REPORT:

The Committee on Pensions, to whom was referred the bill granting a pension to Elizabeth Mounts, have examined the same and report: From the facts stated in House report, and hereby approved and made a part of this report, we believe this to be a meritorious measure, and do recommend the passage of the bill.

HOUSE REPORT:

The Committee on Pensions, to whom was referred the bill (H. R. 13471) granting a pension to Elizabeth Mounts, have considered the same and report as follows:

The claimant's late husband, Joseph Mounts, deceased, was a member of Capt. C.
S. Madding's company of Illinois Volunteers, and served from June 19, 1832, to August 15, 1832, in the Black Hawk War.

It is reliably shown that Mrs. Mounts is a worthy woman, and poor and needy.

She resides at Buffalo, Scott County, Iowa.

There are many precedents for the proposed legislation, and your committee therefore return the bill recommending its passage.
