

### DR. MATT TO HEAD SOCIETY IN 1953

Dr. Marshall O. Hart Assumes Office As President Of The Tulsa County Medical Society For 1952. Annual Membership Dues Raised To \$135.00.

Dr. John G. Matt, Tulsa proctologist, was named President-Elect of the Tulsa County Medical Society at the organization's annual business meeting and election of officers on December 10, 1951. He will serve in 1953, succeeding Dr. Marshall O. Hart, who assumed office as President on January 1st.

Other officers selected by the Society include Dr. W. D. Hoover, Vice-President; Dr. Paul T. Strong, Secretary-Treasurer; Dr. Ralph A. McGill, named to a five-year term on the Board of Trustees; Dr. I. H. Nelson, elected to a three-year term on the Board of Censors; and Dr. Walter E. Brown and Dr. J. D. Shipp, named as Delegates to the Oklahoma State Medical Association.

Named as alternate delegates were Dr. Earl M. Lusk, Dr. Thomas J. Hardman, Dr. Herbert S. Orr, Dr. I. H. Nelson, Dr. William A. Walker, Dr. L. A. Munding, Dr. Harold J. Black, Dr. Henry S. Browne, Dr. Thomas H. Davis, Dr. Emil E. Palik, and Dr. Clarence C. Hoke.

The annual membership dues for 1952 were fixed at \$68.00, an increase of \$10.00 over the previous year. The dues for the Oklahoma State Medical Association are \$42.00 and the American Medical Association dues will again be \$25.00. This makes a total of \$135.00. Members are asked to pay this sum in full in January if possible. Members electing to pay their dues on an installment basis are required to pay \$75.00 in January and \$60.00 in July. The increase in membership dues, the first for the Tulsa County Medical Society in five years, was necessitated by rising costs of operating

the Executive Offices and Medical Library.

The new President-Elect of the Society, Dr. John G. Matt, is a graduate of the University of Tennessee School of Medicine, Class of 1935. He interned at St. Vincent's Hospital of New York and for several years was a Chief Medical Officer with the United States Lines. Dr. Matt entered practice in Tulsa in 1941. During World War II he served as a Major in the United States Army Medical Corps, including several months in the Philippine Islands. Dr. Matt served three terms as Secretary-Treasurer of the Tulsa County Medical Society and last year as Vice-President. His Society activities include a year as Chairman of the Scientific Works Committee which prepared the scientific program for the 1951 Annual Meeting of the Oklahoma State Medical Association, and several years as a member of the Society's important Library, Blood Center, and Public Policy committees. A specialist in proctology, he was cited in 1951 by the scientific journal, Proctology, for his scientific contributions, and his recent studies in the use of Adenosine-5-Monophate were reported in the Southern Medical Journal and in Colliers Magazine.

The new President, Dr. Marshall O. Hart, is a graduate of the University of Oklahoma School of Medicine, Class of 1927, with postgraduate medical study at Vanderbilt University. He also holds an L.L.B. degree from Tulsa University School of Law and is a member of the Tulsa County and Oklahoma State Bar

## **GOVERNOR MURRAY HERE JANUARY 14TH**

Chief Executive Will Appear As Guest Speaker For Tulsa County Medical Society. Committee Personnel For 1952 Announced By Dr. Hart.

The Honorable Johnston Murray, Governor of Oklahoma, will be guest speaker for members of the Tulsa County Medical Society, their wives and invited guests on Monday, January 14, 1952, at 8:00 P.M. at The Mayo. The popular chief executive has announced his subject as "It's

Time We Saved Ourselves."

This special program will formally inaugurate the administration of Dr. Marshall O. Hart as President of the Tulsa County Medical Society. "We are most honored by the acceptance of Governor Murray of our invitation to speak in Tulsa on January 14th," Dr. Hart said. "It was the belief of the Program Committee that a program of this type by a man of Governor Murray's prominence would be of wide interest to members

of the Society and our friends in other fields of endeavor. We are hoping for a record attendance of members, their wives, and invited guests."

Long friendly to Oklahoma doctors, Governor Murray is expected to call for a continuation of emphasis upon his program to return more elements of government to local control, to encourage the people of Oklahoma to take a greater personal interest in government, and to "hold the line" on governmental expenditures and taxation. Because of the anticipated attendance, the January 14th meeting will be held in the Crystal Ballroom on the 16th floor of The Mayo. There will be no formal business session.

As this issue of The Bulletin went to press, plans of the Program Committee called for the invitation of members of the Auxiliary to the Tulsa County Medical Society, component county medical societies in Oklahoma, officials of the Oklahoma State Medical Association, and

representatives of other professions and groups.

By official action taken last month, the Board of Trustees of the Tulsa County Medical Society reduced the number of meetings of the Society to one each month. It is presently contemplated to hold this meeting on the second Monday of each month with a prominent medical or lay personality guest speaker. Tentatively set for the program of Monday, February 11, 1952, is Dr. N. F. Hicken, Associate Professor of

Dr. Hart has also announced the personnel of 28 standing and special committees of the Society, including six entirely new special committees. (A list of these committees appears in this issue of The Bulletin). Approved by the Board of Trustees, the committees expect to begin work early this month. New to the list are the Rural Health Committee, staffed by members in outlying towns of Tulsa County; the Hospital Advisory and Professional Relations Committee, designed to coordinate hospital problems; the Industrial Relations Committee, es-



#### A RECEPTIVE ATTITUDE

At its annual business meeting last December 10th the Tulsa County Medical Society acted favorably upon a recommendation of the Board of Trustees to increase annual membership dues for 1952 by ten dollars. It was with considerable regret that the Board of Trustees found it necessary to recommend this increase. Coming at a time when rising living costs, mounting taxes, and spiraling costs of operating a professional office are playing havoc with personal income, it was doubly regretable. At the same time the necessity for the increase is more easily understood for the Tulsa County Medical Society—like every business, individual, and organization—is beset by the same financial problems posed by our inflationary economy. The trustees were not unaware that such an increase would burden some members, particularly the younger men just entering practice, whose incomes were small and unstable; fortunately, established concessions in dues made to members during their first two years of practice will offer some relief to a large portion of doctors in this group. The willingness of the membership to authorize this increase, as evinced by the prompt and unanimous vote, was encouraging and creates an impression of understanding by the members of the financial problems which the Society faces.

This increase in dues is the first to be voted by the Tulsa County Medical Society in five years. Several increases have been made in this period by the Oklahoma State Medical Association and the American Medical Association, and these have given the erroneous impression to many members that the local dues have also been increased. As a matter of fact, dues to the Tulsa County Medical Society itself have been increased only twice in a twelve year period. The first of these increases came late during World War II when doubled operating costs were complicated by a record low membership (due to sixty members having entered military service). A second small increase came five years ago when the Society began to pay several thousand dollars in rent for quarters previously furnished without charge. Fifty per cent of the total increase in dues has gone for the rent item. The actual increase attributable to increased operating costs, both for physical items and personnel, is quite small. The bulk of these expenses -some of which are up 300 per cent or more—has been borne by the income from an increasing number of members, rising advertising revenues, and income from the Medical Credit Bureau. The present increase came only when it became apparent the Society could no longer meet its monthly obligations on its present income.

As noted in the editorial columns of the last issue of The Bulletin, the Society is facing an acute housing problem for its rapidly expanding Medical Library and Executive Offices. It is not unlikely that some time in the next two years the membership must be prepared to meet the costs of more adequate housing facilities; this is a must if the Society is to continue to maintain its Medical Library at the standard demanded by the membership. To meet this potential financial problem, as well as the current increase in dues, the membership must adopt a receptive attitude indicating their faith in the value and future of organized medicine.



of The Bulletin went to press. This will be approximately 1,500 more than for 1950. The report also indicated the average cost per pint of blood would be approximately \$5.00, perhaps slightly less, a reduction of one dollar over the previous year.

Special events at the Blood Center last month included a Rose Day when donors received one dozen roses with the compliments of Tulsa Florists. The event helped to publicize National Flower Week as well as the Blood Center. Another event was a Blood Donor Day at Broken Arrow, Oklahoma, conducted by the Blood Center staff with the aid of mobile equipment. A sizeable turnout was recorded.


The replacement of blood has improved materially in the last few weeks, a situation due in some measure to the first-hand knowledge of the Center acquired by 51 members of the Tulsa County Medical Society who served during the absence of a full-time medical director during the period September 25th to November 17th. Meeting an emergency which left the Center without a medical director for several weeks, forty doctors came one half-day each, six came two half-days each, one three half-days, two four half-days, one seven half-days, and one fourteen half-days. The Center was enabled to be kept continuously open until the employment of Dr. Mary V. Graham as a full-time medical director on November 17th. This personal contact with the Blood Center has been reflected in the manner in which a greater number of replacement donors have appeared.

Under a regulation adopted last month by the Blood Center Committee, therapeutic transfusions at the Blood Center have been forbidden. The Committee feels that transfusions of this type should be performed at a hospital or a doctor's office.

tablished to handle problems of industrial medicine; the Postgraduate Study Committee, reactivated after several years to inaugurate special courses of postgraduate study in Tulsa; the Building Committee, a group designed to consider methods of meeting the Society's serious housing problem; and a Telephone Committee, whose function is to notify members by telephone of the Society's regular monthly meetings.

To coordinate the work of the various committees, Dr. Hart has announced plans for a monthly luncheon at The Mayo to which all committee members will be requested to attend. Chairmen of each committee will be expected to attend or to send an official substitute from the committee. Each Chairman will be expected to report on the progress of his Committee's activities at each luncheon meeting. The first luncheon has been scheduled for Monday, January 14, 1952, at 12:15 P.M. at The Mayo. Committee members will be asked to pay for their own luncheon and to send in a reservation card prior to each meeting. This is necessitated by the Hotel's policy of requiring a guaranteed number for luncheon.
