JOINT RESOLUTION relative to the printing and distribution of the annual estimates.

Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States in Congress assembled, That it shall be the duty of the Secretary of the Treasury to cause the estimates of appropriations, which he is by law required to prepare and submit to Congress, to be printed, and copies of the same to be delivered to the Clerk of the House of Representatives in time for distribution at the commencement of each session; and that the Clerk distribute the said estimates in the manner in which documents printed by Congress are directed to be distributed.

NOTE.—In relation to the last item the Postmaster General remarks: On submitting the foregoing I deem it proper here to state that, since the reduction of postage and the consequent depression of the revenue below the point of paying expenses, it has been the practice of the department to estimate only for such a sum in each fiscal year as would enable it to continue its operations until Congress should provide such further amount as would complete the service of the year. Thus, for example, Congress was asked for \$3,500,000 to supply deficiencies in the postal revenue for 1859, because the amount was deemed sufficient to meet the engagements of the department until Congress should, at its approaching session, to terminate on the 4th of March next, provide the additional means required for the remainder of the year 1859. But it will be seen in the foregoing estimate the sum of \$6,000,000 is asked for in aid of the Post Office revenue in 1860, and, as that is an increase of \$2,500,000 over the sum asked for to commence the fiscal year 1859, an explanation is deemed proper. The first or long session of the 36th Congress may not dispose of the usual appropriation bills until near the close of the fiscal year 1860, and therefore it is indispensable to procure an appropriation at the next session nearly sufficient to carry the department through the year. SIR: I have the honor to state that the following sums will be required from the treasury for the service of this department during the current fiscal year ending June 30, 1859:

On submitting the foregoing, I deem it proper here to state that, since the reduction of postage and the consequent depression of the revenue below the point of paying expenses, it has been the practice of the department to estimate only for such a sum in each fiscal year as would enable it to continue its operations until Congress should provide such further amount as would complete the service of the year. Thus, for example, Congress was asked for \$3,500,000 to

supply deficiencies in the postal revenue for 1859, because that amount was deemed sufficient to meet the engagements of the department until Congress should, at its approaching session, to terminate on the 4th March next, provide the additional means required for the remainder of the year 1859.

But it will be seen that, in the foregoing estimate, the sum of \$6,000,000 is asked for in aid of the Post Office revenue in 1860; and as this is an increase of \$2,500,000 over the sum asked for to commence the fiscal year 1859, an explanation is deemed proper. The first or long session of the 36th Congress may not dispose of the usual appropriation bills until near the close of the fiscal year 1860, and therefore it is indispensable to procure an appropriation at the next session nearly sufficient to carry the department through the year. This, it is believed, cannot be accomplished with a less sum than \$6,000,000, in addition to the revenue from postages.

THE MINT.

MINT OF THE UNITED STATES,
Philadelphia, October 27, 1858.

SIR: I have transmitted to the Register of the Treasury the estimates of the amount of money which will be required for the support of the Mint and its branches for the next fiscal year. A copy of these estimates I herewith enclose for your examination, and also a statement of the grounds upon which they are founded.

As the amounts appropriated for the present year, namely, that which ends on the 30th June, 1859, will, in all probability, be sufficient, it will be unnecessary to ask for an additional appropriation.

As a general remark, I may state that the estimated expenses at all the minting establishments for the next fiscal year are about the same as for the current year. But it will be seen that at some of the branches larger appropriations will be required. The causes of these differences I will briefly explain.

1. At the branch mint at San Francisco the sum asked to cover the incidental expenses is larger than last year, because it is calculated that the deductions from depositors available *pro tanto* for such expenses will be less than was estimated for the current year. The difference, to wit, the sum of \$36,344, must be provided for by appropriation. The appropriation asked for wages of workmen is \$1,401 less than the current year.

2. At New Orleans it is considered that there will be an increased coinage during the next fiscal year, and therefore an additional amount for wages and incidental expenses is asked for, viz: \$10,600. The further apparent difference in the appropriations is explained by the fact, that at the commencement of the present year there was an unexpended balance of \$28,200 from former appropriations.

3. The expenditures of the assay office at New York will probably be the same as during the past year; but there were means available during this year that will not be the next, and therefore an appropriation of \$45,000 is now required for wages.

4. At the branch mints at Dahlonega and Charlotte, at the commencement of the present year, there were unexpended balances of former appropriations applicable to the payment of wages of workmen and to the incidental expenses; hence, although the expenses at these branches for the next year are estimated the same as the present, an increase in the appropriations will be required, namely, at Dahlonega to the amount of \$3,680, and at Charlotte to the amount of \$5,600.

MINT OF THE UNITED STATES.

SIR: When I submitted to your consideration, on the 27th ult., the estimated amounts required to be appropriated for the support of the Mint and its branches for the next fiscal year, I was induced to ask for an increased amount for wages of labor and for incidental expenses at the branch mint in New Orleans, because the superintendent of that branch expressed the opinion that its coinage would be increased during the next year, and presented his estimates according to such increase. I have very carefully reconsidered that point, and have reason to believe that the expectations of that officer will not be realized. I think it will be safe if we provide the same means for the next year as for the present one.

The means for the current year may be stated as follows:

COAST SURVEY.

CHESHIRE, CONNECTICUT,
October 14, 1858.

SIR: I have the honor to present for your examination the estimates for the work of the Coast Survey for the next fiscal year, and would respectfully request that, if approved, they may be inserted in your estimates of appropriations.

The exigencies of the government last year caused a large reduction in the amount disposable for continuing the work of the survey. The amount heretofore received from the Land Office for surveying and marking the Florida Keys, and connecting them with the main, under the act of Congress of March 3, 1849, and that from the same office for surveying the islands off the western coast, were not asked for by the Secretary of the Interior. This reduced our available means \$60,000, each of these appropriations having been \$30,000. In addition, by direction of the Treasury Department to reduce the estimates passing through the hands of the Secretary to the lowest figure possible, I recommended that five thousand dollars should be taken from each of the previously estimated sums—for the line across the Florida peninsula, for repairs of vessels, and for fuel and quarters of army officers employed in the survey; there being a sufficient balance from former appropriations on hand to meet the required expenditures. I also recommended the suspension for the year of the publications, the balance of the fund on hand being adequate for this important work in progress.

As in duty bound, I stated at the same time that "A contraction of the scale of the work is not an economical process, as has been shown by comparisons of the survey in former years on different scales. Omitting to complete operations which are begun and in progress will lead to much loss and waste. The signals are temporary, and the operations must follow each other closely to be conducted with economy."

In my last report I took great pains to show when the survey might be essentially completed on the coast of the Atlantic and Gulf of Mexico, if the appropriation remained on the scale of the fiscal year 1857-'58. The reduction made of ninety thousand dollars in available means, of course, renders the rate of progress which I had assumed impossible. I am so unwilling to be responsible for a diminished rate of progress, which must prolong the term of completion of the work, that I must urge upon the department to restore it to its former scale as early as the needs of the government will permit. The coast being of definite extent, and a decided economy resulting from surveying it

on a large scale as compared with a survey upon a smaller scale, it is my duty to make these representations and suggestions.

The present estimates are based upon the rate of the year 1858-'59, and are, I believe, as low as practicable with the amount of work laid out. Should any new emergency require their reduction, the progress must necessarily be diminished.

There is included a small item sufficient to keep the publication force employed in preparing material, but not to publish the observations. The publication of the "records and results" continues to be pressed upon me from various quarters, but we are, I think, warranted for the present in postponing the actual publication. It would be inexpedient to lose the trained employes who prepare the work.

The appropriation now asked for the line across the head of the Florida peninsula will, I believe, half complete that work, and it is better that it should be given this year, so as to keep the work going forward, even if it is not completed. The loss of stations, the growing up of avenues, the deterioration of the accessories of the work, loss of experienced employes, which result from postponing the progress of a work of this sort after it has once been begun, must all be paid for when the work is resumed. It is certain that the saving by this connecting line across the peninsula will be very great; for, to run a main triangulation around the coast of Florida, to connect the triangulation on the Atlantic and Gulf, must needs be a difficult, and therefore an expensive operation.

Under present circumstances I have not advised any increase of the western coast appropriation.

It will thus be seen that I have strictly confined the amount asked to that accorded last year under the adverse and peculiar circumstances of that period.

The work on the Atlantic coast is so far advanced to completion that no very careful or extended examination is needed to see that it must soon be finished. The Gulf coast, too, is well advanced. The discovery of a new entrance to Apalachicola, with twenty or twenty-one feet at low water on the bar, is one of the most striking results of the year's progress.

The triangulation of the Atlantic coast is continuous from within forty miles of the eastern boundary to Shallotte inlet, ten miles above the southern boundary of North Carolina. A glance at the sketch giving the limits designed for the seacoast charts, which accompanies the annual report for 1857, will show what a large portion of the Atlantic coast is embraced within these limits. With an interval on the coast of North and South Carolina of seventy miles, the triangulation extends unbroken to Sapelo entrance, on the coast of Georgia. Three seasons more will probably connect the triangulations on the coast of Georgia, which were commenced at the various entrances, so as to furnish preliminary charts of them without delay. Two parties will work, filling up the interval between the St. Mary's and St. John's river and that between Diego Plains and Cape Florida, one passing southward, and the other northward. The triangulation of the Florida Keys and reef is continuous along a line of a hundred and seventy miles from Cape Florida to the Marquesas, and two or three seasons more will

connect the whole southern part of the main with the keys. The triangulation of Charlotte harbor has been commenced. The coast series on the western coast of Florida extends from Homosassa river to beyond Cedar Keys; over Ocilla river entrance and St. Mark's harbor; from Southwest Cape, east of Apalachicola, to Indian Pass; over St. Andrew's bay, and Pensacola harbor and approaches; from Mobile bay, which it covers, along the coast of Alabama, Mississippi, and Louisiana, to the lower part of Chandeleur Sound, and throughout Lakes Borgne and Pontchartrain to New Orleans; over the mouths of the Mississippi, Isle Dernière, and Caillou bay, Atchafalaya and Côte Blanche bays; on the coast of Texas, over Galveston and East and West bays and the coast, to include Matagorda bay and entrance. A minute reconnaissance has been pushed forward to cover half of the remaining part of the coast, and the triangulation extends over the entrance of the Rio Grande.

Every harbor of importance in California and Oregon, and many in Washington Territory, have been surveyed, and the general coast triangulations, and those of Washington Sound, the Straits of Haro and Rosario, and of Puget's Sound and its dependencies, are well advanced.

These triangulations rest upon fifty-four base lines—ten principal, and forty-four preliminary.

The topography of the immediate shores is based upon the triangulations, and the hydrography uses the shore lines and triangle points in its determinations.

The latitudes and longitudes of the principal headlands, capes, &c., are determined, and the direction (azimuth) of the principal triangle sides. The work is thus, as required by law, a geodetic work. The determinations of longitude by telegraph have greatly added to the accuracy of the survey. The older methods of determining the longitude of points by astronomical observations, and the transportation of chronometers, have been carried out so as to comply with the law requiring the longitude of important points in the survey to be determined from the well established European observatories. Preparations have been made from year to year for carrying forward the longitude points, to connect by telegraph with Europe at the earliest practicable period. Calais, in Maine, and New Orleans, in Louisiana, are now connected by a chain of telegraphic longitudes, including in its links Bangor, Me., Cambridge, Mass., New York, Philadelphia, Washington, D. C., Petersburg, Va., Raleigh and Wilmington, N. C., Columbia, S. C., Macon, Ga., Montgomery and Mobile, Ala. The "American method" of longitudes will bear favorable comparison, it is believed, with any other yet devised. It requires only the telegraphic connexion with Europe to make its application to the first meridian of the survey complete. The numerous triangulation stations are connected for longitudes with the coast points named, and Charleston and Savannah are connected with the series.

The hydrography has closely followed the triangulation and topography, preliminary triangulation being employed when waiting for

the completion of the main work would have too long delayed the hydrography.

The most dangerous parts of the coast, and those offering special facilities for navigation and commerce, have been the first to claim the attention of the survey. The method of separate bases and sections spread all along the coast has permitted this. The closing of the work of one base upon another proves the work, and makes a connected system of the whole. The survey thus loses the rigidity which would confine it to continuous progress, and merely requires steadiness of execution after the plan is once conceived to bring it to a successful close.

The in-shore hydrography is nearly continuous from Cape Neddick, in Maine, to Ocracoke, in North Carolina, and the off-shore work embraces a very large area, including important localities from the coast of New Hampshire to that of Florida and in the Gulf of Mexico. The principal harbors on the Atlantic, south of the coast of Maine, Portland harbor, and other minor ones in that State, have been surveyed. There is a survey or hydrographic reconnaissance of more than three-fourths of the principal ones on the Gulf of Mexico.

The report of last year gives a detail of the progress of the hydrography, and important additions in Maine, New Hampshire, Massachusetts, Maryland, Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, Florida, Louisiana, California, and Washington Territory, have been made since. The coasts of New York, New Jersey, Delaware, and Alabama, have been almost entirely completed.

The charts are regularly kept up with the work in the field and afloat. The amount of the appropriation determines the progress of the survey, and the operations are directed according to the plan submitted with the estimates of appropriation. The directions are submitted to the Secretary of the Treasury by the Superintendent, and, on receiving his approval, are carried out by instructions from the Superintendent to the assistants and others employed in the survey. The work executed is delivered to the office, where the second computations are made and the field maps reduced according to the scales suited to publication. The great effort has been to bring up the back work, and then to keep the computations, drawing, and engraving up with the field work. We are so near this point that there is a steady gain on the back work every year. The computing has overtaken it, and the drawing is not much behind. The engraving division has been considerably increased within two years in reference to this object, and is gaining. No important map or chart lies unused in the archives but is immediately brought into requisition. To systematize the publications as early as a tolerably correct coast line could be had, maps and charts were planned. A description of the different series is given in my report of last year. The coast maps, (in-shore charts) on the scale of $\frac{1}{800,000}$, will be one hundred and thirteen in number, the approximate limits being laid down on a sketch map of the coast of the United States for the guidance of the office. These cover the sounds and bays and the seacoast. The general coast charts, (off-shore charts) on a scale of $\frac{1}{400,000}$, will be sixteen in number. A preliminary series, issued as rapidly as the work is made, and extended from

year to year as the field work and hydrography advance, on a scale of $\frac{1}{200,000}$, will consist of thirty-three charts, embracing both the in and offshore hydrography. Besides these, on various scales adapted to different localities, are harbor charts, and maps and charts of rivers to the head of tide water.

Charts of two hundred and eighty-six harbors, inlets, shoals, sounds, bays, features of the coast, &c., have been drawn, engraved, and published. The annual report of the survey contains usually about seventy charts and sketches, showing the progress of the work, and diffusing important geographical and nautical information. Of the report last year, Congress ordered the publication of 11,200 extra copies, namely, six thousand two hundred by the Senate, and five thousand by the House of Representatives. Of these, eight thousand copies are to be distributed from the Coast Survey Office. The details of this duty from approved lists devolve upon the assistant in charge of the office, who has been given the franking privilege by legislation in order to enable him to fulfil it.

My report of this year will contain a most valuable contribution for the interests of commerce and navigation on our western coast, in a directory containing notices of all the principal harbors, sailing directions for entering them, and for the coast generally, with lists of dangers, aids to navigation, and the like. I propose also to transfer to it portions of a special report made last year to the Treasury Department, showing its progress in different years, and the comparison of its cost and duration with those of other surveys.

All experience has shown that one of the most expensive as well as tedious modes of effecting the survey of the coast of a country is to entrust it to a branch of government organized for some other purpose, and merely pursuing that work as an incident of its service, having no special interest in driving the work to completion, nor in economy of expenditures, because existing independently of the work, and deriving existence and consequence and certain remuneration from other wants of the government. The Coast Survey organization is essentially a temporary one, and all its parts are planned with reference to executing a special work and then ceasing to exist. The work being once determined upon, and the rate of progress which the income of the government renders desirable being established, the time of completion becomes calculable. It is true, existing maps afforded originally very imperfect data, and in many cases altogether deceptive ones, but then year by year this is remedied as the data are more and more derived from the survey itself. During the progress of the survey, the coast is divided into two parts—that subject to change, and that not so. The changing portions are comparatively small in extent. The land work being the most elaborate, and therefore the most expensive part of a geodetic survey, by preserving a sufficient number of stations for reference it becomes essentially a permanent result. If some of these stations are lost it is a matter of little import, as from those which remain the old ones may be replaced or new ones may be established. Too much care cannot be taken to preserve enough points. When this is thoroughly done, all changes of the coast are easily mapped. The geodetic survey does not require

renewal at all. Small triangulations take the place of large ones. The shore lines are easily traced. The hydrography is readily repeated. The expense of these partial surveys, after the main work is done, is insignificant. A comparatively small organization will secure that all the requirements of commerce and navigation are fulfilled. As an incident to this temporary organization is the possibility of promotion by merit, which is one of the cardinal features of the work and to which it owes much of its progress.

The estimates which follow show the particulars of the work proposed for the different parts of the coast for the fiscal year 1859-'60. The sum total, as already stated, is the same as that appropriated in 1858-'59, and less than that of the years immediately preceding. The estimates suppose the same aid from the War and Navy Departments as heretofore. Should any part of this be withheld the proportionate progress of the survey must be diminished. The table gives in parallel columns the estimates for the next fiscal year and the appropriations of the present year, 1858-'59. These appropriations were less by \$30,000 than for the previous year, (1857-'58,) besides which no appropriations were asked by the Interior Department for the survey and marking of the Florida Keys and of the islands off the western coast, making a diminution of \$90,000 in the available means for the progress of the survey in 1858-'59.

The item for pay of engineers had previously been included in the naval estimates, but the exigencies of the service induced the withdrawal of the naval engineers attached to coast survey steamers.

SIR: I have the honor, by direction of this Board, respectfully to submit for your examination and consideration the accompanying estimates of funds which will be required for the support and maintenance of the light-house establishment service, in addition to the estimated balances under the respective heads of appropriation which will be available at the close of the present fiscal year, for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1860.

These estimates are exhibited in tabular form from No. 1 to 6, inclusive, with explanatory tables in detail marked A, B, C, D, E, F, G, H, I, J, K, L and M.

It will be observed that the estimate for repairs and incidental expenses of light-houses on the Atlantic, Gulf and lake coasts for the fiscal year of 1859-'60 has been reduced one third; a small reduction made on account of support of light-vessels; a small amount only asked for commissions on disbursements by collectors of customs acting as superintendents of lights, and no additional appropriation is asked for visiting and inspecting lights.

The sum asked to continue the work on Minot's Ledge light-house, authorized in 1852, is explained in No. 4.

The only additional appropriations, beyond balances which it is estimated will be available at the close of the present fiscal year for the Pacific coast, are for support of the light-house service steam tender, now on that coast by authority of law, and for estimated losses of buoys, chains, sinkers, paints, &c., for them, amounting to \$40,000 in the aggregate.

The detailed tables from A to M, inclusive, will, it is believed, explain fully, and it is hoped satisfactorily, the estimates for 1859-'60, to which is appended a list of light-keepers.

Although the appropriation for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1859, was \$1,380,652 65, (as stated in the proper column of the present estimate,) the estimate for that year was \$1,980,928 00, from which was deducted \$600,275 35 on account of the "Appropriation for subsistence of Utah expedition," leaving the sum of \$1,380,652 65 to be then appropriated.

It will now be seen that the *present estimate* is less than that for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1859.

NOTE.—In addition to subsisting the regular troops, employés, and Indians at the estimated price of the ration, (25 cents,) the following expenses are included: preserving provisions, erecting and repairing bake-ovens. Besides, there are large losses from wastage and deterioration of provisions at all the southern and western posts in all the old States, and at all the posts in California, Utah, New Mexico, and Oregon.

SIR: I have the honor to submit the estimates, due from this office, for the several items of army expenditures for services and supplies, for the fiscal year commencing the 1st of July next and ending the 30th of June, 1860.

Every item of expenditure through the Quartermaster's Department is more or less contingent. The allowances of fuel, forage and straw for bedding are limited in quantity by the regulations of the War Department, made in accordance with law; but the cost of the articles

depends upon the position occupied by the troops and the resources of the country in which they operate, or adjacent to their posts. Not only does the cost of these supplies depend upon circumstances which the officers of this department cannot control, but all the expenditures made through the department depend upon exigencies as they arise, which must be promptly met or every operation will be a failure, and the public interests, as well as the military character of the nation, will suffer. Every movement of the troops increases the transportation; and the necessity of placing and supporting them on distant frontiers, and often at points where there is neither timber for building nor wood or coal for fuel, increases greatly the expense of covering and warming them. The success of military operations, particularly on so vast a theatre as that covered by our little army, depends mainly upon the promptness and efficiency of the Quartermaster's Department. There can be no efficiency where the means are not at hand to meet all demands of the service as they arise. There is no economy in reducing estimates below the probable wants of the service. Deficiencies may be thus produced, claimants embarrassed, and the public expenditures increased. To save money, the only way is to get clear of the objects of expenditure. The officers of the Quartermaster's Department have but little control over them.

Paper marked A is the estimate for the Quartermaster's Department proper in all its branches.

The item of fuel has been calculated for the full organization of the army, according to its present distribution, at the cost at the several posts occupied. From this has been deducted the amount which will probably be supplied by the labor of the troops and the operatives of the Quartermaster's Department at the frontier posts and in the field. This item is ten thousand dollars less than the appropriation for the present year. This is as great a reduction as I can venture to make, after a close examination of the subject in all its details.

The item of forage has been calculated for a full supply for the animals in the public service, and at present prices, at the depôts, posts, and in the sections of country where the troops are stationed. There is an increase of \$110,000 over the appropriation for the present year, but the number of animals have been increased from 9,100 to 13,500. The latter number of animals cannot be reduced if the operations in New Mexico, Oregon and Washington continue upon the present scale; indeed, the probability is that the number must be greatly increased. At the calculation for the present number, and at present prices, the cost would be over \$2,400,000. It will be seen that a reduction of \$740,000 has been made for time when the animals shall be grazed. That is as large a deduction as can be safely made.

Straw and stationery are small items. A reduction of \$5,000 has been made in the latter. Both are believed to be sufficient if economically applied.

The item for incidental expenses is \$57,000 more than the appropriation for the present year. A small part of that increase arises from the expenses of the interment of officers of the army, being by the present regulations chargeable to this item of the Quartermaster's Department—formerly, when allowed at all, the expenditures were

charged to the contingencies of the army—it was only under very peculiar circumstances, however, that they were ever allowed; but the principal increase arises from the great increase of laborers, guides, interpreters, &c., rendered necessary in the operations against the Indians. This item will be seen to be contingent in almost all its particulars, and the chance is that every dollar will be required.

The item for mounts and remounts is to keep the mounted service efficient. Some of the corps and companies have been allowed, by the commanders in the field, or by the War Department, to increase the number of mounted men; but the estimate is the same as the appropriation for this year. Should more of the corps be allowed to mount the maximum of their force, a larger sum will be required.

The item for mileage of officers when travelling on military duty, without troops, escorts, or military supplies, is five thousand dollars less than the appropriation of the present year; it will probably be sufficient, but will not bear reduction.

The item for the transportation of the army, including that of clothing, equipments, subsistence, medical and hospital supplies, ordnance, arms and ordnance stores, troops' and quartermaster's stores, is ninety thousand dollars more than the appropriation for the present year. When it is considered that the expenses of the war in Oregon and Washington Territories will be greatly increased by the greatly increased prices of labor and supplies of all kinds, consequent upon the Frazer river gold excitement, the increase will probably not be sufficient. The amount required will certainly not be more than sufficient, unless the war should be ended much sooner than the present prospects render probable.

The item for barracks and quarters consists of rents, constructions, and repairs. Of the first \$49,308 is for the rent of officers' quarters, or for the commutation in money allowed them for rent; the sum of \$65,692 is for the rent of barracks for troops, of sites for frontier posts, of lands for summer cantonments, fields for drill, and storehouses and storage for supplies, and grounds on which to graze horses and other public animals; and the sum of \$585,000 is for the construction of such buildings as may be required during the year, and repairs to the public buildings occupied by the troops for the same period throughout our extensive territories. The aggregate estimate for barracks and quarters is ninety thousand dollars less than the appropriation for the same objects for the present fiscal year.

Paper marked B is the estimate for clothing, camp and garrison equipage for the army, including the expenses of the clothing arsenal at Philadelphia, where the clothing, camp and garrison equipage for the army are mostly prepared. The increase of this over the last estimate arises from various causes, viz: An additional clerk at \$1,200, rendered necessary by the greatly increased business at the arsenal, owing to the increase of the army; an increase of laborers from the same cause, and in some few instances an increase of compensation to operators whose services it is desirable to retain; an increase in the cost of advertising for proposals for contracts, from the greater number of newspapers now employed, in order to invite wider competition; the substitution of a more costly, but, at the same time, a more com-

fortable tent for officers and men. But the great increase is caused by the change in the uniform, which alone adds about \$79,000 to the aggregate cost.

After the closest scrutiny into all the circumstances of the service, and with the utmost desire to make every proper reduction, I present these estimates as the lowest, in all the items, which I can venture to present consistently with a just regard to the public interests.

REMARKS.—Fuel.—This item is reduced below the appropriation for the present year ten thousand dollars; a greater reduction could not safely be made, for were the full allowance to which the army is entitled by the regulations to be supplied, the cost, at present prices, would be \$206,652; but the troops in the field, as well as at some of the posts, supply themselves with fuel. I have, in consequence, made a deduction of \$46,652.

Forage.—The estimate for the present fiscal year was for 12,533, and this estimate is for 16,957 horses, mules and oxen, being for an increase of 4,424 animals. The cost of the forage for so large a number of animals, at the prices ascertained from the last reports and from the last accounts received from the different sections of our extensive territory, would amount to a small fraction over two million four hundred thousand dollars, were the full ration to be at all times issued; but it is the duty of all officers, by the present regulations, to reduce the allowance when there is grass in the field or near the depots, posts and stations, where the horses and other animals may graze when not on severe duty. The increase for this item over the appropriation for the present year is \$110,000, a small increase when the great increase of animals is considered. The amount now estimated will certainly be required, and we will be fortunate if it be sufficient.

Straw for soldiers' bedding is precisely the same as for the present year; and in the item for *stationery* less by \$5,000; both are small items and will probably be enough for the service of the present year.

REMARKS.—This item is one which, as I remarked on presenting my last estimate, cannot be controlled by any authority. Wheresoever the troops are required, they, with their supplies, must be placed. The greater portion of them are serving in sections of our extensive territories difficult of access, and almost without resources. Our army, small as it is, covers more ground and carries on more extended operations than ten times its numbers in any other section of the globe. This item is \$90,000 more than the appropriation for this year; the addition is made to meet the increased operations in New Mexico, Washington, and Oregon,

REMARKS.—*Rents*.—Of this sum, \$49,303 is for the rent of officers' quarters, or commutation allowed in lieu of them, in which there has been a slight reduction. The remainder is for the rent of offices, store-houses, buildings for barracks, sites for temporary posts and encampments, and grounds for drill.

Construction and repairs.—This is an item which cannot be well controlled; wheresoever the troops may be placed, when not in the field, or in camps of instruction, particularly in the winter season, and at permanent outposts, they must be covered comfortably. The sick must have hospitals; the animals must be stabled, and there must be secure covering for the stores. The expenditures on these accounts are constant, and, though generally small at the greater number of the posts, they are sometimes necessarily pretty large at a few of the posts, and in the aggregate amount to large sums.

It will be seen that this estimate is \$90,000 less than the appropriation for the present year. I am a little apprehensive that the sum asked will not be sufficient; less certainly will not.

In regard to all the items of the estimate, it is proper to remark, that to make them sufficient to supply the absolute wants, and to maintain the present efficiency of the service, will require all the energy of the officers of the Quartermaster's Department, and of the officers of the line, with all the support which can be given to them by the War Department, to limit the expenditures to objects absolutely necessary.

By the increased business at the arsenal, in consequence of the increase of the army, an additional clerk has become necessary. I have estimated for one at \$1,200. For the same reason a greater number of operatives have become necessary, and, in some few instances, the compensation of employes has necessarily been increased. The cost of advertising for proposals for contracts for materials used at the arsenal in the manufactures of clothing and equipage, is increased by a greater number of newspapers being now employed than formerly.

Explanations in detail of the foregoing estimate.

1. *Armament of fortifications.*—The object of this item of the estimate is to procure sea coast and garrison cannon, and the means of mounting and equipping them, for the defence of the Atlantic, Gulf, Lake, and Pacific coasts of the United States, including the repair and preservation of the armament already in place. The amount appropriated will be applicable to the purchase of the cannon mentioned, and materials for sea coast and garrison carriages with their implements and equipments, and payment of the mechanics at the arsenals employed in their manufacture. The amount asked for is the same as that of last year's appropriation.

2. *Ordnance service.*—The amount of this item is required to defray the expenses of receiving, issuing, and keeping in good order the arms, ordnance stores, and other public property in use and in store at the various arsenals and ordnance depôts in the United States; and for the purchase of fuel, stationery, forage, and for all other incidental expenses of the ordnance service. It is the same as last year's appropriation.

3. *Ordnance, ordnance stores and supplies*—The amount of this item of the estimate is to procure siege and field guns, carriages, caissons, and battery wagons, with their implements, equipments, and harness; side-arms and accoutrements for the different kinds of troops composing the army, and to defray the expense of making and repairing the same; and for the purchase of materials for and preparing ammunition; and for procuring horse equipments for the mounted troops. Same amount as appropriated last year.

4. *National armories.*—The amount of this item of the estimate is required to carry on the manufacture of arms at the national armories during the year. It is the same sum that was appropriated last year.

5. *Repairs and improvements and new machinery at Springfield armory.*

Remarks.

1. These walls have been completed to the point formerly occupied by the middle water shop dam. By continuing the raceway from this point about 300 yards to intersect the stream below, the wheels at the new shop will be greatly relieved of back water.

2. This machinery has recently been received. Great solidity and firmness are indispensably necessary for its successful operation.

3. This is requisite for the preservation of the walls of the buildings, bridge, dam, and raceway, as well as for the general appearance and convenience of the grounds.

4. A temporary structure is now used ; but it affords neither a safe, convenient, nor proper shelter.

5. Necessary for properly furnishing the new water and other shops for the rapid and economical fabrication of arms.

6. Necessary for keeping in order roads, culverts, fences, trees, walks, &c.

7. Necessary for preservation of United States lands and roads.

8. This bridge the government is obliged to maintain, and as the old wooden structure is to be removed a stone bridge is deemed to be most economical.

9. An iron fence is built on three sides of the government lands.

This is necessary to continue the fence according to the original design.

10. The arsenals and the houses of the paymaster, master armorer, and clerks require painting to preserve former coatings of paint, as well as for their proper appearance.

11. This sum is necessary to complete the road to the railroad depôt, to facilitate the transportation of coal, iron, arms, &c., to and from the depôt.

1. More shop room is essentially necessary at this factory than we now have to facilitate the fabrication of the new rifle, and wherein the needful machinery can be put in position.

2. The machinery is necessary for facilitating the economical manufacture of arms—some of the machines to replace old ones now in use, badly adapted to the work, others for entirely new operations consequent on a change of arms.

3. The building in which all this work for both factories is now done is entirely too small for the business, and is so constructed as to cause the machine grindstones to be dangerously crowded. The addition proposed will obviate these defects.

4. The embankment to be removed obstructs very injuriously the volume of water in the armory canal, and should be removed.

5. By the construction of this wall a much greater volume of water can be obtained, and the damage done by the burrowing of muskrats in the embankment of the armory canal will cease.

6. This work of cleaning out the canal has become necessary from a great accumulation of debris.

7. This fence is essential for the preservation of the grounds around the new magazine and new stock-house.

8. The appropriation made at the last session of Congress embraced 40,000 dollars for this dam as estimated by the Superintendent of the armory. But the construction of the work having been confided to a professional engineer, and his estimate being that the work, to be permanently and properly done, will cost \$66,000, this additional sum is now asked.

HEADQUARTERS CORPS OF ENGINEERS,

Item No. 3 of the foregoing estimate for Military Academy, is increased in consequence of having to provide for members of the Board of Visitors from Oregon and Minnesota, distant places, from which, under the act of Congress, members of the Board must be taken every other year.

Item No. 4 is less than the last year's estimate by the sum of \$1,095, the balance on hand after purchasing the year's supply of forage.

Item No. 5 is deemed amply sufficient for the gradual substitution of good for worn out, disabled, or dangerous horses. The sale of any condemned horses there may be, with the funds now available, and a regular annual appropriation, is considered sufficient for all needful purposes.

Item No. 6. The numerous buildings belonging to the United States and in constant use of officers, many of them constructed forty years since, call for constant repairs, rendering this item liable to be frequently called for. Renewing some parts of the slate roofs is just now very necessary.

Item No. 7. Some additional models have already been procured, including the skeleton of the horse, several hoofs, with and without shoes, and diseases common to bones of the horse. It is desirable to procure other models during the next two years.

Item No. 8. The most indispensable matter now calling for attention is the supply of water for the cadets and families resident on the Point. At this time the supply has failed to such a degree that every house on the plain, with one exception, has to be furnished by hauling water from a single pump daily. The cadets have to resort to the same pump for their wants in quarters, and none can be had for the bathing rooms. With the funds now on hand, the sum now asked for, and possibly a like sum a year hence, I cannot doubt the practicability of insuring a competent and permanent supply, with its extension to all the principal buildings on the post. It can only be done by constructing a

dam across a mountain gorge, which has been commenced, and upon which work will again be renewed when some existing impediments are overcome; one of which is to find shelter on the post for the necessary labor; another, that the work has to be so conducted as not to interfere with the only source of supply part of the year from the same mountain valley.

Item No. 9 is for renewing targets of different kinds, destroyed by the annual artillery practice, instructing the cadets at the siege and sea-coast batteries.

Item No. 10. The Academic Board have recommended that riding shall not be allowed during the hours from 8 to 4, appropriated to study and recitation, and that instruction in this branch be given from 4 to 6 p. m. To do so during that period of the year when the sun is below the horizon at those hours the riding hall must be lighted, and this item is introduced to extend the gas work (now in successful operation, from previous appropriations, throughout the cadets' barracks, the mess hall, its kitchen, bakery, &c., the hospital and Academic buildings, together with 29 other public buildings, by which the main pipe now passes,) to the stables, riding hall, and adjacent buildings.

Item No. 11. This item is contingent, and may be necessary to furnish some additional, and replace worn out furniture in the cadets' hospital.

Items Nos. 12, 13, 14, and 15 are items that have become very necessary, on the grounds of cleanliness and health, already too long neglected.

Item No. 16. During the past year a warming apparatus was tested in the recitation rooms used by the Professor of Philosophy. It proved very satisfactory, combining pure air never overheated, yet warm enough during the coldest days of last winter. The present arrangement, in all other parts of the building, is that of iron stoves in each room, the air of which, when occupied by from 10 to 15 cadets for 1½ to 2 hours, becomes offensively impure—an evil it is hoped to remedy by extending the low pressure steam apparatus advantageously commenced, and which removes all danger from fire in the large building, containing much valuable apparatus, models, minerals, &c.

Item No. 17. Frequent occasions render it expedient to shore up the second floors of the academic building, to guard against serious disasters. These temporary shore timbers have to be removed whenever the lower rooms are needed for fencing and other exercises, (a part of every year.) This building, 276 feet in length by 75 in breadth, finished in 1838, requires new floors in part and extensive repairs to the roof, before making which increased strength should be given, to do away with all apprehension of danger by overloading the second story rooms. The sum now asked for is to guard first against accidents by the yielding of the floor timbers; the roof and parts of the floors can remain for a second and third year.

SIR: I have the honor to submit herewith the following estimates of appropriations required for this branch of the public service for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1860, viz:

Estimates of appropriations required for salaries in this office, including an additional watchman and laborer for extra rooms assigned to us in another part of this building.

Estimate for contingent expenses of same.

Estimate of appropriations for collecting revenue from the sale of public lands.

Estimate for salaries, &c., in offices of surveyors general.

Estimate for surveying the public lands.

Estimate of the probable amounts for the 2, 3 and 5 per cent. to certain States, and for refunding, &c.

The estimates for the contingent expenses of this office have been reduced in the sum of \$10,000 below the appropriations for the current fiscal year, and it is believed the amount asked will be sufficient for the service of the next fiscal year.

The estimates for collecting the revenue from lands have necessarily been increased, as there will be no balances of former appropriations applicable to the next fiscal year; and should the expenses of the current and last two quarters of the present fiscal year equal those of the first quarter, a deficiency of \$25,131 will result in the last quarter; but no deficiency estimate need now be submitted, as Congress will be in session at the time such deficiency possibly may occur.

It will be perceived that the whole amount now asked for, for collecting revenue for the service of the fiscal year ending June 30, 1860, is \$356,800, and it is anticipated during that period the sales of public lands will be materially increased, rendering the whole of this appropriation necessary. The expenses of collecting revenue from public lands during the first quarter of the current year were \$77,137, or \$308,548 for the whole year, and the sales for this quarter are small. The whole amount available for the year, including balances of former appropriations, was \$283,417, showing a probable deficiency at the end of the year of upwards of \$25,000, as herein before indicated.

It has also been found necessary to increase the estimates for repayments under the acts of 1825 and 1842, in view of the large amounts which must be refunded on swamp land sales and sales under the graduation law.

EXPLANATION OF THE FOREGOING ESTIMATE.

11. The usual appropriations have been \$3,000. The appropriation for the year ending June 30, 1859, was \$1,500, owing to balance on hand of former appropriations; the actual expenses being \$1,800 a year, among which pay of messenger was \$900, and rent \$500.
14. The prominent items of the expenses are: rent of office, \$5,400; pay of messenger, \$900, and incidentals, such as fuel, stationery, &c., \$850 a year.
21. The surveyor general estimates \$1,500 to enable him to have bound the plats, field-notes, descriptive notes of surveys, and other numerous archives which have accumulated in his office since the commencement of the surveying operations.
26. The organic act fixes \$4,000 per annum. Owing to the forcible closing of the surveyor general's office on the part of the Mormons, no estimate was submitted for the year. There being, however, a balance of \$2,500 of former appropriations, and deeming it likely that surveys will be resumed during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1860, the clerical force will be required to restore missing documents of former surveys and to attend to the regular business; for this reason the sum of \$1,500 is estimated, which, with the balance as aforesaid, will be equal to \$4,000.
27. The usual estimate has been \$3,000 a year. The surveyor general having been commissioned, may enter upon his duties at a period requiring a building for an office, and \$2,500 to pay rent thereof, say \$1,300 pay of messenger, and other incidental expenses, such as stationery, fuel, furniture, &c.
30. The fixed compensation to the clerks in the surveyors general offices by organic laws having proved insufficient, special estimate has been submitted for that purpose, and has been apportioned to the several surveying districts for upwards of twenty years past. The present estimate of \$41,000 in addition to the estimated balance of \$5,000 is less by \$10,000 than the aggregate estimates of the surveyors general amount to for the service during the next fiscal year.

EXPLANATION OF THE FOREGOING ESTIMATES.

1. The usual estimate has been \$115,000. That for the present year, \$40,000, owing to balances of former appropriations which were then on hand, but which will have been absorbed at the end of the year. The aggregate estimates submitted by surveyors general, for the next year, amount to \$162,000, in Minnesota, Florida, Louisiana, Illinois, and Missouri. With the view, however, to the retrenchment of the expenditures of the surveying service, their respective estimates have been curtailed as much as is consistent with a due regard to the requirements of the surveys, and the sum of \$115,000 only is herewith submitted.
2. The surveyor general estimates \$106,000, and is the lowest of any heretofore submitted for the surveying service in California during the several years past, but one. \$60,000 of this is for the liabilities which were not before this office at the time the deficiency estimate of \$220,000 was submitted to the department, on the 25th of September, 1857, but which have been since reported by the present surveyor general, with the statement that this amount covers *all the accounts* for the survey of public lands and private land claims in California, under contracts made by his predecessor in office, *prior to June 30, 1857*, and in excess of the appropriation of \$50,000 for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1857, and in disregard of official instructions. And \$3,000 for rent of surveyor general's office in California, fuel, books, stationery, &c., for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1859; no appropriations since March 3, 1855, having been made for these purposes, and the former balances having proved inadequate. Hence this estimate is submitted.
3. The surveyor general estimates \$200,000; but, in consideration of Indian hostilities and the uncertainty of extinguishment of Indian title to lands in New Mexico, the estimate is deemed too high, and with the view of limiting the surveys to undisputed lands of the character fit for agriculture, the same is reduced to \$20,000.
4. The surveyor general estimates \$185,560. The usual estimates of former years having been found more than sufficient for the exigencies of the surveying in Kansas and Nebraska, the estimate for the next year is reduced to \$40,000, in addition to \$14,000, the amount of surveying liabilities incurred by the late surveyor general during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1855, 1856, 1857, and 1858, over and above those authorized for the corresponding years, amounting to \$300,000, which is only 5 per cent. on the aggregate, and is considered small when compared with the extent of the surveys performed. The excess consists mainly in the difference between the *estimated liabilities under contract, while entering into and the actual amount of surveys necessarily performed* in the field under the same; and also it is partly owing to special surveys and resurveys ordered by this office, with the view to protect vested rights growing out of treaty stipulations, and maintaining the integrity of the public surveys.
5. With the view to a speedy closing of the offices of the surveyors general of Arkansas, Illinois and Missouri, Louisiana and Florida, an increased clerical force is deemed necessary for the completion of the surveying records and the delivery of the same to the respective States, thereby saving the expenses of the maintenance of those offices for years to come.
6. The balance of \$19,650 84 not being applicable for the salary of a clerk, the usual \$2,000 is estimated for that purpose.
7. The surveyor general estimates \$44,400. No appropriation for this service has been made for several years past; the balances will have been exhausted, and the \$20,000 is therefore regarded as necessary for the service.
8. The surveyor general estimates \$47,600. Under the belief that the surveys in the field may be checked by Indian difficulties now existing, and for the reason that there exists a balance of an appropriation heretofore made, say \$20,000, the estimate of only \$10,000 additional is submitted for the next fiscal year.
9. The exigency existing for closing the Minnesota surveys upon the western boundary thereof, and with the view of guarding against crossing the boundary and entering the adjoining district not under the superintendency of the surveyor general of Minnesota, the estimate of \$5,000 is submitted for the running and marking the boundary, which is at the rate of about \$40 per mile.

ESTIMATES OF APPROPRIATIONS.

OFFICE OF INDIAN AFFAIRS, *October 29, 1858.*

SIR: I have the honor to transmit herewith estimates of funds required for "fulfilling treaties" with the various Indian tribes, and for the general current expenses of the Indian service for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1860, with accompanying copies of estimates from the different superintendents, &c., marked from A to J.

It will be seen that on this occasion this office has been enabled, in consequence of making timely arrangements therefor, to embrace in one general statement all funds that will be required for the Indian service for the ensuing fiscal year, thus avoiding the inconvenience of rendering additional and supplemental estimates, as heretofore practiced.

From the comparative statement attached to these estimates the aggregate of amounts estimated for the service for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1859, the appropriations made by Congress thereon, and that for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1860, is shown, from which it will be perceived that the estimates now made by the department for the ensuing fiscal year is \$1,227,228 82 less than the estimates made to Congress at its last session, and \$744,829 51 less than was appropriated therefor.

In recommending the reduction of the estimates above referred to, which have met with your approbation, I have had in view the amounts of funds on hand applicable to the service in the different sections where the reductions have been made, which I believe will suffice, with the sums now asked for, to sustain its operation, with a general judicious economy for the remainder of the present year and for that ending June 30, 1860, unless circumstances of a more unfavorable character than are now foreseen should arise. Should the appropriations be made in accordance therewith, early information will be given to the respective superintendents of the initiation of such economical policy, with instructions to be prepared to conform thereto in every respect.

With regard to the estimate of appropriations required by the Treasury Department of the balances of funds arising therefrom, that may be applied to the wants of the service for the "next fiscal year," I have to state that in compliance, as far as practicable, the specific sums are placed in the middle column, after the form prescribed in the Register's office, and is as near an approximation of what will be the probable result, in this respect, as the peculiar circumstances attending these funds will admit of; remarking that the appropriations for the Indian service, particularly all those for treaty stipulations, when not remitted for disbursement, are simply held in trust by the department for the Indians, subject to draft at any time that their necessities and welfare may demand it, or the policy of the department may render it expedient and requisite.

SIR: Herewith I have the honor to submit my estimates for the Indian service within this superintendency for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1860.

As you will perceive, the estimates are of two classes, one for complying with treaty stipulations and one for purposes not provided for by treaties.

In my estimates for treaty purposes I have included a greater amount for compensation of teachers, blacksmiths, physicians, and farmers, than has heretofore been appropriated. I deemed this necessary as it is impossible to procure the services of that class of employes at the rates heretofore provided by the appropriations.

The Indians claim that they have a right to this service irrespective of the cost, and urge with a great degree of justice that the government has solemnly bound itself by treaty stipulations to have the services performed.

I would therefore respectfully recommend that the amounts as estimated be appropriated for the service. It will have a tendency to quiet the Indians and convince them that the government intends to comply with the provisions of the treaties.

The estimates for purposes not provided for by treaty stipulations are in detail and as low as the service would admit of, and are, in fact, much lower than the estimates submitted by the respective agents.

As you will perceive, I have only estimated for half rations of beef and flour for the four thousand Indians located at the Grand Ronde, Seletz, and Umpqua. It is contemplated that those Indians will be

able to obtain the remainder of their subsistence by the cultivation of the soil and by fishing.

For more detailed information in relation to the tribes located upon those reservations, I beg leave to refer you to my annual report, which accompanies this.

Making for the year \$205,600. I have supposed it practicable to make a retrenchment in the expenses of the reservations of twenty-five per cent., which would leave \$150,000, within a fraction, for that

purpose; and this appears to me to be the lowest sum with which they can be successfully managed.

The estimate of \$50,000 for removal will not bring to the reservations a larger number of Indians than we are now prepared to subsist there; nor so large a number as it will be really necessary to remove within the ensuing year. I have been petitioned from various quarters for the removal of Indians, whose condition really requires that early attention should be paid to the subject; and I have given assurances that it would be attended to so soon as funds could be provided for that purpose. There is now food enough on the northern reservations to justify a considerable increase of Indians; an increase, probably, sufficient to satisfy the expectations of the people in reference to the final removal of the Indians from their midst. It is therefore deemed proper that, after making provision for the current expenses of the reservations, a specific sum be set apart for purpose of removal. The estimate for the general, incidental, and travelling expenses, is the same as this year. Those for superintendent, agents, sub-agents, and clerk, are specified by law.

SIR: I forwarded by last mail an estimate of funds supposed to be needed in this (Utah) superintendency for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1860.

I ask ten thousand dollars for new farms and reservations; every acre of arable land in this Territory will be occupied in a very short time.

The time is almost at hand when the Indians in this Territory must be entirely supported. If it is the design of government to locate the Indians here on farms, no time should be lost in making Indian reservations.

In consideration of the above views, I respectfully ask the additional sum of \$10,000 for new farms and *general farming purposes*.

In making the appropriations for this Territory, with the present queer and mixed up state of things, the sums appropriated for various purposes should not be definitely fixed on each item. The superintendent should have some discretionary powers. I hope sincerely you will appreciate this suggestion.
