Mr. TURPIE, from the Committee on Pensions, submitted the following

REPORT:

[To accompany H. R. 10483.]

The Committee on Pensions, to whom was referred the bill (H. R. 10483) granting a pension to Marcellus A. Stovall, have examined the same and report:

From the facts stated in the House report, which is hereby approved, attached, and made a part of this report, we believe this to be a meritorious bill, and do therefore recommend its passage.

The Committee on Pensions, to whom was referred the bill (H. R. 10483) granting a pension to Marcellus A. Stovall, have considered the same and respectfully report as follows:

The claimant was a private in Capt. F. M. Robertsen's company of Georgia volunteers, and served from January 23, 1836, to May 5, 1838, in the Florida Indian war. This service is a matter of record in the office of the Second Auditor of the Treasury.

It is reliably shown that the claimant is now about 74 years old and in needy circumstances.

The passage of the bill is recommended with an amendment to show the claimant's post-office address, *i. e.* Augusta, Ga., and to fix the rate of pension at \$12 per month.
