The documents distributed during the past year were chiefly those of the Fiftieth Congress. Some advance, however, is being made by the Government Printing Office in the promptness with which the reserve documents are bound and delivered for distribution to depositories. The responsibility for delay in this matter does not rest in any large degree with the Public Printer. This delay is caused chiefly by his being obliged to wait until the indexes of the several series of Congressional documents are completed, so that they can be bound up with each copy issued. Except for this many of these volumes could be bound and distributed at least a year earlier than is now the case.

The simple and sufficient remedy for this evil is the enactment by Congress of a law providing for the preparation and publication annually of a general comprehensive index of all public documents, to take the place of all partial and separate indexes hitherto published. Further reference to such an index will be found on a subsequent page of this report.

Ten volumes of the documents of the Fiftieth Congress still remain to be delivered by the Public Printer. Of the 129 volumes of the documents of the first session of the Fifty-first Congress, 41, and of the 87 volumes of the second session 8, have been received to date, leaving 177

volumes yet to be bound.

#### REPORTS OF THE DEPARTMENT AND MISCELLANEOUS DOCUMENTS.

Of the reports of the Secretary of the Interior and of the several subordinate officers of the Department, and of other miscellaneous publications of the Government, 51,579 were received during the last fiscal year by the Department. Most of these documents were in pamphlet form. All were issued for the official use of the Department and its several bureaus, and for their discretionary distribution.

In addition there were received 3,976 volumes of decisions of the Department relating to public lands, 1,000 volumes of the decisions of the Department relating to pensions, and 1,000 United States maps,

which were published exclusively for sale by this office.

#### PUBLICATIONS OF THE GEOLOGICAL SURVEY.

Of the publications of the U.S. Geological Survey, 24,740 were received, which have been distributed to the several libraries and other institutions designated for the purpose under the provisions of joint resolution of March 3, 1887.

#### OFFICIAL REGISTER.

The first volume of the Official Register for 1891 is nearly completed, and will be issued in a few days. This volume, which in consequence chiefly of more complete returns is 20 per cent larger than the corresponding volume for 1889, records the name, office, and salary of about 70,000 employés of the United States Government, together with the State or country in which each was born, and the State from which each was appointed to office. The second volume, which relates exclusively to the postal service, will probably be published in May next.

#### CENSUS REPORTS.

Distribution of the reports of the Tenth Census continued through the year, as far as orders for the same were received from Senators and Representatives. The great bulk of the more than 600,000 volumes of these publications has been distributed. It is probable that no series of public documents has ever had a wider or more general distribution or has reached so large a number of the public, college, and school libraries of the country. A considerable number of three volumes of these reports still remain in the care of the Department, of which distribution will be made as rapidly as orders are received from those having authority in the premises.

Of the Eleventh Census no bound volumes have yet been issued, its reports having so far been limited to preliminary publications in the form of bulletins, distributed at the discretion of the Superintendent of the Census. It is impossible to say how soon the compendium or the first of the series of full reports or final volumes will be published, but it is hoped that this will be done at an early day during the present

session of Congress.

Provision in part only for the printing of these reports, in addition to the usual number, was made at the last session, as follows:

It will be observed that no provision has yet been made for printing extra copies of the reports on population, agriculture, manufactures, fish and fisheries, education and religion, mortality and vital statistics, the Indians, crime and allied subjects, nor the volumes containing the record of the veterans of the civil war, each of which, besides other questions, has by order of Congress been made the subject of investigation by the Census Office.

Of the reports of the Tenth Census there were printed, in addition to

Of each of the other 19 final volumes, 10,000 copies; and of each of

The experience gained in the distribution of these reports leads to the conclusion that, while a somewhat smaller number of some of the volumes of the Eleventh Census than were printed of the Tenth Census will suffice to meet the public demand, this number can not be reduced as low as 5,000 copies. There are at least 4,000 public, university, college, and school libraries in which a complete set of these reports should be deposited.

It is estimated that to satisfy a resonable demand on the part of the public for these reports will require the printing of 75,000 copies of the Compendium, 20,000 copies each of Statistics of Population, Statistics of

Manufactures, and Statistics of Agriculture, and 8,000 copies each of the other final volumes, while for the volumes containing the names of the veterans of the civil war it is difficult to estimate what the demand may be.

The printing of 1,000 copies of each of these volumes exclusively for sale, under the provisions of joint resolution of March 3, 1887, is also recommended.

#### SUPREME COURT REPORTS.

Seventy-six copies each of volumes 132 to 136, and 376 copies each of volumes 137 to 139, of United States Reports, were received during the fiscal year 1890–'91, which were distributed in accordance with the provisions of section 683 of the Revised Statutes and of an act of Con-

gress approved February 12, 1889.

Attention is again called to the importance of some immediate action on the part of Congress providing for the supply of these reports to officers of the Government and to United States courts that are yet unsupplied. Frequent requests are made of this office for these documents by Government officers who have occasion, in the discharge of their official duties, to make constant or frequent reference to them, which requests can not be complied with, because the law does not authorize such action. Furthermore, since the passage of the law of February 12, 1889, additional United States courts have been established and United States judges appointed, for whose use these reports can not be provided because no appropriation is available for the pur-A bill designed to cover all legitimate requirements in this matter was submitted to each House of Congress during the last session, which bill was reported favorably in the House, but no final action was had on the same. It is, however, hoped that early in the present session Congress will make adequate provision in the premises, so that hereafter requisitions for these reports by the parties above referred to may be promptly complied with.

In my judgment more adequate provision should be made for the sale of the publications of the Government. To be sure, authority now exists for the sale at cost price of any document that may be in charge of the Secretary of the Interior not required for official use, and also for the sale by one officer or another of the Government of specific publications, but no office is supplied with copies of all documents for this purpose, and therefore many persons who would gladly buy rather than beg public documents are unable to secure them by purchase. In view of the rapidly increasing population of the United States, and therefore of the largely increased demand for public documents that the coming years will bring, it seems to me that it would be a wise policy on the part of the Government to encourage the sale of its publications after the manner of the English Government. To meet the demands for gratuitous distribution, if this is to be done on any principle of equity or justice, will necessitate the expendi-

ture from year to year of ever-increasing sums of money.

When there are 500,000 or 1,000,000 people who would be glad to have the report of the Geological Survey, for instance, why should the edition be limited to 15,000 copies? Of this great multitude it is true, as a rule, that one individual is as much entitled to receive it as an-Take as an additional illustration, "The Growth of Industrial Art," which was ordered by the last Congress. There are probably a million families that would be glad to have this document for display in their homes, but the edition is limited to 10,000 copies. Of course there can be no equitable distribution in such a case. The work on "Diseases of the Horse," recently published, is another instance in point. This Government is by far the most liberal in the world in the matter of its expenditures in this direction, but I think the time has come when Congress may well consider whether some decided change in this particular may not wisely be inaugurated. It seems to me that if all departments and offices of the Government were adequately provided for, and if a general and liberal distribution of Government publications were made to our public, university, college, and school libraries, then the gratuitous distribution to individuals might well be much restricted, provided it were made possible for any one desiring a document to secure it at the absolute cost price as printed from stereotyped

When it is made possible for a citizen of any community to consult a public document by resorting to the public library of the town, it can

not be considered a hardship if he be required to pay the small price at which the document can be purchased if he desires a copy for his own personal library, because of its intrinsic value or because it fills a vacant space in his library case. I am disposed to think that there is something at least slightly demoralizing in the practice (which so largely obtains and which is encouraged by the present system) of begging documents on the part of so many of our people, or of their being supplied with them without cost or trouble on their part, especially when the distribution of documents is made for partisan purposes or in anywise to influence or to reward political action. For both economical and moral reasons I believe it would be best to discourage the general gratuitous distributions of documents, and to make such provision that anyone desiring these publications can, in an independent and manly way,

purchase them.

I think, also, that some provision might wisely be made by which documents, the edition of which already printed has been exhausted, might be reprinted for sale where the demand for the same continues. Take, for example, the first five volumes of the Rebellion Record. There are in the hands of libraries and of individuals a large number of incomplete sets, beginning with the sixth volume. It is probable that nearly everyone possessing such incomplete set would be very glad indeed to purchase the prior volumes if this could be done, and I see no reason why the officer who is authorized to sell public documents should not also be authorized whenever he has received a sufficient number of orders, say a token, or 250 copies, for this work to justify its being again put to press, to make a requisition upon the Public Printer for such number of volumes as has been ordered by those desiring to purchase. The Medical and Surgical History of the War of the Rebellion and the Index Catalogue of the Surgeon-General's Office may be cited as other examples. These are among the most valuable documents ever issued, as far as the medical profession is concerned. I have no doubt that if it were made possible for surgeons and physicians to purchase this work at cost price a large number of orders would be received. Under such provision as is above suggested it would be possible for all who desired the work to secure it without any expense whatever to the Government. These same remarks apply to other series of documents, the edition of which is now exhausted.

It has been suggested that it would be wise for the Government to transfer its plates to some private publisher and allow him to reprint documents for sale. This would, perhaps, be better than no provision at all in this direction, but I can see no reason whatever for the Government not doing this work itself. Of course, no private publisher would do this except at a considerable profit to himself, and I do not think the Government should by its action seek to enrich an individual at the expense of the public at large, my contention being that the Government policy should be to supply its publications at absolute cost, without profit to itself or anyone else, to all who desire to pur-

chase.

The Official Gazette of the Patent Office affords an illustration of this policy. This document is supplied gratuitously to each member of Congress and to eight libraries named by each member of Congress. All other parties who wish it are supplied in the way of sale. I have heard no complaints as to the manner in which the public at large is provided with this publication.

The same principle in the main applies to the distribution of the mon-

ographs and the bulletins of the U. S. Geological Survey, though the distribution to libraries is much more limited.

There ought also to be some provision by which the public can be apprised of the documents that are issued from month to month and of the price at which these are sold by the Government, so that all who are interested in the matter can at the earliest practicable moment receive information in the premises. Such information can be readily communicated to almost all the libraries of the country and to their patrons through the Official Gazette of the Patent Office, if authority were given to have such list published in connection with the first monthly issue of the Gazette. During sessions of Congress this information could also be communicated through the Congressional Record.

#### INDEX OF PUBLIC DOCUMENTS.

Attention has been called in previous reports to the almost imperative necessity for some adequate provision for the preparation of a comprehensive index of all the publications of the Government. As these publications accumulate, which they do with very great rapidity year after year, reference to individual papers among them without such an index becomes more and more difficult, so that it is the judgment of not a few librarians and others that it would be of much greater public service largely to reduce the number of documents and provide a satisfactory index of the same than to increase the number without such an index. There is not the slightest doubt but that the value of public documents would be very greatly enhanced and the convenience of officers of the Government and members of Congress, and of all others who have occasion frequently to refer to them, be very greatly subserved by the annual publication of an index, which should embrace under its proper title every document issued by the United States Government. The wonder is that the lack of such an index has been so long tolerated and that we have been content with the makeshifts in this direction that have characterized the past.

A subordinate advantage resulting from such an index would be this, that all executive and miscellaneous documents and reports of committees of the two Houses of Congress, the binding and distribution of which has been hitherto delayed from one to two years waiting for the index of the individual series, could be printed and distributed at the earliest moment that the Public Printer found it practicable to take up the work, the general index herein referred to taking the place of all these special indexes that are now printed and inserted in each of the leather-bound copies of the series of Congressional documents distributed to members of Congress and to depositories of public documents. Furthermore, the cost of preparing these separate indexes and of printing the same in editions numbering many thousands each year would be avoided, as a single indexer and a single index would suffice. The number of copies of the several indexes of documents and reports printed in connection with the documents of the Fiftieth Congress was

not less than 150,000.

During the last Congress a bill was introduced in the two Houses providing for the appointment of an official indexer and the preparation and publication annually of a general comprehensive index of public documents. This bill was reported favorably by the committee having it in charge in the House, but, owing to the pressure of other business, no opportunity for calling it up occurred. It is hoped, however, that during the present session adequate provisions in this matter may be made.

#### CLASSIFICATION OF DOCUMENTS.

The publications of the Government known as Congressional documents are now divided into executive documents, miscellaneous documents, and reports of committees of the Senate and House of Representatives. This classification has been in vogue for forty years, and has therefore become familiar to all parties accustomed to consult them; but on general principles the simpler the classification and the smaller the number of classes into which documents are divided the more convenient will reference to them and the indexing of them be found. I see no necessity for the division of documents into executive and miscellaneous, or any decided advantage resulting from this classification; nor can any good reason be given in many cases for assigning documents to one class rather than to the other, as, for example, why the Annual Report of the Director of the Geological Survey should be assigned to the executive document class and the Annual Report of the Bureau of Ethnology to the miscellaneous document class; or why the Report of the Commissioner of Fish and Fisheries should be classed as a miscellaneous document instead of an executive document. Many other instances of this kind can readily be cited.

It is suggested, therefore, that the executive and miscellaneous documents of each House of Congress be consolidated, and that they be designated, respectively, Senate documents and House documents. There will then be two classes for each House, viz: Senate documents, Senate reports; House documents, House reports. This will simplify and render much more convenient both reference to and indexing of public documents. Then arrange a series of numbers which shall be uniformly given to certain annual publications of the Government so that the same number shall attach to the same document year after

year. The following enumeration of documents is suggested:

In my judgment, however, it would be still better to discontinue the classification of all annual publications as executive and miscellaneous documents and publish them as separate and distinct series, with uniform title-page and back title, excepting the date, so that each Department or bureau series could be arranged by itself if desired; for example-

The publications of the several Departments could be bound in different colors, so as to introduce variety and also render them still more readily distinguishable. I would suggest, also, that those designed for depositories, instead of being bound in full sheep, as now, be bound in half morocco or half Russia, which would involve, I think, very little, if any, additional expense. Every copy of the same volume issued should bear the same title page and the same back title, and the practice of publishing the same book in several editions, with varying titles, should be at once and forever discontinued, and an end put to the confusion and waste which this practice entails.

#### EXCHANGE OF PUBLIC DOCUMENTS.

So far as the demands of the regular current work of the office have permitted, the exchange of documents among the libraries of the country has been continued through the year. It has, however, been a matter

of regret that this work has often been interrupted because other duties have required the services of its entire force. But those libraries whose check lists have not yet received attention may rest assured that reported deficiencies will be supplied, so far as this can be done, at the earliest practicable moment. The number of volumes received from all sources, which by this system of exchange have been made available for supplying such deficiencies, amounts in the aggregate to 145,000.

Check lists have been sent to many libraries which have not yet returned them to the Department. It is desired that all libraries receiving these make such return as soon as can conveniently be done, and furthermore that librarians who do not wish to coöperate in this work

notify the office to this effect.

During the year three additional check lists have been prepared and sent to all the principal libraries of the country, viz:

American Archives and American State Papers. Treasury Department:

Reports on the State of Finances, 1801–1890.
Reports on the Commerce and Navigation of the United States, 1821–1890.
Reports of the Comptroller of the Currency, 1863–1890.

Certain miscellaneous publications of the Government.

As frequent requests have been made for these check lists by librarians and others, those already prepared are hereto appended. They will be found not only convenient for purposes of reference, but also valuable for the historical and bibliographical information which some of them contain, and for these reasons may be worthy of being permanently preserved among the documents of the Government.

To these check lists of individual series of documents is added a list of Congressional documents from the Fifteenth to the Fiftieth Congress, inclusive. It is thought that this last list can be made serviceable to libraries having leather bound sets of these publications, by the aid it affords in showing the number and arrangement of the documents of each Congress, and in many instances the contents of the individual volumes, and that by attaching corresponding numbers to the back of each volume in the library and to the same volume in the list, it may be made greatly to facilitate reference to these documents on the part of librarians.

This list is in no sense an index of Government publications, but only an enumeration of the volumes which constitute the set of Congressional documents, with the number or numbers contained in each. The contents of the individual volumes are indicated only in the case of such as contain each not more than three separate documents, when the subject to which each document relates is noted. It is thought that this will add much to the value of the list for purposes of reference. To extend this, however, to other volumes would be inconsistent with the object in view.


The documents of the first fourteen Congresses are not included, chiefly for the reason that the State papers or documents of the Senate and House of Representatives for that period have not been published in such form that a satisfactory list of volumes can be given. All the important documents, however, of these Congresses have been brought together and arranged according to their subject matter, and published in the American State papers. Documents are occasionally enumerated which are not found in the volume said to contain them, omitted, it is supposed, chiefly because they were not furnished the Public Printer. To specify such omitted documents has not been practicable.

The regular classification of documents as executive and miscellaneous began with the Thirtieth Congress. The first is supposed to embrace all documents sent to the Senate or House of Representatives by the Executive Departments; the second all other documents, excepting reports of committees, ordered printed by either House. This distinction

is, however, not always maintained.



# DEBATES AND PROCEEDINGS OF CONGRESS.

#### PROCEEDINGS OF CONGRESS.

The record of the proceedings of the Congress of the United States is found in the following series of publications, viz: Annals of Congress, Register of Debates, the Congressional Globe, and the Congressional Record; the first containing that of the First Congress to the Eighteenth Congress, first session, inclusive; the second, that of the Eighteenth Congress, second session, to the Twenty-fifth Congress, first session, inclusive; the third, that of the Twenty-third Congress to the Forty-second Congress, inclusive; the fourth, that of the Forty-third Congress to date. It will be observed that the Register of Debates and the Globe overlap each other, so that the proceedings of the Twenty-third, Twenty-fourth, and the first session of the Twenty-fifth Congress are embraced in both.

#### ANNALS OF CONGRESS.

As indicated by the title page, these volumes contain a record of "the debates and proceedings of the Congress of the United States, with an appendix containing important state papers and public documents, and all laws of a public nature, with a copious index, compiled from authentic materials."

The running page title of the first two volumes, which were compiled by Joseph Gales, sr., and published in 1834, is "Gales & Seaton's History of Debates in Congress," and of the other volumes published,

1849 to 1856, "History of Congress."

They contain by no means a full report of Congressional proceedings, but only an abridgment of the more important debates, prepared by the compilers from reliable contemporaneous records. Of the Senate proceedings, until 1794, only the most meager record is found, as the Senate sat with closed doors up to the second session of the Third Congress. The proceedings of the two Houses are arranged separately by sessions, and not by days as in the Congressional Globe and Record, so that the record of each House is consecutive through the entire session.

These volumes contain not only the record of the proceedings of the Senate and House of Representatives, but in the appendix incorporated in the last volume of each Congress are found the most important executive and other documents appertaining to, and all laws of a public character passed by, that Congress.

By joint resolution of March 3, 1849, and by act of Congress of September 30, 1850, the Secretary of the Senate and Clerk of the House of Representatives were authorized to subscribe on behalf of Congress for 2,000 copies of Annals of Congress from the commencement of the First Congress to the second session of the Eighteenth Congress. The Annals were compiled and published by Gales & Seaton.

#### REGISTER OF DEBATES.

The title of these volumes differs but little from that of the Annals of Congress, being "Register of Debates in Congress, comprising the leading debates and incidents of each session, together with an appendix containing the most important state papers and public documents to which the session has given birth, to which are added the laws enacted during the session, with a copious index of the whole."

No part of the proceedings of the two Houses of Congress is given except what involves debates or some incident novel or important in its character, and therefore worthy of preservation. The debates are not in all cases literally reported, but their substantial accuracy may

be entirely relied upon.

The record of each House is arranged by sessions, as in the Annals, excepting that contained in the first volume, which is by days, as in

the Globe and Record.

In the appendix, attached to the last volume of each session, are printed the messages of the President, the most important reports from the several Departments of the Government and of the leading committees of each House of Congress, and all acts passed during the session.

The Register was compiled and published by Gales & Seaton, the first volume being issued in 1825 and the last in 1837. Provision for the purchase of these volumes for the use of Congress was made from time to time, either in the way of a general appropriation for books for the Library of Congress or of a special appropriation for the Register.

#### THE CONGRESSIONAL GLOBE.

This series, up to the close of the Thirty-first Congress, as indicated on the title page, contains "Sketches of the Debates and Proceedings" of the two Houses of Congress. The title is then changed by the omission of the word "sketches," implying thereafter a fuller report.

The appendices, in addition to speeches in full, or but slightly abridged, of Senators and Representatives on important questions, which were withheld for personal revision and not printed in the body of the Globe, contain also, to the close of the Thirty-ninth Congress, messages of the President and reports of Cabinet officers, and from the second session of the Thirty-second Congress, the laws of the United States passed, and to the first session of the Thirty-seventh Congress, a detailed statement of the appropriations made during each session. An index, covering the session to which it belongs, is, with a few omissions, found in each volume excepting the second session of the Forty-second Congress, of which the index is printed in a separate volume. Each of the appendices has an index of its own.

The Globe was edited and published as follows: By Blair & Rives to the close of the Thirtieth Congress; by John C. Rives to the close of the first session of the Thirty-eighth Congress; by F. & J. Rives to the close of the Thirty-ninth Congress; by F. & J. Rives and George A. Bailey to the close of the series. The work was supplied to Congress under resolutions of either House providing, from time to time, for its purchase for the use of Senators and Representatives. The

first volume was published in 1834; the last in 1873.

#### THE CONGRESSIONAL RECORD.

By act of March 3, 1873, it was provided that "the debates of Congress shall be printed by the Congressional Printer, under the direction of the Joint Committee on Public Printing on the part of the Senate," and on March 21, 1873, Senator Anthony, then chairman of the Senate Committee on Printing, reported that in compliance with this provision Mr. D. F. Murphy had been appointed official reporter of the Senate, and that the debates of Congress would be published at the Government Printing Office in the Congressional Record, which arrangement was approved by the House.

Thus the Globe was superseded by the Record, which, from and including the Forty-third Congress to the present time, has been printed at the Government Printing Office from stenographic reports supplied

by the official reporters of the two Houses.

All extraneous matter has been excluded from this series, the contents of the several volumes being strictly limited to the proceedings of Congress. The appendices contain only specches which, for one reason or another, were not inserted in their proper places in the Record. Except in cases in which the Record for the entire session makes but a single volume, the index for each session is printed in a separate volume, instead of being included in each volume of the series, as is the case with the Globe.



## AMERICAN ARCHIVES. Folio.

By act of March 2, 1833, the Secretary of State was authorized to contract with Matthew St. Clair Clarke and Peter Force for the publication of a work entitled "The Documentary History of the American Revolution." This work is known as American Archives, and as originally projected was to comprise six series, consisting of a collection of authentic records, state papers, debates, and letters and other notices of public affairs, the whole forming a documentary history of the origin and progress of the North American colonies, of the causes and accomplishment of the American Revolution, and of the constitution of Government for the United States to the final ratification thereof, covering the period from the discovery and settlement of North America to the ratification of the Constitution of the United States.

Of this work only the fourth and a portion of the fifth series have been published. The fourth contains six volumes, relating to the period from the King's message of March 7, 1774, to the Declaration of Independence by the United States in 1776.

It was intended that the fifth series should cover the period from the Declaration of Independence in 1776 to the definitive treaty of peace with Great Britain in 1783, but of this series only three volumes were compiled, extending from July to December, inclusive, 1776.

The work therefore comprises the following volumes:

Fourth series, V. 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, and 6. Fifth series, V. 1, 2, and 3.

#### AMERICAN STATE PAPERS. Folio.

This series of documents was published by Gales & Seaton under the provisions of the act of Congress approved March 2, 1831, of joint resolution of March 2, 1833, and of act of June 12, 1858. Twenty-one volumes were prepared under the provisions of the first-named act and resolution and 17 volumes under those of the last act. They comprise the most important executive and legislative documents of the United States, selected by the Secretary of the Senate and the Clerk of the House of Representatives with great care from the mass of manuscript and printed papers in the offices of the two Houses of Congress and in the several Executive Departments of the Government.

They are divided into ten classes, according to the subject-matter, the documents of each class being arranged chronologically, as follows:

The Coast Survey was established by an act of Congress approved February 10, 1807, and reorganized under the provisions of an act approved July 10, 1832. Reports of progress were made in 1816 and 1818, when the work of the survey was suspended until 1832, since which date an annual report has been issued.

Provision was made in act of March 3, 1871, for extending the triangulation of the coast survey, so as to form a geodetic connection between the Atlantic and Pacific coasts of the United States. Beginning with that of 1878, its reports have been entitled Report of the

U. S. Coast and Geodetic Survey.

From 1851 these reports have been issued in cloth as Bureau publications, and in leather as Congressional documents. From 1851 to 1858, inclusive, they are included in the executive documents of both the Senate and House; from 1859 to 1875 in those of the House; from 1876 to 1883 in those of the Senate, and from 1884 to date in those of the House. The Department of the Interior was organized under the provisions of an act of Congress approved March 3, 1849, by which act the Patent Office and the Census Office were transferred from the Department of State, the Land Office from the Treasury Department, the Indian Office from the War Department, the Pension Office from the War and Navy Departments, and placed under the jurisdiction of the Secretary of the Interior. Since that date the Bureau of Education, the U.S. Geological Survey, the office of the Commissioner of Railroads, and the Bureau of Labor have been established and attached to the Department, and a number of institutions and offices of the Government, not connected with any of the above-named Bureaus, have also been put under its supervision, all making their annual reports to the Secretary.

The Patent Office was originally connected with the Department of State, but was transferred to the Department of the Interior upon its organization in 1849. From 1837 to 1842 it issued brief reports in pamphlet form, but subsequently in volumes, as above enumerated. Prior to 1862, when the Department of Agriculture was established, the report on agriculture was prepared and published by the Commissioner of Patents, and forms a volume, or part of a volume, of his annual reports, the first being that of 1840.

These reports are included in the set of Congressional documents bound in leather, forming a part of the executive documents of the House of Representatives. Those of 1849 to 1858, inclusive, are included also in the executive documents of the Senate. A separate

edition bound in cloth was also published.

In 1872 the Official Gazette, a weekly publication, was substituted in the place of the annual reports, when the publication and distribution of the latter ceased.

The Gazette is supplied gratuitously to eight libraries designated by each member of Congress, and to other parties on subscription at the rate of \$5 per annum.

Its publications comprise annual reports, circulars of information, and miscellaneous papers. The first report was issued in 1868, which is found in V. 13, House Ex. Docs., 41st Congress, 2d session. A special report on education in the District of Columbia was published in 1871.

Its regular series of annual reports begins with that of 1870. These are issued as publications of the bureau, are included in the annual report of the Secretary of the Interior and accompanying documents; also in the series known as "Message and Documents," and, furthermore, form a part of the leather-bound set of House executive documents.

The circulars of information are issued only as bureau publications, at irregular intervals, and in pamphlet form. This work, popularly denominated the Blue Book, is a biennial publication, issued each year in which a new Congress assembles, *i. e.*, every odd year. It was published in ordinary octavo until 1875, but since then in large octavo. The Register from and including that of 1883 is embraced in the miscellaneous documents of the House of Representatives.

The Department of Agriculture was organized in 1862 and placed under the direction of the Commissioner of Agriculture. The Commissioner was superseded by the Secretary of Agriculture by act of February 9, 1889, when the Department became one of the Executive Departments of the Government, the eighth, and its head a Cabinet officer. Its first report was issued January 1, 1863.

Prior to 1862 the Commissioner of Patents issued the annual report on Agriculture, forming, from 1849 to 1861, a volume by itself. (See list of Patent Office Reports.) Previous to 1849 the Report on Agriculture was incorporated in a single volume of Patent Office Reports, published

annually.

Some of these volumes are included in the leather-bound edition of Congressional documents, being found among the executive documents of the Senate or House, or both. All of them have been issued in cloth

binding.

The annual report as now published contains, besides the report of the Secretary, reports of the following subordinate officers, viz: The Assistant Secretary, the Chief of the Bureau of Animal Industry, the Chemist, the Chief of the Division of Forestry, the Entomologist, the Chief of the Silk Section, the Ornithologist and Mammalogist, the Statistician, the Microscopist, the Botanist, the Chief of the Division of Vegetable Pathology, the Pomologist, the Chief of the Seed Division, the Chief of the Division of Illustrations, the Chief of the Division of Records and Editing, the Superintendent of the Document and Folding Room, the Special Agent of Fiber Investigations, the Special Agent of the Artesian and Irrigation Inquiry, the Director of the Office of Experiment Stations, the Superintendent of Gardens and Grounds.

The Smithsonian Institution was founded upon the bequest of James Smithson, of London, England, who gave his entire property to the United States to establish an institution for the increase and diffusion of knowledge among men. It was incorporated by act of Congress approved August 10, 1846.

The first report was issued in 1847, and an annual report thereafter. The volume, however, containing the report for 1853 embraces the essential portions of preceding reports and is now considered the first of

the set.

Many of these volumes are included in the leather-bound edition of Congressional documents and are found among the miscellaneous documents of the House of Representatives. All of them have been issued

in cloth binding.

In addition to the annual reports, the Institution issues two series of publications, viz: Contributions to Knowledge (4°), and Miscellaneous Collections (8°).
