

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

### MANY FALL MEDICAL EVENTS SCHEDULED

American Medical Association Plans Conference On Medical Service In Tulsa For November 13-14. Regional Meeting Of American College of Physicians Scheduled.

An unusually impressive schedule of scientific medical events are in store for members of the Tulsa County Medical Society during the remainder of 1948,

offering a wide range of subjects and speakers. Among the features on the Society's Fall calendar are the following:

- (1)Southern Regional Conference on Medical American Service. Associa-Medical tion, meeting in Tulsa November 13-14 with visiting doctors and medical society officials drawn from an eight-state area.
- (2) Oklahoma Regional Meeting, American College of Physicians,

Tulsa, September 25, 1948, with visiting members of the College and guests from Oklahoma, Arkansas, and Kansas.

(3) Resumption of the Tulsa County Medical Society's regular series of scientific medical programs with the appearance of Dr. Paul H. Holinger, eminent Chicago otolaryngologist, on September 13, 1948. Six other meetings of the Society have been scheduled between now and January 1, 1949.

(4) Resumption of the Postgraduate Study Course in Basic Sciences on Tuesday, September 7, 1948, with successive meetings to be conducted each Tuesday

evening. As in the past, speakers will be drawn primarily from members of the faculty of the University of Oklahoma School of Medicine.

(5) The Oklahoma City Clinical Society's Annual Fall Clinics at Oklahoma City on October 25-29, an event always well attended by Tulsa physicians and noted for its splendid scientific offerings. The annual meeting of the Southern Medical Association will be

held at Miami, Florida, on the same dates.

- (6) A one-day post-graduate course in obstetrics sponsored by the University of Oklahoma School of Medicine, scheduled for September 30 at Tulsa. A similar three-day seminal in pediatrics is planned by the School of Medicine for December 6-8 at Oklahoma City.
- (7) The interim session of the American Medical Association at St. Louis,

November 28 through December 5.

(8) A prospective one-day Conference on Industrial Health, plans for which are still in the planning stage.

The selection of Tulsa as the host city for the American Medical Association's Regional Conference on Medical Service was announced last month following the issuance of an invitation to meet here by the Tulsa County Medical Society and the Oklahoma State Medical Association. Designed primarily for county medical society officers of the Mid-West, the two-day meeting will feature discussions of problems of medical economics. The group will hold its sessions at The Mayo with approximately 150 visiting doctors in attendance. Last year's Conference was held in New Orleans, Louisiana. Arrangements for the program will be handled by the Oklahoma State Medical Association with local hotel and publicity arrangements under the direction of a special committee of the Tulsa County Medical Society.

The Oklahoma Regional Meeting of the American College of Physicians promises to be an outstanding event of September. The program, prepared under the direction of a local committee headed by Dr. E. G. Hyatt, will feature Oklahoma members of the College as speakers, as well as several out-of-state medical leaders. The day-long program will be held at The Mayo, September 25, and will close with a banquet meeting. Dr. Hyatt emphasized that all physicians are invited to attend regardless of membership in the American College of Physicians. A small registration fee will be charged. The complete program of the Meeting is to be found in this issue of The Bulletin.

The principal speaker for the College will be Dr. LeRoy H. Sloan, Professor of Medicine at the University of Illinois School of Medicine. A diplomate of the American Board of Internal Medicine, Dr. Sloan is a graduate of Rush Medical College, Class of 1917. He studied abroad extensively at various times from 1927 to 1935, including postgraduate instruction in Vienna and London. For-

merly a member of the faculty of Rush Medical College, he is now devoting much time to his duties as Regent of the American College of Physicians.

Other speakers will include Dr. Harold H. Jones, Governor of the Kansas District of the College, and a former member of the Board of Governors. A diplomate of the American Board of Internal Medicine, Dr. Jones is now in private practice at Winfield, Kansas. Dr Euclid M. Smith of Hot Springs, Arkansas, will be the third guest speaker.

Regular scientific medical meetings of the Tulsa County Medical Society tee off for the Fall semester on September 13, 1948, with the appearance of Dr. Paul H. Holinger, Chicago otolaryngologist, speaking on the subject "Bronchogenic Tumors." Nationally known for his work in this field, Dr. Holinger will show motion pictures of his studies, one of which was awarded First Prize as the Best Scientific Film Of 1947 at the Brussells Film Festival. Born in 1905, Dr. Holinger received his medical degree from the School of Medicine, Northwestern University, in 1933. He interned at Albany Hospital, Albany, New York, and subsequently served a series of residencies in otolaryngology. He was an Assistant at the celebrated Dr. Chevalier Jackson Bronchogenic Clinic of Temple University Hospital, Philadelphia. Now in practice in Chicago, he is Associate Professor of Otolaryngology at the University of Illinois School of Medicine. He is diplomate of the American Board of Otolaryngology, member of the American Laryngological Association, American Association for Thoracic Surgery, fellow of the American College of Surgeons, Secretary-Treasurer of the American College of Chest Physicians, Secretary of the American Broncho-Esophagological Society, and member of the American Academy of Ophthalmology. He has been honored by many groups for his studies, especially by medical organizations of Mexico, in whose tubercular problem he is particularly interested. A one-day Postgraduate Review In Obstetrics will be conducted in Tulsa on Thursday, September 30, 1948, featuring as guest speaker Dr. W. F. Guerriero, Associate Professor of Obstetrics & Gynecology at Southwestern Medical Foundation of Dallas. Designed for the general practitioner, the purpose of the review is to offer a review of obstetrics and advances in the field to doctors of Eastern Oklahoma.

The program is under the sponsorship of the University of Oklahoma School of Medicine, with local arrangements under the direction of a special committee composed of Dr. William F. Thomas, Jr., Chairman, Dr. W. Carl Lindstrom, and Dr. Charles H. Eads. Meetings will be at Hillcrest Lying-In Hospital, 1615 East 15th Street, Tulsa, in the Staff Room beginning at 9:00 A.M. The Library of the Tulsa County Medical Society has received eighty-three volumes from the bindery, comprising bound editions of the 1947 issues of some fifty journals in all fields of medicine. These bound journals have been catalouged and placed on the shelves. Some of the Library furniture has also been repainted.

Prominently featured in a recent issue of a national magazine is the book, Surgery Through The Ages, by Paul Benton and John H. Hewlett with photographs by Lejaren A. Hiller. First published in 1944, this attractive pictorial history of surgery drew wide acclaim for its concise text and especially for the beauty of the posed photographs. In a recent issue of Popular Photography magazine, Hiller recounted the painstaking effort necessary to produce the photographs, pointing out that many of the pictures were produced after days of trial and error, posing, and preparation of the models. Photographed against striking backgrounds, the models are clothed in carefully executed costumes of the era. The result is a picturesque naturalness which gives an accurate and interesting history of surgery. Surgery Through The Ages is available in the Library of the Tulsa County Medical Society for leisure reading of physicians.

# PRESIDENT'S PAGE


A four-man committee of the Tulsa County Medical Society has been at work for the past several months in revising and rewriting our Constitution & By-Laws. The present document under which the Society is operating was approved in March, 1939, and since that time has become increasingly inadequate to cover the scope of the Society's expanded activities. We are also carrying out the directive of the House of Delegates of the Oklahoma State Medical Association approved last Spring and requiring each component county medical society to examine its Constitution & By-Laws and to submit same to the Association for approval and rechartering. We know that certain portions of our document are in conflict with the Constitution & By-Laws of the State Association—a situation which should be corrected by the work of our Committee.

The Committee will probably complete its work in September after many long nights of work and conference. Another task will follow in preparing the suggested document for distribution to the membership. Finally, you, as a member of the Society, must approve the proposed Constitution & By-Laws or amend it to your satisfaction. Great pains have been taken by the Committee to insure a suitable and adequate document, and many of the new provisions have been inserted only after considerable thought and discussion. I am desireous that each of you will read carefully the final draft of the proposal, present your questions to the Committee, and vote intelligently on the matter. Your understanding of the importance of this work is essential.

#### FORWARD STEPS

It is generally agreed that the Tulsa County Medical Society sadly needs a "home" for its necessary business offices and library. At this time, financially speaking, the Society is on a treadmill. We are going nowhere fast. Money dispensed for rent brings no return beyond service received, and there is no acquisition of an interest in the property rented.

Our Society has certain needs. First, business. Second, professional. Third, social. There is no reason why these cannot be met almost completely by the erection of a "home" for the Society. Business offices, housing for the growing Library, an auditorium for meetings that could also be used for dances and other social events or for athletic pursuits could be readily provided under the same roof.

It will be argued that inflation has made materials excessively expensive as well as scarce but by the same token our income as a profession is higher than it has ever been. It should be possible to carry out this project without any increase in annual dues and without assessment of our membership. Vision, courage, hard work, unselfishness, the utilization of our many resources individually and as a profession collectively will be essentials. Practicality must be

combined with our daring to think in terms of something big. In these times we need more than ever before a close knit organization. The utilization of our County Society building as a medical social center would provide vastly increased opportunity for our membership to become better acquainted and so better prepared to act as a unit.

No attempt is here made to discuss ways and means or policies. What is intended is a challenge to our thinking. The impression obtains at present that we have not had the courage and foresight to "think big." It's time we were about it. — B.W.W.
