RIGHT OF WAY TO ARIZONA SOUTHERN RAILROAD COM-PANY THROUGH PAPAGO INDIAN RESERVATION.

Mr. SPAULDING, from the Committee on Indian Affairs, submitted the following

REPORT:

[To accompany bill H. R. 6372.]

The Committee on Indian Affairs, to whom was referred the bill (H. R. 6372) granting the right of way to the Arizona Southern Railroad Company through the Papago Indian Reservation in Arizona, respectfully report:

The railroad company wants this right of way, a distance of about 8 miles, and the Indians want to grant it. The present bill is approved by the Secretary of the Interior and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, with the following amendment: Strike out all the first section after the word "and," in the 13th line, and insert the words, "such compensation as may be fixed by the Secretary of the Interior be paid to him by the said railroad company, to be expended by him for the benefit of the said Indians." As so amended your committee recommend that the bill do pass.
