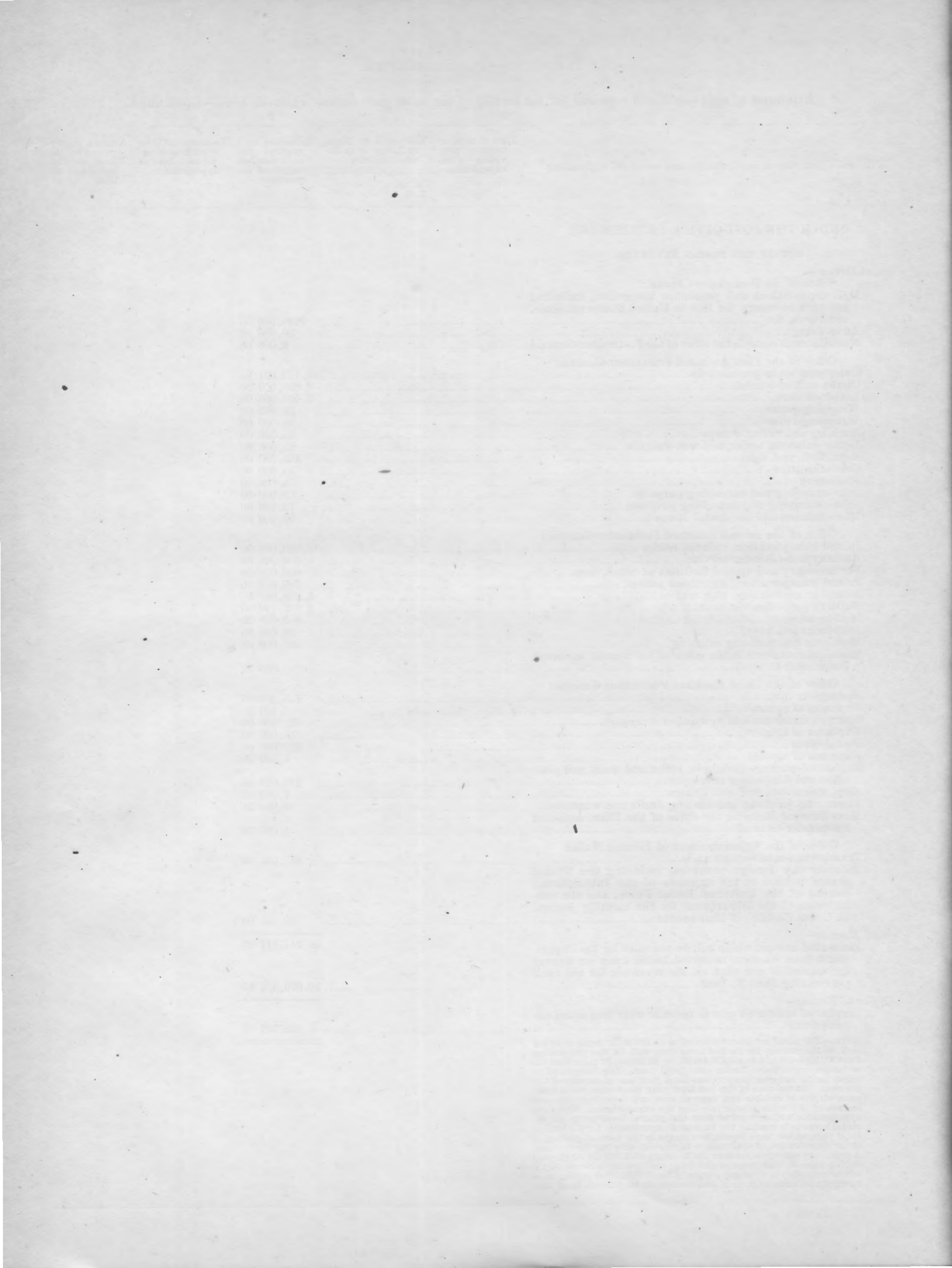

At the close of the last fiscal year there remained a handsome surplus of receipts over expenditures, and the receipts are now increasing at a much greater rate than the expenditures. Hence, no appropriation will be required from the general Treasury to aid the postal revenue in meeting the estimated expenditures for the coming fiscal year, unless there should be changes in the rates of postage or in the classification of mail-matter injuriously affecting the revenue. A deficiency appropriation from the Treasury of \$2,152,258 for the year ending June 30, 1882, remains undrawn; and it is not believed that it will be necessary to draw any portion of the \$1,902,177.90 appropriated to supply deficiencies in the postal revenue for the current fiscal year.</p>

TREASURY DEPARTMENT,
Fourth Auditor's Office, September 19, 1882.

SIR: I have the honor to transmit herewith estimates of appropriation for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1884, in compliance with your circular of August 1, 1882.

In submitting this estimate, I ask for an increase in the force of the office of one chief of division and two clerks of class one, for the following reasons:

The work of the office is most conveniently divided into six distinct branches or divisions, and has been so divided for some years past. As the salaries are now appropriated, one chief of division must be a third-class clerk. This is manifestly unjust, for, if compelled to assume the duties and responsibilities of a chief, he should receive a chief's compensation.

For the past six years the clerical force has been insufficient, and the work of the office is, consequently, in arrears.

There is now a still further increase of business on account of the great number of Navy-pension claims referred for examination.

No additional clerks were allowed this office by the appropriation for the current fiscal year, although an increase is given to every other office affected by the increase of pension business. You will perceive, therefore, that the need of the additional clerks asked is very urgent.

APPENDIX C.

In relation to the estimates for Salaries, Office of the Sixth Auditor. (See pages 19 and 20.)

OFFICE OF THE AUDITOR OF THE TREASURY FOR THE POST-OFFICE DEPARTMENT,

Washington, D. C., October 30, 1882.

SIR: In submitting the accompanying estimates, I am reminded that the law of 1875 reorganizing the Treasury Department fixed the salary of the Auditor at \$4,000, that of the Deputy Auditor at \$2,500, and that of chiefs of divisions \$2,100 each. At the session of Congress of 1877, in the legislative, executive, and judicial appropriation bill, it was provided that the sums named in the bill should be received in full compensation for the year. The same provision was put in the appropriation bill for 1878. The appropriation bill for 1879 provided for the repeal of all laws inconsistent or in conflict with the provisions of the bill for that year.

The increased cost of living for the past year, which is certain to continue, makes it both just and equitable that the sums provided in the act of 1875 should be restored. It is also just and right, in view of the vast amount of work and responsibility resting upon these officers, and the experience and ability required to properly perform their several duties. I therefore invite your attention to the provisions of the law of 1875 fixing the salaries of these officers, and the propriety of asking Congress to make the appropriations for this office for the coming year in accordance with the provisions of that act, and to place the chief clerk and disbursing officer of this office on the same footing with chiefs of divisions.

SIR: Referring to the estimates for salaries in this office for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1884, forwarded the 30th ultimo, I beg to call your attention to the fact that an appropriation has been asked to pay three additional counters, \$900 each.

We had formerly seven employes of this description, but were compelled to dispense with three in 1878, by reason of the failure of Congress to make appropriation for more than four. At that time I protested to the committee against the reduction, and stated that it would embarrass the business of the office.

In April, 1881, the mint in this city ceased redeeming minor coins, since which time that work has devolved upon this office. It is no light duty, and there is an urgent need for some additional force. I am informed that the handling of this minor coin, when it was received at the mint, occupied the time of four persons. * * *

APPENDIX G.

In relation to the estimates for mints and assay officers. (See pages 28 to 31.)

TREASURY DEPARTMENT,
Bureau of the Mint, Washington, D. C., September 30, 1882.

SIR: I have the honor to transmit herewith estimates of appropriations required for the support of this office and the mints and assay offices of the United States during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1884.

The total appropriations for the support of the mint service during the present fiscal year amounted to \$1,263,010, including \$30,000 for freight on bullion and coin.

The total amount of the estimates herewith submitted for the next fiscal year is \$1,262,930, including the same amount for freight on bullion and coin as for the present fiscal year, which is a reduction of \$80 from the appropriations for the present fiscal year.

I have asked that the position of assistant messenger in this office be changed to a clerk at \$1,000, for the reason that the person now filling the position named performs clerical service, and should be compensated accordingly.

I have also asked that the salary of the helper be increased from \$360 a year to \$600, as the former amount is not considered sufficient compensation for the services rendered.

The estimate for "collecting mining statistics" is the same as was appropriated for the fiscal year 1881, and only \$50 more than the amount appropriated for 1882. I consider \$5,000 the least amount that will be sufficient to make a full and complete investigation of the production of the precious metals in this country and to collect and collate the statistics pertaining thereto, which is less than one-half of the amount appropriated for that purpose prior to 1881.

Under the head of Philadelphia mint, I have recommended an increase in the salaries of the chief clerk and book-keeper of \$250 each. The chief clerk at present receives \$2,250, and the increase, if granted, will place his salary on an equality with that paid the chief clerks at the mint at San Francisco and the assay office at New York. As the chief clerk is required by law to act as superintendent in the absence of that officer, it would seem that the salary paid the chief clerk at the Philadelphia mint should be equal to that paid at any of the others.

The book-keeper at the Philadelphia mint fills a difficult and laborious position, to which he has given the best years of his life. The increase submitted will, if granted, increase his pay to \$2,250, which will then be less than that paid the book-keepers at the San Francisco mint and New York assay office, and I earnestly recommend that his salary be increased to the amount named.

An increase of \$3,000 has been recommended for "wages of workmen" at the San Francisco mint, for the reason that the expenses under that head for the last two fiscal years have been at the rate submitted, and the superintendent is of the opinion that a smaller amount will not be sufficient.

It is recommended that the salary of the register of deposits at the New York assay office be increased from \$1,250 to \$1,600 per annum, as the position is a responsible one, and it is difficult to secure the services of a competent person at the present compensation.

An increase of \$500 has been recommended in the salary of the assayer in charge of the mint at Denver, and \$250 in the salary of the melter at the same institution, while the estimate for incidentals and contingent purposes has been reduced from \$9,000 to \$6,000. As the expenses of living in Denver are higher than in most cities, I think that the salaries paid the officers should be placed at the figures submitted in the estimates.

SIR: Referring to estimates of appropriations required for the support of this office for the fiscal year 1884, I have the honor to recommend that the salary of the adjuster of accounts be increased from \$2,000 to \$2,200.

The bullion accounts of the mints and assay offices are intricate and very elaborate, requiring for their proper adjustment a thorough knowledge of the business of the mint and of the system of accounts and a great many calculations. Besides the examination of the vouchers, the work and responsibility of this desk have been largely increased within the last two years by a more complete examination of the accounts and a more thorough system of checks.

The duties of the position have been very satisfactorily performed by the gentleman who has had charge of the examination of the accounts since the organization of this bureau, and I earnestly request that his salary be increased \$200 to place it on an equality with that of others in this office, as the duties performed by him are equally as important.

In this recommendation the Director of the Mint fully concurs.

In relation to the estimate for legislative expenses, Territory of Dakota. (See page 32.)

TERRITORY OF DAKOTA,

SIR: I have the honor to transmit herewith estimates for legislative expenses of this Territory for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1884.

The estimates exceed the amount for the corresponding fiscal year ending June 30, 1882, by \$990. This is owing to the great increase of business in the Secretary's office, consequent upon the immense and unparalleled immigration which has been and still is flowing into the Territory. Dakota has to-day a population of at least 350,000, and 100,000

more will be added during the next twelve months. All this increases very largely the business of the secretary's office in the way of organization of new counties, correspondence, &c.

Unless the Territory should be divided at the ensuing session of Congress, it will not be possible to conduct the business of this office for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1884, for a less sum than I have estimated.

APPENDIX I.

In relation to the estimate for salaries, governor, &c., Territory of Montana. (See page 32.)

THE TERRITORY OF MONTANA,
Secretary's Office, Helena, Mont., August 29, 1882.

SIR: In the matter of making estimates for the salaries of the governor, secretary, and judges in the several Territories, I desire to call your attention to section 1845, page 327, of the Revised Statutes, and section 1879 of the same act, neither of which, I find, upon a careful examination, have ever been repealed. Congress has, during the last five or six years, annually appropriated a lesser sum than is provided for in said sections "to be received in full payment for services" for the year for which such appropriation was made. To illustrate the injustice of such a condition of things, I beg leave to cite my own case: I assumed the duties of this office June 1, 1882. I *knew* when I did so that my compensation for the remainder of the fiscal year would be my pro rata of \$1,800. I also knew that by the provisions of section 1845, above cited, I should be entitled to a salary of \$2,500 for the ensuing year. I have no official notice of the amount appropriated for the year ending June 30, 1883, but am informed that it is but \$1,300. I have performed two months' service, believing that Congress would appropriate a sum sufficient to pay the salary allowed by law. Thoroughly familiar with your well-merited national reputation as a just judge, I am emboldened to appeal to you to submit with your estimate for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1884, the amount of my salary as provided for in the section of the Revised Statutes cited. In view of the facts, I am also inclined to the belief that justice to the Territorial officers for whose salaries an insufficient amount has been appropriated demands that such deficiency be provided for.

APPENDIX J.

Explanation to estimates of Chief of Engineers for public buildings and grounds for year ending June 30, 1884. (See pages 51 and 153.)

SIR: As the amounts of some of the items above submitted are greater than the amounts appropriated for similar purposes for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1883, and as others are for objects for which no appropriation has as yet been made, it is deemed advisable to submit a brief explanation, giving the reasons why the additional sums are asked for, as follows:

The amount appropriated "for one clerk" for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1883, is \$1,400, and I recommend that his salary be increased to \$1,600, (being \$200 additional,) for the reason that the duties of the position are as exacting and require quite as much intelligence and ability as those performed by the majority of the third-class clerks in the Executive Departments. In addition, the present incumbent has been a faithful servant of the Government for over twenty-three years, (nearly ten of which have been spent in this office,) and he can hope for advancement only through an increase of the salary of the position by act of Congress.

The salary of "one public gardener" is estimated for at \$1,800, which is \$200 more than the amount appropriated for the present fiscal year. The salary of this position was placed by Congress during the years 1874, 1875, 1876, and 1877 at \$1,800 per annum, so that the additional \$200 submitted in my estimates is not an increase, but really a restoration. The duties of the position not only demand a thorough familiarity with tree, shrub, and plant culture, but also a practical knowledge of civil engineering as applied to landscape-gardening, as this officer is charged with the duty of laying out such portions of the public grounds as are to be improved, and with the general oversight and immediate supervision of the work upon the public reservations, and in the propagating greenhouses and nursery under the charge of this office. The salaries of officers performing somewhat similar, though not as varied or extensive, duties under the Departments of the Government in this city are larger than the present compensation (*i. e.*, \$1,600) of the public gardener, and I therefore earnestly recommend that the amount asked for in my estimate (*viz.*, \$1,800) be appropriated, in order that the salary may be restored to what it was prior to the reduction made by Congress in 1877.

The amount appropriated for the present fiscal year "for foremen and laborers employed on the public grounds" is \$26,000, but with the increase each year in the area of the improved reservations requiring constant care and supervision to maintain them in a slightly condition, an increase in the force used in the work becomes imperative. The acreage of the improved reservations is at least 20 per cent. more now than it was five years ago, and requires a corresponding increase in the labor employed in their care. I therefore recommend that the additional \$4,000 asked for in my estimate, making \$30,000 in all, be granted.

It will be noticed that I have asked for an additional day-watchman and for one night-watchman for "Armory square and reservations east to Botanic Garden," and I recommend that they be granted. These grounds extend from Seventh to Second streets, and require the services of at least two watchmen to properly police them during the day, and of one watchman for night duty.

I have asked for a "watchman for the greenhouses at the nursery," in order that a proper supervision may be exercised over the buildings and Government property in the nursery grounds, and I recommend that the appropriation be granted.

Among the items under head of improvement and care of public buildings and grounds I have submitted one for the "ordinary care of Franklin square." This square has been maintained, during the years since its improvement, from the small amounts that could be allotted yearly for the purpose from the appropriations for "various reservations," but a larger amount than can be spared from that appropriation has now become necessary, and I recommend that a specific appropriation be provided, as in the case of Lafayette square.

As new reservations have been improved and enclosed, the number of running feet of iron fence to be annually painted has increased, and \$1,500, the amount annually appropriated for several years past, is not now sufficient to paint the fences of all the reservations controlled by this office. I therefore recommend that the appropriation "for painting iron fences, &c.," be increased to \$2,000, the amount submitted in my estimate.

The amount appropriated for "removing snow and ice" for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1883, is \$1,000. The amount appropriated for the previous year was \$2,000, \$1,000 by the "Sundry civil act" approved March 3, 1881, and \$1,000 by the "Immediate deficiency act" approved March 6, 1882. The experience of the past two winters has shown that \$1,000 is not sufficient to remove the snow fall of the whole season from the walks and pavements (over fifteen miles in length, and varying in width from ten to forty feet) in and around the various public reservations, and I therefore recommend that \$2,000 be granted for this purpose, as submitted in my estimates.

In the item for "improving various reservations" the sum of \$20,000 is asked, being an increase of \$5,000 over the amount appropriated for the present fiscal year. This amount is required for making necessary repairs to roadways and walks, and for introducing additional sub-drainage in certain portions of the public grounds; for constructing additional drain lodges and gutters on margins of roads and walks; for sodding worn-out portions of lawn surfaces; for planting trees and shrubs; for improving certain of the smaller unimproved and partly improved public spaces, and generally for the prosecution of such work as may be required in the improvement and care of such of the public reservations as are not specifically provided for.

"Seward Place," for which I have asked an appropriation of \$10,000, is situated on Pennsylvania avenue, between Fourth and Sixth streets east, and is at present intersected by Pennsylvania and North Carolina avenues and Fifth street, the street surfaces embracing more than one-half the area of the reservation. It is proposed to remove the intersecting street and avenues, together with the street-railway tracks, regrade, improve, and enclose the park in a manner similar to Stanton and Mount Vernon squares, with walks through it on direct lines of travel, for pedestrians only.

With the amount asked for the "reservation on South Carolina avenue, between Fourth and Sixth streets east" it is proposed to reduce its grade to correspond with the proper surrounding street grades; to introduce necessary water and drain pipe; to surface-soil and sow down in lawn-grass seed, and to plant trees and shrubs, and suitably enclose the park.

The "reservation on North Carolina avenue, between Second and Third streets east," for the improvement of which an appropriation of \$4,000 is asked, is situated directly in front of "Providence Hospital" and is at present enclosed with an iron post-and-chain fence. It is proposed to sub-drain this reservation, introduce water-pipe for irrigation, and gutters and drain lodges, with suitable sewer connections for surface drainage; lay out and construct gravelled walks for pedestrian travel; surface grade, soil, and sow down in grass-seed those portions of the park designed for lawn surfaces, and plant trees and ornamental shrubs upon the same.

With the amount asked for "improving four reservations on New Jersey avenue, northwest," it is proposed to grade, surface-soil, sow down in grass-seed, and plant with trees and shrubs three of them, now totally unimproved; to plant trees and shrubs and further improve one of them, now partly improved, and to enclose all four with suitable iron post-and-chain fence.

The \$10,000 asked for the "Smithsonian grounds" it is proposed to expend in resurfacing with gravel worn-out portions of roadways and walks, and in the construction of brick and cobble-stone gutters, with suitable drain lodges on margin of same; in sub-draining the central portion of the grounds, and in surface-soiling, resodding, and resowing worn-out lawn surfaces.

The amount of \$5,000 asked for "Armory square and reservation east to Botanic Garden" is very much needed for resurfacing with gravel the roadways and walks, now very much worn, and for the construction of gutters and drain lodges, with suitable sewer connections on their margins, and for the repair of the roadway approaches to the parks.

The item of \$4,000 for "improvement of Washington circle" is asked in order to regrade the park to conform to the surrounding street grades; for the purchase of earth for rough grading, and good soil for surface grading; for purchasing and laying additional water-pipes for irrigation; for sodding margins of walks and sowing down lawn surfaces in grass-seed; for purchasing and setting park-curbings on lines of walks, and for laying asphaltum walks for pedestrian travel.

The amount appropriated for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1883, for "lighting the Executive Mansion and public grounds" is \$15,000. I have asked for an additional amount of \$1,000 for the year ending June 30, 1884, to provide for an expected increase in the consumption of gas in the Executive Mansion, and to replace with new gas-lanterns such of those in the public parks as may become worn-out and unserviceable. The amount appropriated for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1882, was \$16,000, \$15,000 of which was appropriated in the "Sundry civil act" approved March 3, 1881, and \$1,000 in the "Immediate deficiency appropriation act" approved March 6, 1882, every dollar of which was needed and expended as appropriated.

In the "Sundry civil appropriation act" for the year ending June 30, 1883, an appropriation of \$600 was made for rent of the office for the use of the "colonel in charge of public buildings and grounds," to be paid from the appropriation for rent of quartermasters' offices in the act making appropriations for the Army, &c., for 1883. In my estimates for 1884 I have incorporated an item for the "rent of office, public buildings and grounds," and would recommend that the amount asked for (*i. e.*, \$600) be provided, to be expended by the officer in charge of public buildings and grounds, in the same manner that other appropriations provided for the public buildings and grounds are expended. [An estimate for heating and lighting office is also submitted.]

SIR: I have the honor to transmit herewith duplicate estimates of appropriations required for the land service during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1884, as follows:

Referring to the estimate submitted for salaries of this office, I desire to state that it provides for the same number of clerks as are provided for in the act of August 5, 1882, for the current fiscal year. While the number of clerks provided for is not sufficient to meet the requirements of the service and the prompt transaction of the public business, with the limited room at my command I cannot work a larger number to any advantage. The rooms are all in such a crowded condition that I have not space sufficient for the proper care and preservation of the valuable files and records of the office. The present force is barely sufficient to keep up with the current routine work of the office, without taking into account the innumerable number of contests daily coming up for consideration. The work in some of the divisions is over twelve months behind, without any prospect, under the present circumstances, of relief. If I had rooms to accommodate them, with an additional force of one hundred clerks I believe I can within two years bring up the back work of the office to date, and then with a reduced force keep it up. In this connection I wish to call attention to the great increase in the sales of public lands within the past two years. During the fiscal year 1880 there were disposed of 9,152,357.62 acres; during 1881, 10,762,957.18 acres; during 1882, 15,699,848.97 acres—being an increase during the fiscal year 1882 of 50 per cent. over those of 1881. These figures show for themselves the absolute necessity for an increase of force, and nothing that I may say can add to their weight. I have therefore to respectfully request that the attention of Congress be called to the urgent necessity of providing additional accommodation and force for this office.

SIR: I have the honor to transmit herewith an estimate of appropriations required for the service of this office for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1884, being in addition to the annual estimate submitted with my letter of the 5th instant.

The estimate now submitted provides for one hundred additional clerks of the several grades, at an aggregate of \$134,500, and the rent of a building for their accommodation, at an annual rental of \$4,000.

In my annual estimate for the service of the fiscal year 1884 I included the same number of clerks as are provided for in the act of August 5, last, for the current fiscal year. I called attention, however, in my letter of transmittal, dated the 5th instant, to the necessity of the employment of this additional force, stating that I did not estimate for them, because I had no room at my disposal for their accommodation. Upon reconsideration, however, I considered that a further postponement of bringing up the arrears of work and keeping it up will operate to the great disadvantage of the Government and the public.

I have, therefore, estimated for the rent of a building large enough to furnish accommodation for this additional force, and have to request that the enclosed estimate be forwarded to the Hon. Secretary of the Treasury, for presentation to Congress.

APPENDIX L.

In explanation of the estimates of the Commissioner of Patents. (See pages 60 and 61.)

DEPARTMENT OF THE INTERIOR,
United States Patent Office, Washington, September 29, 1882.

SIR: I have the honor to transmit herewith estimates in duplicate for the appropriations required by this office for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1884.

I have estimated for an increase of \$22,070, over the present appropriation for the salaries of employés. This is made up in part by an increase of the salaries of some of the officers, and in part by an increase in the force.

Section 440, Revised Statutes, provides that each principal examiner of this office shall receive a salary of \$2,500 per annum. For several years past Congress has appropriated \$2,400, for each of said examiners. I have estimated for the salary provided by the statute, rather than that provided in late appropriation acts.

I have also submitted an estimate for an increase of the salary of the chief clerk from \$2,250 to \$2,500, and of the financial clerk from \$2,000 to \$2,500. The salaries of these officers were fixed at the sums above mentioned at a time when the business of the office was much less than at the present time. An increase of labor and responsibility should be compensated by an increase of pay. I have estimated for twenty-six examiners' clerks, at \$1,000 each, reducing the number of copyists, at \$900 each, twenty-one. The duties of an examiner's clerk are more onerous and varied, and require higher qualifications than mere copyists. For this reason I think their salaries should be increased.

I also submit an estimate for an increase of \$200 in the salary of the purchasing clerk. The duties of this officer are largely increased by the increase of the business of the office.

I also submit an estimate for an increase of the salary of ten model attendants from \$800 to \$900 per annum, the latter sum being that mentioned in the statute providing for their appointment. For several years past Congress has appropriated \$800 for each of these model attendants, instead of the sum fixed in the statute.

I also submit estimates for five additional clerks of class one, one skilled laborer, at a salary of \$720 per annum, five laborers, at \$600 per annum, and five at \$360 per annum, making a total increase in the number of employes of twenty-one.

I also submit an estimate for an increase of \$6,000 over the amount appropriated for the present fiscal year for the Official Gazette. It is impossible at present to state whether this increase will be sufficient to provide for the publication of the Gazette, but it is believed that that sum at least, in addition to the present appropriation, will be required from the increase of business. I submit an estimate of \$80,000 for photo-lithographing, or otherwise producing copies of drawings of the weekly issue of patents, for producing copies of designs, trade-marks, and pending applications, and for the reproduction of exhausted copies. The appropriation for weekly issues and drawings, and for copies of designs, and trade-marks, and pending applications in the fiscal year 1880-'81 was \$35,000. A deficiency appropriation of \$23,733.29 had to be obtained for that year, in order to carry on the work. For the present fiscal year an appropriation of \$45,000 was obtained for this work, but if the business of the office increases at the rate at which it has increased since the commencement of the fiscal year during the remainder of it, there will be a deficiency of not less than \$20,000 on this appropriation. In this estimate is included \$5,000 for reproduction of exhausted copies. This latter item has heretofore been included in the appropriation for the reproduction of burnt work, &c. It is by no means certain that this estimate will be sufficient to pay for the work therein mentioned.

From January 1 to the 15th of the present month, eight and a half months, the receipts of the office were \$725,470.10, an increase over the same period in 1881 of \$113,276.70. The increase in the number of applications received for the same period was 3,823. Should this increase in the business of the office continue at the same ratio, none of the items estimated for will be too large.

In relation to the estimate for new Naval Observatory. (See page 157.)

UNITED STATES NAVAL OBSERVATORY,
Washington, October 24, 1882.

SIR: I respectfully request that the Department will ask Congress to make an appropriation of \$586,138 for the purpose of erecting a new Observatory upon the site purchased under the act of Congress approved February 4, 1880.

The amount asked for is to cover the expense of constructing roads, grading, erecting the Observatory buildings and quarters for the superintendent, observers, and others whose duties require them to be in attendance during the night, for fencing, for moving the instruments and erecting them in the new building, and for all the expenses whatever.

The plans of the building were made a year ago, and photographs of these plans were submitted to all the leading scientific gentlemen of the country for their opinion and criticism. These opinions led to some slight alterations in the

plans, though the opinions, in all cases, were most favorable. The plans were finally approved by the commission appointed under the act mentioned above.

The unsuitableness of the present situation for astronomical purposes, added to its unhealthfulness, renders it desirable to make the change as early as possible. I append hereto, as bearing upon this subject, a copy of a letter from the Supervising Architect of the Treasury, written in April last, to the chairman of the House Committee on Appropriations.

SIR: In compliance with request of your committee, conveyed by letter of 12th instant, I have examined the plans and specifications for the proposed building for the Naval Observatory.

The present buildings are old and dilapidated, and the interests of the public service require that the new building should be erected as speedily as possible. I estimate that the lowest amount that would reasonably serve for the first year's work would be about one-half of the amount proposed to be appropriated, say two hundred and seventy-five thousand dollars, (\$275,000.) I think, however, the Government interests would be best served by an appropriation of the entire amount estimated for the work.

APPENDIX S.

Explanation of the estimates for the Government Hospital for the Insane. (See pages 158 and 206.)

GOVERNMENT HOSPITAL FOR THE INSANE,
Washington, D. C., August 29, 1882.

SIR: I have the honor to transmit herewith the estimates of appropriations required by this hospital for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1884.

BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS.

It is believed that nothing has been asked under this head that is not absolutely needed for the most efficient conduct of the hospital. The question of more shelter for our neat-stock and barn room for our farm products is an urgent one. Aside from new structures for the swine, no farm buildings have been erected since 1874. The milk product of the farm for that year was 13,918 gallons. For the year ending June 30, 1882, it was 44,325 gallons. If we are to carry our milk supply up to 200 gallons a day, as we can, and as we must if we are to afford an abundance of that form of nourishment, for which we have found no substitute in these enfeebled cases broken down with disease, we must have something besides shed-room for our greatly-increased herd; nor is it economy for the United States to yearly expose to the weather one hundred tons of hay in stacks, when the expenditure of \$5,000 would give us the needed barn-room and tool-house. The increased number of inmates renders the erection of detached buildings for the culinary department an absolute necessity. The freedom from the odors of cooking throughout the building and the absence of the tropic heat hitherto generated in the offices situated directly over the present kitchen, will be felt as a relief. The amount estimated for this, including the necessary apparatus for roasting, steaming, and otherwise preparing the food, \$8,500. The sum of \$3,500 for cold grapey, forcing and green house, is an expenditure that will add more to the beauty of the grounds and the pleasure of the inmates than the same amount would yield in almost any other way. It is not alone an æsthetic, but an economic provision to preserve and bring forward the budding plants that brighten the gardens and lawns. It is not unmeet to plant flowers by the pathways of sorrow.

In preparing the estimate for fire-walls, for which an appropriation was made the present year, and which walls are now in process of erection, the item of \$4,500 to replace the present wooden stairways with fire-proof ones was unfortunately overlooked. This is so obviously necessary to complete the protection against fire that it is now asked to be made immediately available. The remaining item of \$6,000, is to provide bedding and furniture for the new wards, which we confidently expect to have ready for occupation by the fall of 1883.

CURRENT EXPENSES.

Under the recent legislation whereby provision has been made for the reception and care at the Government Hospital for the Insane of the insane from the Home for the Disabled Volunteer Soldiers, it is thought that the average number of the indigent insane of all classes to be provided for during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1884, will not be less than eleven hundred and twenty-five. The expectation is that the number from the Soldiers' Home will not exceed one hundred and fifty, and that the admissions from all sources will not greatly exceed those of the present year. Such calculations, from the nature of the case, can be only approximations, and may prove to be underestimates. The bases of estimated cost is \$225 per annum for each patient, which includes all the expenditures of the hospital except those for special im-

provements and repairs. For three years past Congress has provided for a portion of this expenditure in the bill for the expenses of the District of Columbia. Following the ratio of increase of the appropriation under that head which has been adopted for those years, the amount in the District bill will be \$46,700, leaving \$206,425 to be provided for, as hitherto, in the sundry civil bill. The provision that has been made for some years past, that not exceeding \$1,000 of this appropriation may be expended in removing indigent patients to their homes, is just, and so obviously in the line of economy that its continuance is recommended.

APPENDIX T.

Explanation of estimates for Howard University. (See page 158.)

HOWARD UNIVERSITY,
Washington, D. C., September 14, 1882.

DEAR SIR: Please find accompanying this letter the estimates for Howard University, to be laid before Congress at its coming session, amounting to \$27,500.

The estimate for salaries is the same as the previous year, to wit, \$15,000.

A special appropriation of \$7,500 is asked, to make needed additional repairs, not yet commenced, in the main building, the dormitories, the professors' and officers' houses, the out-buildings, and the grounds, as also in providing pumping-machinery (to be moved by wind or hot air) and connections, with which to draw water from the new reservoir, directly contiguous to the university grounds, and the construction of which by Congress has necessitated delay and change in our plans for protection against fire and for daily use. We need also to grade and lay out the front grounds and those which are to face the new reservoir, and to erect a new fence in front of them, and to make on all the grounds carriage-ways and foot-paths.

A special appropriation of \$2,500 is also requested, to make a needed enlargement of accommodations in the library and cabinet rooms, and for a small increase of the library itself, for which no books have been purchased for eight or ten years, even for the necessary researches and studies of the professors.

A deficiency appropriation of \$2,500 is asked, to apply on the expenses of the present year, ending June 30, 1883, in order to complete important repairs already begun, but which proved to be necessarily so much more extensive and expensive than was expected, and which it was impossible thoroughly to survey and contract for beforehand, that the liberal sum appropriated failed to meet the exigency. This fact will be better appreciated when it is stated that there was found to be necessary an entire renovation of the steam heating-apparatus, plumbing, ventilation, and sewerage of the main building and Miner Hall, two immense structures, in accordance with modern sanitary improvements and the requirements of the health department, and at double the cost which had previously been considered needful.

APPENDIX U.

In relation to the estimates of the Bureau of Engraving and Printing. (See pages 23 and 171 to 181.)

TREASURY DEPARTMENT,
Bureau of Engraving and Printing, November 14, 1882.

SIR: I have the honor to submit herewith the estimates for the appropriations necessary to operate this bureau during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1884.

SALARIES.

In the estimate for the officers, clerks, &c., I have added a clerk of class four, that being the grade of clerkship established by law for disbursing officers, (Revised Statutes, second edition, section 176,) to which it is proposed to promote the disbursing officer of this bureau, who is now rated as a second-class clerk, with \$200 additional as disbursing-clerk, making his salary, in all, only \$1,600, although he is required to give bond in the sum of \$100,000, and disburses annually very nearly \$1,000,000.

LABOR AND EXPENSES OF ENGRAVING AND PRINTING.

The amount required for this item, under the present method of appropriating for the bureau, is substantially the same as submitted last year, *i. e.*, \$425,000, (the actual figures being \$425,998.66.) The estimated requirements of the Treasurer of the United States and the Register of the Treasury being also substantially the same, *i. e.*, 8,509,000 sheets of notes, certificates, and bonds, the estimate submitted last year being for 8,535,250 sheets, a difference (24,250 sheets) not sufficient to make any appreciable decrease in the amount of money necessary to operate the bureau. The full number of sheets can be delivered, if desired, in any class of notes or securities.

The act making appropriations for sundry civil expenses of the Government for the year ending June 30, 1883, and for other purposes, approved August 7, 1882, (Statutes at Large, chapter 423, pamphlet edition, page 308,) after appropriating for labor and expenses of engraving and printing the sum of \$400,000, enacts as follows:

"And the Secretary of the Treasury shall, at the next session of Congress, submit for the year thereafter, commencing July 1, 1883, an itemized estimate for the above service, and, so far as practicable, for the force of employes that can be individually and specifically appropriated for, and shall also estimate for the force that cannot so be appropriated for and for material in separate amounts, and itemized as far as practicable."

After careful consideration of the matter since the passage of this act, I have arrived at the conclusion that the only practicable way in which it can be complied with is to estimate for all the work executed by the bureau under a single head of appropriation, including internal-revenue stamps, national-bank notes, checks, &c., which are now provided for by separate appropriations, and I have accordingly prepared an estimate of the force of employes necessary, specifying in detail the class and number to be employed, and the compensation to be given each. I have likewise estimated for each item of material separately, giving quantity and price. This estimate is based upon the work of last year, modified where necessary by the results of the first quarter (July 1 to September 30) of the current year, and is intended to cover all expenditures now made for engraving and printing, and work incident thereto, from the following appropriations, the figures opposite each item indicating the amount of expenditure made therefrom to this bureau in payment for such work executed by it during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1882:

If the detailed estimate is acted upon, the amounts last-above indicated should be deducted from the estimates for the purposes specified, except the items marked "reimbursable," the proceeds of which should be required to be covered into the Treasury as miscellaneous receipts.

The increase in the amount estimated for this year over the expenditures of last year is \$119,054.59, and is mainly upon the items of United States notes, gold and silver certificates, and other securities, the estimate for this item being \$125,998.66, as against an expenditure of \$321,693.72. The necessity for this increase is the requirements of the Treasurer's office to bring up and maintain a sufficient reserve of notes and certificates to meet the demands of business, and to prevent the use of freshly-printed notes. The amount now estimated for this purpose is the same as was estimated for the year ended June 30, 1882, and for the year ending June 30, 1883. With the smaller appropriations provided by Congress the bureau can only execute a proportionate amount of work, and the reserve cannot be brought to or maintained in a proper condition.

APPENDIX V.

Explanation of estimates for Coast and Geodetic Survey. (See pages 182 to 184.)

UNITED STATES COAST AND GEODETIC SURVEY OFFICE,
Washington, November 1, 1882.

SIR: I have the honor to transmit herewith the estimates for the work of the Coast and Geodetic Survey during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1884, and for the standard weights and measures of the United States.

It will be observed that these estimates conform, in the aggregate, to the amount appropriated for the current fiscal year, and that they have been prepared in conformity with a requirement attached to that appropriation, which provides that the pay of persons continuously employed in the field and office shall be specifically estimated for, and that the estimates for the work proposed to be done in the several localities shall be submitted in much greater detail than before. Hence the principal items of the estimates are not the same as before in form, although they are substantially the same in effect. In making this change of form an earnest endeavor has been made to meet the requirements of the law, while preserving a necessary degree of pliancy in the detail of the work proposed to be done and in the expenditures therefor.

The two principal items of the appropriation, as heretofore made, have been aggregate amounts for the survey of the Atlantic and Gulf coasts and for the Pacific coast. They embraced the pay of all persons employed in making surveys in the field and in the work of the office, as well as all "party expenses," which comprise the pay of those temporarily employed as recorders, signal-men, hands, cooks, drivers, or boatmen, as the case might be, the subsistence and transportation of the parties, and all requisite materials, tents, boats, and all other necessary expenses incident to the work.

In the new form of estimates herewith submitted the expenditures are divided as follows:

1. *General expenses for the survey of the coast*, (being party expenses, as above defined.)—In the "details of estimates" given, each locality proposed to be surveyed or class of work to be done is specified, and the amount to be spent upon each is estimated. It is of course impracticable to make such estimates with great accuracy far in advance, and some discretion must be left with the Superintendent to vary the amounts, according to the character of the season or unforeseen requirements elsewhere; but this estimate will form the project for the year's work, to be adhered to as nearly as consistent with the best interests of the service, and of course the total amount appropriated under this head will not be exceeded.

2. *Transcontinental geodetic work*.—The estimate for the continuation of the transcontinental geodetic work, or triangulation to connect the Atlantic and Pacific coasts, conforms to the amount granted for the current year; but an amount of \$3,450 for the line of accurate levelling between the two oceans has been added to this item and deducted from the preceding one. This line of extremely accurate levels will have reached half-way between New York and San Francisco when this appropriation goes into effect.

3. *Aid to State surveys*.—For furnishing points in aid of State surveys, same as heretofore.

4. *Pay in field*.—This item provides for the pay of officers regularly employed in the work, in conformity with paragraph four of the Regulations for the government of the Coast and Geodetic Survey adopted by the Treasury Department. The actual organization of the work is represented by the classification here given of assistants, sub-assistants, and aids who constitute its normal surveying force, the development of which is the natural outgrowth of the needs of the country. The six assistants who receive salaries between \$3,000 and \$4,000 have been in its service for an average time of forty years. The average term of service of the nineteen assistants who receive salaries between \$2,000 and \$2,900 is thirty years; that of the twenty-one assistants whose pay is between \$1,500 and \$1,900 is twenty years. The average length of service of the sub-assistants and aids is ten and five years, respectively.

5. *Pay in office*.—The estimates for this service are given in great detail as to the several branches of the office-work, and require no further explanation.

6. *Office expenses*.—For purchase of materials, instruments, books, and all other expenditures necessary for the work in the office not otherwise provided for, as recited in the details of estimates.

7. *Rent of offices*.—Same as heretofore.

8. *Publication of records*.—Same as heretofore. The principal object in retaining this as a separate item is the direction that the work shall be done at the Government Printing Office.

9. *Repairs and maintenance of vessels*.—Same as heretofore.

The total of these estimates is \$573,000, against \$573,900 appropriated for the current fiscal year.

In addition, I beg leave to submit, and ask the sanction of the Department for, an estimate of \$100,000 for the construction of a steamship specially adapted for surveying the coasts and sounds of Alaska Territory. The considerations which have been presented in favor of this appropriation are given in the accompanying letters:

TREASURY DEPARTMENT, *July 1, 1882.*

SIR: I have had the honor heretofore of transmitting to you a communication* to me relative to an appropriation for the building of a vessel for the purposes of "the coast survey" along the coast of Alaska. I also, in reply to a letter from you, informed you that, in my opinion, there was no vessel in the Revenue-Marine Service that could be used for the purpose

above mentioned. I now have the further honor of handing to you another letter† from Professor Hilgard, of the United States Coast and Geodetic Survey, on the same subject, and of saying that I am convinced that this effort on the part of that office is not mere pertinacity, but is made from a hearty belief in the needs of that branch of the public service and of the commercial-marine interests of the country.

From conversation with gentleman connected with that branch of the service, and from some observation of facts, I am prepared to say that the Territory of Alaska is worthy of the attention and fostering care of Congress, and that no means consistent with a wise economy should be spared to bring it within the range of commercial enterprise and open its resources to the public reach and use. Doubtless a survey and charting of the coast, straits, inlets, bays, and harbors, as perfect as may be, is an efficient means to that end, and vessels of suitable build and capacity are needful.

So much I am able to say unhesitatingly and of my own observation.

The specific thing sought at the present is an appropriation of \$100,000 for the building of a vessel. As to the need now for this I must rely upon the statements of those having the general matter in charge, and those statements are well set forth in the accompanying letter of Professor Hilgard. They seem to me to be more than plausible as to the need of a vessel. I commend them to the attention of the committee, which is finally to judge whether the sum asked for can be afforded from the public moneys without inconvenience to other urgent demands upon the public moneys.

UNITED STATES COAST AND GEODETIC SURVEY OFFICE,
Washington, February 3, 1882.

SIR: The rapidly-growing commerce and navigation on the coast of Alaska warns us of the importance of making as early as possible more complete surveys of that coast than have hitherto been practicable with the means at the command of the Department.

A consideration of what has been done will show that great diligence has been used by this office since the acquisition of that Territory. A general map of the coast from previous Russian and British explorations and local surveys, a general chart of the coast, and an atlas of harbors in Alaska were published as early as 1869. A volume of sailing directions was compiled and published in 1869. More exact surveys of important localities have since been made by this office, and thirty-eight charts from original surveys have been published. Two of these are from surveys made by United States naval vessels on duty on that coast. A new and much enlarged edition of the Alaska Coast Pilot is in hand, and over one hundred pages stereotyped, and fifteen charts illustrative of the same are engraved and nearly ready for printing. Seven additional charts of hitherto unsurveyed localities are in hand for engraving from observations by the officers of the Survey, and the number of astronomical positions fixed, and magnetic observations preparing for publication is very large.

In the mean time, the people on the Pacific coast are calling for a more rapid progress of the survey on the northwestern coast, as is evidenced by memorials presented to Congress, copies of which are appended to this letter.

In order to carry on the work to good advantage, a new vessel, especially adapted for the purpose, is absolutely necessary.

The required qualities of such a vessel are: Size for carrying a comparatively large staff of officers and crew; capacity for a large quantity of provisions and coal, which cannot be easily replaced during a long season's work; strength, to resist damages liable on a dangerous and unknown coast, water-tight compartments being a necessary adjunct; speed to overcome the strong currents of the narrow channels; economy of fuel and proper sail-power to assist in the saving of fuel when practicable, making it possible to maintain the field for the full length of the working season, and keeping the expenses within the limits of the appropriation made by Congress.

The plans for such a vessel have been prepared under the direction of my predecessor, Captain C. P. Patterson, and this office is ready to make contracts if authorized by Congress.

In view of the foregoing considerations, I have the honor to request the Department to recommend to Congress a special appropriation for the construction of a vessel for these surveys, at a cost not exceeding the sum of \$100,000.

It is very desirable that the appropriation, if approved, be available at an early day, in order that advantage may be taken of the surveying season of 1883.

UNITED STATES COAST AND GEODETIC SURVEY OFFICE,
Washington, June 29, 1882.

SIR: On the 3d of February I had the honor to address you a letter, asking that you would recommend to Congress an appropriation of \$100,000 for the building and equipping of a vessel for the survey of the coast of Alaska.

The matter was also urged by memorials from the Chamber of Commerce of San Francisco, from the Geographical Society of the Pacific, and from the California Academy of Sciences. These memorials accompanied my letter.

These documents were transmitted by you to Congress; and no appropriation for the purpose proposed appearing in the sundry civil bill, I beg leave to recall the subject to your attention, because the commercial necessities of the Pacific coast particularly demand a survey of the great interior passages of Alaska, notorious for their hidden and unknown dangers; and because the Coast Survey has no vessel properly adapted and fitted for such duty. The "Hassler" is now there, but is especially needed for the hydrography of the coasts of California, Oregon, and Washington Territory.

Urgent applications were made upon the Superintendent last year by the chamber of commerce and other commercial bodies for special surveys of such dangerous passages as Wrangel Strait, whereby several hundred miles are saved on each trip of the mail and coasting vessels.

Since the date of my letter, I have also had the personal statements of officers of the Survey who have been through these waters, and who have given attentive study to the resources, requirements, and development of that country. The resources of Alaska are much greater than are generally known. For example, the area of her cod-fishing banks is estimated to be four times greater than that of the banks of Newfoundland, and the coasts of the Archipelago Alexander embrace between 8,000 and 9,000 miles, clothed with timber of great size and excellent quality, which will be a source of supply when all our other sources are exhausted. Of the mineral wealth of the Territory, the favorable reports have been confirmed.

The existing charts of this region are in a great measure founded upon those of Vancouver of 1792, and but recently the revenue-cutter "Corwin," when returning with the "Rodgers" expedition, struck upon unknown dangers.

Added to the unreliable and misleading details of these charts, the dangers to navigation are increased by the heavy storms of these high northern latitudes, and the unusual amount of rainy, thick, and foggy weather, together with the short daylight of winter.

The number of vessels trading to these waters and the number of fishing and whaling vessels have greatly increased.

There are no trustworthy pilots for the interior straits of the Archipelago Alexander, for the Shumagin and Aleutian Islands, or for the approaches to the great rivers Yukon, Kiskovin, &c. The few English pilots for the regular route from Fuca Strait to Sitka demand extraordinary remuneration, (as high as \$500 per month for Admiral C. P. R. Rodgers.)

For want of Government charts, companies trading to these waters are using private charts, compiled from information obtained by their captains, &c. In consideration of these difficulties which beset the commercial community of the Pacific coast, the cost of insurance is unusually large and oppressive, and in winter it is practically prohibitory.

We have endeavored, with the very limited means at our disposal for Alaska, to meet some of the most urgent wants of commerce by the examination of dangerous localities, by the publication of sailing directions, the compilation of charts, observations of tides, &c. It must be evident, nevertheless, that little systematic work can be done without a vessel constructed and equipped expressly for this duty, and whose whole time shall be devoted thereto. The "Hassler," now temporarily in Alaska, is a single-shell iron vessel, not suited to these waters, as I have more explicitly detailed in my previous letter, and, should she strike upon an unknown danger, would doubtless be a total loss, just as the "Suwanee" was lost in Shadwell Passage.

The practical acquaintance of the officers of the Coast Survey with the waters of Alaska, their knowledge of the resources of the Territory, and their familiarity with the commercial demands of the Pacific coast for charts to aid navigation, conspire to give force to my request for this vessel.

Washington, D. C., November 21, 1882.

SIR: I have the honor to submit an additional paragraph for introduction in the estimate for the service of the United States Fish Commission for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1884. I am officially informed by the First Comptroller of the Treasury Department that, under the present enactments in regard to the Fish Commission, there is no provision by which any one other than the Commissioner, appointed by the President, can legally or properly direct its affairs, and that in the absence or indisposition of the Commissioner no business can be transacted, such as signature of official documents, the signing of requisitions for money, approval of bills for payments, &c.

I have therefore prepared a clause (see page 186) to remedy this defect, and am informed by the Comptroller that if enacted it will answer the desired purpose.

GENERAL: I have the honor to present the following report upon a survey of the marine-hospital grounds at Chicago, with estimates for the protection of the front from encroachments of the lake.

Upon receipt of the instructions, I visited the hospital and examined the surroundings, and then directed a survey to be made of the locality, extending some distance north and south along the lake front, the map of which is presented herewith. For the purpose of comparison, I desired to secure a map showing the shore line at some previous date, but was enabled only to procure one made in 1872. Comparing the two, it is observed that the shore line in front of the hospital grounds in the interval has receded 140 feet at the northerly limit and 75 feet at the southerly limit. The shore is subject to the same changes experienced at all places along the southwesterly coast of the lake where a pier has been built projecting into the lake, viz., a progression on the north and a recession on the south side of the pier. A reference to the map will show a small pier about 550 feet north of the hospital grounds, and at the Lake View Water-Works, 1,100 feet further north, another but longer pier, at both of which places the changes referred to have taken place.

The water in front of the grounds is shallow; about 200 feet out there is a narrow ridge, part of which is less than one foot below water surface. The location of this bar changes frequently, inwards or outwards, depending upon the direction of the prevailing winds. It is stated that it is sometimes found close into shore.

The sewer from the main building and a waste-pipe from the pump-house (indicated by dotted lines on the map) have their outlets directly in the sand beach; and as this is unprotected from the action of the northeasterly seas, which are most severe in this vicinity, the pipes are constantly getting clogged up, causing great annoyance and inconvenience, and, in the case of the sewer-pipe, liable to result in an insanitary condition of the building.

For the protection of the shore line and grounds, I would recommend that a pier be built out on the dotted line (red) shown on the map, starting at the shore on the north boundary line and running out on the projection of that line a distance of about 100 feet; then south, keeping at about that distance from the shore until opposite the southerly limit of the grounds; this pier to be built of two rows of piles, placed five feet apart, and filled with brush fascines (or, better, long strips of bark) and stone; the piles in the outer row to be placed close together, and those in the inner row about four feet apart, secured by waling-pieces. This is one of the many devices adopted in this vicinity for shore protection, and with success, at the same time being comparatively an economical construction.

The sewer-pipe can be led to the outer face, which, being swept continually by the sea, will prevent any clogging of the pipe from sand.

TREASURY DEPARTMENT,

Office of Internal Revenue, Washington, November 14, 1882.

SIR: On the 22d of June last I had the honor to report that it would require, in round numbers, \$190,000 to pay the original owners of lands which were sold for non-payment of United States direct taxes the surplus proceeds of the same, as provided under the laws as construed by the United States Supreme Court, at its October term, 1881, in the case of the United States vs. Charles M. Taylor.

I have been informed that for some reason Congress did not make the appropriation. I have the honor to recommend that the amount above mentioned be included in the estimates for appropriation to the next session of Congress. I would also respectfully recommend that \$500 be included in the estimates for care and protection of real estate which is owned by the Government under the direct-tax laws. There are over two thousand lots of land at Fernandina, Fla., owned in that way by the Government, and it is found necessary to incur expenses in keeping control of them and properly protecting the interests of the Government in them, about which there is already considerable litigation. It is important that the Government should keep possession and control of them until they are sold as provided by law.

The aggregate of this estimate appears to be large, but most of the items go to constitute the permanent equipment of the school, and I could not conscientiously say one could be suppressed without detriment to the interests of investigation and the acquirement of professional knowledge and experience. The world of artillery is to-day endeavoring to solve the nature and results of the forces that propel a shot within a gun, and of those that tend to disturb or decrease it after it has been expelled upon its mission, and I especially and earnestly suggest that if the school was supplied with items numbered in this estimate 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 10, and 12, it might be possible for the school to discover, develop, and perfect data that would be of priceless value to the service in time of need; at any rate, if these machines were in hand, no excuse of want of facility could be made. I believe the instruments asked for are the best adapted to their purpose of any known to me. I ask for the purchase of one of each of Lieutenant Zalinski's sights, because I am satisfied of their great superiority over any others that have been devised. I understand the Ordnance Department declined to manufacture or experiment with either of them. Lieutenant Zalinski, with commendable zeal and liberality, has, by having them made at his own expense and bringing them here for use, enabled their great superiority to be shown, and I think it no more than right and proper that the school should, by the patronage and use of them shown this month, and force them into service. I have experienced the need of the articles asked for in item 11, and hope they may be supplied.

SIR: I respectfully submit estimate of appropriations for this hospital for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1884.

I have asked for an increase over the present appropriation of nine hundred and fifty-six dollars. The increase is made in the items for salaries and fuel and light.

I ask for the increase in salaries so as to be able to raise the pay of two cooks from fifteen dollars to twenty dollars per month, one from ten dollars to fifteen dollars; also the pay of the steward from eighteen dollars to twenty-five dollars, and two nurses from twenty-two to twenty-five dollars, one from eighteen to twenty dollars, and two others from fifteen to eighteen dollars. The pay of these employes is very small. Most of them have been connected with the institution for several years, and are skilled in their work. The total amount expended under contract for fuel for the present fiscal year amounts to two thousand eight hundred and forty-four dollars. The amount expended during the last fiscal year for light was four hundred and seventy-five dollars, which amounts to one hundred and sixty-nine dollars more than has been appropriated for the present fiscal year, and as it is possible that the present amount of fuel purchased may be consumed before the end of the year, I have deemed it wise to guard against a deficiency in this item.

The item for furniture and repairs I have reduced, and added the reduction to medicines and medical supplies.

Estimate for repairs upon the "adobe palace" at Sante Fé, Territory of New Mexico, the same being known and recognized as the property of the General Government, and occupied by the legislative, judicial, and executive departments of the Territory:

For expenses upon portal or veranda, &c. \$200 00

This expenditure is a necessity by reason of the joists or supports of the portal roof being broken on account of the great weight of the dirt roof resting upon them, the latter being now supported by temporary means.

For repairs upon back walls \$400 00

This expenditure becomes necessary because of the walls of the building being softened and in a crumbling condition, and from being seriously weakened at the foundation from want of a stone base or protection from rain and dampness, the whole aggravated by the general dilapidated condition of the joinings of the roof upon the said wall and the decayed condition of the water-conduits from the roof, the general bad effect being not only to soften and weaken the walls of the building, but likewise to cause the rooms adjoining the same to be damp and unhealthy.

STATEMENT OF THE PROCEEDS OF GOVERNMENT PROPERTY, PUBLISHED IN CONFORMITY TO THE FOLLOWING PROVISIONS OF LAW:

All proceeds of sales of old material, condemned stores, supplies, or other public property of any kind, except the proceeds of the sale or leasing of marine hospitals, or of the sales of revenue-cutters, or of the sales of commissary stores to the officers and enlisted men of the Army, or of materials, stores, or supplies sold to officers and soldiers of the Army, or of the sale of condemned Navy clothing, or of the sales of materials, stores, or supplies to any exploring or surveying expedition authorized by law, shall be deposited and covered into the Treasury as miscellaneous receipts on account of "proceeds of Government property," and shall not be withdrawn or applied, except in consequence of a subsequent appropriation made by law. A detailed statement of the proceeds of all sales of old material, condemned stores, supplies, or other public property of any kind, shall be included in the Appendix to the Book of Estimates.—(R.
