Mr. DAVIS, from the Committee on Pensions, submitted the following

**REPORT:**

[To accompany H. R. 6509.]

The Committee on Pensions have considered the bill (H. R. 6509) granting a pension to Herman Heinze and submit the following report:

The petitioner was a member of the Minnesota militia and was wounded in the left shoulder, August 23, 1862, in an engagement with the Sioux Indians at New Ulm, Minn., as fully appears from the evidence.

The adjutant-general of Minnesota certifies that Herman Heinze enlisted as a private in Company No. 1, Le Seuer Tigers, Minnesota Militia, commanded by Capt. William Dellaughter, on August 12, 1862, and was discharged August 27, 1862, and was in the battle of New Ulm, August 23, 1862. The fact that he was wounded by the enemy in the battle is shown by the testimony of William Dellaughter, who was captain of the company; John F. Meagher, who was first lieutenant of the company; Dr. W. R. McMahon, who treated him in the hospital for the wound, which was a fracture of the left acromion process; Dr. A. W. Daniels, who was in charge of the hospital, and of John Klein and Anton Phillips, comrades, who had personal knowledge of the wound being received.

The committee recommend the passage of the bill.
