



MOTON HOSPITAL PROGRESS NOTED

Tulsa Colored Hospital Offers Greatly Improved Medical and Surgical Facilities To Public. Approximately \$50,000 Expended In Purchase of New Equipment.

With the installation of considerable new equipment in completely remodeled quarters, Moton Memorial Hospital, Tulsa institution for the care of colored persons, assumes new stature as a modern Oklahoma hospital.

Located at 603 East Pine Street, Moton Hospital has benefited from the interest of a large number of Tulsa civic leaders, both white and colored, who have effected a complete reorganization of the original facilities. Designed to meet the needs of the colored population, it affords complete surgical facilities for the ten negro physicians who are members of the medical staff.

During the past year, Moton Hospital has expended approximately \$50,000.00 in remodeling and in acquiring much needed equipment. The rooms are light, clean and cheerful, and have been finished in different pastel shades to relieve the monotony of the usual whiteness of hospital walls and floors.

The medical staff is under the direction of an executive committee which includes Dr. R. C. Bryant, president; Dr. Charles Bate, secretary; Dr. W. T. Napier, treasurer; and Dr. W. Norvell Coots, member. This staff has been assisted by a group of consultants from the membership of the Tulsa County Medical Society. Each field of medicine is represented by a white physician selected by the Moton staff.

The hospital now has a capacity of 40 beds and 10 bassinets. It has wards, semi-

private and private rooms. It has a fullyequipped operating room and also an emergency room. The nursery, which is one of the nicest in the city, is complete in every respect with the most modern equipment.

Moton Hospital, in an effort to attain the high standards prescribed by accrediting hospital organizations, employs only registered nurses and assistants. Laboratory facilities are under the direction of trained technicians and are quite complete.

The hospital is now a member of the Blue Cross Plan of Oklahoma, providing prescribed services to holders of the Blue Cross Plan of hospital insurance policies. Under an agreeable arrangement with the Board of County Commissioners, facilities are made available to county charity patients. The Hospital enjoys a high degree of cooperation with both of these groups. Through the enthusiasm of the various civic groups and individuals interested in the progress of the hospital, Moton Hospital has met with a high degree of cooperation from all quarters in its efforts to attain its goals.

Members of the Tulsa County Medical Society are invited to visit Moton Hospital and to inspect the fine facilities now available there. The Hospital also welcomes visits from prospective patients. In this manner, the Hospital hopes to acquaint the public with the services which it has to offer.

PRESIDENT'S PAGE

In the way of post-war planning by the Tulsa County Medical Society, I should like to suggest a careful study of the relation which American Medicine is to play to the returning war veteran. There is little doubt but that the doctor will be an integral part in the veteran's rehabilitation program, both from a standpoint of mental and physical health. With some twelve million men constituting an influential bloc, it is a foregone certainty that considerable health benefits will be provided to them in one form or another. There are already indications of the development of such a program.

I believe that much of the chaos and unrest which existed in the veteran's relationship with the doctor after the last war can be eliminated by a properly alligned program of cooperation between the doctor, the veteran, and the federal administrative agencies. To be more concise, we should not permit ourselves to be excluded in the planning of this program. As the doctor is to be a vital factor in its successful operations, he should be given an equal voice in determining the details of operation. This will not only enable the construction of a sounder program but one which will best meet the needs of our returning servicemen. The doctor has long permitted much of the thinking in medical matters to be done by laymen. Fortunately, we are rapidly abandoning that attitude. Our obligation to the veteran, and the thinking and planning which it entails, represents one place where we should and must do our own part of the thinking and planning.

NPC PROGRAM PRAISED; WAGNER BILL GAINING

By action taken at a July meeting of the Board of Trustees, the Tulsa County Medical Society last month urged support of the program of the National Physicians Committee by the doctors of Oklahoma. In a report to the Tulsa membership, the Board pointed out that the NPC represented the "fighting arm of American Medicine" and noted the Committee's past value in combating trends towards state medicine. Physicians are urged to enroll by sending their name and contribution to the National Physicians Committee, Pittsfield Building, Chicago. The NPC operates as a lobby for medical interests and is under the direction of a number of prominent American medical doctors.

In Washington last month, the reintroduced Wagner-Murray-Dingell Bill




For security reasons, the Bulletin is not permitted to print in full the addresses of its in-service members. Copies will be sent to all physicians in Eastern Oklahoma without charge. Additional copies are available. advocating state medicine was gaining considerable support. Labor interests, headed by the American Federation of Labor, threw their support to the bill before public hearings on the merits of the proposal were begun. Doctors anticipated a hard fight in committee hearings to prevent the bill from being reported favorably to the floor of the House and Senate.

Officials of the Tulsa County Medical Society last month urged members to write to Senator E. H. Moore or Senator Elmer Thomas for copies of the bill. After due study of its provisions, physicians are urged to advise their senators and representatives as its apparent merits or lack of merit.

Regular monthly meetings of the Tulsa County Medical Society resume September 24 at the Mayo Hotel when Dr. V. C. Tisdal and 11 other representatives of the Oklahoma State Medical Association will present an unusual program of brief lectures pertaining to medicine, medical economics, and the work of the state group.

The Medical Credit Bureau, official collection agency of the Tulsa County Medical Society, has augmented its collection and credit services by now offering use of the Powers Service to collect difficult accounts. Details of this service are available from the Executive Secretary. Investigate today.

With the announcement that the Army plans to release 7,000 medical officers, the Tulea County Medical Society is anticipating the return of a number of its in-service members.

IN THE LIBRARY

PENICILLIN AND OTHER ANTIBIOTIC AGENTS: W'allace E. Herrell, M.D., M.S., F.A.C.P., Assistant Professor of Medicine, the Mayo Foundation, University of Minnesota; Consultant in Medicine, Mayo Clinic. Rochester, Minnesota. Pp. 347. Illustrations, some in color. W. B. Saunders Co., Philadelphia and London. 1945.

Although practically every medical journal and periodical carries numerous reports on the use of Penicillin, this book of three hundred and forty-eight pages brings together in a monograph the fundamental, experimental and clinical studies which have been carried out on Penicillin and other Antibiotic agents. There were many contributors to this valuable work and full credit has been given to each of them.

The book is divided into four parts. The first part outlines the historical aspect of the development of Penicillin. In this, a discussion is given to events preceding Flemming's discovery: the work of the Oxford Investigators and Florey's visit to the United States to secure help in its production, because of their difficulties in England caused by the intensive bombing. A considerable portion of this section is given to the method of preparing Penicillin; its physical and chemical properties; its antibacterial activity in vitro and in vivo. Also a brief outline on the absorption, diffusion and excretion of Penicillin as well as methods of standardizing and determining its concentration in the body fluids, is presented.

Part two serves as a treatise on the clinical uses of the drug. In this, the various methods of administration and dosage are given. Many of the more common diseases and some not so common are discussed in detail. The various methods of administration and the results as obtained by the author and his co-workers are pointed out. The infections of the various systems are discussed, namely; infections of the blood stream and the heart, central nervous system, respiratory system, skeletal system, and genito-urinary system, as well as the skin and soft tissues.

Part three deals with Penicilln's effectiveness in various diseases and its toxicity. A comprehensive report is given on its use in the treatment of gas gangrene, actinomycotic infections, rat-bite fever, Vincent's infection, erysipeloid, anthrax and tetanus.

In part four a brief review is given of other antibiotic agents, their reactions and uses in vitro and vivo; Gramicidin, Tyrocidine, Streptothricin and Streptomycin. Some of these may one day take the place of Penicillin, namely, Tyrothricin. This entire monograph is very interesting, primarily because it presents a new phase and an advancement in scientific medicine. It is brief, and is easily read, and in my opinion should occupy an important place on every doctor's desk, since it presents such a comprehensive review of the many uses of Penicillin.—R.A.M.




QUALIFIED LEADERSHIP


