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Mr. FAULKNER, from the Committee on Pensions, submitted the following

REPORT:

[To accompany H. R. 11926.]

The Committee on Pensions to whom was referred the bill (H. R. 11926) granting a pension to Ira A. Stout, have examined the same and report:

Your committee adopt the report submitted by the Committee on Pensions of the House of Representatives, and recommend the passage of the bill.

The House report is as follows:

The claimant was a corporal in Capt. James P. Grundy's company of Col. William P. Tronsdale's Second Regiment Tennessee Volunteers, and served from June 7, 1836, to January 14, 1837, in the Florida Indian war. Previous to the above term of enlistment he served some time with troops raised for the purpose of protecting the southwestern frontier against Indian depredations, and he also served in the Commissary Department during the war with Mexico.

The testimony submitted to the committee shows that the claimant is 74 years old, and, by reason of his age, varicose veins of a leg, impaired sight and hearing, is unable to do any work by which to support himself, and he possesses no property of any kind, but is dependent upon his friends for the necessities of life.

The passage of the bill is recommended.

Amend by striking out the word "twenty" in line 8, and inserting in lieu thereof the word "twelve."
