World Attention Focused on Nigerian Woman's Sentence

A 31-year-old Muslim woman has been sentenced to death by stoning by a northern Nigerian Islamic court after allegedly confessing to having had a child outside of marriage. Adultery is punishable by death according to newly introduced Islamic laws in Nigeria. The decision has attracted worldwide attention and outrage and even sparked a boycott by some participants in the Miss World pageant set to begin December 7th in Nigeria. (The pageant organizers announced this week they are moving the contest to London in the wake of raging violence in the city where the contest was to be held.) Religious tensions have been raised in Nigeria by three years of flickering sectarian violence since the end of military rule. More than 100 people have been killed and at least 500 seriously injured in clashes in the northern city of Kaduna. The Nigerian Government, desperate to play down the controversy surrounding the woman's sentence, has given assurances that it would intervene to save her once the legal process has been exhausted. Saint Sybil Presents: Guest Feminists, Part III

Saint Sybil continues to offer her space to gentle souls seeking to define feminism. This month's column is by Peggy Johnson.

I'm having a really hard time defining feminist. The political definition is useful to a point but does not take us far enough if we are willing to go further.

On a psychological level and a deep-in-the-gut, permeate the soul level, my understanding of feminism has come full circle. It is as Jill Johnston and all those early lesbian feminist writers put it in the seventies and from whose books I honed my heart, my philosophy and my starving intellect. Putting the political model aside for sake of deeper understanding (and also using dictionary spellings), a feminist is a woman-identified-woman who is on the side of women, rooting for women, not against women, no brick walls, no holds barred, no psychological barriers to what is really inside, cut to the chase, what does the woman think, feel, believe about her hopes and dreams and abilities. A feminist strives to bring her true abilities into action in the world by being the real whoever she is based on what her particular body and mind and soul contains inherently, uncovered from any subterfuge laid on top of the true nature or hidden behind to discount the inherent ability. Example: If I have the strength to pick up the heavy bag of sand, I will pick it up. If I have the ability to think through the problem, I will think it through. If I want to have a baby, I will have a baby. If I don't want to have a baby, I won't have a baby. I could increase the list ad infinitum.

I agree with the definitions of feminist spotlighted so far. Equal pay for equal work. Striving toward an egalitarian alternative to patriarchy. The personal is, indeed, political. In my world, the political is also very personal. My political explorations have grown from my love of women and not vice versa.

Here's my definition in less than 25 words: Feminist: a woman-identified-woman who explores her own will, her own life, her own body to become the being she truly is.

Book Review: Our Fundamentalist Future?

Half Nation Under God: A Novel, by Cora Corbett, Eru Books, 2002.

If you like suspense thrillers and you are concerned about women's rights and the separation of church and state, you will love this book. The setting is sometime in the future. The religious right has succeeded in bringing about religious rule in many states and is working toward ratifying a change in the constitution to make the United States a religious Nation.

The story takes place mostly in Arizona, a religious state. Sharon Clark is a reporter for a medium-size newspaper wanting to break the big story. She is assigned to investigate what life is like under religious rule in Arizona and to write an expose in time to prevent Southern California from voting in upcoming elections to become a religious state. During this assignment, Sharon discovers human rights violations, including imprisonment, torture, corruption and murder. The fundamentalists will stop at nothing to advance their agenda. So does Sharon make it back to Southern California in time to save the state? Read the book - available in the Herland lending library.

OBUPride Challenges School Policy

This fall, as Oklahoma Baptist University (OBU) was being ranked as the state's top comprehensive college by U.S. News & World Report, twelve OBU alumni were gathered at a nearby restaurant to charter an organization whose mission would challenge the school's long-standing policy against gay, lesbian, bisexual, and transgender students and their allies (GLBTA).

The group calls itself OBUPride, and its mission is "to provide compassion, understanding, advocacy and support to GLBTA who have been associated with Oklahoma Baptist University." OBUPride's main goals are to provide a safe community and connection for anyone who has been associated with OBU, either as an alumnus, employee or current student. The organization also provides support to GLBTA who have been adversely affected by the

influence of religious teachings and policies; provides truthful information and educational resources to GLBTA; provides a voice for the full inclusion and acceptance of GLBTA; works towards ending discriminatory, anti-GLBT policies; and protects the anonymity of persons involved with OBUPride who are not yet comfortable with being out.

A formal letter was sent to OBU informing the university of OBUPride's mission and goals, and expressing the hope that the university's policy makers would accept OBUPride as a positive development, allowing OBU's gay, lesbian, bisexual, and transgender alumni, employees, and current students to fully participate in the life of the University. OBU officials responded that the school's policy is based upon biblical teachings and will not be changed. The OBU Board of Trustees adopted an anti-gay policy in March 1985 that calls for mandatory counseling of professed or practicing homosexual students to deal with homosexuality as an inappropriate behavior or lifestyle. Failure to comply with the policy or subsequent violations would result in expulsion from the university.

Publicity following an October 9th television interview of OBUPride charter member, Karen Weldin, has caused a stir on campus, and across the state, as well. The group's website,

www.obupride.org, received over 2,000 hits within a week of the interview, and the controversy ignited Baptist ministers across the state to condemn its existence from their pulpits. In a recent article for The Baptist Messenger, a weekly newspaper that reaches Baptist homes across the state, the executive director for the Oklahoma Baptist General Convention wrote: "There is no reason to think [OBUPride] will stop its attempts to bully us into acquiescing to its position that homosexuality is biblically acceptable. Baptists will continue to face attacks and demands to compromise, as we have in the past. We will be ridiculed and declared to be extremist, narrow-minded and uncaring. So be it." As word about OBUPride continues to spread, more and more GLBT alumni have begun to join the organization and share their stories with other members. OBUPride membership is open to all persons in the GLBT community and their allies who have been associated with Oklahoma Baptist University as students or employees. Former students reside in all parts of the world, and are encouraged to join in the work to affect a positive change in the university's policy. The OBUPride website, www.obupride.org, also features links to resources that deal with homosexuality and scripture in modern, scholarly works.
