Mr. HENDERSON, of North Carolina, from the Committee on Pensions, submitted the following

REPORT:

To accompany H. R. 10810.]

The Committee on Pensions, to whom was referred the bill (H. R. 10810) granting a pension to Samuel S. Humphreys, beg leave to submit the following report:

The claimant was a private in Capt. Abner Williams' company, Georgia volunteers, and served three months and sixteen days in the

Florida Indian war of 1838-39.

He asks a pension by special act at the rate of \$8 per month, declaring under oath that he is seventy-two years old, and without any means of support whatever except manual labor, and he is now physically unable to do any work by which to gain a livelihood for himself and wife. Mr. W. N. Spence, attorney of Camilla, Ga., states that the claimant

has a hard time to make a living and is very poor.

In view of the claimant's service and his great age and dependence, your committee recommend the passage of the bill.
