This meeting will be held in the small auditorium on the 16th floor of the Mayo Hotel at 8 o'clock, September 11th.

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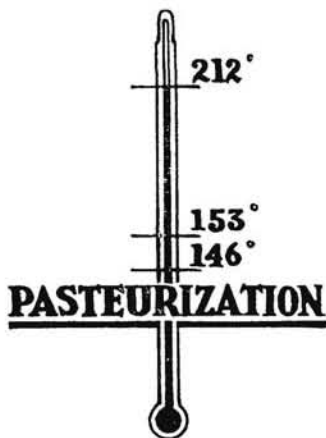
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Thomas Parran
Surgeon General, Says:

"There can be no doubt that all milk should be properly pasteurized or boiled before it is consumed. The reasons for this are given in detail in the attached reprint from the Public Health Reports entitled "What Every Person Should Know About Milk." The fact that pasteurization does not significantly affect the food value of milk is shown in another enclosed reprint entitled "Do Children Who Drink Raw Milk Thrive Better Than Children Who Drink Pasteurized or Other Heated Milk?"

"Whether *compulsory* pasteurization is expedient depends largely upon the previous amount of educational work which has been done in the community concerned. If the vast majority of the citizens still mistakenly believe that raw milk is better than pasteurized milk, and would strongly resent being forced to consume pasteurized milk, then compulsion would be inexpedient. If, however, the majority of your citizens have by now been convinced, as public health authorities have been, that all raw milk, even the best, would be still safer if pasteurized and that pasteurization does not significantly affect food value, then it would be entirely proper for your city administration to require all market milk to be pasteurized. I hope this will be possible in Tulsa."

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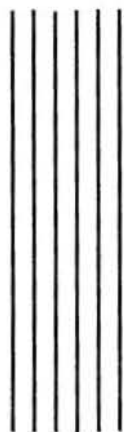

County Approves Clinic; Ruled Legal

Long fight over adoption of free clinic plan ends;
two district judges hold plan is legal in dismissing
restraining order and denying injunction suit.

Tulsa County Commissioners after three and one-half hours of debate, on August 14th, voted two to one to inaugurate the Tulsa County Medical Clinic, sponsored by the Tulsa County Medical Society.

The plan provides:

1. Money now set up in the county budget for drugs will be transferred to the public health department appropriation for maintenance of the clinic.

2. Members of the medical society—with 110 members already signed up—will form clinical staffs, donating their services, the county furnishing drugs.

3. The county physician will be clinic director, certifying for hospitalization.

4. The county will give the medical society \$300 a month for overhead expenses, including the salary of a case worker, who will investigate cases.

5. Borderline patients must pay their own medicine and hospitalization, but the medical society will supply its services free.

6. The job of county surgeon, paying \$250 a month, will be abolished, and the head of the surgical department will serve without pay.

7. Waite Phillips, oil man, will contribute \$6,000 to equip the clinic and remodel the first floor of the Community fund building. The Community fund contributes free rent and utilities.

8. Commissioners retain the right to approve or reject anything done by the clinic committee.

More than 300 persons—many of them private citizens and taxpayers urging adoption of the clinic proposal—crowded into commission chambers in the county clerk's office at 8 a. m. the morning of the meeting and forced the commissioners to transfer the hearing to the county court. As the debate progressed, the crowd grew until many were standing on benches and crowding out into the hall.

The end came at 11:15 a. m. when Chairman George Shepard, Republican, seconded a motion made by Democratic Commissioner Ralsa F. Morley at 8:50 a. m.

Then came the first real split in the Republican majority as Commissioner Lincoln Sallee voted "No."

Shepard's sudden capitulation left the audience breathless, because it came after hope for the clinic plan had virtually been abandoned. Sallee voted against adoption of the plan on "legal grounds," despite written opinions from the Attorney General and County Attorney Dixie Gilmer that it met requirements of the law.

"The medical society is willing to inaugurate this plan on the basis of its stand."

Sallee's legal objections were flattened out early in the meeting when Gilmer presented a resolution creating the clinic which he said would meet requirements of the law. The county attorney had been instructed to prepare such a resolution Monday afternoon.

Gilmer added his personal indorsement to the medical society's proposal, declaring that the arrangement now followed by commissioners "is a lousy one."

Shepard's decision to second Morley's motion did not come until the commissioners had fled from the crowded court room into executive session in Judge Melone's private chambers, where Dr. Wiley and Dr. Pigford were called in an abortive effort to entice them to change their offer.

Gilmer told commissioners that they have the "power of veto—of life and death" over the clinic because they hold the pursestrings. "If you adopt this plan and it doesn't work out, all you need do is quit writing the checks," he said.

G. C. Spillers, Tulsa attorney who happened in by accident, took off his coat and led the fight for adoption.

Reverend Harry Carr, president of the Tulsa Ministerial Alliance, repeatedly challenged Shepard, and once drew a fiery retort from the commissioner.

COURTS HOLD PLAN LEGAL

The recently adopted clinic plan for Tulsa county's indigents—sponsored by the medical society and approved by the county commission—August 28 was legally approved by District Judge J. T. Shipman of Bartlesville, assigned here by the state supreme court.

Judge Shipman dismissed the petition of W. L. Coffey, attorney, and denied his request for an injunction to prevent the county commission from making a current year appropriation for the operation of the clinic.

Coffey's action was brought in behalf of Dr. R. C. Bryant, Negro, and H. L. Barnes, property owner of the Sand Springs line.

The lawyer contended the commissioners had no authority to enter into a contract with medical society members to operate the clinic and that they could not legally delegate their authority of "overseers of the poor" to the society members. Dixie Gilmer, county attorney; John Conway, assistant; R. D. Hudson, G. C. Spillers and C. H. Rosenstein, attorneys for the doctors' group, argue that no contract would be entered into but that the clinic would be operated on "an understanding."

In the Shipman decision, which Coffey said would be appealed, the court ruled:

"There is no showing that it is going to cost the taxpayers any more money for the commissioners to administer to the poor and sick, the indigent poor, following the plan that they have here proposed, than they would spend following the plans heretofore adopted and followed.

"I might not be very well acquainted with those things, but according to my observations and information, the administration of this particular part of any government in this state—and I don't know anything peculiar about the county government of this county—is very unsatisfactory."

"I think the legislature intended that the county commissioners should do something in some fashion or other to eradicate communicable diseases and make a levy upon taxable property for the purpose of doing that.

"I understand that the Tulsa County Medical Society proposes to co-operate with the commissioners and lend them assistance. Something has been said about some members of the society making some money out of it. I don't see how they will do it; possibly they will. I am not one of those that is willing to believe that even doctors are not public spirited. I believe they can have good intentions divorced from any thought of personal gain. As far as I know this is a demonstration on the part of doctors of this county, whether it is or not, or is good or bad," the court decided.

TULSA'S SYPHILIS CLINIC LARGER

The State Health Department has observed with a great deal of interest the development of Public Health activities in Tulsa. Of particular importance is the interest shown by the Medical Society itself. This has manifested itself in the establishment of a non-political Board of Health for the city of Tulsa, the organization of a poly-clinic for the treatment of the indigent sick of Tulsa County, and the organization of a Syphilis clinic for indigent patients which is already the largest in the state.

The Medical profession has been responsible for the progress of scientific medicine in the United States and the high degree of medical care available to the population. When city, county and state funds are exhausted, the private practitioner continues to take care of the indigent sick regardless of the fact that he never had any funds at all, and can anticipate no other reward than the satisfaction of a job well done.

The reporting of communicable diseases is tedious and the filling out of that little yellow card becomes very monotonous. The Health Department appreciates the efforts of the physicians who keep the department of epidemiology in touch with the morbidity of the state, by sending in these weekly reports. No State Health Department has ever received one hundred per cent returns on morbidity reports but the interest shown in your county stimulates a desire to see if a precedent can be established, with the co-operation of a well organized and efficient Medical Society.

Because of recent interest in the treatment of Syphilis, the reporting of this disease has increased very noticeably as is shown in the following table.

The Health Department will be grateful for the co-operation if each member of the Tulsa County Medical Society will send in his report card each week. If any physician is not receiving these cards regularly we would appreciate his writing to the Health Department, in Oklahoma City, or calling the local health officer, Dr. James H. Neal, 4-2138. The yellow card is in two sections, one containing space for reporting communicable diseases, and the other a list of notifiable diseases.

There has been some misunderstanding about these cards, and some individuals are under the impression that if they do not have any communicable diseases for that week, no card need be sent in. The cards should be sent in each week. If there have been no communicable diseases for the week designated, the card is mailed blank, or with "none," written across the report.

If there have been communicable diseases in the physician's office, the name or case number of the patient should be entered, name of disease, race, address, sex, and age. These cards are dated for each Saturday of the year and if it is not possible to fill these out on Saturday they should be filled out and mailed, Monday.

Thanking you for your co-operation in the past and anticipating your continued co-operation with these morbidity reports.
