REPORT:

[To accompany bill H. R. 4699.]

The Committee on the Public Lands, to whom was referred the bill (H. R. 776) granting right of way to the Saginaw and Mount Pleasant Railroad Company, in the State of Michigan, having had the bill under consideration, report the same back with a substitute, the passage of which is recommended.

The object of the bill is to permit a right of way to the railroad company named in the title through an Indian reservation. The substitute submitted requires the consent of the Indians to be first obtained, and all damages sustained by individual Indians to be paid.
