IN FAVOR OF

Making only such treaties with Indian tribes within that State, for sale of their lands, as will remove from the State such Indians, and secure to the State the right to tax such lands immediately after such sales.

FEBRUARY 26, 1864.—Referred to the Committee on Indian Affairs and ordered to be printed.

SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION No. 17, in relation to treaties with Indian tribes.

Resolved by the senate, the house concurring therein, That the President and Senate of the United States be respectfully requested to make only such treaties with Indian tribes within this State, for sale of their lands, as will remove from the State such Indians, and secure to the State the right to tax such lands immediately after such sales; and that the secretary of state be, and is hereby, instructed, immediately upon the passage of this resolution, to forward a certified copy thereof to the President of the United States, and one to each of our senators in Congress.

Adopted by the senate on the 13th day of February, A. D. 1864.
