

RESOLUTION
OF
THE LEGISLATURE OF KANSAS,

ASKING

The adjustment and settlement of certain claims arising from Indian depredations.

MARCH 15, 1876.—Referred to the Committee on Indian Affairs and ordered to be printed.

Whereas, by an act of the legislature, approved March 3, 1870, and a subsequent act, approved February 28, 1872, relating to certain Indian depredations during the years from 1860 to 1870, a commissioner was appointed to audit the claims of certain individuals suffering by Indian depredations during those years; and whereas, by a concurrent resolution of the house and senate in 1872, said claims were forwarded to the Secretary of the Interior by the auditor of state; and whereas said claims have never been adjusted or any part thereof paid: Therefore,

Be it resolved by the house of representatives, (the senate concurring therein,) That our members of Congress are hereby requested to procure such legislation as will direct the Secretary of the Interior to adjust and settle these claims; and

Resolved, That the secretary of state be requested to forward a copy of these resolutions to our Senators and Representatives in Congress.
