Mr. W. R. Cox, from the Committee on Pensions, submitted the following

REPORT:

[To accompany bill S. 1532.]

The Committee on Pensions, to whom was referred the bill (S. 1532) granting a pension to George C. Quick, submit the following report:

That in the case of George C. Quick, it is shown that the applicant served in the Black Hawk War in 1832 as a private; that he became disabled in the service, was furloughed, sent home, and afterwards honorably discharged. As there was no surgeon attached to the company in which he served, and all the commissioned officers have since died, the fact of his disability cannot be officially certified. Collateral evidence on this point is furnished, however; and in view of the services and sufferings of the applicant, and his advanced age, the committee recommend concurrence in the accompanying Senate bill entitled "An act granting a pension to George C. Quick."

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
