II.—OFFICERS CREATED, AND THE SALARIES THEREOF.

By the act to raise, for a limited time, an additional military force, and for other purposes.

For one regiment of dragoons and nine regiments of infantry the same number and rank of commissioned and non-commissioned officers, &c., as are provided for the same number of regiments under existing laws; to receive the same pay, rations, and emoluments, according to their respective grades.

One additional major added to each regiment.

A regimental quartermaster to be appointed to each regiment of dragoons, artillery, infantry, and riflemen, to be allowed ten dollars per month, and forage for two horses.

One surgeon and two assistant surgeons authorized for each of the ten new regiments.

A chaplain authorized for each brigade of the regular army and volunteer force, to receive per annum \$750, one ration, and forage for one horse.

Two additional surgeons and twelve additional assistant surgeons authorized for the regular army; to receive the pay and emoluments of officers of the same grades, respectively.

Four quartermasters with the rank of major, and ten additional quartermasters with the rank of captain, also authorized to be appointed; their pay and emoluments not specified.

By the act to establish a court at Key West, in the State of Florida, and for other purposes.

One district judge, to receive an annual salary of two thousand dollars.

One clerk, to receive the fees allowed the clerk for the Louisiana district.

One district attorney, to receive the "stated fees," and two hundred dollars per annum.

One marshal, to be entitled to the fees allowed to marshals in the district of Louisiana, and two hundred dollars in addition, annually.

By the act for the increase of the marine corps of the United States.

Four additional captains.

Four first lieutenants.

Four second lieutenants, &c., &c.

By the act to establish a land office in the northern part of Michigan, and to provide for the sale of mineral lands in Michigan.

One register and one receiver authorized to be appointed, who shall receive the compensation provided for in other districts.

By the act to create an additional land district in the Territory of Wisconsin, and for other purposes.

One register and one receiver authorized to be appointed, who shall receive the compensation allowed to other registers and receivers.

By the act to establish a port of entry at Saluria, in the State of Texas, and for other purposes.

A deputy collector at Aransas, to receive fees.

A deputy collector for the port of Sabine, at a salary of \$1,000 per annum.

The collector for the district of Texas to receive a salary, including fees, not exceeding \$1,750 per annum.

By the act creating a collection district in Maine, and constituting Bangor, in said district, a port of entry and delivery.

One collector, and "such other officers" as are "provided for by law," authorized to be appointed for the district of Bangor; "and the compensation of the said collector shall be such fees and commissions as he by law may be entitled to."

By the act making provision for an additional number of general officers, and for other purposes.

Two additional major generals.

Three additional brigadier generals.

One assistant adjutant general, with the rank, pay, and emoluments of a lieutenant colonel of cavalry.

III.—THE OFFICES THE SALARIES OF WHICH HAVE BEEN INCREASED, WITH THE AMOUNT OF SUCH INCREASE, DURING THE SECOND SESSION OF THE 29TH CONGRESS.

By the act making compensation for revolutionary and other pensions of the United States for the year ending the 30th June, 1848.

Equitable commissions on disbursements, to be allowed to pension agents, not to exceed two per centum on moneys disbursed; and in no case to exceed \$1,000 per annum.

By the act making appropriations for the service of the Post Office Department for the year ending June 30, 1848.

The assistant messenger of the Post Office Department to receive, in lieu of his former compensation, an annual salary of \$450.

By the act to amend an act entitled "An act to provide for the better organization of the department of Indian affairs," and an act entitled "An act to regulate trade and intercourse with the Indian tribes, and to preserve peace on the frontiers," approved June 30, 1834, and for other purposes.

The salary of the chief clerk in the office of Indian affairs increased \$100 per annum; and another clerkship of \$1,000 per annum, in the same office, increased \$200 per annum.

By the act making appropriations for the civil and diplomatic expenses of government for the year ending 30th June, 1848.

The salary of the chief clerk in the office of the Solicitor of the Treasury increased to \$1,600 per annum.

The salaries of the five district judges of Missouri, Arkansas, Louisiana, Mississippi, and Alabama, increased \$200 each.

The salary of the clerk in the office of the Attorney General increased \$600 per annum.

The salary of the surveyor general of Wisconsin increased \$500 per annum, for one year.

The salary of the surveyor general of Arkansas increased \$500 (for one year) per annum.

The salaries of the treasurers of the mint at Philadelphia, and the branch mint at New Orleans, increased from 6th August, 1846, to 30th June, 1847, \$902 17.
