Tulsa County Medical Library

The Tulsa County Medical Library had its beginning in 1932 as the Journal Club Library sponsored by the Journal Club, an organization interested in the reporting and discussion of current medical literature. Interest in the library increased so the name was changed to the Tulsa County Medical Library to include all physicians, laboratory workers and those engaged in the medical sciences either members of the Tulsa County Medical Society or affiliated with it. The greater part of the expense has been borne by private subscriptions with an appropriation from the Tulsa County Medical Society in 1932 and 1935 for binding and service expenses. At the last meeting in November funds were appropriated to cover the expense of the subscriptions to and binding of over twenty-five medical journals, including the *Quarterly Cumulative Index Medicus*. In addition to the journals the appropriation covers the service expense and the installation of additional shelves and cabinets increasing the shelf space over one hundred per cent. During the past year the Doctors' Credit Exchange has acted as librarian and will continue to have charge of the withdrawal and return of books and journals during 1935. These will be given out and received at 304 Medical Arts Building, telephone 5-3145. A catalog is kept which includes the back numbers of all journals in the library as well as books.

Dr. Carl F. Simpson has placed the official copy of the 1934 American Medical Directory in the library where it is available for reference at all times.

The Doctors' Credit Exchange has offered to loan to the Tulsa County Medical Library the 1934 and 1935 Polk's City Directory with the under-

standing that these books are not to be removed from the library.

An open meeting was held in the Mayo Hotel November 6, at which time Dr. L. H. Ritzhaupt, President-elect of the Oklahoma State Medical Association, talked on "Laws Pertaining to Public Welfare and the Medicine in Oklahoma." His discussion of a proposed state health board was interesting. Hostesses for the meeting were: Mrs. J. W. Rogers, Mrs. R. E. L. Rhodes, Mrs. F. S. Clinton and H. D. Murdock.

At the home of Mrs. A. Ray Wiley, the December meeting took on an informal atmosphere following luncheon. One group of members tacked quilts under the direction of Mrs. Gregory A. Wall and her philanthropic committee, while another group, with Mrs. A. W. Roth as chairman, made scrap-books as Christmas gifts for children in the St. John's and Morningside Hospitals. Those assisting Mrs. Wiley were: Mrs. W. J. Trainor, Mrs. Arthur H. Davis, Mrs. H. C. Graham and Mrs. R. M. Shepard.

Members were urged to co-operate with local clubs for the continuance of Tulsa's two F. E. R. The Round Table

Recently there has been put forth active efforts by the well-endowed National Anti-Vivisection Society to restrict through legislative channels the use of animals for experimental purposes. We are informed that as a result of its organized campaign, bills will be introduced into many of the state legislatures during their next sessions with the intent of outlawing vivisection. In the interests of scientific medicine and surgery and the welfare of humanity, their efforts must not be permitted to succeed.

The American College of Surgeons is making a strenuous effort to prevent the passing of such laws by appointing a committee in each state for the purpose of conducting a campaign against such legislation.

Pamphlets have been prepared and are ready for distribution among the medical profession, law makers and interested laymen. The titles of these pamphlets

are "Animal Experimentation—Its Importance and Value to Scientific Medicine," and "Health Benefits from Animal Experimentation."

It has been suggested that in those states in which such a problem arises that the following plan be adopted: The physicians acquaint themselves with the facts; copies of the above pamphlets be placed in the hands of all legislators as well as the Governor; and the support of influential laymen be obtained.

Fortunately, such a movement has not been started in this state. However, it is well to be on the *qui vive* in order that we might present the true facts when the occasion arises.

Those interested in this subject, or hearing of any activity along this line, could for the moment best serve by passing the information to the committee.

Diphtheria Immunization

Dr. G. N. Bilby, State Health Commissioner, in the January, 1935, issue of the Journal of the Oklahoma State Medical Association states that he is in a position to furnish toxoid to all physicians who desire to immunize against diphtheria. The physicians need only to write to Dr. G. N. Bilby, State Commissioner of Health, State Capitol, Oklahoma City, stating the amount needed and the toxoid will be mailed promptly. "The State Health Department is doing no immunization work at all, but in order to do its part, can make toxoid available to the physicians of the state who can do the work of immunizing." The Tulsa Medical Society will do its part to see that every child in Tulsa County is protected against diphtheria.

City Health Department

Dr. J. Jeff Billington, Superintendent of Health, desires to announce through this bulletin that a limited amount of toxoid, typhoid and smallpox vaccine is available for physicians who wish to immunize indigent patients. This may be secured at 523 N. Boulder. If unable to do this yourself please send all indigent patients to the Health Department where they will be given immunization. Children of school age may be immunized Saturday mornings in order to avoid absence from classes.

Dr. LeRoy Long

Dr. LeRoy Long was born January 1, 1869, in Lincoln County, North Carolina. In 1893 he was graduated with first honors from the Louisville Medical College, which has since been merged with the University of Louisville School of Medicine. Severe illness prevented a regular internship so he served an irregular one in the infirmary at Louisville during the years of 1894 and 1895, during which time he was Demonstrator of Genito-Urinary Diseases. He moved to Indian Territory in 1895, located at Caddo where he remained in general practice until 1904. From there he moved to McAlester and engaged in the practice of surgery up to 1915, at which time he was appointed Dean of the Medical Department in the University of Oklahoma and went to Oklahoma City, to assume the duties of this office. He remained as Dean of the Medical School from 1915 until the first year of Governor Murray's administration, at which time he resigned. He is now engaged in the practice of general surgery in Oklahoma City.

During Dr. Long's administration the Medical School stepped up into the rank

of Class A, and the entire four-year course was centered in Oklahoma City. During this time also University Hospital, Crippled Children's Hospital, and the Medical School Building were planned and erected. The Medical School Library naturally developed along with other departments of school activities, and the entire institution will for many years reflect the influences of Doctor Long's splendid leadership.

R. C. Pigford.

As a long time member and ex-president of the Tulsa County Medical Society, I battled for better co-operation and better ethics. My endeavors were futile and most times enemy makers. So many mistook what I intended to be constructive criticism, for selfish gain. At this point, may I suggest that it would probably be of advantage to the Society if the older members were shown a trifle more welcome and consideration. Of course, I shall admit that many of us may not be so up-to-the-modern as many of the younger ones are, but the oldsters have something which only time and study can give, viz: *Experience*.

I notice a great absence from the Society Meetings of men who should be attending, but they stay away because they feel that they are just flotsam on the Society Sea.

The profession, if it is going to survive the many organizations, laity controlled, which are now being proposed to cheapen medical fees, must become a more harmonious working body and this can only be accomplished by a unified, unselfish, and friendly Society membership. The younger men will be sure to suffer greatly if this condition is not corrected in its infancy. Both young and old in the Society can give advice, at least worth listening to.

Maybe I am wrong, but I am of the

opinion that the cutting of fees, done by men seeking to control compensation and industrial work, has been the real cause for this trend toward State Medicine. The insurance companies today dictate the fees of doctors who work for them, and we can either take it or let the erstwhile fee-cutter get it. There has been a great deal said and written about the fee-splitter. I am convinced that the fee-splitter never did the damage to the profession that the fee-cutter has done, and I cannot for the life of me see why medicine tries to make an outcast of him and let the fee-cutter alone. I believe every fee-cutter should be at least censured by his Society; if not suspended. The fee-splitter never was an agency to under bid the other fellow; in fact, he has been the one who has kept fees up. The fee-cutter has been the man who, by doing contract work at prices dictated by his employer, has been the real cause of the present oncoming tragedy in medicine. Want of space does not permit a more lengthy discussion of this subject.

**Dr. W. S. Larrabee**

Born 1885 in North Dakota. Graduated from the University of Louisville 1910. Practiced in Arcola, Miss., 1911 to 1913 and then took graduate work in Roentgenology in Chicago, New York and Boston, 1914 and 1915. Practiced Roentgenology in Henryetta, Okla., 1916; El Paso, Texas, 1917 to 1925, and has been located in Tulsa since 1926. Dr. Larrabee is a member of the Radiological Society of North America and limits his work to x-ray diagnosis and therapy.

Born 1889 at Charleston, Arkansas. Graduated from University of Arkansas Medical Department 1912. Located in Jinny Lind, Ark., from 1912 to 1916 and Henryetta, since 1916. Special work at Tulane Post Graduate School of Medicine. Dr. Bollinger owns and operates the Henryetta Hospital and is interested in Industrial Medicine.

THE TULSA JUNIOR LEAGUE HOME FOR CRIPPLED CHILDREN

The Tulsa Junior League first entered the Crippled Children work by maintaining a Convalescent Home in a frame house on East Fifth Place. As the Crippled Children grew, the League had to change their arrangement.

They decided to erect, furnish and maintain an up-to-date Convalescent Home that was adequate for the work. A ten-acre site at Forty-ninth and South Lewis was donated and the erection of an \$86,000.00 home begun. It was opened officially in March, 1928, and has been running at capacity since then.

The League is paying for the home and running it by their own efforts. They raise money by running a Tea Room and by sponsoring ticket sales for games, by dances and by shows.

The home is an up-to-date brick and stone building with a bed capacity of thirty.

The nursing care is given by Mrs. Riggs, R. N. Matron and three undergraduate nurses. Any child who should become seriously ill is sent back to the hospital.

Physiotherapy, an important adjunct to any Orthopaedic Surgery, is ably handled by Miss Esther Sutcliffe. Additional equipment is purchased from time to time.

The Tulsa School Board maintains a full-time teacher, Miss Mayfield, who gives instruction through the eighth grade. She is assisted by Miss Seibert, who also is in charge of Handi Crafts and Occupational Therapy.

Special school desks have been installed and the time spent in school is adjusted to the patient.

The children admitted to the home are those cases between two and twelve years that have been committed to the hospital under the Crippled Children's law. Cases of Spastic Paralysis, those with draining sinuses or low mentality

are not accepted.

Medical care is under the supervision of the medical staff. This consists of about thirty doctors. However, the Orthopaedic Surgeon who has sent the child to the home, makes frequent visits and calls in consultation when needed.

The purpose of the home is to look after the child during its convalescent period after an operation and until the time of its discharge, or in order to prepare a child for further operations.

Every attempt is made to work in close co-operation with the hospital and the Orthopaedist in charge of the case decides when the child shall be transferred. He is then investigated by a committee from the League and must be approved by them before admission.

The Convalescent care of an Orthopaedic patient is very important. It shortens the hospital stay of many of these patients and gets them away from the hospital atmosphere which becomes depressing after several months. It is especially important, in these times when a too early return of these patients to their own homes would minimize the results of the operation of hospital treatment.

A visit to the home convinces anyone of the worthiness of this work and makes one appreciate the efforts of the League.

Our profession has for its prime object the service it can render to humanity, reward or financial gain should be a subordinate consideration.

The Round Table

The Truth in Medicine

When, and if, Medicine becomes an exact science in its diagnostic, therapeutic, and prognostic phases, there will then be no occasion to discuss the truth in Medicine. Medical men are rank individualists. This tendency asserts itself in all matters pertaining to the care of the sick. Probably the most common situation that Doctors are faced with, is a demand, either on the part of the patient himself, or of interested relatives, for the exact truth as to what is wrong with the patient, and what can be done about it.

One very prominent eastern Clinician asserted in a public address, that he told the patients themselves, including those mentally ill, exactly what was wrong with them. It must be apparent, that if he lived up to his statement, that he was approaching a desirable ideal rather closely. I am quite convinced that all Physicians intend to be honest and sincere, and that their expressions, either to the patient or to the patient's family are intended to serve the best interests of all concerned. The difficulty arises from either insufficient

experience or acquired information upon which to base a conclusion as to diagnosis, treatment, or prognosis. These remarks are stimulated by the oft repeated experience of being told, by either a patient or his family, that certain diseases, more particularly mental deviations and syphilis of the central nervous system, were incurable, according to their Physician.

We have all had the experience of having a patient, whom we had pronounced as hopeless, walk into our office, hale and hearty, six months later. Or conversely, possibly, of having a patient abruptly die of heart disease, (as did the writer), right at the time that the inquiring son and daughter were being told that the patient was doing fine, and would be able to go home shortly. All of which is only another way of saying that frequently, the exact truth in Medicine is not ascertainable. It therefore, develops upon us to clearly distinguish first between situations in which something approaching the exact truth is known, and where the situation is always problematical. We can always make it very clear to

those concerned, just when we are dealing with exact facts, and when we enter the realm of speculation, in the discussion of medical problems. Or, as is frequently the case, if there are no criteria upon which to base an opinion, we can simply and clearly state the statistical possibilities.

The relations between the Physician and his patient can then proceed with the expectation that his best service will be rendered, in an attempt to attain the desired end. But, if progress is unfavorable, criticism is unwarranted.

Viewed in its broader aspects, the matter of truth in Medicine has large implications with respect to the present status of the Physician in Society. We hear and read much of the "good old practitioner", who was the idol of his clientele, and the father confessor and patron saint in general in the community in which he labored. He did not live and work in this age of "health columns", medical broadcasting and other means ad nauseam, by which the public are being "educated" for the sole purpose of cross examining their Physician as to appropriate diagnosis, treatment, etc. It is readily apparent that many Physicians have adopted an attitude of evasion and obscurity of statement, as a defense against the barrage of ill founded questions, to which they are subjected.

It is time then, that we develop a rectilinear spine, an attitude that bespeaks self confidence without egotism, and meet our clientele frankly, courageously, and firmly with the truth, in so far as it lies within our power to speak it. —N. R. Smith.

The Reading Room

"Executive Secretary"

Mr. Max A. Teale, Property Manager of the Medical and Dental Arts Building announces that space will be available on the 12th. floor of the Medical and Dental Arts Building January 1, 1936 for the Library Reading Room.

This marks an important step in the development of the library. The new books and journals have overflowed the cabinets in Room 304 and filled a considerable portion of the new cases in the assembly room. Heretofore it has been impossible to provide adequate reading room space combined with library service. During the past two years the Doctor's Credit Exchange has given the Medical Society library service at very low cost hampered by small space and operating the library from two distantly separated floors.

The new setup concentrates the library on one floor and provides a reading room with sufficient space for a small office. A full time librarian acting as executive secretary of the medical society could take care of the library, assist in the publication of the bulletin and relieve the secretary of a considerable amount of routine.

It has been suggested that by adding to the amount heretofore paid the secretary it would be possible to employ a secretary capable of handling the work without upsetting the budget. It is better to go slowly and employ a high powered executive only when the society activities justify an increase in dues and a big salary than to get one and then have to dig up things for him to execute. Think this over seriously. This society has been pregnant a long while and it's about time for some thing to happen.

The Doctor and Charity Patients

Our Society is about to adopt a fee schedule and this will be an important item of business at our next meeting. I believe the schedule to be presented is as satisfactory as can be obtained for the purpose intended. However, this is not the point I want to discuss.

In the rather rapid changing of the old order of things, the economic changes, etc., the doctor is called upon more and more to render gratuitous service. This has largely been brought about by a high sense of benevolence and a very low business acumen on the part of the doctor.

With the increase in number of patients applying at charitable or free agencies more demands are made on the doctor. The question arises, why should we do this work free? Time is our only commodity. I have yet to see the butcher or the baker giving away his meat and bread free to large groups, day in and day out. There are three primary requirements for maintenance in comfort on this earth, namely; food, shelter and good health. The first two

are not free, why the last one? I believe that the doctors' service should be paid, as every other commodity is paid for and that we cease from giving away our time gratuitously.

The butcher and the baker are paid by the tax payers. In Tulsa County this is handled through the county commissioners. It is extremely hard to up-set old precedents or customs, and it is not likely that we would be able to collect our fees from the county, for services to charity patients.

There is one thing I believe that could be done, and certainly should be done. If a doctor devotes a portion of his time, if not more than one hour a week to charity cases, or works in a charity clinic, he should be exempt from taxation on his home, his personal property and professional business. I do not think he should be exempt from any taxation on property or income arising from other sources other than his professional business. I believe this would work better than offering the doctor a low minimum fee for his charity work, a fee which he would feel to be menial even if paid.

Abstract of Paper Titled "Discussion of Contraception" By Dr. Joseph Fulcher

The practice of contraception is as old as antiquity. The desire to control conception antedates written history. It is only in recent years that a practical scientific method of control has been evolved. This method has resolved itself into two different means, (1) A mechanical, chemical means, the most

practical example of which is the diaphragm pessary, together with the lactic acid jelly. (2) The natural method known medically as the Ogino-Knaus theory depends for its conception control upon the strict observation of the fertility period in women. We find many proponents of each of these means of conception control. Which, if either, will prove to be the most universally used of the two, only time can tell.

The desire for conception control is so universal that it cannot be destroyed. The means of accomplishing conception control however, can be guided. This guiding could be done by the medical profession. If they do not, then someone else will. Whether one is against Birth Control, or for it, matters little. It has survived thousands of years of condemnation.

In considering the application of means of conception control, one should take into consideration the medical, social, and economic indications. It is very probable that we will have much frank discussion about this subject amongst lay people and see a great deal about it in the lay press. It will be carried to an extreme, but in my opinion its equilibrium will be established. In this connection is a good thing to remember that one should not advocate illiteracy because some people forge checks.

Blood Cholesterol Values in Hypometabolism

An increase in blood cholesterol has been found to be a more characteristic finding than a low basal metabolism in postoperative hypothyroidism and myxedema. A constant increase in the blood cholesterol has been observed in cretinism and juvenile hypothyroidism, in which patients an accurate basal metabolic rate cannot be obtained. During the past year I have encountered twenty-seven patients in whom the blood cholesterol was elevated, sixteen of which showed an associated low basal metabolic rate. The metabolism in the remaining nine was within normal limits. Seven of these patients on physical examination reveal nothing suggesting hypometabolism but manifested

definite signs of a diminished thyroid function.

An occasional patient will be encountered in which the symptoms may suggest a mild hyperthyroidism but the associated hypercholesterolemia and favorable therapeutic response leaves little doubt that we are dealing with an activating hypothyroidism.

Four patients were encountered in which the basal metabolism was less than minus 20 and a normal blood cholesterol. Unfavorable therapeutic response or an aggravation of their symptoms to thyroid extract indicates definitely that the low metabolism was due to causes other than that associated with thyroid deficiency.

In some patients the blood cholesterol is increased out of proportion to the lowering of the basal metabolism. A fall of the blood cholesterol results following the administration of thyroid extract. The determination of blood cholesterol is definitely a valuable adjunct in determining the dosage of thyroid extract in treating these patients, obviating the necessity of frequent basal metabolism tests.
