HERLAND BOOKSTORE CLOSED INDEFINITELY SEEKS EMPATHIC ELECTRICAL CONTRACTOR

OKLAHOMA CITY - Due to insufficient funding and unforeseen electrical problems with the new building, the new Herland Bookstore will not be prepared to open its doors in February as tentatively planned.

Faulty wiring in the recently-purchased property is necessitating complete re-wiring of the building and installation of major and minor electrical components "from the ground up" according to Laura, the renovation supervisor. As a not-for-profit organization, Herland does not have the funds to overcome this excessive, unanticipated expense without the help of an electrical contractor and electrician sympathetic to Herland's plight. Currently, Herland's coffer cannot support the retail costs of the crucial electrical repairs.

Meanwhile --- again, due to a dwindling depository and the need to conserve funds -- Herland Bookstore has been moved from the old building to a (considerably) less expensive storage unit where inventory, furniture and supplies must rest until the new store site is fit for them.

As a result of this predicament, there will be no Herland Bookstore until the new one opens, hopefully, in March. Watch this Newsletter for information on the Bookstore and its Grand Opening festivities. K.L.

That evening of Shartel hijinks and marvelous music was such a success that the group has (aghast) been invited back for an encore performance, Grace Grand and all (some people never learn!).

W.A.R. PREPARES FOR BATTLE

Women Against Rape (WAR) held its first meeting at the YWCA on NW 5th last January 9th, and set its agenda for action to raise the public and legislature's awareness of rape: the leniency its perpetrator is afforded by our legal, judicial, and parole systems, and the brutality and disregard its victim endures at the behest of not only the rapist, but the current "system" as well.

On November 13th, a 15-year-old girl was kidnapped, repeatedly raped, and mutilated in south Oklahoma City. The victim was kidnapped on her way to school held in a van for 22 hours where she was repeatedly raped, sodomized orally and anally, and mutilated by having both her nipples bitten off. She made note of the van's license plate number when her perpetrator dumped her from his van.

The man who has been charged with this crime is Donald Spitznas, who was on parole after serving 5 years of a 15 year sentence on a conviction for the abduction, rape and sodomy of a 14-year-old Drummond girl in 1982.

The formation of WAR was prompted by this case. Spitznas was paroled after serving less than five years, and the Garfield County District Attorney's Office (through which he was convicted) was apparently never notified of his impending parole.

Fashioning themselves after the very successful nationwide Mothers Against Drunk Driving (MADD) effort, the women who attended the first WAR meeting hope to reshape the prevalent attitude toward rape to prevent recidivism, thereby reducing the overall incidence of rape and victim suffering. They plan to do this, at least in part, by monitoring court proceedings and lobbying the legislature to pass laws that will prevent the parole of convicted rapists, as well as increasing their terms of incarceration.

Music lovers have come together to keep music alive in Oklahoma. Two musical events of interest to women are being finalized now through the combined efforts of a number of local music personalities.

Lee Agnew of the musical group Friends of Tradition, Mark Falk owner of the recent Second Fret night spot, Mary Reynolds of the celebrated group Sisters of Swing and Barbara Cleveland, founder of Herland Bookstore, have coalesced with Herland to bring Robin Flower and Nancy Vogl to Oklahoma City for an afternoon of music and entertainment.

Robin's bluegrass sounds have been a popular attraction on her previous visits to OKC, and this time she teams up with a renowned musician making her Oklahoma City debut appearance. This promises to be an unforgettable performance. Peggy Johnson is scheduled to open for Robin and Nancy at 4 pm on Sunday, March 13, 1988, at the Civic Center Little Theater, 200 Channing Square in downtown OKC. General admission tickets are \$6.00.

And, on April 2nd, Herland and Shartel Productions proudly presents a return engagement of Jasmine. Surprised and very pleased with the response they received on their first tour of Oklahoma City last Winter, this "top of the line", all-woman jazz group looks forward to coming our way again. The Shartels will open for Jasmine at 7:30 pm, Saturday April 2nd, at the Civic Center Little Theater. General admission is \$8.00.

OKLAHOMA TO HOST PEACE POET

OKLAHOMA CITY - "Life is full of paths; some very winding, some cumbersome, hilly, lush, straight, dry, some seeming to being or end nowhere... (we all have more than one)".

Fortunately, one of Safiya Henderson-Holmes' paths leads her to Oklahoma City on February 15th where she will share her poetry during an open reception, 7 pm at the Jimmy Stewart building. On February 16th, she will perform in Stillwater on campus at Oklahoma State University.

Safiya is a poet, writer and performing artist whose life exemplifies "the poet as a social change agent". Last March she read at Freedom's Riders 1987, a fundraising reception organized to protect voter's rights in the North and South. When asked to describe the 1987 recipient of the Fannie Lou Hamer award, one woman responded, "Well, she keeps good company."

Her "good company" includes performances at the World Peace Conference in Copenhagen and Sisterfire, a national women's artists outdoor festival in Washing-

ton, DC. During a MADRE benefit in New York City, Safiya shared the stage with June Jordan, Sekou Sandiata, Holly Near, Alexis DeVeaux, and Evelyn Harris of Sweet Honey in the Rock. Funds were raised to support a women's hospital in Manaqua, and relief work in Africa. Ms. Holmes is also a contributor in Art Against Apartheid's anthology with Sonia Sanchez, Dennis Brutus, Audre Lorde, Maurice Kenny and Alice Walker.

Safiya's tour in Oklahoma is sponsored by the following OSU organizations: National Organization for Women, the Afro-American Student Association, Sigma Tau Delta/English Club, and the African Students Association. Her Stillwater performance is free and open to the public. Readings will begin at 7:30 pm in the Student Union Little Theater. NANCY DAY PROJECT SOLICITS OKC WOMEN'S HELP

KALAMAZOO, MI - A group of Kalamazoo, Michigan-area women are excited about a project they are working on in conjunction with Pittsburgh composer and performer Nancy Day.

A spokesperson for the group, Carol, said, "The project has great potential for empowering and encouraging victims of violence, promoting women's culture, and consoling those burdened by the pain in the world, as well as entertainment. But, the project needs the vision and commitment of many good women. That is why we are reaching out for your helping hand."

Convinced that Day's "incredible healing and empowering music needs to reach a larger audience", this group of women is attempting to raise the \$10,000 necessary to produce a high quality, full length tape of Day's music. The tape, entitled "We All Have a Vision" (also the name of this project), would feature the title song with a majority of music focusing on ending violence, especially violence against women in its many forms.

Because of its planned content, the group supports Nancy's wish that the tapes be wholesaled to women's shelters

and other centers which help domestic or sexual assault survivors. This would allow these centers to retail the tapes and use the proceeds to help fund much-needed human services. A tour by Nancy Day through some of the target communities is planned as a later step in the "We All Have a Vision" project.

"We desperately need the restorative energy of truly talented musicians --- we need the spirit of Nancy Day's messages in the world. We hope you, the women of Oklahoma, will make this vision yours as well as ours," Carol said. The Women's Action Center in Kalamazoo is accepting all donations, and would like to hear from women who may wish to make a low-interest or no-interest loan to Nancy Day of \$500.-\$10,000. to assist with the project.
