Mr. MOADOO submitted the following

RESOLUTION:

Whereas it is being charged in the public press and elsewhere, to the involving of the national honor, that certain Indian reservation police officers, acting under the authority of the civil and military powers of the United States, did, in arresting the late Sitting Bull, one of the chiefs of the Sioux Indians, unjustifiably kill the said Sitting Bull, and afterwards barbarously mutilate his remains: Therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Secretaries of War and of the Department of the Interior be, and they are hereby, requested to send to this House all the official statements and correspondence in their possession, or that of their subordinates, relating to said arrest and killing, more especially the reports of those officers and agents directly concerned in ordering or effecting the arrest of said Sitting Bull, together with all other papers or facts known to them in connection with this matter.
