TREASURY DEPARTMENT, December 31, 1840.

SIR: I have the honor to transmit, herewith, a report from the Commissioner of the General Land Office, dated the 30th instant, with the documents therein referred to, having regard to the operations of the General Land Office during parts of the years 1839 and 1840.

GENERAL LAND OFFICE, December 30, 1840.

Sin: I have the honor to lay before you the accompanying documents, showing the operations of this branch of the public service since the date of my last annual report.

The sales of public lands during the year 1839 amounted to 4,976,382.87 acres; the purchase-money of which amounted to \$6,464,556 78; and the net receipts into the Treasury from this source, during the same period, was \$7,076,447 35, as shown by table marked A.

The sales during the first three quarters of the year 1840 amounted to 1,696,617.42 acres; of which the purchase-money was \$2,252,202 07; and the payments by receivers into the Treasury, during the same time, amounted to \$2,630,217 25, as shown by the table marked B.

The exhibit marked C shows the monthly sales, from the 1st January to

30th September of the present year.

The exhibit marked D indicates the latest periods to which returns have been rendered by the district land officers, and the latest cash balances reported to be in the hands of receivers.

The progress and extent of the labors performed in registering the sales of public lands in the tract-books of this office, and in the adjustment of the

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accounts of the receivers of public money, are set forth in the exhibit marked E.

Exhibit marked F shows the annual sales of public lands, from the year 1833 to 30th September, 1840, inclusive; the aggregate of which is

56,842,806.87 acres, and purchase money \$72,269,749 58.

Document marked G shows the sales of Chickasaw lands in Mississippi and Alabama, pursuant to the treaties of 1832 and 1834; discriminating between the regular sales and those made for the benefit of Chickasaw orphans, from the commencement of operations under those treaties to 30th September, 1840.

Paper H is the estimate of the expenses of the General Land Office for

the year 1841.

The estimates for the surveying department, for the year 1841, will be found in document I.

Document K is a synopsis of the proclamations of the public lands since

the date of my last annual report.

Exhibit L shows that there have been proclaimed for sale, during the present year, upwards of thirteen millions and a half of acres; and that the quantity prepared for market and not yet proclaimed, together with the quantity, plats for which it is expected will be returned during the year 1841, will make an aggregate of nearly twenty-three millions and three-quarters of acres. It also shows that the quantity of new lands intended to be surveyed for market in the last six months of this year, (the plats of which may be returned by the middle of 1842,) is estimated at about seven millions and a half of acres. Hence, it will be seen that the estimated quantity which will be prepared for market during the ensuing eighteen

months, is thirty-one millions and a quarter of acres.

The tables herewith, marked M and N, show the quantity of new lands, the surveys of which have been returned to this office annually, during the last four years, (ending with the 1st of this month,) and the quantity offered at public sale within the same period, excluding school-lands, and lands to be sold for the benefit of the Indians in Ohio, Mississippi, and Michigan. From these tables it will be seen that, during the period mentioned, the plats of survey for over forty and a half millions of acres have been returned to this office; and that, excepting about half a million of acres to be offered for sale in 1841, under existing proclamations, the large amount of nearly forty-six and a half millions of acres have been offered at public sale; and that the average amount annually offered during the last three years exceeds fifteen and a quarter millions of acres. Whilst these tables exhibit the quantity of lands which the department is capable of bringing into market annually, they afford, at the same time, gratifying evidence of the beneficial results of improvements recently introduced in the details of this branch of the service, especially the new mode of compensating the clerks and draughtsmen in the offices of the surveyors general, as referred to in my last annual report.

As an additional means of insuring prompt returns of the surveys, so as to render them soon available, and at an early period reimburse the Treasury for surveying expenses, and augment the revenue, a circular was issued in August last, from this office, to the surveyors general, limiting the size of the future contracts with deputy surveyors to quantities which could be completed and returned within three or four months from date. This regulation, by increasing the number of deputies employed, will, it is believed,

expedite the field operations, insure proper competition, and enable the surveyors general to exercise a more efficient check upon their deputies, by testing, at short intervals, the correctness of the work, and the better to ascertain their relative qualifications for future employment.

Herewith are submitted, as affording detailed information on the subject of

NEW SURVEYS,

The reports of the surveyors general, with maps (document marked O) showing the condition of the surveys in their respective districts, the state of the work in their offices, together with their estimates:

In consequence of the new appropriations not having been made until near the middle of the current year, and of its being found desirable that the surveying should not exceed the amount that could be completed within the year, the instructions for new surveys, issued in August last, limited the expenditures to one moiety of the appropriations for each district; reserving the balance to be expended in 1841. These instructions, and the operations under them, were as follows:

In Indiana.—The survey of the lands recently ceded by the Miami Indians in this State, mentioned in the last annual report as in progress and nearly completed, has since been returned to this office, and may all be brought into market whenever the lands are attached to a district, with the exception of the portion that has been selected by the authorities of the

State of Indiana on account of the Wabash and Erie canal grant.

These lands comprise all the unsurveyed tracts of importance in the State, to which the Indian title has been extinguished, and no instructions for new

surveys therein have been given during the present year.

In Michigan.—In addition to the former extensive operations in this State, the surveyor general was authorized, by the instructions of this year, to contract for the subdivision of a number of townships intended for market, situated in the southern peninsula, all north of the 3d correction line, or of Thunder Bay river; also, for the subdivision of some of the townships in the northern peninsula, east of range 9 west—making, with those in the southern peninsula, one hundred full townships; and for the survey of the exterior township boundaries of the lands situated between Lake Superior, Chocolate river, and a standard parallel, dividing equally all that part of the northern peninsula lying west of range 8 west. It appears from the annual report of the surveyor general, that the season was too far advanced to commence operations in the northern peninsula. The surveys have therefore been necessarily postponed until early next spring; but contracts have been made to subdivide for market about one hundred townships in the southern peninsula, to be closed in the present month.

It will be seen by the exhibit L, referred to in the foregoing, that the plats of survey of nearly eight and one third millions of acres of new lands in the southern peninsula of the State (which is exclusive of lands to be sold for the benefit of the Indians) have been received at this office this year; all of which had been advertised for sale at the date of the exhibit, with the exception of one million eight hundred and fifty-five thousand acres, about

one-half of which last amount has since been advertised.

In Wiskonsin Territory.—The only township ordered to be surveyed in the Territory, this year, is that recently ceded by the Stockbridge Indians near Lake Winnebago. The surveys of the twenty townships near the Chippewa and St. Croix rivers, for which appropriation was made at the

last session of Congress, were postponed for want of the proper connexion of those points with the existing surveys. The present estimate of the surveyor general, however, will enable him to supply this deficiency; and it is contemplated to issue the instructions for the whole of these surveys in 1841. It appears that the surveys of about fifteen townships immediately west of Green Bay, in the Menomonie cession, and of the sixteen townships north of the Wiskonsin river, in the Winnebago cession, authorized to be subdivided for market by the instructions of 1839, are very nearly completed. The plats may therefore be expected in the first six months of next year, when the lands may be advertised for sale.

Since the last annual report, the plats of the "pine lands," situated on the banks of the Wiskonsin river, above the grant of "Amable Grignon," have

been received, and the lands advertised for sale.

In Iowa Territory.—The instructions of this year for new surveys embraced the township boundaries of the west Sac and Fox cession of 1837, and the subdivision for market of as many townships thereof as would not require, with the exterior boundaries, an expenditure of over ten thousand dollars, reserving the balance of the appropriation for future instructions. These, when completed, will nearly close the surveys of all the lands in the

Territory to which the Indian title has been extinguished.

In Illinois.—Of the one hundred and five townships, (the quantity estimated last year as remaining to be surveyed in the State,) fifty townships were ordered to be subdivided for market this year. These surveys, it appears, are in progress, and the returns are expected to be made to the office of the surveyor general in January next, according to contract. The plats of these lands, together with the plats of a considerable amount of surveying in the State, already returned to his office, will therefore probably be transmitted to this office within the ensuing six months, when the lands may be advertised for sale.

In Missouri.—Under instructions of this year, contracts have been entered into for the subdivision of about fifty-eight townships, situated principally in the western and southwestern parts of the State; leaving to be surveyed in 1841, forty-two of the one hundred townships which were inclu-

ded in the estimates of last year, to be subdivided for market.

The plats of the above fifty-eight townships are expected to reach this office in the course of the approaching year. These, with other tracts, the plats of which are expected to be received within the next six months, will comprise a valuable body of new land in this State, then ready for market.

The surveys int he late "northwest addition" to the State, commonly called the "Platte river country," were (a part of them) completed, and the plats returned to this office before the adjournment of the last session of Congress. They could not, however, be put into market, on account of the lands not being attached to any land district. As these lands must remain unoffered until this obstacle is removed, I would respectfully invite early attention to this subject.

In Arkansas.—The instructions of August last authorized the survey of one half of the eighty-six townships colored brown on the diagram of the State, (which accompanied the report of the surveyor general, appended to the last annual report of this office,) the survey of the exterior township lines of twenty-five townships, and the subdivision of ten of them lying southwest of Red river, and east of the line dividing ranges 29 and 30 west; together with one thousand miles of subdivision lines in Carroll and Jefferson counties. These will make about sixty-eight townships sectioned for market.

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The surveys of the remaining forty-three townships covered by the esti-

mates have been postponed till next year.

It appears that contracts had not been entered into for these surveys, with the exception of such as are southwest of Red river, at the date of the surveyor general's late annual report; the same having been deferred, in order to obtain the information necessary to enable him to make a proper selec-

tion of the townships to be subdivided.

In Louisiana.—Under the special appropriation of ten thousand dollars at the last session of Congress, new surveys in various parts of the State, requiring an expenditure to the amount of eight thousand dollars, were authorized, in order to enable the surveyor general to complete the returns of some of the townships described in his annual report; so that the lands, which are represented to be very desirable, might be put into market.

The examinations of the difficulties found to exist in the surveys of the Greensburg (formerly St. Helena) district not being yet completed and reported on, no part of the appropriation could be expended in that district.

In Mississippi .- The thirty-seven townships in the Choctaw cession of 1830, referred to in the estimates of last year, as all that remained to be surveyed in that cession, were in August last ordered to be put under contract. The instructions for retracing certain old surveys in the State, for which are appropriation was also made at the last session, have been withheld until 1841, in order that more specific directions might be given as to the manner in which the surveys should be made.

In the Chickasaw cession, the surveys having been completed, the office of the principal surveyor has been closed, and the books, papers, &c. deliv-

ered to the register.

In Alabama.—No instructions were issued for new surveys in this State during the current year; the surveys, however, of the Cherokee cession, undertaken last year, have all been completed, and the plats deposited in this

These lands may be advertised for sale immediately after they shall have

been attached to a land district.

Official information of the final adjustment of the State line between Georgia and Alabama having been received by the surveyor general since my last annual report, he has, pursuant to former instructions from this office, closed thereon all the surveys formerly left unfinished near that line, and transmitted plats thereof to this office and to the district offices; and such of the lands as are attached to a district have been offered for sale.

The special report and estimate for retracing old surveys in this State, promised in the last annual report, will be found appended to the report herewith of the surveyor general; and the amount estimated by him for

that service has been made an item in the estimate of this office.

In Florida.—Instructions were issued for the expenditure of a part of the new appropriations for this district; but, as will be seen from the annual report of the surveyor general, all operations in the field have been pre-

vented by the continuation of Indian hostilities.

The following table, compiled from the reports of the surveyors general, shows the aggregate number of miles of surveying under contract not completed, or not fully paid for, in each State and Territory; the estimated cost of the surveys under such contracts; the number of miles of surveys returned to the offices of the surveyors general; the sums paid on account of the contracts; and the cash balances of the surveying funds remaining in their hands on the 30th September, 1540:

Since the 6th day of December, 1836, when the present Commissioner took charge of the office, its correspondence, notwithstanding the gradual decline of the land sales, has, for obvious reasons, been progressively increasing. During this period, more than 35,000 letters have been written and recorded in the office, covering more than 24,000 large folio pages; and more than 8,000 folio pages of exemplifications of letters, documents, &c. have been furnished. Within the same period, a large number of confirmed private land claims and reservations under Indian treaties (many of the former, of a very difficult and complex character, requiring laborious examination) have been acted on. Many special unconfirmed cases have also been examined and reported on for the action of Congress; and a considerable number of private land claims in the Greensburg, Ouachita, New Orleans, and Opelousas districts, in Louisiana, have been brought before this office, for the opinion of the Commissioner on the respective claims under the act of 6th February, 1835, " for the final adjustment of claims to lands in the State of Louisiana." All these cases have been duly reported for submission to Congress. In the examination of them, great labor was required.

A large portion of the title papers, being in the French and Spanish languages, had necessarily to be translated in order to pass upon their validity. It was rendered necessary, also, under the law, first to determine whether these cases came within the purview of the previous legislation of Congress on similar claims.

In the same time, besides the large number of pre-emption cases settled at the district land offices, more than 11,000 of such cases, which had come before this office by appeal, or on account of intrinsic difficulty, or which otherwise came within its supervisory powers, have been acted upon and finally determined.

The time and labor required in these cases can be in some degree imagined, when it is considered that they arise under various acts of Congress, differing more or less in their provisions; and that many of them were contested by conflicting claimants, and embraced voluminous evidence, frequently of a contradictory character.

Within the same period, also, more than four hundred and thirteen thousand patents have been actually transmitted, including above thirteen thousand patents for private land claims, Indian reservations, Creek orphan lands,

and sales in the Chickasaw cession.

In addition to these, there are now lying in the office, written and recorded, about sixty thousand patents awaiting official signature. In a part of this number, the dates are left blank, and are filled as they are needed for signing. A hope is entertained, however, that these will be ready for transmission during the present session of Congress. This delay has occurred through circumstances beyond the control of the Commissioner. Adding these to the number of patents transmitted, as above mentioned, and to about six thousand patents now signed for transmission, it is shown that, since the 6th of December, 1836, there have been written and recorded in this office more than four hundred and seventy-nine thousand patents.

Within this period, there have been furnished from the office one hundred and thirty eight reports, statements, statistical tables, &c., requiring

much time and care in their preparation.

During the last four years, also, indexes have been prepared of the names of patentees for upwards of one thousand folio volumes of records, embracing five hundred thousand patents, besides a complete index of all patentees for bounty lands in Illinois and Missouri, granted for military services during the late war; and a general index of the greater part of the surveys, made from the commencement, in the Virginia military district in Ohio.

Besides accomplishing these various objects, there are now twenty regular clerks less employed in this office than formerly, nineteen of whom were

dispensed with anterior to the date of my last annual report.

Under the provisions of the act approved 12th June, 1840, for the discontinuance of the office of surveyors general, &c., the discontinuance of the land offices at Marietta, Zanesville, Steubenville, Cincinnati, and Wooster, in the State of Ohio, has been directed; and the lands remaining unsold in the four first named districts made subject to entry at the land office at Chillicothe; and those remaining unsold at Wooster, subject to entry at the land office at Bucyrus. The necessary transfers of books and papers, to carry these directions into effect, have long since been ordered, and, for the most

part, accomplished.

The discontinuance of the land office at *Monroe*, in the State of Michigan, and the annexation of the unsold lands to the *Detroit* district, have also been ordered. Instructions for the transfer of the books and papers have been issued. Measures have also been taken to discontinue the land office at Indianapolis, and to annex the unsold lands to an adjoining district, should Congress not think proper, in the mean time, to make that office an exception; for which exception, strong reasons exist. Should a bill for attaching other lands to that district, which was introduced at the last session, (but which, it is understood, then failed to become a law for want of time,) be passed at an early period during the present session, it will be in season to prevent the transportation of the books, papers, &c., as some time must necessarily elapse in making preparations for that purpose at the office.

This retrenchment in the number of clerks and discontinuance of offices, including that of the surveyor general at Pontotoc, before alluded to, will

result in an annual saving of more than thirty thousand dollars.

Occasion was taken, at the close of my last annual report, to reiterate a recommendation for the erection of fire proof offices for the different surveyors general; a plan and estimates for which I had the honor to submit in a special report, (Doc. 23, H. R., 25th Congress 2d session,) and to which, as well as to the report of the committee thereon, reference is respectfully made. In consequence of the recommendation in the special report, bill No. 876 was introduced into the House of Representatives at that session; the passage of which, it is believed, was only prevented by the want of time. I cannot too strongly express my sense of the vital importance of the passage of such a law, as a measure not only of necessary safety, but of sound economy.

I would again invite attention to the propriety of repealing the ninth section of the act of May 10, 1800, entitled "An act to amend the act entitled 'An act providing for the sale of the lands of the United States in the territory northwest of the Ohio and above the mouth of Kentucky river," for

the reasons mentioned at the close of my last annual report.

I also beg leave to refer to reasons assigned in the same document, in favor of the passage of an act authorizing the appointment of examiners from the General Land Office, to visit the subordinate offices for the investigation of alleged errors and abuses, to administer oaths, and to compel the attendance of persons and the production of papers. Such a law is deemed of great importance, as leading to efficiency, promptitude, and uniformity of action throughout the various ramifications of this branch of the public service.

Reports of the Surveyors General of the public lands.

SURVEYOR GENERAL'S OFFICE, Cincinnati, October 24, 1840.

Sir: In obedience to the instruction contained in your "circular to surveyors general," of the 9th September ultimo, I present to you the usual annual report on the progress and condition of the public surveys in the strict comprising the States of Ohio, Indiana, and Michigan, for the year thich has expired since my last annual report, with the usual estimates

for the service of the ensuing year.

The whole of the lands in the State of *Indiana*, acquired by the treaties with the Miami Indians of October 23, 1834, and November 6, 1838, have been surveyed, and copies of the plats thereof transmitted to the General land Office. The copies of the same plats for the Fort Wayne district have been sent to the register some time since, and those for the Crawfords-rille and Winamac districts are prepared, and will be forwarded to the

egisters, respectively, in the course of a few days.

In the State of Michigan, since the date of my last annual report there have been surveyed, and the returns made to this office of seventy-nine lownships west, and fifty five townships east, of the principal meridian; including the lands purchased of the Saganaw band of Chippewa Indians by freaty of January 14, 1837: in all, one hundred and thirty four townships. This completes the survey of all the townships in the State south of the third forrection line, (between townships 30 and 31,) and twelve townships north of that line, and includes forty-eight townships west of the principal meridian, which were put under contract since the last annual report was made. The original plats of all these townships have been made, and copies of most of them transmitted to the general and district land offices. The copies of the remainder will be completed and transmitted early next month; and, within the present quarter, the descriptive notes of these townships, and such others as have not heretofore been sent, will be completed, and copies transmitted to your office, and to the registers of the several land offices. During the year, there have been transmitted to the General Land Office, and also to the registers of the proper land offices, copies of the plats of three hundred and forty townships in Michigan, and forty-eight townships in Indiana, as enumerated in the accompanying table, (marked No. 3.)

Within the year ending on the 30th of September ultimo, we have transcribed, for preservation at the seat of Government, the field notes of five hundred and forty-six townships, covering sixteen thousand five hundred and thirty-two pages of large foolscap paper. The transcripts of original field notes of surveys, which have been prepared in this office, will make eighty volumes of about five hundred pages each; which have been collated and arranged for the binder, and will be immediately bound, indexed, and transmitted to the General Land Office. On the 15th of January last, I entered into contract with three able and experienced deputies for surveying all the exterior township lines north of the third correction line in the southern peninsula, and so much of the upper peninsula as lies east of the line between ranges 8 and 9 west of the principal meridian. Under these contracts, all the township lines north of the third correction line in the southern peninsula have been completed, and the field-notes thereof return-

ed to this office. No return has yet been received from the surveyor in the upper peninsula. His contract is limited to the 1st of next month, and he is now daily looked for. By a communication received from him, under date of 5th of June last, I learn that he passed the straits of Mackinaw, on the line between ranges 3 and 4 west, and intersected the upper peninsula about one mile west of Point St. Ignace, and had surveyed the point between Lakes Huron and Michigan up to the line between town-

ships 42 and 43.

On the receipt of your instructions of the 6th of August last, I immediately put under contract, for subdivision, all the remaining townships in the southern peninsula, except twenty-three, situate in the interior. These surveys, by the terms of the contracts, are all returnable by the 11th of December next, and will probably be all completed by that time. In these contracts, on the west side of the peninsula, is embraced a considerable body of very good farming land. For want of the return of the township lines in the upper peninsula, I have not made any contracts for subdividing therein. And, moreover, the season has now too far advanced to commence surveys there,

and they must necessarily be deferred until next season.

By your instruction of the 6th August last, I am directed "to cause that township line of range 8, which will, as near as may be, equally divide the peninsula, to be extended west to Chocolate river, (which is the western boundary of the Ottowa and Chippewa cession of 1836,) as a standard parallel, and contract for the survey of all the exterior boundaries of townships situated between that line and Lake Superior;" but it was then too late in the season to commence a tour of surveying in that high latitude, where winter sets in early with its deep snows and severe cold weather; to encounter which, no surveying party would consent to remain out. Moreover, for want of the returns of the township lines, now in course of survey in that quarter, it could not be known with sufficient accuracy what township line extended west would divide the territory into about equal parts. The surveys above directed were, therefore, also laid over till next spring.

For our field operations during the year 1841, besides the running of the township boundary lines above referred to, I recommend the extension of the township lines throughout all that part of the peninsula lying east of Chocolate river, or the western boundary of the Ottawa and Chippewa cession of 1836. From the survey of the township lines, the character of the country will be made known; and such portions of it as may be found suitable for cultivation, or valuable for its lumber, metalliferous deposites, or other advantages, might then be subdivided. This tract is estimated to contain about one hundred and eighty townships. I recommend, also, the subdivision of all the townships in the upper peninsula situate east of the 9th range west of the meridian, the exterior boundaries of which are now being surveyed, estimated at sixty townships, and the twenty-three townships remaining in the southern peninsula. It might likewise be deemed expedient to subdivide some fifty townships in the tract lying between Lakes Michigan and Superior, and east of Chocolate river; and I suggest the propriety of authorizing the survey thereof, if, on running out the township boundaries, it should seem advisable to do so.

Should these several surveys be authorized, there will be required, to defray the expense thereof, an appropriation of thirty-four thousand six hun-

dred and fifty dollars, as follows:

In your communication of the 28th of July last, you direct that the elenditure for clerk-hire be restricted "to the smallest possible amount consistent with the public interests and the actual demands upon the office, in order that any balance left at the close of the year may be carried forward to the service of 1841, and the estimates for that year reduced by an

enal amount, should it become necessary."

Whether the proposed new surveys for the next year be authorized or not, the public interests will require that there should be at least no reducion of the clerical force of the office. So great has been the amount of the arrent business, growing out of the public surveys during the last fifteen wars, that no time could be spared to do any thing toward bringing up the mords. The original field-notes and plats of all the public surveys made in this district within that period remain yet to be recorded. And, besides his, a large portion of the original field notes of the surveys made prior thereto, as far back as the year 1799, and some as early as 1786, are yet to be recorded. A considerable portion of the field-notes of those early surveys, written originally with very inferior ink, have become so dim as to be read with difficulty; and, in a few years more, will be altogether illegi-These must, therefore, soon be recorded, or the writing will be entirely obliterated. In justice, then, to the public interests, the usual appropriation for clerk-hire in this office should be continued; which I earnestly Mcommend.

As the transcribing the field-notes of the surveys for preservation at the seat of Government has so far advanced, and is a work of such manifest thility and importance that it should now be steadily prosecuted to completion, I think it my duty, therefore, to recommend the continuance of the usual appropriation for that purpose for next year. With these views, I present the following estimate for the service of 1841:

Sir: I enclose herein a sketch of that portion of the northern peninsula of Michigan through which Mr. Burt has extended the exterior township lines, being the eastern end of the peninsula. The sketch is drawn on the same scale as the skeleton maps accompanying my last annual report, and is intended as an amendment of those maps, so far as relates to that

portion of the State embraced in the sketch.

Mr. Burt informs me that the inhabitants at the Sault Ste. Marie were surprised that Sugar island should have been withheld from survey; as there is no doubt in the minds of the people, on both sides of the strait, that the island belongs to the United States, as the rapid and shoal water on the west side of it prevents its navigation by lake craft, while on the eastern side there is a fine deep channel. It will be very desirable that the boundary question in relation to this island be fixed before the subdivisions are made in that quarter.

A diagram of Mr. Burt's township lines will be prepared, and transmitted

to you in a few days.

Sir: In compliance with the requisitions of your "circular to the surveyors general," dated September 9, 1840, calling for the usual report, maps, and tabular statements on the condition of the surveys in this district, and estimates for the service of 1841, I respectfully submit the following:

Since the last annual report of my predecessor, the surveys then in progress, embracing the Wiskonsin pineries, have been completed, the work platted, and the plats and descriptive notes transmitted to the general and

district land offices.

The exterior township lines east of Fox river, and west of Green bay, ordered for survey in your communication of the 23d of November, 1838, have been completed, amounting to 599 miles 96 chains 59 links. Two contracts have been given out for the subdivision of seven townships, and fifteen fractional townships bordering upon the navigable waters of Green bay and its tributaries; the field notes of the northern part of this district are returned to this office, but not yet platted; the field-notes of the sur-

veys in the southern part are daily expected.

The exterior township lines in the Winnebago cession of November 1, 1837, ordered for survey in your communication of the 20th of August, 1838, have been completed, with the exception of one fractional township boundary, which is now undergoing a resurvey, the returns from which are expected in two weeks; soon after their receipt, the diagram of said township lines will be forwarded to your department. A contract for the subdivision of thirteen fractional townships, bordering upon the Wiskonsin river, in said Winnebago cession, east of the 4th principal meridian, was assigned to Messrs. Sprague & Mansfield; they have made returns of their work, which has been platted, but much of it found very defective; this circumstance has compelled me to send another deputy into the field, to make corrections of about fifty miles of their work. These corrections, which are expected in two or three weeks, will, it is hoped, enable me to finish the plats of said district within a few weeks after.

The subdivision of two townships and twelve fractional townships has been assigned to Orson Lyon, situated west of the 4th principal meridian, and hordering upon the Wiskonsin and Mississippi rivers; all but one township of this district have been returned to this office, and two thirds of the same platted. A resurvey has been made of the east and west branches of the Pekatonica river, in township 1 north, range 5 east, 4th meridian;

also a survey of two islands in Fox lake, in township 13 north, range 13 east, 4th meridian; the plats of which have been transmitted to the general

and district land offices.

Two deputies have been selected to run the exterior township lines in the Sac and Fox cession of October 21, 1837, as per your communication of August 8, 1840; the necessary papers for the deputies are prepared, and they will be in the field in a few days. These contracts have been unavoidably delayed, in consequence of the severe indisposition of the clerks in my office the past summer and this fall. The township ceded by the Stockbridge Indians, situate on the east side of Winnebago lake, will be put under contract for survey in a few days. There have been transcribed, for the General Land Office, 166 townships and fractional townships in Wiskonsin, and 42 in Iowa; also 23 townships and fractional townships recorded in Wiskonsin, and 24 in Iowa.

With regard to future surveys, I would respectfully repeat the recommendation of my predecessor—the expediency of an appropriation for the survey of the "500,000-acre tract," ceded by the Menomonies to the United States for the New York Indians, making about 27 townships; also, the survey of the exterior township lines of the fractional townships bordering upon the Mississippi, as far north as the Falls of St. Anthony, with the subdivision of about 12 townships, having proper regard for those most

important and needed.

You will find herewith tabular statement, marked No. 1, showing the unexpended balance in my hands; also, tabular statement, marked No. 2, exhibiting the condition of contracts in this district; together with triplicate

skeleton maps of Wiskonsin and Iowa Territories.

The high prices demanded for the necessary supplies and support of a family in this place compel me respectfully to call your attention to the following extract from the annual report of E. S. Haines, Esq., Surveyor General, dated October 12, 1838: "The salary of the surveyor general, as fixed by the act creating his office, is, in my opinion, altogether an inadequate compensation for the labors and responsibilities of that officer, located at a point where the cost of living is equal, perhaps, to any other in the country. There seems to be no good reason why his services should receive a less compensation than that which has been invariably allowed to every other surveyor general, ever since the first organization of those offices, forty years ago; and I respectfully recommend that he be allowed the same salary."

"The sum allowed for clerk-hire in the new surveyor general's office, by the same act, will not, I am persuaded, enable that officer to perform even a moiety of the business which will devolve upon it. The new surveys which will be called for, from year to year, are not likely to be less extensive than they will be in the other districts. Besides the office duties

which will grow out of those surveys, there are now the field-notes, maps, and descriptive notes of seven hundred townships, already surveyed, to be recorded; which recording would, of itself, require the clerical force now authorized, at least three years to bring up."

With these remarks, I submit the following estimate for the year 1841: For the salary of the surveyor general, per act of the 12th of June, 1838, and a proposed increase of \$500 For clerks in his office, per act of June, 1838, with a proposed increase of \$400 2,000 For two clerks, to be compensated by the word or plat 3,000 For extra clerks, to transcribe field-notes for preservation at the seat of Government, in addition to the unexpended balance of former appropriation 1,000 Stationary, printing, binding, and postage 800 For office-rent and fuel, per act of June 12, 1838, with proposed 500 increase of \$150

Sir: In compliance with your circular of the 9th of last month, I have prepared the following report, showing the condition of the surveys in this district, the operations of the office during the year which ended with yesterday, and estimates for the service of 1841.

The statement marked A No. 1 shows the amount of funds of the several appropriations transmitted to me, and for which regular vouchers have not been taken; it shows, also, the temporary payments or advances,

and the balance against the United States.

The statement marked A No. 2 gives the amount of disbursements during the year; it shows the expenditures of each quarter, under separate heads, and distinguishes between the specific appropriations and the neces-

sary incidental expenses.

The statements marked B No. 1, B No. 2, B No. 3, and B No. 4, show what has been done under the contracts which were unfinished on the 1st of October, 1839, and also under the contracts that have been since entered into for surveying the public land, and the estimated amount that will be wanted to make complete payment for the surveys under said contracts respectively.

The statement marked C shows the amount of funds available for surveys in Illinois and Missouri, under existing appropriations, in addition

to the contracts already entered into.

The statement marked D shows the original township plats, and plats of parts of townships, which have been authenticated and placed on file in this office, with the date of authentication; the duplicates thereof authenticated and sent to the General Land Office, and the copies sent to the district land offices, with the several dates of transmission.

The statement marked E gives the proper information relating to the fractional and anomalous tracts subdivided under the act of Congress of

the 5th of April, 1832.

The statements marked F No. 1, F No. 2, F No. 3, F No. 4, F No. 5, F No. 6, F No. 7, and the synopsis thereof, marked F No. 8, give a full view (in a condensed and convenient form for use and reference) of the township plats which have been made and copied, but not authenticated, nor transmitted to the general and district land offices; of the townships of which the surveys have been returned, but not yet platted; of the townships, the survey of which has been contracted for, but is not yet returned; and of the townships which it is intended to survey with the funds now available for public surveys in Illinois and Missouri, over and above the contracts already entered into. As the means at present available for public surveys will not enable me to accomplish all that was proposed in my last annual report, I have thought it best to direct my operations so as to sectionize as many townships as practicable; and to select, for this purpose, those most needed by the inhabitants of the country, and leave the running of the township lines which are not necessary for the contemplated subdivisions until a new appropriation shall be made, as recommended in the accompanying statement G.

The statement marked G shows what appropriations for new surveys the public interest and the accommodation of the settlers require at the

approaching session of Congress.

The diagram of Illinois, in triplicate, marked H, and the diagram of Missouri, in triplicate, marked I, show, as far as practicable to exhibit in

this way, the extent and condition of the plats and surveys, and the ner surveying contracts; also, the intended surveys under existing appropriations, and those for which appropriations are recommended at the coming session of Congress.

The statement marked K gives the proper information relative to the expenditures under the appropriation for copying field-notes to be pre-

served at the seat of Government.

The copy, marked L, of a letter this day addressed to the Register of the Treasury, contains an estimate of the expenses of this office for the year 1841.

The duties which the wants and rights of the people and the interests and obligations of the Government demand and require of this office, cannot be fully performed unless the appropriations here asked for shall all be granted, as will be seen by the following explanatory observations.

The first item in this estimate is based upon the accompanying statement G. The townships there proposed for subdivision are well settled by cultivators of the soil, who wish to become the owners thereof.

The second item is asked to enable me to engage the services of competent surveyors to correct erroneous surveys, and to put the unfinished townships in proper order, particularly in the Illinois bounty tract. Numerous attempts have been made to have portions of this work done by local surveyors, recommended by the persons desirous of entering the lands. Sometimes, success has been the result; but it has often turned out that the person so recommended and appointed was altogether unfit for the service he had undertaken, causing a great drawback on the operations of this office, and vexation and continual delay to the people, who feel much anxiety about securing the titles to their homes. The work being scattered over a large extent of country, in small and detached parcels, surveyors living at a distance, and who are considered competent to the undertaking, will not engage in the business at the compensation now allowed by law; nor, indeed, will those who live in the military district consent to do more than what lies in their immediate neighborhood. I have therefore asked for authority to allow an increased compensation for this particular work.

The sum asked for in the third item will be wanted to complete the work there designated, and which is now progressing under the instructions of the General Land Office, issued in conformity with the law of the 26th of May, 1824, and other laws relating to the survey of private

confirmed claims.

The fourth, fifth, sixth, seventh, eighth, ninth, tenth, and eleventh items, are for necessary incidental expenses, and about the sums that

will be wanted for the purposes therein named.

The twelfth and thirteenth items are authorized by the laws mentioned therein. The demand for the fourteenth item is based upon a close estimate of the work to be performed, and the cost thereof, as is shown in the following statement:

The business for which the fifteenth item is asked has been in arrears for the last ten or twelve years; it would certainly be well to grant a sum that would at once bring it up to the present time. It is a serious inconvenience to the people who live in the districts remote from this office, to be unable to get the field-notes of the land they purchase from the United States at the offices where the entries are made; and this inconvenience will continue to exist, until the work under consideration is brought up under special authority, for it has swelled to a magnitude beyond the reach of the regular appropriations.

The sixteenth and seventeenth items are for services required to carry into effect the intention of the several acts of Congress, commencing on the 13th of June, 1812, and ending with the 4th of July, 1836, respecting claims to land derived from the French and Spanish Governments. If these appropriations be deuied, the inevitable consequence must, of necessity, be further delay; which has already proved ruinous to some,

and oppressive to many.

The eighteenth and last item is about the sum that can properly be

expended in the service there designated.

The statement marked M shows the estimated cost of draughting the township plats, and writing the certificates thereto, during the 4th quarter of 1840 and the year 1841.

The statement marked N shows the prices which I have fixed for constructing and copying township plats, and for writing the certificates

thereto.

And the statement marked O shows the estimated quantity of public land in the townships which have been recently surveyed in this district, of which the plats have not been sent to the general and district land

offices; also, the quantity in the townships intended to be surveyed under existing appropriations, and under the appropriation asked for at the approaching session of Congress. I think you may very safely expect that as great a quantity of the land in the townships here referred to will be disposed of at the public sales, and immediately thereafter, as was ever sold in any equal continuous number that have been brought into marke in this district.

The correspondence and reports of the office during the year amount to 460 letters, reports, and statements, of sufficient consequence to have

required a record to be made thereof, occupying 379 folio pages.

All proper exertion has been made to forward the surveying and platting of the claims confirmed by the act of Congress of the 4th July, 1836. I will commence at an early day to send on the plats of the tracts which have been surveyed, and will continue to use due diligence in having the rest of the claims surveyed and platted. The survey of the town and village lots, out-lots, and common field-lots of the towns in Missouri, has received all the attention that could be given thereto; and the plats and descriptions of the survey of the Peoria lots in Illinois have been made out, recorded, and copied. The copies will be sent on to the General Land Office so soon as they can be examined.

The above copies of field-notes are comprised in 52 volumes: of which 30, numbered from 4 to 33, are all Illinois surveys; and 22 volumes, numbered from 95 to 116, are of Missouri surveys.

Of the above 30 volumes of copies of Illinois field-notes, 21 were sent to the General Land Office on the 26th of June and 8th of August, 1840; the other 9 have been compared with the originals, but they have not yet been indexed and registered: this will be done at an early day, and they will then be forwarded to the General Land Office.

And of the 22 volumes of copies of Missouri field-notes, 11 were sent to Washington on the 29th of April and 26th of June, 1840; 5 others have been examined, indexed, registered, and put up for transmission; and the remaining 6 have been compared with the originals, but not indexed or registered: as soon as this can be done, they will be sent on to the General Land Office.

Three volumes of copies of field-notes in Illinois, numbered 1 to 3, and 61 volumes of copies of Missouri field-notes, numbered 34 to 94, made before the 30th day of September, 1839, were sent to the General Land Office on the 11th of December of that year.

Of the appropriation for copying field notes to be preserved at the seat of Government, there remains \$960 50 unexpended; of this sum, about \$30 will be required to complete the indexing, registering, and packing up of the notes already copied, but not sent on to the General Land Office.

1 Plain township:

For constructing the plat, and calculating and subdividing the anomalous quarter-sections, seven dollars; for making a copy of the plat, three dollars.

2. A full township, with a navigable stream running through it:

For constructing the plat, and calculating and subdividing the anomalous quarter sections, exclusive of the additional charge on account of the meanders of the navigable stream, seven dollars.

For taking out from the traverse tables the latitude and departure of the courses of the meanders of the navigable stream, one cent and a half

per course.

For protracting the courses of meanders of the navigable stream, one

cent and a half per course.

For calculating and subdividing the areas of the fractional sections, three cents per course of the meanders, and half a cent for each subdivisional area of the fractional sections.

For making a copy of the plat, three dollars; and an allowance of one cent for each subdivisional area of the fractional sections.

3. A full township, with surveys of private claims therein:

For constructing the original plat, the same price as fixed for original plats in numbers 1 and 2 of this statement; and an additional allowance of fifty cents for each survey of a private claim.

For making a copy of the plat, the same prices fixed in numbers 1 and 2; and an allowance of eighteen and three-quarters cents for each sur-

vey of a private claim.

4. Fractional townships and parts of a full township:

SIR: In anticipation of the customary notification from your office, the accompanying statements have been prepared, with the following report of the condition of the surveys in this State, to be embraced in your annual

report of the present year.

The operations in the field, during the current year, were chiefly confined to sections of country where the execution of the work is found difficult and hazardous, and where surveying can be done only in certain seasons, which, together with the sickliness of the past, has retarded the completion of the unfinished surveys some time on hand; all of which, however, except in one or two instances, will, I have reason to expect, be speedily brought to a close. With respect to the new surveys, designated on the diagram, as recommended to me for survey last year, and for the survey of which appropriation has been made, I have made the necessary inquiry (agreeably to instructions in your letter of the 12th of August last) for the selection of those townships proper for immediate survey, of the 86 shaded brown on the diagram, and find there is not much more than a moiety of it desirable for settlement and sale; the residue is reported to be mostly refuse lands, the survey of which may be suspended, and others substituted in their stead. Application has recently been made for the subdivision of a number of townships in different parts of the State, the substitution of which for the others would obviously be a desirable accommodation; and I expect many similar applications on the meeting of the General Assembly now to convene.

Under the new arrangement, limiting the contract term to three months, (which I have no doubt will prove to be a salutary change in the mode of operations,) I have sent out three efficient deputies, one of whom has taken a contract to survey exteriors south of Red river, with instructions to report the townships, in regard to quality of soil and population, the most desirable for immediate subdivision. The survey of the ten townships ordered there, will, I allow, be completed during the winter.

Diagram marked A, and statements marked Nos. 1 and 2, exhibit the con-

dition and advancement of the unfinished contracts for surveying.

Statement No. 3 exhibits those contracts which have been completed and fully paid for since the report of 30th September, 1839, and for which proper vouchers have been taken.

Diagram A, in addition to the above, shows the proposed new surveys, as ordered and indicated on the diagram received; as also the progress made in the copying of field notes for transmission to the General Land Office.

Statement No. 4 enumerates the plats of townships which have been furnished the general and district land offices since the report of the 30th of September, 1839; and also the plats due those offices, of townships returned to this office and paid for.

The following is a copy of the estimates for this office for the year 1841, sent to the Register of the United States Treasury 30th September, 1840, as

requested in his letter of the 3d September instant, to wit:

Should the department deem it expedient to order the survey of those townships of the former estimate which are withheld for the present, or others in lieu thereof, which may hereafter be proposed for survey, the first item in the foregoing estimate is about the amount that would be required to meet that expense; for the existing appropriation will scarcely be more than sufficient to cover the expense of surveying that which is authorized to be put under contract by your instructions of the 12th of August, 1840, and that which is already under contract. The item for copying field-notes is about the amount required to employ an expert clerk for a year. The other items in the estimates are the amounts that may be required for the purposes therein specified.

Statement No. 5 is an account current, exhibiting the sums received and disbursements made by me since the 8th October, 1839, and the actual bal-

ance remaining in my hands at this time.

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Surveyor General's Office, Donaldsonville, November 20, 1840.

Sir: An explanation is due for the protracted delay of this report and my estimates for the expenses of this office for the year 1841. Almost all of the original surveying having been completed, the most important of the immediate duties of this office related to the correction of the work referred to in my last annual report, and such as has been since ascertained to be incorrect or incomplete. The examination of this, with a view to a definite estimate, has occupied nearly all my time since my arrival at home. In the St. Helena district 114 townships have been reprotracted; and the aggregate number of miles of surveying necessary to the correction of the field-work therein is 1,442 miles.

In the southwestern district 40 townships have been reprotracted, requir-

ing about 1,000 miles of surveys.

In the southeastern district about 200 miles of resurveying has been ascertained, by the reprotraction of the old work, to be necessary to a correct and complete return of the old work; about 100 miles in the district north of Red river; and 50 miles in the northwestern district: making an aggregate of 2,792 miles for the whole State.

The tediousness of this examination of the old work has very much interfered with the current duties of the office; but I have the satisfaction to report the following, which have been completed since my last annual re-

port, to wit:

Copies of notes of 468 townships.

Protraction of maps and separate plats of 28 townships.

Subdivision of 11 townships.

Calculation of areas of 82 townships.

Descriptive notes of 20 townships, for the General Land Office.

Descriptive notes of 37 townships for the several registers' offices.

Copies of 49 township maps, for the General Land Office.

Copies of 6 township maps, for the registers' offices. Sketches of 42 township maps for the registers' offices.

42 townships and fractional townships, and 55 private claims, have been

surveyed, and the field notes returned to this office.

58 townships and fractional townships are under contract, most of which would have been completed last spring, but for the early and unexpected high water; 26 of these townships are at augmented prices, and the aggregate expense will probably be about \$22,000. This work, which embraces some valuable lands, being now far advanced, (and, in fact, part of the notes already in the office,) will, I hope, be completed in the course of a month, or two at farthest.

I think the balance on hand, and the amount available and undrawn of former appropriations, will be quite sufficient for all the surveying, at regular prices, remaining to be executed in this State; but, from the amount of corrections shown above, and the difficult and detached work still necessary to be done, it is believed that at least \$15,000 more will be required, at a rate not exceeding \$8 per mile; and I have estimated accordingly, hoping that it may be practicable to complete the whole in the course of the next year, in accordance with the interest of the Government and the wishes

of the owners of private claims, whose titles, for the want of established boundaries and patents, are daily becoming more and more unsettled and

embarrassing.

Up to this time, there have been 791 township field-notes copied for the General Land Office, and upwards of 500 remain to be copied when all the field-work is finished; which, judging from the expense of what has been done, will require, in addition to the balance available for that object, about \$4,000. When it is remembered that the examination and calculation of almost every private claim and fractional section involve more labor and require more skill than an entire township of square work, and that there is so large an amount of both in this State, it is much to be regretted that the regular compensation for clerks and draughtsmen has not been fixed at a higher sum, so as to enable us to bring the lands more promptly into market after the surveys are executed, and avoid the necessity of repeated calls for extra clerk-hire. On account of the character of the work now in progress, and to be executed, such assistance is deemed indispensable at this time.

From divers causes, the balance of \$1,221 78, available under the act of 3d March, 1837, for completing copies of confirmation and orders of survey, from the registers' offices, has not been expended; but as this must be attended to hereafter, it is hoped, if the amount should be carried to the general fund, that it may be reappropriated. I have thought the Government could not intentionally impose the expense of an office, suitable for the preservation of the most valuable records and the accommodation of from four to eight clerks, on the superintending officers; and, accordingly, have added to my estimate an item for office-rent, fuel, and labor.

With these remarks, I beg leave to refer you to the enclosed copy of my estimates for the year 1841, (marked No. 1;) the general statement of disbursements, (marked No. 2;) the tabular statement of contracts, (marked

No. 3;) and triplicate diagrams of the several land districts.

Sir: In compliance with your request of the 9th ultimo, I herewith transmit to you my report, with triplicate diagrams, showing the amount of surveying yet to be executed in this surveying district; also the amount of field-notes yet remaining in this office to be transcribed for transmission to the General Land Office, and the amount of field-notes yet remaining to be recorded in this office, &c.

CHOCTAW CESSION OF 1830.

Although the whole of the lands in this district remaining to be surveyed at the time of my last annual report were contracted for, yet, owing to the difficulties in prosecuting a survey in this region of country, the compensation heretofore allowed would not justify the expense and privations incurred in the execution of the surveys; and the contracts for the surveying of a large portion of the country have, therefore, been relinguished. Returns of the surveys of a small portion of country have been received, but, owing to some defects in the surveys, they were not approved. Instructions for the correction of errors in those surveys were given, and returns of the corrected surveys are expected in a short time. The surveys of 14 townships in this district yet remain to be contracted for: and it is believed that the surveys which were contracted for prior to the last appropriations by Congress for surveying in this district, will not be prosecuted, and that the contracts will be relinquished. Those contracts were let at the rate of \$5 per mile, with a condition, that if Congress should augment the compensation, the contractors should have the benefit of it, subject to the approbation of the General Land Office; but as it has been signified to this office, by your communication of the 21st of November, 1839, that no approval will be given in that respect, these contracts will, in all probability, be relinquished, and have to be recontracted for.

Since my last annual report, the notes of 129 townships have been recorded, and there now remain only the unsurveyed townships in this district, 37 in number, to be recorded and transcribed. None of the maps in this district have been recorded which remained to be recorded at the time of my last annual report; and, consequently, the number then reported,

of about 50 maps, yet remain to be recorded.

CHOCTAW DISTRICT.

In this district one fractional township remains to be surveyed; the contract for the surveying of which, that existed at the time of my last annual report, has been relinquished. Of the notes of the 11 townships that remained to be transcribed at the time of my last annual report, one township has been transcribed; leaving yet 10 townships in this district, the field-notes of which remain to be transcribed for transmission to the General Land Office.

Of the notes of 53 townships which remained to be recorded at the time of my last report, the notes of 15 townships have been recorded; leaving yet the notes of 38 townships in this district to be recorded. The maps of 11 townships have been recorded, and the maps of 91 townships have been re-recorded, (the old records being very much mutilated;) still leaving the maps of 41 townships to be recorded in this district.

DISTRICT WEST OF PEARL RIVER.

In this district partial notes of 8 townships have been found since my last annual report; leaving yet 17 townships, the notes of which are not on file, nor on record, in this office, and amounting to about 1,100 miles of interior sectional lines, and about 400 miles of exterior boundaries. The field-notes of 68 townships have been transcribed; leaving yet the notes of 31 townships to be transcribed for transmission to the General Land Office; and the notes of 135 townships, and maps of 111 townships, which remain to be recorded in this office.

DISTRICT EAST OF PEARL RIVER.

In this district 30 townships yet remain to be resurveyed, amounting to 1800 miles of interior sectional lines, and about 400 miles of exterior bundaries.

Since my last annual report, the notes of 49 townships have been transcribed, leaving yet the notes of 36 townships to be transcribed for transhission to the General Land Office.

The notes of 210 townships yet remain to be recorded in this office. The naps of 72 townships have been recorded in this district since my last port.

DISTRICT EAST OF THE TOMBIGBEE RIVER.

Since my last annual report, there have been transcribed in this district the field-notes of 5 townships, and the field-notes of 23 townships recorded; leaving yet 28 townships, the field-notes of which remain to be transcribed, and the notes of 10 townships to be recorded.

None of the maps in this district have been recorded.

^{*} The discrepancy which appears between the estimate for work yet to be done in this office, and the amount unexpended, remaining in the Treasury for that object, is owing to a misconstruction, it is presumed, of our report of last year, in making appropriations from said report. There being, at that time, 1,500 miles of resurveying interior sectional lines, at \$6 per mile, amounting to \$9,000; and it appearing, in the printed report sent to us, to have been carried out \$800 only, and that sum only appropriated; also, 400 miles of exterior boundaries, at \$8 per mile, amounting to \$3,200; and it appearing in the printed report sent to us, to have been carried out \$2,400, and that sum only appropriated.

Note at the General Land Office.—The printed report above referred to corresponds with the original on file. An error of \$9,000 in the calculation and extensions of the items in the surveyor general's original estimate, was not discovered until too late to remedy it by making a

corresponding change in the estimate submitted from this office.

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The transcribing of field-notes for this office, of the surveys now executed, would have been completed before this time, but for an order for the suspension of that work; but as that order was revoked by your communication of November 7th, 1840, the work will be resumed, and completed in a short time.

It is believed that all the recording and transcribing for this office, of the

executed surveys, can be completed by the 1st of July next.

A portion of the surveys now under contract will probably be returned

during the ensuing winter.

The compensation for surveying the unsurveyed public lands having been increased by Congress, it is believed the remaining contracts can be let and completed in 18 months from this time.

From the foregoing statement, it will be seen that the principal business

in this office will soon be brought to a close.

It is respectfully suggested that, after the 1st day of July next, one offiter, with two regular clerks, could easily transact the duties of surveyor general, and those also of register and receiver of public lands for the Mount Salus land district.

SIR: I have to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 9th of September last, calling for the annual report of the operations of this surveying department during the last year, and the estimates for the year 1841.

In obedience to your requisition, I have to report that, since the last annual report from this office, all the public lands embraced within the Cherokee cession have been surveyed and returned to this office; the surveys thereof examined and approved; and the township plats made out and sent to the General Land Office.

The field-notes have also been copied, and are ready for transmission to

the General Land Office.

The plats of that cession are also ready to be forwarded to the register

of the land office, whenever established.

There are some five or six islands in the Tennessee river, embraced within the Cherokee cession, which will be surveyed, and returns made, in due season. The above done, the surveys of all the public lands within the limits of the State, north of the 31st degree of latitude, will have been completed.

The surveys of the private claims, north and south of the 31st degree, have not progressed with that efficiency I could have desired, during the last season. The causes which tend to retard that work are numerous and various. The difficulty of the work, and the swampy and overflown condition of a great portion of the country adjacent to the waters of the Mobile, Alabama, and Tombigbee rivers, in which those claims lie, make the survey and location of those claims a difficult job. I have also found it almost impossible to procure surveyors who will undertake under the above disadvantages.

There are, also, many conflicting claims which have been surveyed and

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re-surveyed; and, as I am informed, dissatisfaction still exists as to the manner in which some of the locations have been made. I would therefore most respectfully suggest that the existing laws may be so modified as to give to the surveyor general the discretionary power of making the locations from the best data to be procured; and, when made, to remain final and permanent, so far as the Government is concerned. In this way, only, can the locations and surveys of those claims ever be brought to a close.

I beg leave to call your attention to my report, and the map which accompanied it, of the 25th of January last, on the subject of the missing field-notes, and to request that it may be made to accompany this report. In view of the action of Congress upon the matters therein submitted, I

shall submit the following as the estimates for the year 1841:

SIR: I herewith transmit a diagram of the State of Alabama, in triplicate, axhibiting the true situation of the records of the public surveys in this district on the 1st day of January instant, carefully compiled from the records and files of this office.

The diagram represents, at one view, every township of which there are on file, in the General Land Office and this office, copies of the original field-notes of survey; also, every township of which there are no field-notes of survey on file, either in the General Land Office or this office, having been consumed by fire in December, 1827.

From an examination of the map, you will perceive that the original field-notes of old Madison county are also missing. It is not known if they are on file in the General Land Office; but I am induced to believe copies of the original field-notes were deposited in the register's office at Hunts-

ville; if so, copies can be obtained.

You will also observe that the records now missing are, mostly, of those townships surveyed under the superintendence of Major Thomas Freeman, surveyor general south of Tennessee, whose practice was to make out

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and transmit to the General Land Office, and register's office, descriptive notes-merely giving the outlines of the surveys. Those descriptive notes do not furnish the lengths of the sectional or township lines; the distances on said lines to the different water-courses; their width, depth, or general bearings; nor, indeed, any information which will serve hereafter to define and establish the original "land-marks" and "butts and bounds" of the surveys: hence the absolute necessity of having all those lines retraced, and records made of the original "land-marks." The labor of re-surveying and tracing old surveys is more tedious and slow than in making new surveys; but, as the times are hard, and many seeking employment, I can procure a sufficient number of "skilful and experienced surveyors," who will be willing to undertake for the present compensation allowed by law. the Cherokee cession will have to be prepared for the General Land Office, and the register's office, before the expiration of the pre-emption law in June next, the present regular force, and two additional clerks, will be kept employed up to that time. I shall, therefore, only ask an appropriation, for the present year, to pay for retracing the lines of fifty townships—say 3,600 miles, at \$4 per mile=\$14,400; which will be as much as can be prepared, returned to the General Land Office, and recorded in this office, during the present year.

Sir: I have the honor to make my annual report, which has been delayed for the reason contained in my short letter of the 13th instant.

Herewith you will receive triplicate manuscript maps, differing from those of last year, by having laid down the survey of "Forbes's Purchase," including the fortress of St. Mark's and dependencies, which will have to be cut off by actual survey therefrom, when the Supreme Court shall finally determine the appeal now pending before it, and determine the limits of the property of the United States at that point; when the residue of that claim will be forthwith reported to your office.

The amount of public funds subject to my control, in deposite at the branch of the Bank of Alabama at Mobile, is exhibited in document A. Owing to the disturbed state of the country, from Indian depredations I have not considered myself justified, as well in point of humanity as official duty, to make any contracts for the completion of the small amount of surveys authorized by you, even were deputy surveyors willing to contract, unless I could be furnished with an armed force for their protection. Document B, therefore, is blank in this particular.
