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
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

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

DALLAS UROLOGIST TO SPEAK HERE

Dr. Vincent Vermooten To Address Tulsa Academy of General Practice on November 24. Food and Drug Official Headlines Medical Society Program.

Two outstanding medical programs will be presented for Tulsa doctors during the month of November, one featuring a nationally known urologist as guest

speaker and a second designed to acquaint physicians with some of the prevalent forms of medical quackery.

Dr. Vincent Vermooten, Associate Professor of Urology at Southwestern Medical College, Dallas, Texas, will speak before the Tulsa Academy of General Practice on Monday, November 24, at 8:00 P. M., at Hotel Tulsa. His subject will be "Management of Chronic Urinary Tract Infections."

Two weeks earlier, on Monday, November 10, members of the Tulsa County Medical Society will hear Mr. Samuel Alfend, Chief of the Kansas City District of the United States Food and Drug Administration, Kansas City, Missouri, in a discussion of "The Nostrums and Quackery Encountered by the Federal Food and Drug Administration." The program will be at 8:00 P.M. at The Mayo.

Dr. Vermooten is no stranger to Tulsa

doctors. He appeared as guest speaker before the Tulsa County Medical Society in March, 1950, and the following year participated in a regional meeting of

the Southwestern Urological Association held in Tulsa. A native of South Africa, Dr. Vermooten came to America at an early age. He attended Johns Hopkins University, graduating with the degree of Doctor of Medicine in 1923. His subsequent surgical and urological training was gained in large hospitals Boston, New York, and New Haven, Connecticut. Since 1927 he has been in private practice at Dallas,

Texas, and a member of the faculty of Southwestern Medical College (formerly Baylor University School of Medicine). During World War II he was Chief of the Urological Service at Brooke General Hospital, Fort Sam Houston, Texas, serving with the rank of Lieutenant-Colonel. He is a diplomate of the American Board of Urology, fellow of the American College of Surgeons, Chief of the Urological

The PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

"Man's Inhumanity to Man Makes Countless Thousands Mourn."

The American Academy of General Practice, organized in 1947, has chapters in 48 states and the District of Columbia. Membership in the American Medical Association is a prerequisite to joining. Present membership is in excess of 15,000; continued study, formal and informal postgraduate work, 150 hours every three years for continued membership. Aims briefly stated: To supply good medical and surgical services to the American People. To lend of its effort, finances and cooperation to promote and maintain a free nation. To oppose collectivism, Socialism and Communism, whether offered under that label or a psuedonym. And to secure for its members the opportunity to exercise their talents for which they are trained. That, my friend, is your family doctor. He maintains friendship and goodwill for all, regards the specialties as necessary and their members as his friends. There is no friction between the family doctor and the genuine specialist with very few exceptions. What friction there is comes from some GP who ostensibly is a specialist.

Oklahoma has a Chapter in the American Academy of General Practice, and the Oklahoma City Chapter is very active with some of the finest doctors in Oklahoma as its representatives. Tulsa also has a Chapter which is only one year old but has grown progressively and is destined to greater growth, has brought to Tulsa in the first year of existence some of the finest medical and surgical talent the country offers.

The General Practitioner is entitled to the friendship and cooperation of all physicians and hospitals. He knows and respects his limitations. The ill founded mirage of what would he do if he operated and ran into the unexpected, is best answered by simply doing like the diplomats under whom he trained, when they opened a belly and the pathology lay above the diaphragm. No practictioner, no matter how highly pedigreed, is immune to occasional error. The percentage of malpractice actions across the nation do not serve as an undue indictment of the family doctor. The doctor to whom the public goes for premarital advice, prenatal care, is the family doctor. Many, many times he is their confessor, adviser and counselor in tragedy and death. He always has time and inclination to console the bereaved, he will never assign that task to some social worker. Yes, and believe it or not, in a multiplicity of instances they ask him to recommend a specialist or hospital. His professional fees are seasoned with justice, he believes in live and let live. Every qualified general practitioner should join the Academy and aid in furthering the educational opportunities of the profession.

Do you, my friend, think it fair, honest, and ethical to deny him hospital opportunity, not superior or inferior but equal to the other physicians and surgeons? Do you think he should operate as a referral bureau, losing his identity? All he is asking is a fair "pitch", he expects and believes he will get it when there is mutual

understanding and respect.

Tulsa is fortunate in having two of the state's finest hospitals, Hillcrest Memorial and St. John's. Both are modern, progressive and Democratic. Yes, each of these hospitals has made provision for the general practitioner to admit his patients and practice that medicine and surgery for which he is qualified. The cooperation of the hospitals and the profession must result in a superior service to the sick of body and mind and the fulfillment of that mission every member of the Academy of General Practice is dedicated.


BLUE CROSS-BLUE SHIELD PLANS OWN BUILDING

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
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DIARY OF AN EXECUTIVE SECRETARY

Thursday, Sept. 18: To hearings on proposed legislation for the coming session of the State Legislature conducted at the Chamber of Commerce by the Oklahoma Legislative Council. In the lare afternoon with the President, Dr. Marshall O. Hart, to Bill Skelly's Verdigris ranch for a lavish buffet dinner honoring the Council. Probably 150 in attendance. Our surprise dinner companion, Governor Johnston Murray, told us Time Magazine and newspapers over the country overemphasized criticisms of the profession in his Tulsa County Medical Society speech last January, ignored forty minutes of tribute to the doctors . . . Friday, Sept. 19: With Drs. William Orlando Smith, James W. Kelley, and Vincel Sundgren huddling on plans for social events for the 1953 state meeting here April 13-15. Agreed on a name orchestra, no long-winded banquet speakers . . . Saturday, Sept. 20: With Dr. W. D. Hoover and Dr. G. H. Henry to Lake Texhoma for a two-day meeting of the Council of the Oklahoma State Medical Association. Much interested in plans of Dr. Clinton Gallaher to strengthen medical licensure laws . . . Sunday, Sept. 21: Back from the Lake with Dr. John E. McDonald who told me of his rough treatment before the Magnuson Committee in St. Louis on September 15. Unlimited time for the pro-socialized medicine boys, a quick curfew on Medicine's representatives . . . Monday, Sept. 22: A heavy cold kept me from hearing Philadelphia Internist Dr. Robert W. Kinney at the Tulsa Academy of General Practice meeting . . . Tuesday, Sept. 23: To the meeting of the Health, Recreation, and Climate Committee of the Tulsa Chamber of Commerce. Agreed to supply detailed statistics on number and composition of medical profession, hospitals, health and hospitalization insurance plans . . . Wednesday, Sept. 24: Lunched with Drs. Henry, W. O. Smith, Berg, Matt, and Blocksom on Annual Meeting plans. Agreed on Cimarron Ballroom as a meeting site, two section scientific program, and shift of inaugural ceremonies to the

dinner honoring guest speakers . . . Thursday, Sept. 27: The Military Affairs Committee processed twenty-four availability ratings on Tulsa County Medical Society members. Five, as navy reservists with less than 21 months of service, face recall to active duty in November or December. Nineteen others in Class III (no military service), ages ranging from 34 to 50, may be called up for Selective Service physicals. Friday, Sept. 28: A pleasant session with Mr. Forrest O. Cress, state agent for our new master policy of malpractice insurance, the St. Paul-Mercury Company. Initial sales doing very well with most doctors buying extended coverage beyond the basic \$10,-000-\$30,000 limits . . . Monday, Sept. 29: Dr. W. A. Showman and his Building Committee met to make another try at solving the Society's urgent problem of securing adequate space. Committee authorized a questionnaire among members to determine their interest in building, willingness to indebt themselves to buy or build the Society's own structure . . . Tuesday, Sept. 30: Another month gone. Medical Credit Bureau collections for September nearly \$4,600, an all-time record. Too bad this fine service is not used by more doctors. Met with the Research Committee of the Chamber of Commerce; much progress on the Chamber's gigantic statistical tabulations on all phases of Tulsa economy. In the evening to the Executive Committee of the Health Division, Tulsa Council of Social Agencies, a working, worthwhile organization sparked by Mrs. Hays R. Yandell, Mrs. Averill Stowell, and Executive Secretary Lois Tubb. The Committee formulated a new work program, authorized a study of health conditions in the city and county jails . . . Wednesday, October 1: The Board of Trustees of the Tulsa County Medical Society met with interested parties to discuss the proposed moving of the Tulsa Child Guidance Clinic to a local hospital. Much pros and cons with the matter tabled for further study after an hour and forty minutes of warm

discussion . . . Thursday, October 2: To Indian Hills Country Club with Dick Graham, Executive Secretary of the Cklahoma State Medical Association, for the annual golf tournament. A rousing event with a record 140 in attendance . . . Friday October 3: Stuck the President-Elect, Dr. John G. Matt, for luncheon and a talk of the Society program for next year. Grievances Committee met at 1:00 P. M. for consideration of some problems affecting Blue Cross Plan claims. A very serious-minded group, extremely fair, and merciless on offenders. Met in the evening with the Insurance Committee, attorneys for the insurance companies, for a run-down on malpractice problems . . . Saturday. Oct. 4: To Oklahoma City for the weekend with Dr. James Stevenson to sit in on a discussion of some A.M.A. problems. A pleasure to see Dr. George H. Garrison and Dr. R. Q. Godwin of Oklahoma City, Dr. Paul Champlin of Enid. Home via American Airlines on Sunday . . . Monday, Oct. 6: Meeting with Dr. J. D. Shipp's Legislative Committee to discuss the future of the Reed-Keogh Bill in Congress. Measure, if passed, will permit doctors to establish pension plans with premiums deductible for income tax purposes . . . Tuesday, October 7: A dinner meeting of our Press Relations Committee at Hillcrest Hospital with representatives of the Tulsa World, Tulsa Tribune, KOTV, and Tulsa Association of News Broadcasters. Adopted the American Hospital Association's standards for hospital news releases, set up 24-hour news contact points at both hospitals . . . Wednesday, October 8: Huddled with the Tulsa Chamber of Commerce's Russell S. Rhodes and John Barhydt on the Chamber's campaign to increase memberships in the profession; a long visit with the Cimarron Ballroom's C. M. Cooksey on convention problems and details of our rental contract . . . Thursday, October 9: Sat in the New Members Breakfast at the Chamber of Commerce, enjoyed a visit with two new Tulsa doctors, Dr. Edward M. Schneider and Dr. Harry B. Weinberg of the Shapiro Clinic . . . Friday, October 10: A 1:00 P.M. meeting with the Fraudulent Practices Committee.

This group, thanks in large measure to the interest of Dr. Marshall O. Hart, is slowly eradicating Tulsa of its medical renegades . . . Monday, October 13: Oklahoma University School of Medicine's new Chairman in Medicine, Dr. Stewart M. Wolf, Jr., made a resounding impression at the Tulsa County Medical Society's regular meeting. In a pre-meeting dinner with the Program Committee he told us many interesting things of the controversible Alger Hiss, whom he once met. Started the day at the Community Chest-Red Cross Drive's kickoff breakfast. Quota for the doctors this year is \$13,750 . . . Tuesday, October 14: The Society's advisory committee to the Tulsa Chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis met for a discussion of some current problems. Lent my advisory services to St. John's Hospital in the preparation of their new prospectus for interns and residents. Some nice writing appears in the booklet by each of the Hospital's department heads. In the afternoon closeted with the Tulsa Chamber of Commerce's John Marshall on convention details . . . Wednesday, October 15: Lunched with Drs. S. C. Shepard, Logan A. Spann, Edward L. Moore, and John G. Matt, plotting scientific program for next year. Committee voted to ask the membership for an expression on one meeting or two per month, local speakers versus out-of-town. Matter comes up for discussion at the November 10 meeting . . . Thursday, October 16: Society members had pledged \$10,000 of their Community Chest-Red Cross goal by today with over a hundred cards still out . . . Friday, October 17: All day at the fine International College of Surgeons' regional meeting at Hotel Tulsa. A pity attendance was so poor. Snatched a few moments between sessions to meet with Dr. Alfred R. Sugg of Ada, President of the State Medical Association, Dr. John E. McDonald, and Dr. G. H. Henry to secure a green light on annual meeting plans to date . . . Saturday, October 19: Dr. Hart called to tell me he was enjoying working in his rose garden. It was his first day without some meeting to attend in weeks.



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CIMARRON BALLROOM TO BE SITE OF 1953 CONVENTION

The Cimarron Ballroom, 4th and Denver streets, Tulsa, has been selected as the site of the 60th Annual Meeting of the Oklahoma State Medical Association to be held April 13-15, 1953, it was announced last month by Dr. Gifford H. Henry, General Convention Chairman.

Dr. Henry said the change to the Cimarron Ballroom from The Mayo, site of previous conventions, would increase the number of available commercial exhibits from 34 to 57. In addition, the Ballroom will provide for two separate meeting rooms, ample registration area, easy freight access to exhibits, and a limited number of scientific exhibit booths.

Other news of the 1953 state convention to develop last month included:

An appeal for papers for the scientific program was made by Dr. Berget H. Blocksom, Chairman of the Scientific Works Committee, to all members of the Oklahoma State Medical Association. Dr. Blockson said papers in all fields of medicine were needed and invited Oklahoma doctors to send a synopsis of their proposed paper to his offices at 517 Medical Arts Building, Tulsa. Those whose suggested papers are suitable for the program will be notified. All papers presented on the program will be considered for publication in the Journal of the Oklahoma State Medical Association. Papers should be approximately fifteen minutes in length.

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

The usage of whole blood in Tulsa hospitals took a sharp drop in September with only 651 pints used in contrast to 1,044 used in August, 1952. At the same time replacement rose from 49.3% to 67.2%, an increase due in some measure to replacement of the heavy blood usage in August. Dr. Felix R. Park, Chairman of the Blood Center Committee, appealed to members of the Tulsa County Medical Society to keep replacement at a high level by reminding patient-recipients of their obligation to replace blood. "We are seeking a replacement level of not less than 75%," said Dr. Park, "and this can be reached only through the cooperation of every doctor."

The Tulsa County Red Cross Blood Center has announced the employment of Mr. Robert S. Meredith as Administrator of the Center and the blood program. He assumed his new duties October 15th, replacing Mr. James J. Morton, who served as temporary administrator during the summer months. Mr. Morton has returned to his duties with the Tulsa Board of Education.

Mr. Meredith has been a resident of Tulsa for the past eighteen months and was formerly connected with the Blaw-Knox Construction Company. Previously he was with the Flour Corporation and the Baptist Memorial Hospital, both of Kansas City, Missouri. As Administrator of the Blood Center he will be in charge of the donor recruitment program, public relations, and clerical administration.

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
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
