#### AMA MEETING HAS RECORD ATTENDANCE

House Of Delegates Postpones Action On Resolution Urging Eventual Consolidation Of Osteopathy And Medicine. Over 50,000 Present at New York Meeting.

The American Medical Association chalked up a whopping attendance of 18,000 physicians at its 1953 Annual Meeting in New York City last June 1-5, the largest ever held in the history of the organization. Counting exhibitors and other guests, mostly wives and children of visiting doctors, the convention brought over 50,000 persons to Manhattan.

For the House of Delegates of the AMA it was a comparatively quiet session with anticipated fireworks on the Dr. Paul Hawley controversy failing to materialize. However, the House did take important policy actions on a wide variety of subjects including veterans' medical care, osteopathy, medical ethics, intern training, medical education, and public relations.

Named as the new President-Elect of the AMA was Dr. Walter B. Martin of Norfolk, Virginia, who led Dr. R. B. Robins of Arkansas with a heavy majority vote. Dr. Edward J. McCormick of Toledo, Ohio, elected last year, took office as President in a special inaugural session televised and broadcast on nationwide TV and radio networks.

In summary, the action of the House of Delegates included:

(1) Reaffirmation of its previous stand on the question of medical care to veterans and endorsement of a resolution calling upon the United States Veterans Administration hospitals to limit its care to service-connected disabilities except for treatment of tuberculosis and psychiatric and neurological disorders. A refer-

ence committee failed to recommend a resolution which would have required applicants for VA care to file a statement of income, assets, and liabilities.

- (2) The House condemned generalized statements regarding the ethics of physicians by persons or groups without official status in the American Medical Association but failed to act on eleven resolutions seeking censure of Dr. Paul Hawley, Executive Director of the American College of Surgeons, for well publicized statements accusing physicians of fee-splitting, ghost surgery, unnecessary surgery, and other types of ethics violations. A reference committee, which earlier heard Dr. Hawley defend his actions, pointed out the right of free speech is still a principle of American Democracy but criticized the publication or utterance of ill-considered generalized statements which tend to destroy public confidence in the medical profession. The reference committee report, to the surprise of some delegates, passed the House without further comment.
- (3) The most controversial issue brought before the House of Delegates concerned the question of immediate or deferred action on the report of the Committee for the Study of Relations Between Osteopathy and Medicine. After more than two hours of debate, the House postponed action until the June, 1954, session. The report, in effect, urged the AMA to take positive action to consolidate standards of osteopathic education with those of approved medical edu-

# PRESIDENT'S PAGE

The Tulsa County Medical Society is now in the process of collecting a special assessment of \$20.00 approved by the membership at the regular meeting of May 11th. While several special assessments were levied in recent years by both the Oklahoma State Medical Association and the American Medical Association to combat the threat of state medicine, this is actually only the second time in fifteen years that the local Society has authorized a special assessment. The first, in 1946, went to finance a program of benefits to returning service members. The current assessment will initiate a fund whose principal and accumulated interest will eventually be used to purchase or construct a building suitable to house the Society's Executive Offices and rapidly growing Medical Library. Life and Honorary Members, most of whom are not in practice, are exempt from payment of the assessment as are members who have been in practice less than two years.

I believe that most members of the Tulsa County Medical Society share with me the view that this is a step in the right direction. There can be little question but that the Society must eventually have its own home in a location convenient to both the downtown and residential offices and the major hospitals. Our Medical Library, already accorded national recognition, is growing by leaps and bounds. A permanent home for this vital asset to the profession, planned to allow for yearly expansion, is a "must."

The Sedgwick County Medical Society, a sister society of Wichita, Kansas, which the Tulsa County Medical Society has frequently found to be a pattern for its own progress, has purchased its lot and completed architect's drawings for an attractive modern structure housing a library, offices, and an auditorium. The members are contributing \$200.00 each towards its initial cost. While I wish that our enthusiasm were such to enable us to do the same at once, I believe that as this project grows each of you will appreciate its material value to Tulsa Medicine.





The replacement of blood contributed to Tulsa patients by the Tulsa County Red Cross Blood Center during the first five months of 1953 has been considerably under that of previous years. Only 42.8 per cent of the blood given from January 1 to May 31st has been replaced. This contrasts with a 53.4 per cent in 1952, 53.9 per cent in 1951, and 61.7 per cent in 1950. With elimination of the mobile blood unit visits for the summer and the anticipated summer month slump in donations, the replacement rate may fall even further. In a statement issued last month, Dr. Felix R. Park, Chairman of the Blood Center Committee, called upon members of the Tulsa County Medical Society to give increased personal encouragement to recipients to arrange for the replacement of blood by tamily or friends. Dr. Park said the cooperation was essential if the Center was to maintain a safety factor sufficient to meet any emergencies.

A revised contract between the Tulsa County Red Cross Blood Center and the participating hospitals was agreed upon at a meeting of the directing Committee of the Center and hospital representatives at St. John's Hospital on June 10, 1953. The new contract replaces those signed in 1949. The provisions are substantially the same with the most important changes being in connection with laboratory costs of blood ordered but not used. Under the new regulations, patients will continue to pay the standard \$10.00 hospital charge for the cost of the bottles,

donor and recipient sets, crossmatch, typing, rh factor, and serology. Where the first pint ordered is not used, the patient will pay \$5.00 to defray laboratory charges and \$2.50 for each unused pint thereafter. Doctors should estimate blood requirements as carefully as possible in order to save patients these charges and to eliminate unnecessary hospital laboratory work. The blood itself will continue to be given without charge to all patients; under the new contract each statement of hospital charges rendered the patient will carry a special rubber stamp message stating no charge was made for the blood.

The Medical Advisory Committee to the Center is developing plans to secure more complete reports of reactions due to blood transfusion. A standard reaction report sheet is being made up for use on the floor. Doctors and nurses will be asked to cooperate in seeing that all reactions are noted on these forms. The information will be tabulated and used as a guide in hematology studies to be conducted by the Center's medical personel.

The Blood Center Committee wishes to thank Dr. J. W. Childs for pinch-hitting two days at the Center for Dr. Betty Conrad, Medical Director, when the latter suffered an injured ankle last month.



#### from the files of

#### THE GRIEVANCES COMMITTEE . .

a case study

Editor's Note: This is the fourth in a series of articles dealing with the work of the Grievances Committee of the Tulsa County Medical Society. All names and places have been eliminated and the circumstances of the individual case altered to prevent identification and embarrassment to any person. The basic principles of the cases remain, however, and are printed here to illustrate the various types of complaints received by the Committee from the general public. Actual case files are confidential and are never opened for public inspection.

All Grievances Committees are plagued by the so-called "crank" complaint from irresponsible or prejudiced persons. From the point of view of maintaining good public relations, they present a difficult problem to the Grievances Committee. An arbitrary dismissal of the complaint is certain to react unfavorably as the complainant protests the decision, and yet, much the same results are obtained when a decision unfavorable to the complainant is reached after time and effort have been expended in investigating the case. In all fairness to the complainant, all complaints have to be carefully examined by the Committee and a conciliatory effort made to reduce the degree of bitterness at the decision. All too frequently, the complainant is so prejudiced that no amount of conciliation or explanation will prove effective.

It is obvious that many of the complaints received in the "crank" category come from that group of patients whose objective is to avoid payment of the charges, and it is not uncommon to find the written complaint sprinkled with false statements and allegations. Naturally, the Committee has little sympathy with such cases and makes a firm decision once the true facts of the case have been ascertained. Of more concern are those cases where the complainant has a sincere belief in the righteousness of his position, and no amount of conciliation or explanation will convince him that he has not been wronged. Here are a few typical cases.

Case A: Mr. X consulted a dermatologist about a rash on his body. It was a common ailment which the doctor promptly recognized and effectively treated with a single prescription. Mr. X, a common laborer, was billed a nominal charge for an office call. He complained to the Grievances Committee that the doctor had spent less than five minutes on his case and yet had charged him a sum equal to three or four hours of his income as a laborer. The Decision: This is an age-old complaint of persons in lower economic and educational levels, and is also found occasionally in more prosperous, better-educated groups. The decision obviously favored the doctor as the medical profession recognizes the sale of professional knowledge and skill, not of time, as a basic tenet. While time consumed is a factor in some cases, such as extensive surgery or physical examinations or lengthy diagnostic procedures, the essential charge is for the doctor's knowledge and ability to effectively diagnose and treat. Yet, this principle is never quite acceptable to those persons who think of compensation for services in terms of time expended. While the Committee attempted to illustrate that the doctor had obtained his training by dent of long years of study and expense, the explanation was never quite acceptable. Even though he had been quickly cured of his ailment, the complainant was resentful that he had received so little of the doctor's time.

Case B: Mr. Y consulted an internist about a stomach ailment and during the course of a physical examination was sent to a laboratory for a G.I. series. He subsequently received the usual separate

statement from the laboratory. Mr. Y, by that time, had already paid the individual physician and became impressed with the idea that such payment had included the laboratory charges. In a complaint to the Grievances Committee, he alleged that he had not authorized the laboratory work and that the doctor, having directed him to the laboratory, was responsible for the charges. The Decision: Here again, there was no doubt but that Mr. Y owed the laboratory for the work it had done. Legally, his willingness to participate in the laboratory tests obligated him to make payment. In such cases the Committee is always critical of the referring physician for failing to make an explanation of the nature of laboratory charges. Too often, the doctor simply forgets that all patients are not familiar with such procedures. The additional bill, although completely justified, frequently comes as a surprise to the patient who believes his bill to be paid. Most patients are willing to pay laboratory charges once they have been explained, but some persons are never willing to accept them. Mr. Y could not be convinced and probably continues to believe that he was treated unfairly. It was just another one of those cases which are difficult to conciliate. Yet, a little more foresight and explanation from the doctor in advance of the tests would probably have obliviated the difficulty.

Case C: Mrs. Z placed herself under the care of an allergist, who began a series of patch tests to determine her sensitivity to various substances. When the tests were half completed the patient declined to return further to the doctor's office. The physician billed her a reasonable fee for the materials used in the tests and in consideration of the time and professional talent expended in her behalf. Mrs. Z complained to the Grievances Committee that she had not received any benefit from the tests and was thus freed of any obligation to pay the doctor. The Decision: Once again, the Committee made an obvious decision favoring the physician. Having ascertained that the patient left the care of the doctor for personal reasons of her own which in no way concerned the doctor, the Committee ruled she was obligated to pay the doctor for his time and trouble. No amount of persuasion could convince Mrs. Z otherwise, and the doctor finally collected his bill through a collection agency. Mrs. Z remains firmly convinced that since she received no relief from her allergies, even though she refused to complete the diagnostic tests, that she should not have been charged.

These cases in themselves are not too important, and to the doctor-reader may appear ridiculous as a cause of complaint. However, they appear rather regularly in the files of the Grievances Committee. They are difficult to conciliate and freuently a permanent damage to the doctor-patient relationship is maintained. The only effective answer to the problem appears to be a continuing program of public education to acquaint the patient with the various facets of medical practice. This must be done not only by the profession as a whole but by each individual physician in his day to day practice.





cation to the end that osteopathy would eventually be absorbed into medicine. The approved House action refers the matter to the individual State Associations for further consideration. (The Council of the Oklahoma State Medical Association was to inaugurate discussions on the subject at its meeting of June 28th as this issue of The Bulletin went to press).


(4) The House also abolished a rule in the Essentials of Approved Internship whereby approval of a hospital may be withdrawn if the institution fails to obtain two-thirds of its complement of interns for two successive years.

Mrs. Oveta Culp Hobby, United States Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare, added a glamorous note to the House proceedings with an address on the opening day of the session. She told delegates the present administration in Washington is looking with confidence to the nation's physicians for leadership in meeting the challenge of medical care problems.

Dr. Alfred Blalock of Baltimore, Maryland, was recipient of the Distinguished Service Award for his part in the development of the so-called "Blue Baby" operation.

Other features of the convention included four floors of commercial and scientific exhibits at the Grand Central Palace, scientific section meetings, many annual sessions of various specialty groups, the annual Conference of Presidents and Other Officers on May 31st, and the annual meeting of the Medical Society Executives Conference, organization of lay employees of medical organizations.


