Mr. TURPIE, from the Committee on Pensions, submitted the following

REPORT:

[To accompany H. R. 12550.]

The Committee on Pensions, to whom was referred the bill granting a pension to Robert Moore, have examined the same and report:

From the facts stated in House report, which is approved, and is hereto attached and made a part of this report, we believe this to be a meritorious bill, and do therefore recommend its passage.

HOUSE REPORT.

The Committee on Pensions, to whom was referred the bill (H. R. 12550) granting a pension to Robert Moore, submit the following report:

The claimant served under the name of Abraham Moore in Capt. Alexander White's company, of Illinois, in the Black Hawk war of 1832, and was paid for 21 days of mounted service. His identity is fully established in his bounty-land papers on file at the Pension Bureau.

It is shown by the sworn testimony of A. T. Nelson, M. D., and 14 other citizens of Kirkwood, Ill., that the claimant is 75 years old, and that he and his aged wife are both in feeble health; also that their pecuniary circumstances are such that they need assistance.

The bill seems to be a meritorious one and its passage is respectfully recommended. Amend by striking out the word "twenty," in line 7, and inserting in lieu thereof the word "twelve."
