## REPORT:

[To accompany bill S. 357.]

The Committee on Pensions, to which was referred the bill (S. 357) granting a pension to William Lockhart, adopt the report of the Senate committee, as follows:

That claimant is now nearly eighty years of age. There is no doubt of his service in the Black Hawk war in 1832, and that he was wounded. The Pension Department rejected the claim on the ground that there was no proof the disability arose from the service, but a comrade swears distinctly he remembers when claimant went with a raiding party, and that he came back wounded, and in the wagon which brought in the wounded soldiers, and the committee therefore recommend the passage of the bill.

Your committee recommend the passage of the bill.
