JOINT RESOLUTION relative to the printing and distribution of the annual estimates.

Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States in Congress assembled, That it shall be the duty of the Secretary of the Treasury to cause the estimates of appropriations, which he is by law required to prepare and submit to Congress, to be printed, and copies of the same to be delivered to the Clerk of the House of Representatives in time for distribution at the commencement of each session ; and that the Clerk distribute the said estimates in the manner in which documents printed by Congress are directed to be distributed.

Approved January 7, 1846.

THE MINT.

MINT OF THE UNITED STATES,
Philadelphia, October 24, 1857.

SIR: I have forwarded to-day to the Register of the Treasury the estimates of appropriations required for the support of the mint and its branches and the assay office, for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1859.

I herewith enclose for your examination a copy of these estimates, and also the grounds upon which they are founded.

By reference to these papers it will be seen that the appropriations for the current fiscal year are considered sufficient for the support of the several minting establishments, and, therefore, no deficiency appropriation will be required. I have not, however, in these estimates taken into view the excessive wastage and other losses at the branch mint in San Francisco. As indicated in a recent letter to the department, this subject will hereafter be brought fully to your attention.

In explanation of the fact that no appropriation, except for salaries of officers and clerks at the assay office, is required, I may state that the operations of that office are confined to "refining, casting, and forming bars," and the charges to depositors, (pursuant to the 7th section of the act of March 3, 1853, Stat. at Large, vol 10, p. 188,) in addition to former appropriations undrawn, will be sufficient to meet the expenses of labor, as well as the incidental and other expenses.

A less sum is asked for the support of the branch mint at San Francisco for the next fiscal year than was appropriated for the current year. The reduction is to the amount of \$51,500. I concur with the superintendent of that branch, who gives as a reason for this difference his expectation of being able to reduce the expenses of that institution, especially in the price of materials, and the reduction of the number of workmen and of their *per diem* compensation. The superintendent adds, "I feel confident, from the best information I am able to obtain, that we will be enabled to keep our expenditures within the amounts estimated."

The superintendent further remarks, "you will observe that there is no estimate made for wastage; upon consultation with the operative officers, I have concluded to leave this matter entirely to your discretion, with the single remark that we are willing to abide by the result of the experience of the parent mint, and only ask for an appropriation for this object to an amount equal to the customary wastage at your institution, confident in the belief that our work at the end of the year will justify our expectations in this particular."

I have accordingly, in the estimates herein submitted, made a proper allowance for "necessary waste," placing it a little beyond the highest wastage we have ever experienced in the mint. I have every reason to hope that the wastage in that institution will hereafter be within a reasonable and proper limit.

The estimates sent me from San Francisco included four additional clerks, viz: three additional clerks for the treasurer, and one for the

superintendent, each of them at \$2,000 per annum. I have not included them in the estimates herein submitted, inasmuch as they are not authorized. The superintendent informs me that the duties of these clerks are now performed by "laborers," under the name of "employés" on the rolls. He regards their services as indispensably necessary. If so, they should be provided for by law in the appropriations, because it is not right that clerical services should be performed by laborers. Being anxious that every possible facility be given to the officers of that institution, I recommend to your favorable consideration the application of the superintendent. If you concur in the propriety of this increase in the clerks, it will be necessary to add to the appropriation these words, "one assistant clerk to the superintendent and three additional clerks to the treasurer," and increase the appropriation for salaries from \$30,500, as it now stands, to \$38,500. The persons now employed at San Francisco in discharging clerical duties are allowed the sum of \$6,260 per annum, so that the increase in point of fact only amounts to \$1,740 per annum.

The estimates submitted to me from the assay office asked for \$1,000 additional salary for the superintendent, and \$500 additional salary to the superintendent's clerk. But I have modified these items to the salaries now fixed by law, or the regulations of the department. I cannot estimate for any increase in salaries; but I submit the matter to your discretion and decision, to whom it properly belongs.

It seems proper for me, in conclusion, to add, that the mints are not a burden on the treasury to the amount of the appropriations granted; because the charge of one-half per cent. on gold coinage, and the profits on the silver coinage, as provided in the act of March 3, 1853, are paid into the treasury of the United States. So likewise the net profits on the coinage of cents, as authorized by the act of February 21, 1857, are payable into the treasury. I estimate the profits to the government from these sources, for the fiscal year embraced in the estimates herein submitted, at three hundred thousand dollars.

COAST SURVEY.

COAST SURVEY STATION,
Bangor, Maine, October 21, 1857.

SIR: I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 14th instant, requesting the annual estimates for the coast survey, and their reduction to the lowest figure possible, in reference to the financial embarrassments of the times. Before receiving this letter, having been advised by telegraph that the estimates were called for, I had already forwarded them from this place with an explanatory letter.

Under the view entertained in your letter of the 14th, if the measure meet your approval, the publication of the records and results of the coast survey might be suspended during the next fiscal year, and the estimate for that purpose be omitted for that year. This would diminish the estimates of my letter of October 19th by \$15,000.

If a further reduction is necessary, I would advise that \$5,000 be taken from each of the following items: for the line across the Florida peninsula; for repairs of vessels; and for fuel and quarters of army officers employed on the survey. These will make a further reduction of \$15,000, and a total reduction of \$30,000. I hope, however, that the first named reduction may suffice.

A contraction of the scale of the work is not an economical process, as has been shown by comparisons of the survey in former years on different scales. Omitting to complete operations which are begun and in progress will lead to much loss and waste. The signals are temporary, and the operations must follow each other closely to be conducted with economy.

COAST SURVEY STATION,
Bangor, Maine, October 19, 1857.

SIR: I have the honor to present for your examination the estimates for the work of the coast survey for the next fiscal year, and would respectfully request that, if approved, they may be inserted in your estimates for appropriations.

The estimates provide for the scale of progress heretofore approved by the Treasury Department and by Congress. The items are the same as for the last two years, with two exceptions. The estimate needed for fuel and quarters, and for transportation for officers of the army serving on the work, in consequence of a surplus from the former estimates, is less than heretofore, and the withdrawal of the naval

engineers, hitherto detailed for the coast survey steamers, requires an estimate for the pay of steam engineers.

The progress upon which these estimates are based are stated under the head of the several sections of the Atlantic, Gulf, and Pacific coasts, and the sums estimated are the least which can insure the amount of work stated. They include, as usual, the office as well as field work, and are intended to keep the former as near the latter as practicable.

The past year has, owing to peculiar circumstances, not determined the question of insufficiency of the western coast appropriation referred to in my last annual report, and I have, therefore, not advised an increase.

The line across the Florida peninsula proves very practicable, and will be of great advantage to the survey, connecting the main triangulation of the Atlantic and Gulf of Mexico, and preventing the necessity of reliance upon the small triangulation across the Florida peninsula for such a purpose. As a measure of economy it is also of great advantage. It is possible that the sum now asked may nearly or quite complete this work.

Several of the older vessels of the survey require more thorough repairs than can be given from the current resources, and provision is made therefor by an item in the estimates.

Before presenting the estimates, I would respectfully call attention to the progress of the survey. Fifty-three base lines, ten principal and forty-three preliminary, have been measured on different parts of the coast. Upon these rest the triangulations which are now continuous from Mount Desert, in Maine, to Shallotte Inlet, south of the Cape Fear, in North Carolina, stretching over more than ten degrees of latitude and as many of longitude, including the coast of ten States, and the greater part of the coast of two others. Then, with an interval of about seventy miles, it extends along the coast of South Carolina and Georgia, with two gaps which this season will fill, to Ossabaw entrance. It covers, on the coast of Georgia, Sapelo entrance, and St. Simon's and Brunswick harbor; St. Mary's, Georgia, and Fernandina harbor, and St. John's river, Florida. It is continuous from Virginia Key, Cape Florida, to the Marquesas, west of Key West, completing the connexion of the outer keys and reefs of South Florida. On the western coast of Florida, it extends from Crystal river to beyond Cedar Keys; over Ocilla river entrance; St. Mark's harbor; from the east pass through St. George's and St. Vincent's sounds, including Apalachicola harbor; St. Andrew's bay; and Pensacola harbor and approaches. On the coast of Alabama and Mississippi, Mobile bay and approaches; Mississippi Sound and part of Lake Pontchartrain, connecting Mobile and New Orleans. On the coast of Louisiana, Chandeleur Sound to Isle au Breton Sound; Isle Dernière and Caillou bay; Atchafalaya and part of Côte Blanche bays. On the coast of Texas, Galveston entrance, and East and West bays, and the coast to include Matagorda bay, and the entrance to the Rio Grande. On the coast of California, the main triangulation is complete from north of Sonoma mountain to south of Monterey bay, and the secondary triangulation connected with this along the coast line.

is nearly completed. Secondary triangulation has been made at San Diego; near San Pedro; along the Santa Barbara coast, and on the Santa Barbara islands, in San Francisco; San Pablo, Suisun Ballenas, Drake's and Tomales bays. The river entrances of the coast of Oregon have been surveyed, and Columbia river triangulated to Astoria. On the coast of Washington Territory, Shoalwater bay, Washington Sound, Admiralty Inlet, and parts of Puget's Sound and Hood's canal, have been triangulated.

Where the main triangulations did not afford the requisite facilities for progress, preliminary triangulations have been executed in advance of them, to serve as a basis for the detailed work, and to be verified in turn.

The topography giving the coast line and so much of the shores as may be essential to recognition by the mariner, and to give the nearest land communication, has been kept generally within one season of the triangulation. The hydrography has followed closely in turn. The in shore hydrography is nearly continuous from the coast at Cape Neddick, in Maine, to Ocracoke, in North Carolina, with gaps which two or three seasons will probably fill. Kennebec entrance, and part of Casco bay, in Maine, are, besides, done.

The difficult off shore work towards George's bank has made good progress, and the broken ground of the Nantucket shoals has been completely sounded. The hydrography of the coast of North Carolina is in vigorous progress, being complete from Hatteras to Portsmouth, beyond Ocracoke; from Cape Lookout to south of Beaufort, and at Cape Fear and approaches. The in shore work on the coast of South Carolina is nearly complete; Winyah bay and Georgetown harbor are done, and the soundings are complete from Cape Roman to Tybee entrance. On the coast of Georgia, Tybee entrance and Savannah river to the head of Arygle island are finished; also St. Simon's entrance, Turtle river and Brunswick harbor to the north end of Blythe island, and St. Mary's entrance. Reconnaissances have been made of St. Andrew's Sound and Doboy entrance. On the coast of Florida, Fernandina harbor is completely surveyed, and St. John's entrance and river, to Jacksonville. The hydrography of the Florida reef is complete from near Cape Florida to Rodriguez bank, and from Loggerhead key to the Marquesas, and Key Biscayne bay has been sounded out. There is a reconnaissance of Tampa bay. The hydrography is complete from Waccasassa Point to Cedar keys, inclusive; of Ocala river entrance; of St. Mark's harbor; St. Andrew's bay, and Pensacola entrance and harbor. The hydrography is complete of Mobile bay, Mississippi Sound and coast, outside of the chain of islands and westward into Lake Borgne, and of part of Chandeleur Sound. Much off shore hydrography has been done in connexion with this in shore work, and both classes of hydrography keep close upon the triangulation and topography. There is a reconnaissance of the passes of the Mississippi. The hydrography of part of Caillou bay, behind Isle Dernière, is complete, and that of Atchafalaya bay is in progress. Galveston bay and entrance are complete, and East and West bays in part finished. The in shore work of the coast of Texas is nearly done between Galveston and Matagorda

entrances. There is a reconnaissance of Aransas pass, and a survey of the Rio Grande entrance.

On the western coast, San Diego bay and harbor, Cortez bank, San Clemente anchorage, Santa Catalina harbor, the coast of Santa Barbara channel between Port Duma and San Buenaventura, Prisoner's harbor, Cuyler's harbor, Santa Barbara, San Luis Obispo, Coxo, and Monterey harbors, San Pedro, San Francisco, San Pablo and Suisun bays and Mare Island Strait, have been sounded out, Ballenas and Drake's bays, Haven's anchorage, Mendocino city harbor, Shelter Cove, Humboldt harbor and Trinidad bay, Crecent city and Ewing harbors, Umpqua river, Columbia river entrance, Shoalwater bay, Gray's harbor, Nee-ah harbor, New Dungenes and False Dungenes, in the Strait of Fuca; Canal de Haro and Rosario Strait and approaches, Blakely harbor; and in Admiralty Inlet, Puget's Sound and Hood's canal, Port Townsend, Port Ludlow, Port Gamble, Olympia, and Steilacoom harbors and Bellingham bay, have been surveyed in a preliminary way and charts have been published.

The charts have kept pace with the field work, preliminary ones being published for each year's work in advance of the elaborate finished maps. The principal dangerous localities on the coast have been surveyed, and charts published in advance of connected work; thus, of the Nantucket and Monomoy shoals, Hatteras shoals, the Frying Pan, and Cape Fear shoals, Cape Roman shoals, Canaveral shoals, and others. The same course has been taken in regard to localities affording facilities for commerce and navigation, and nearly half the harbors and most of the important inlets of the coast have been surveyed, and charts have been published. Every season, as the hydrographic work comes in, a preliminary chart is drawn and engraved, and the engraved plate is added to year by year, by the electrotype process. This is done according to a project determined beforehand, as early as the limits of the coast are known with sufficient precision.

It has been practicable within the past year to take up again the projects of all the preliminary charts, and in a general way those of the sea coast, (in shore,) and of the general coast charts, (off shore,) and to bring the general plan or system nearly to completion. The data for the shore line of a large portion of the Atlantic and Gulf coasts are sufficiently complete to permit this to be done with advantage.

In my letter of last year, I enumerated the preliminary charts, eleven in number, which had been commenced in this way.

Charts of two hundred and thirty-five harbors, inlets, shoals, sounds, bays, and portions of the coast and rivers have been drawn, engraved, and published. The annual report of the coast survey contains about sixty sketches and charts, diffusing nautical and geographical information widely throughout the country.

The field work is now so far done that it is easy to see that a few years more must bring it to a close on the Atlantic and Gulf coasts, if a steady progress, at the present rate, is secured by the usual appropriations.

In speaking of the different sections in my annual report, I shall point this out more clearly. It is much more easy now, upon the

Atlantic coast, to state what remains to be done, than what has been done. Filling up a gap of seventy miles on the coast of Maine, of seventy miles on the coast of North and South Carolina, of seventy-five miles on the coast of Georgia, and of three hundred and forty miles on the coast of Florida, would give a continuous triangulation, either main or secondary, from Quoddy Head to Cape Florida. The time of completion of the work is merely a question of the means furnished, for we have now not only trained officers, steadily, actively, and intelligently working in their several spheres of duty, but many in inferior grades, who are quite ripe for higher occupations. The survey is essentially a temporary work, and its whole organization is adapted to that idea. It has thus the advantage of adapting the number and qualities of its employés to the amount and kind of work, and is able to recognize the principle of promotion by merit, for which the quantity and quality of the work furnish a mathematical basis.

The resources being applied, from year to year, to the varying state of relative progress in the different operations, the progress for a given extent of coast is determined by the scale of appropriation. A comparison of the relative progress in the earlier stages of the work, showed clearly that it was more economical to conduct it upon a large scale than upon a small one. The division of labor and facilities for working on different parts of the coast during different seasons of the year, produce the chief part of this economy. The sooner the facilities of a survey can be presented to a growing commerce and navigation the better. The extent of the coast being determined, economy and utility both indicate that the appropriations should be such as to push the work vigorously to completion.

The estimates which are hereto appended in detail, show the progress proposed to be secured by them during the fiscal year 1858-'59.

For general expenses of all the sections, namely: Rent, fuel, materials for drawing, engraving, and printing, and ruling forms, binding, transportation of instruments, maps, and charts, and for miscellaneous office expenses, and the purchase of new instruments, books, maps, and charts.....

LIGHT-HOUSE ESTABLISHMENT.

TREASURY DEPARTMENT,
OFFICE LIGHT-HOUSE BOARD,

SIR: I have the honor, by direction of this board, respectfully to recommend for your approval the estimate submitted for a 4th class clerk for this office, in addition to the present force, under the head No. 1, for clerks, messengers, &c., &c., for the fiscal year ending 30th June, 1859.

There are but five clerks in this office, a number, it is believed, not equal to that actually employed on the various duties connected with light-house service prior to the organization of this board, although all that were transferred under the act of Congress, although since that time the aids to the Pacific coast have been added, and those on the Atlantic, Gulf, and lakes have nearly doubled.

There are about 3,000 returns received from light-keepers annually of supplies, &c., received and expended, which require a close examination, and when found to be correct, to be recorded in books kept for the purpose.

This duty may possibly, by strict attention, be performed by one competent clerk. There are 68 collectors of customs, who are disbursing officers for the light-house establishment, and about 15 engineer officers, whose accounts are rendered monthly, have to undergo an administrative examination, entered on the book of the office, and then transmitted to the accounting officers. This duty is now performed by one clerk, with the occasional assistance of the chief clerk, when his other duties will permit.

All contracts for supplies of all kinds, for materials, labor, &c., &c., are now recorded by one clerk, in addition to keeping registry of letters, preparing files for binding, &c.

One clerk only is left for carrying on all the correspondence of the office, registering light-keepers' names, making out estimates, and preparing all the miscellaneous writing of the office.

The proposed additional clerk, if approved by the department and allowed by Congress, will enable this office to place two clerks in charge of the administrative examination of the disbursing accounts, and relieve the office greatly, if not entirely, from a pressure of business, which prevents as close a scrutiny into the disbursements as is desired, and which the interests of the service demand.

SIR: I have the honor, by direction of this board, respectfully to submit for your examination and consideration the accompanying estimates of funds required for the support and maintenance of the light-house establishment for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1859.

These estimates have been prepared to meet the actual state of the light-house service as it will be at the close of the present fiscal year, and not upon the prorata of expenditures of previous years, as heretofore, in view of the fact that by the commencement of the next fiscal year the system of catadioptric illumination, authorized by the 7th section of the act of Congress, making appropriations for light-houses, &c., approved March 3, 1851, and which has been in steady progress of execution since the organization of this board, on the 9th of October, 1852, will be near its full completion, which will thenceforth produce the economical results indicated at that time, by greatly diminishing the annual consumption of oil, wicks, chimneys, and other supplies, as compared with that of the old system of reflectors and lamps, in addition to other benefits arising from increased brilliancy and power of the lights; and from illuminating apparatus which is not liable to any sensible deterioration from use.

The items of proposed appropriation in table No. 4, for rebuilding certain light-houses at prominent points on the Atlantic seacoast, and for erecting the iron light-house authorized August 3, 1854, to be built at the southwest pass of the Mississippi, (but which has not

been commenced, for the reason that the entire sum required was not authorized,) are submitted, in accordance with usage, as embracing works of renovation and improvement of great importance and of pressing necessity to the commercial and navigating interests of the country, which seem to require the early favorable attention of Congress, and which, when made, will complete the entire system of main sea coast lights.

The accompanying detailed statements, from A to S, inclusive, will, it is believed, explain fully and satisfactorily the foregoing estimates.

SIR: I have the honor to transmit herewith the annual estimates of funds required for the Indian service for "fulfilling treaties" with the various Indian tribes, and for several items of regular and incidental expenses, during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1859.

There will be perceived a difference in the present estimates from those of last year of \$1,220,164 47, being that amount less asked for the ensuing year, which difference is accounted for on the last page of the estimates.

The reports and estimates from officers in charge of the service in California, Texas, and the distant Territories, on which estimates of the expenditures there could be understandingly based, have not yet reached this office. As soon hereafter as practicable the estimates alluded to will be made to the department.

In correspondence with conversations which I have had the honor of holding with you, I now submit also herewith a tabular statement showing under the several treaties with the Indians specified, an aggregate amount of \$750,000, which, by the provisions of the treaties, is required to be invested in safe and profitable stocks, &c. ; but upon which Congress has heretofore appropriated five per centum interest, no investment having been made thereof; and to suggest the propriety of recommending to Congress at its next session the investment of these moneys under the favorable prospect of making an advantageous investment for the Indians.

Should this latter course be pursued, and the means placed at the disposal of the department in time to make the investment with a view of causing the interest to accrue on or before the first of Ju next, the present estimates will be diminished in the sum of \$37,500, being the amount asked for, and heretofore appropriated for interest, &c.

Estimates for the Quartermaster's Department, and for the clothing, camp and garrison equipage of the army, for the year ending June 30, 1859.

QUARTERMASTER GENERAL'S OFFICE,
Washington City, November 10, 1857.

SIR: I have the honor to submit the estimates due from this office for the several items of army expenditures for services and supplies for the fiscal year commencing on the 1st of July next and ending the 30th of June, 1859.

As I have had occasion heretofore to remark, every item of expenditure through the Quartermaster's Department, so far, at least, as relates to the cost, is contingent. The allowances of fuel, forage and straw are limited in quantity by the regulations of the War Department, made in accordance with law; but the cost of the articles depends upon the positions occupied by the troops, and the resources of the country adjacent to the posts. Not only does the cost of these supplies depend upon contingencies which the officers of this department cannot control, but all the expenditures made through the department depend upon circumstances and exigencies as they arise, and which must be promptly met, or every operation of the troops will be a failure, and the interests of the public, as well as the military character of the nation, suffer. Every movement of the troops increases the transportation; and the necessity of placing and supporting them on distant frontiers, and often at points where there is neither timber for building nor wood or coal for fuel, increases enormously the expense of covering and warming them. The success of military operations, particularly on so vast a theatre as that covered by our little army, depends almost entirely upon the promptness and efficiency with which the duties of the Quartermaster's Department are performed. These duties cannot be performed as they should be unless the required means be supplied to meet all demands as they arise. Economy is not secured by reducing estimates below the probable wants of the service; deficiencies may be thus produced, and the government, as well as claimants, embarrassed. The only way to save money is to get clear of the objects of expenditure. Over them the officers of the Quartermaster's Department have no control, or, at best, very little.

Paper marked A is the estimate for the Quartermaster's Department proper in all its various branches. The item of fuel has been calculated for the full organization of the army, according to its present distribution, at the cost at the several posts occupied. From this has been deducted the amount which will probably be supplied by the labor of the troops and the operatives of the Quartermaster's Department at the frontier posts and in the field. This item is forty-five thousand dollars more than the appropriation for the present fiscal year; for it is ascertained that the cost of fuel at posts where the troops formerly supplied themselves, but where they have now to be supplied by purchase, is increasing, and at some of those posts is equal to, and at others greater than, what it is in this city.

The item for forage has been calculated for a full supply for the animals in the public service, and at present prices, according to the present distribution; and a deduction has been made for the probable period of time which the animals will be grazed, as well as for the allowance of officers entitled to forage, but who will probably receive commutation in lieu of it through the pay department.

The items for straw for soldiers' bedding, and for stationery, are for small amounts, and are the same as those items for the present year.

The item for incidental expenses is entirely contingent in all its particulars; it is sixty thousand dollars more than the appropriation for the present fiscal year, but not more than will be required for the expenditures of the year, and certainly not more than will be required next year.

The item for mounts and remounts is for the supply of horses for the mounted corps, for the companies of light artillery, and for such companies of infantry as commanding officers on the frontiers, when, without cavalry, dragoons, or riflemen, may find it necessary to mount. Should the mounted corps be allowed their full number of horses and equipment, a larger sum will be necessary.

The item for mileage for officers when travelling on military duty, without troops, escorts, or military supplies, is ten thousand dollars more than the appropriation for the present year; this increase is necessary, in consequence of the change in the regulations allowing transportation to officers returning from leave of absence, as well as of increased travelling from a greater extension of our frontier posts.

The item for the transportation of the army, including that of clothing, equipments, subsistence, medical and hospital supplies, ordnance and ordnance stores, troops and quartermaster's stores, is greater than any previous estimate since the war with Mexico. The appropriation for this object last year, including that for the deficiency, was two million two hundred thousand dollars, and it is ascertained from accounts already received and examined that the expenditures for that year have exceeded two million five hundred thousand dollars, and it is believed that accounts not yet received will swell the amount from one hundred to one hundred and fifty thousand dollars more. The expenditures under this head cannot be controlled by any authority, except by limiting the operations of the troops, for wheresoever they are required they must be placed with their supplies. The greater part of the force is serving in sections of our vast territory, difficult of access, distant from the sources of supply, and with no resources beyond a scanty supply of wild grass. Our little army is constantly engaged in the performance of more duty, and in more extended operations, than any hundred thousand troops in the service of France, Austria, Prussia, or any other European nation, and it covers and protects a territory equal to the whole of Europe, from the Asiatic frontier of Russia to the Spanish frontier of France; and is constantly obliged to make sudden, long, rapid, and expensive movements to supply the want of numbers. Large as the amount estimated certainly is, it will be all required, perhaps more.

The item for barracks and quarters consists of rents, constructions,

and repairs. Of the first, \$52,224 is for the rent of officers' quarters, or for the commutation in money allowed them for rent; \$47,776 for the rent of barracks for troops, of sites for frontier posts, of lands for summer cantonments, fields for drill, and for grazing horses and other public animals. The whole sum will probably be required.

The amount for construction and repairs, when considered in the aggregate, seems large, but when viewed in all its details it will be found to be reduced as low as the efficiency of the service and the comfort of the troops will admit. Indeed, in regard to the whole estimate, as well as to these items, the question is simply whether the army shall be supported, and the operations considered proper by the executive, and called for by the public interest, be carried out, or the former be reduced and the latter abandoned.

Paper marked B is the estimate for clothing, camp and garrison equipage for the army, including the expenses of the clothing arsenal at Philadelphia, where the clothing, camp and garrison equipage for the army are mostly prepared, and for iron bedsteads—an article not heretofore included in the estimates, but which, being sanctioned by the War Department, and often called for, I now include.

1.—*Regular supplies.*

For the regular supplies of the Quartermaster's Department, consisting of *fuel* for the officers, enlisted men, guards, hospitals, storehouses, and offices; of *forage* in kind for the horses, mules, and oxen of the Quartermaster's Department at the several posts and stations and with the armies in the field; for the horses of the two regiments of dragoons, the two regiments of cavalry, the regiment of

mounted riflemen, the companies of light artillery, and such companies of infantry as may be mounted, and for the authorized number of officers' horses, when serving in the field and at the outposts, including bedding for the animals; of straw for soldiers' bedding; and of stationery, including company and other blank books for the army, certificates for discharged soldiers, blank forms for the Pay and Quartermaster's Departments, and for the printing of division and department orders, army regulations, and reports.

Remarks.

Fuel.—It is ascertained that the cost of the allowance of fuel for the army under the present regulations, calculating for the full organization and according to the present distribution, and at the prices at the posts and frontiers now occupied, would exceed two hundred and twenty thousand dollars, and that the deductions or saving by fuel furnished by the troops at posts and in the field will exceed fifty thousand dollars, leaving the amount estimated to be provided for. This amount cannot be safely reduced.

Forage.—The cost of forage for the army according to its present distribution, calculating at the prices at the posts occupied, would exceed two million three hundred thousand dollars, were the full ration at all posts issued; but it is the duty of all officers by existing regulations to reduce the allowance when there is grass in the field, or near the posts, where the horses and other animals may graze when not on severe duty. The sum estimated is as little as it would be safe to ask.

Straw and stationery.—These items are both precisely the same as the appropriations for the present year. They will probably be sufficient, but will not bear reduction.

2.—Incidental expenses.

For the incidental expenses of the Quartermaster's Department, consisting of postage on letters and packets received and sent by the officers of the army on public service; expenses of courts martial and courts of inquiry, including the additional compensation of judge advocates, recorders, members, and

witnesses, while on that service, under the act of March 16, 1802; extra pay to ~~soldiers~~ employed under the direction of the Quartermaster's Department in the erection of barracks, quarters, storehouses, and hospitals, in the construction of roads, and on other constant labor for periods of not less than ten days, under the acts of March 2, 1819, and of August 4, 1854, including those employed as clerks at division and department headquarters; expenses of expresses to and from the frontier posts and armies in the field; of escorts to paymasters and other disbursing officers, and to trains, where military escorts cannot be furnished; expense of the interment of officers killed in action, or who die when on duty in the field, or at the posts on the frontiers, and of non-commissioned officers and soldiers; authorized office furniture; hire of laborers in the Quartermaster's Department; compensation of forage and wagon masters, authorized by the act of July 5, 1838, for the apprehension of deserters, and the expenses incident to their pursuit. The following expenditures required for the two regiments of dragoons, the two regiments of cavalry, the regiment of mounted riflemen, and such companies of infantry as may be mounted viz: the purchase of portable forges, blacksmiths' and shoeing tools, horse and mule shoes and nails; iron and steel for shoeing; hire of veterinary surgeons; medicines for horses and mules; picket ropes, and shoeing the horses of those corps.....

Remarks.

The expenditures under this head, it will be seen, are altogether contingent in their character, and depend upon the circumstances of the service, which no authority or department here can control. This estimate is sixty thousand dollars more than the appropriation for the present year. The greater extension of the frontier posts, with the operations being carried on for the purpose of occupying Utah, renders the increase asked for necessary.

3.—*Mounts and remounts.*

For the purchase of horses for the two regiments of dragoons, the two regiments of cavalry, the regiment of mounted riflemen, and the companies of light artillery.....

Remarks.

The service of the mounted troops, with the exception of three companies of artillery, is on the frontier, in the Indian country, and the Territory of Utah. The service is severe, and has often to be performed when forage cannot be had, and in consequence the horses break down and are abandoned or die. The service required of our mounted force is five-fold greater than that required of, or performed by, the mounted troops of any other nation on the globe; in addition to the severe service which the troops are required to perform, losses often occur from stampedes, capture by the Indians, and other accidents. The loss of horses, it is believed, will amount, according to the service on which the troops are, or may be, employed, to from one-fifth to three-fourths of the whole number; in addition to the sum to supply these probable losses, should it be determined to supply the mounted corps with their full number of horses and to mount the additional companies of light artillery, about ninety thousand dollars more will be required.

4.—*Mileage to officers of the army.*

For mileage, or the allowance made to officers of the army for the transportation of themselves and their baggage, when travelling on duty without troops, escorts, or supplies.....

\$130,000 00

Remarks.

The sum estimated is ten thousand dollars more than the appropriation for the present year. This increase is rendered necessary by the change in the regulation allowing transportation to officers when returning from leave of absence, and from increased travelling consequent on the continued extension of our frontier posts.

5.—*Transportation of troops and supplies.*

For transportation of the army, including the baggage of the troops, when moving either by land or water; of clothing, camp and garrison equipment from the depot at Philadelphia to the several posts and army depots; of horse equipments, and of subsistence from the places of purchase and from the places of delivery under contract to such places as the circumstances of the service may require them to be sent; of ordnance, ordnance stores, and small arms from the foundries and armories to the

arsenals, fortifications, frontier posts, and army depots; freights, wharfage, tolls and ferriages; for the purchase and hire of horses, mules, and oxen, and the purchase and repair of wagons, carts, drays, ships, and other sea going vessels and boats, required for the transportation of supplies and garrison purposes; for drayage and cartage at the several posts; hire of teamsters; transportation of funds for the pay and other disbursing departments; the expense of sailing public transports on the various rivers, the Gulf of Mexico, and the Atlantic and Pacific; and for procuring water at such posts as, from their situation, require that it be brought from a distance; and for clearing roads, and removing obstructions from roads, harbors, and rivers, to the extent which may be required for the actual operations of the troops on the frontier..... \$3,400,000 00

Remarks.

This is an item which cannot be controlled by any authority. Wheresoever the troops are required, they, with their supplies, must be placed. The greater portion of them are serving in sections of our vast Territories difficult of access, and with scarcely any other resources than a scanty supply of wild grass. Our army, small as it is, covers more ground and carries on more extended operations than any hundred thousand men in any other section of the globe. Indeed, our little army occupies a territory equal in extent to four-fifths of that of Europe.

6.—*Barracks and quarters.*

1. *Rents*, including hire or commutation of quarters for officers on military duty; hire of quarters for troops; of storehouses for the safe keeping of military stores; of grounds for summer cantonments, and for temporary frontier stations... \$100,000 00

2. *Construction, alteration and repairs.*—
For constructing barracks and other buildings at posts which it may be necessary to occupy during the year, and for repairing, altering and enlarging buildings at the established posts, according to the following details, viz:

Remarks.

Rents.—Of this sum, \$52,224 is for rent of officers' quarters, or for commutation allowed in lieu of them; the remainder is for the rent of offices, storehouses, buildings for barracks, sites for temporary posts and encampments, and grounds for drill.

Construction and repairs.—This is an item which cannot be well controlled. Wheresoever the troops may be placed in the winter season, or at permanent outposts, they must be covered comfortably. Hospital accommodation must be provided for the sick, and secure covering for the stores. The expenditures on these accounts are constant, and though generally small at the greater number of the posts, they amount in the aggregate to large sums. These expenditures must continue as long as the frontier is being extended. It will require the greatest energy on the part of the officers of the Quartermaster's Department, with all the support which can be given by the War Department, to limit the expenditures to the sums estimated, \$6,765,000.

Explanations and details of the foregoing estimates.

1. *Armament of fortifications.*—The object of this item of the estimate is to procure seacoast and garrison cannon, and the means of mounting and equipping them for the defence and protection of the Atlantic, Gulf, Lake, and Pacific coasts of the United States, and for the repair and preservation of the armament already in place. The

amount appropriated will be applicable to the purchase of heavy artillery and projectiles; of materials for the manufacture of seacoast and garrison carriages, with their implements and equipments, and to the payment of mechanics employed in their manufacture at the arsenals. The amount of the estimates is the same as that of last year's appropriation.

2. *Ordnance service.*—The amount of this item of the estimate is required to defray the expenses of receiving, issuing, and keeping in good order the arms, ordnance stores, and other public property in use and in store at the different arsenals and ordnance depots in the United States; for the purchase of ordinary supplies of fuel, stationery, and forage, and for all the incidental expenses of the ordnance service. It is the same as the last year's appropriation.

3. *Ordnance, ordnance stores, and supplies.*—The amount included in the estimate for this object is intended to procure siege and field guns, carriages, caissons, and battery wagons, with their implements and equipments and harness; side-arms and accoutrements for the different kinds of troops composing the army, and to defray the expenses of fabricating and repairing the same; and for the purchase of materials for, and the preparation of, ammunition; and for procuring horse equipments for the mounted troops. No increase beyond last year's appropriation.

4. *National armories.*—The amount of this item of the estimate is required to carry on the operations at the national armories during the fiscal year. In consequence of the adoption of new models for small arms, it is advisable, until a considerable supply of the new arms shall be fabricated, to enlarge somewhat the usual annual estimate.

Repairs and improvements and new machinery at the national armories.

The details and explanations of this part of the estimate are as follows:

5. *Springfield armory.*

Remarks.

1. This road has long been in contemplation, and, by the purchase of land of George Bliss, in 1856, over which a part of this road is to pass, was made practicable, and was substantially adopted, and, when completed, will greatly facilitate communication with the railroad, and extend around the government square on the hill.

2. A substantial and imperishable iron fence now extends about three-fifths of the distance around the government square, on which the workshops and arsenals on the hill are situated. And this amount is required to continue the fence on the north side adjoining a road that will be much travelled.

3. This square is enclosed, containing about 20 acres. Armorers would be accommodated by having walks across it, so that they could pass through the square, whereas they are now compelled to go around it.

4. This railing is needed to prevent accidents to the many travellers who pass over this bridge, which is forty feet high, and along a high river wall.

5. The engine now in use, of 30 horse power, has been the sole power on the hill for 14 years. A large number of operations, with the rifling of the new arms, has been added within the last year, and more power is now indispensable.

6. An appropriation, in part, was granted for this machinery by the last Congress; this amount is wanted to complete the machinery for said mill.

7. A pump to protect the new shops against fires, and pipe attached to the pump, to convey water for various shop uses to different points, in a length of 494 feet of shops, is deemed to be an indispensable appendage.

8. This cistern to be placed in the attic of the new shop, to supply water to the machines and forges.

9. These forges, furnaces, and belting are necessary in the new shops, the old ones being insufficient for present work.

10. These machines are all required to enable the establishment to manufacture cheaply and economically the new rifle musket, which

requires more operations than the old musket, and a corresponding number of additional machines.

11. The new shop grounds are destitute of fences and walks, both of which are deemed necessary.

12. Dials are set in the tower, and a clock by which to regulate time in the shops, that can be seen and heard in the vicinity of the shops, will be very useful to all employed in that portion of the government works at this armory.

6. *Harper's Ferry armory.*

Remarks.

1. This building is required for the storage of finished arms. It is proposed to locate it on the old arsenal square, filling up the ground to the level of the street, so as to keep it above the highest rise of water.

2. There is a necessity for more shop room for the manufacture of arms; and a new stock house having been erected outside of the armory yard affords an opportunity of converting the building in the yard, heretofore used as a stock house, into a very suitable workshop. It is designed for files and for putting in position the cutting and milling machines necessary for the work of manufacture.

3. The canal, or race-way, which furnishes all the power to the armory, requires protection from the washing of the hill-side, (which is steep and bluffly throughout its entire length,) more particularly now, as a county road, very much used, lies along its bank the whole distance from the armory buildings to the lock gates or head. The efforts heretofore made to secure the object of this estimate have been partial and temporary; and although they have materially aided in preventing the evil complained of, complete protection in this respect cannot be obtained except by the construction of a revetment wall like that above estimated for.

4. The old dam on the Potomac river, by which the entire effective value of the armory, as such, is controlled, has been in use over thirty years, and as constructed at that early day is deficient, and always has been so, in all the points which render it secure and reliable. Year after year it has been necessary to repair it, and remedy the defects which every freshet in the river, or the breaking up of the

ice in the spring, makes apparent. The cost of the repairs which have been made to this dam since its construction would be more than sufficient to reconstruct it upon the most approved plan, which is now proposed as a measure of necessity and economy.

5. The county road, running immediately along the margin of the canal, is constantly wearing away its banks and forming a slope from the road to the canal, facilitating the washing into the immediate channel of the canal of all kinds of rubbish and filth that accumulates on the surface of the road.

6. To facilitate the manufacture of the rifle musket and rifle and their respective appendages. Some of the machines are to replace old ones now in use, badly adapted to the work, besides being dilapidated and partly worn out. Others are for entirely new operations consequent upon a change in the models of the musket and rifle.

7. *Arsenals.*

The amount of the estimate under this head is made up from the estimates of the commanding officers of the arsenals, revised and modified at the ordnance office. The details and explanations are as follow, viz:

Allegheny arsenal.

1. For the construction of a building for carriage makers', harness makers', and accoutrement makers' shops, and of offices and tool houses for new shops.....	\$21,500

Remarks.

1. This item will complete the new shops on the plan which has been approved.

2. It is found that the supply of water from the reservoir is only sufficient for one engine, and for the current necessities of the post; it is therefore proposed to make

arrangements so that one engine can supply water for both, and leave the water of the reservoir available for other purposes of the post, and to serve in case of fire. The water from wells within the limits of the arsenal is found to be too injurious to the boilers to admit of its use.

3. The second floor of this building is suspended from the roof, the framing of which is found to be too light for the purpose; it is proposed to remove the suspension rods and support the floor from below.

4. To complete this unfinished work.

5. These shelters are too much dilapidated for repair.

6. Three separate buildings will be necessary for the purposes of the laboratory, the cost of which cannot be less than the sum named. One of the buildings will be entirely for the preparation of ammunition of the various kinds; another for a driving room, and the third for the needful furnaces, &c.

7. The cellars of these quarters are so damp that their use as kitchens has been necessarily abandoned; but the effects are felt throughout the whole buildings to so great a degree that ordinary fires cannot counteract them.

8. This floor is chiefly occupied by articles made of leather, which require to be arranged with a view to proper ventilation, and the exclusion of dampness, excessive light, and dust. It is proposed to effect this by putting them all in racks and shelves, and surrounding them by frames for curtains of some cheap coarse material prepared with a coating of gas tar.

9. To keep the post in order, and to reslate the barracks.

5. The old wooden shot beds are entirely rotten.
6. Many guns in the yard are on wooden skidding, which is entirely rotten.
7. To preserve and keep the public buildings in order.

Kennebeck arsenal.

Remarks.

1. The repairs required on this wall have been begun by removing from behind it a portion of the embankment which threatened to overthrow the wall. It is not proposed to relay the structure to its present height, but to an elevation of only about 14 feet above low water. Its present height is about 22 feet above that point.

2. Constant repairs are needed in the foundation of the iron enclosing fence, which is much heaved and impaired by the action of the frost. The slopes and numerous deep drains are no longer in a condition to answer the uses for which they were intended.

North Carolina arsenal.

This building is necessary to make this arsenal a suitable one for construction, and was included in the estimate for that purpose made on a resolution of the Senate at the last session of Congress; but not being required until after the machinery for constructing operations had been put in place, the appropriation was deferred until the succeeding year, or that for which it is now estimated.

1. Should the importance of St. Louis arsenal increase in the ratio of the last two years, and as the present position of the troops would indicate, a large storehouse will become necessary.

2. The introduction of gas would be of great public convenience, as already found at the larger arsenals. The introduction of water is of great importance, with reference to the safety of the public buildings. The altitude from which the water would be drawn is quite sufficient, with the appliance of hose, to reach the highest buildings. The present supply of water is derived from cisterns, which is found to be barely adequate in the periods of drought, which are of annual occurrence. The bed of the river in front of the arsenal is dry during a large portion of the year, and a supply of water could not be relied upon in case of fire.

3. The slate roofs of the buildings generally require extensive repairs. Much damage has heretofore been sustained by one of them from the blasting of a neighboring stone quarry.

2. An additional cistern is required for the safety and protection of the post from fire, and also for furnishing wholesome water for ordinary use.

3. These are frame buildings, and require painting for their preservation.

4. These foundations, of brick, were laid some 25 or 30 years ago, and require repairs to make them serviceable.

5. The flooring, joists, sills, and other wood work of

several of the public buildings, are much decayed, and need repairs, which, with the contingent expenditures for keeping the post in good order, will require the amount estimated.

The situation of some of the principal arsenal buildings, which are unavoidably placed on low ground, exposes them to be generally flooded by the spring freshets in the river, causing decay of the floors and other woodwork. In repairing such of the buildings as cannot be removed to higher ground, it is proposed to use iron beams, instead of wood, for supporting the lower floors, which are subject to inundation.

During the past session of Congress the pay of the cadets was raised from \$24 to \$30 per month ; the result of which has been to reduce the indebtedness of the corps of cadets to the sum of \$2,629 64 on the 31st of August, and less than at any corresponding period since the year 1849, when it was \$2,461 99.

With the increased pay now authorized by law, and strict attention given to economize their expenses, it is hoped and believed that by this time next year very few of them will be in debt. At present 132 of them are in debt, and 109 have small sums to their credit in account with the treasurer.

It must be understood that from the pay allowed a cadet he is provided with his food, clothing, books, stationery, mathematical instruments, bedding, room furniture, lights, and military equipments, excepting arms, which has kept the corps in debt as above stated. During the five years preceding 1846, when the pay of a cadet was \$28 per month, the average indebtedness at the corresponding period of the year was \$3,133 19.

The first five items of the preceding estimate remain as for many years past.

No. 6. For dragoon barracks, five thousand dollars was appropriated last year. It has been and is being applied to erecting a two story brick building on the foundation of the former decayed wooden structure. To do this, the dragoons were encamped, and so remain. The brick work of the new structure is now finished, and by the 1st November it will be habitable, though not finished, when the troops must be moved from the camp into winter quarters. The rooms will be floored, but the ceilings, kitchen and basement cannot be finished until additional funds are made available, and for this purpose the sum of \$1,500 is now introduced in this estimate.

No. 7. The artillery detachment is quartered in a decayed wooden building, part of an old laboratory and artillery shed, that was removed from the site of the library in 1840, (about.) It, like the one lately occupied by the dragoons, is unsuited for the accommodation of these men, and not such as our enlisted soldiers have a right to expect, or the government should provide for the privates of the army. On the stone foundation of the present structure it is proposed to construct a two-story brick building during the next season, putting the men into camp for the time, and for which \$6,500 will suffice.

No. 8 is called for to purchase a bell for the clock and tower, for which an appropriation of \$700 was made in 1856, and \$800 in 1857.

The clock and tower are advancing towards completion, and will be finished this fall. The means of purchasing a suitable bell and adding a dial on the east face is now asked for. No more of this structure has been undertaken than the available funds would perfect.

Nos. 9, 10, and 11, are for the same purposes as previous year, with a diminution in No. 10 of \$750, and an increase of \$500 for the reservoir. An appropriation of \$2,000 was made last year for this purpose, but little work on which has been done in consequence of the unprecedented wet season, and the conveniences of the post not permitting more work to be undertaken than the dragoon barracks, clock tower, and gas works. The sum now asked for is to be applied to the dam forming the reservoir and pipes to distribute the water to public buildings, where at times it has to be hauled by teams, though this season has been altogether exempt from such evil. A like sum the succeeding year should suffice to do all that is necessary, but not desired sooner, as the work should progress slowly, to suit the convenience and labor of the locality.

No. 13 is to extend gas lights to the public buildings. These works are now in such a state of forwardness as to be in operation this fall. All the pipes are in the cadets' barracks, the main thereto is being laid; the gas house, retorts, gas-holder, and cistern of 35 feet diameter, with furnace, and all other more minute parts, are nearly completed. The appropriation of last year of \$7,500 has been exclusively applied to constructing the works and extending the use of the gas to the cadets' barracks. To introduce it into the cadets' mess hall, and other public buildings requiring only house pipes and prolongation of the street main, this sum of \$2,500 is now asked; the capacity of the works suffice for all the buildings, by extending the pipes. These works, suitable for 1,000 burners, will be completed for the sum appropriated, but it must not be understood that the like can be built elsewhere for that sum. An old vacated stone building (stable) has been appropriated to this purpose, whereby much expense is saved; a like sum of \$2,500 another year may become necessary to extend the advantages of gas to all the public buildings, beyond which no additional outlay can be foreseen or believed to be necessary, and which cannot advantageously be used the next year, the sum at present called for being sufficient to absorb all the conveniences of application at command.

No. 14. This item is to finish one-half of the stables for which appropriations were made in 1855. During the present season, the north half has been paved with granite blocks, through the centre, and with brick on edge in all the stalls, with a stone gutter behind each line of stalls to drain them. The other half had been, and in part is still in use. It was paved throughout with round cobble stones, that prove injurious to the horses' feet, often requiring renewal, and not to be kept clean. It is proposed the next year to pave this, and finish it as the northern half.

These estimates vary from those of the current fiscal year, under the following heads of appropriation, viz :

"Provisions" increased \$9,782; the amount estimated for 134 men, the number supposed to be on shore, of the increase authorized by the letter of the Hon. Secretary of the Navy, dated April 21, 1857.

"Clothing" increased \$11,248; amount required for 268 men, authorized as above, with 200 additional watch coats.

"Fuel" increased \$474 88; amount required for 134 men, supposed number on shore, as authorized above, and also to meet increased allowances to officers, by army regulations of January 1, 1857; the fuel is estimated at \$7 per cord, instead of \$7 50 per cord.

"Military stores" increased \$16,000; to purchase 1,000 rifled muskets, that character of arm having been introduced into the marine corps; and by a new regulation of the War Department the corps is required to pay for arms, instead of being supplied, as heretofore, by the War Department upon requisition.
