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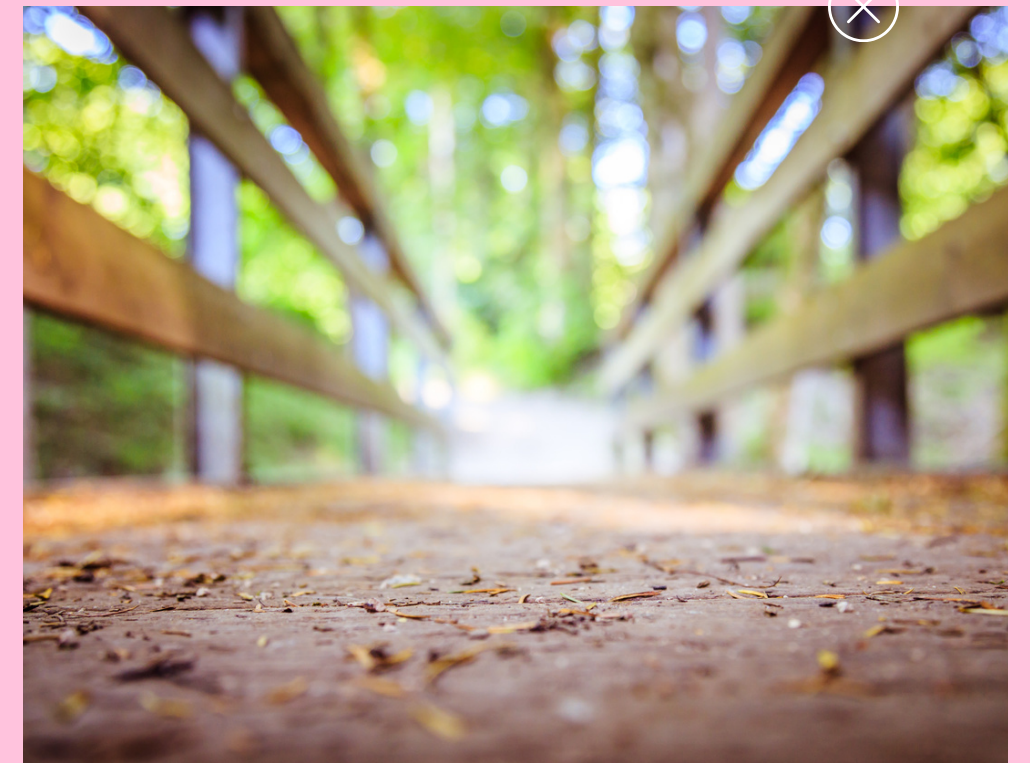

 - Median age: Women 20, Men 18
- "Sexuality Research and Social Policy" (2021): Noted increase in midlife coming out for women
- Popular terms: "Late-blooming lesbians", "Later-in-life lesbians"
- Trend recognized, but precise statistics lacking
