Mr. DE LANO, from the Committee on Pensions, submitted the following

REPORT:

[To accompany H. R. 3585.]

The Committee on Pensions, to whom was referred the bill (H. R. 3585) granting a pension to James T. Furlow, have considered the same and report:

The claimant was a private in Capt. William C. Dawson's company, Col. William Porter's First Regiment Georgia Volunteers, Indian war, from June 6, 1836, to July 12, 1836, and was paid for one month and twenty-three days' service. He prays a pension at the same rate as is allowed by law for service in the war of 1812.

The claimant is seventy-seven years old, unable to work, and with no means of support. These facts are vouched for by Mr. McKae, Member of Congress from Arkansas.

Your committee believe the case to be a meritorious one, and the passage of the bill is therefore recommended, with the following amendment: Strike out the words "William Borter's" in the sixth line of said bill and insert in lieu thereof the words "William C. Dawson's."
